Mrs. Bessie Starr Keefe.

Mrs. Bessie Starr Keefe, the talented lady temperance lecturer, gave two addresses in Wolfville during the present week. The first, in the Presbyterian church on Sunday afternoon, although altogether unexpected and unannounced, was well attended by an audience that listened attentively to a stirring and able temperance sermon. Wednesday evening Mrs. Keefe spoke in the Baptist church which was well filled. Mr. Geo. C. Johnson, Deputy of Acadia Lodge, was chairman and Mr. R. R. Duncan, Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Good Templars, occupied a seat on the platform. After singing and prayer by Dr. Higgins, the lecturer was introduced, and for fully two hours occupied the full attention of her audience. The ideas enforced on this occasion was that our bodies are "living temples" and worthy of our utmost care and regard. That alcohol and tobacco, even when used in moderation, are the two great defilers of these temples. Their destructive effect on the muscular and nervous system was well illustrated by charts and emphasized in an able manner by the gifted speaker. She made an earnest plea for pure living on the part of both sexes. The subject was treated on a broader principle, by a more scientific method than is generally adopted on such occasions. We congratulate Acadia Lodge and the temperance cause in having such an able advocate, and feel sure that such addresses as those given by Mrs. Keefe must have a deep and lasting effect on the minds of the people and be productive of good results.

Berwick Jottings.

The public examination of our schools took place on the first inst. A large number of parents and friends present. All manifesting deep interest in the progress made in each department. The average is increasing. The No. registered in 1st department, 52; average attendance, 40. No. registered in 2d department, 52; average attendance 42-2. No. registered in 3d department, 58; average attendance, 46. No. pupils present at examination in the 2d department, 51. Another department is becoming a necessity. Pupils from outside are still pressing into the school.

What it Cost for Inspecting.

The following is a copy of the account of Inspector Ryan for inspecting the work done by the Local Government on the roads of King's county last season:

Surely the Government was not having road money spent as late as Dec. 9th. If so it is a crying scandal. It will also be seen that Mr. Ryan was perogating the county every week day, from June 17th to Dec. 9th rain or shine, thunder and lightning, floods and torrents, heat or cold seem to have made no difference. It will be seen that the total amount of the inspector's bill is \$690.00. We understand the amount paid in Yarmouth county for inspecting the expenditure on the roads was \$127.22.

GIFT FOR ACADIA.—Mark Curry, Esq. of Windsor, heretofore one of the most liberal givers to the institution here has, we understand, recently signified his willingness to be responsible for the salary of a Professor in any chair that the government of the College may think best to establish. Mr. Curry intends to permanently endow the chair, for the support of which he has decided to make himself responsible. This is the first case of a professorship being established at Acadia by a single individual.

S. P. C.—The annual meeting of the Wolfville branch of the Society for Prevention of Cruelty will be held in the vestry of the Presbyterian church Tuesday evening next beginning at 8 o'clock. A full attendance is requested.

To the Editor of the ACADIAN:

DEAR SIR,—Will you tell me if you can by whose authority a bill was prepared and sent to the Legislature authorizing the Municipality of King's county to borrow \$20,000 to buy a farm and erect buildings thereon for the poor and harmless insane. I see by referring to the minutes of last January term that a committee was appointed to buy the farm and erect the buildings. And I also find that there was a notice filed to reconsider at the April term of Council; but no instructions to borrow money for that project. I think it is quite time for that committee to present such a bill to the Legislature when they are instructed by the Council to do so. At all events they should wait to see what action the Council takes on it at the spring term. The time may come when perhaps it will be necessary for this county to have such an establishment, but I think there is no rush, especially when we are already overburdened with taxes. There is the ordinary county and poor taxes to be paid and some \$20,000 for right of way for the C. V. R. road, and a new Court House to be built perhaps this coming summer which I think is about as much as the rate payers of this county can handle at present. I think when we get through with those extra taxes we could build an establishment such as would be needed for this county without borrowing the money to do it with if the matter is properly handled. Thanking you Mr. Editor.

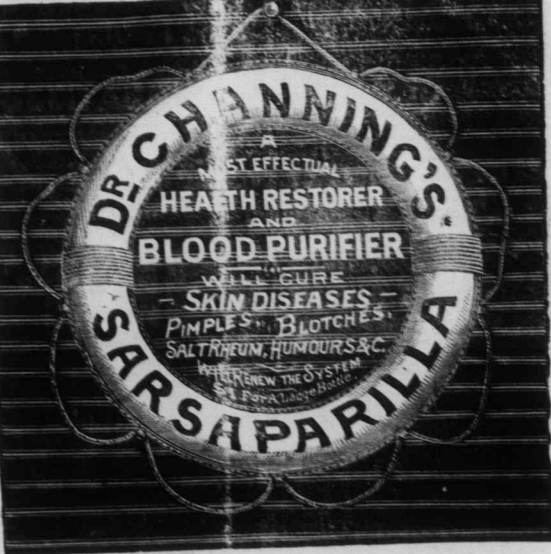

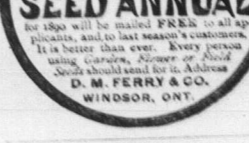
