CORRESPONDENCE.

WHO IS MY BROTHER?
MR. EDITOR.—In reference to the matter brought before your readers in this week's Reporter, in a letter under the above caption, endorsed by yourself, I beg to state that it is not in the power of the trustees of the North church to appropriate any of the monies accruing from the sale of the said property for the purpose named. Their duties are prescribed by act of parliament as well as by the discipline of the Methodist church. The objects to which they may apply the monies are specified, and provision is made for the surplus, if any; so that any alienation of funds for other purposes, however worthy, would vitiate their acts, and leave them liable to an action for maladministration.

The friends of Mr. Nash, however, need not regret this, as it will enable them to give proof of their sympathy in a way which must be a thousandfold more agreeable to Mr. Nash. It could take the form of a public testimonial of respect and gratitude, accompanied by that which would assure him that we mean to do our best for him.
