OTAWA, April 27.

PILOTAGE

Mr. POPE (Queen's) introduced a bill further to amend "the Pilotage Act of 1873," by making a pilot's license renewable yearly and preventing licensed pilots from being harbourmasters. He stated that after the passing of the proposed act the license of pilots would be renewable yearly by endorsement on the back of the document. This was necessary because some pilots would not attend to their duties, and harbourmasters found difficulty getting rid of them.

Mr. MACKENZIE said he observed that in a recent interview with members of the Government, the Minister of Public Works promised a general revision of everything relating to the navigation of the lakes and of the St. Lawrence. In connection with the revision of the laws relating to pilotage done regarding the complaints made in reference to the pilotage on the St. Lawrence, Mr. MACKENZIE said he would like to know what change was to be made.

Mr. LANGEVIN said the hon. gentleman was right and that the Department had waited on the Government regarding the tolls on the canals, and in reference to the harbours of Quebec and Montreal. Mr. MACKENZIE said that the Government could not consider the matter at this moment, but did not promise that action would be taken immediately. The matter would be considered during the year, and whatever the Government determined upon would be communicated to Parliament.

Mr. MACKENZIE—Then no action is to be taken this session?

Mr. LANGEVIN—No.

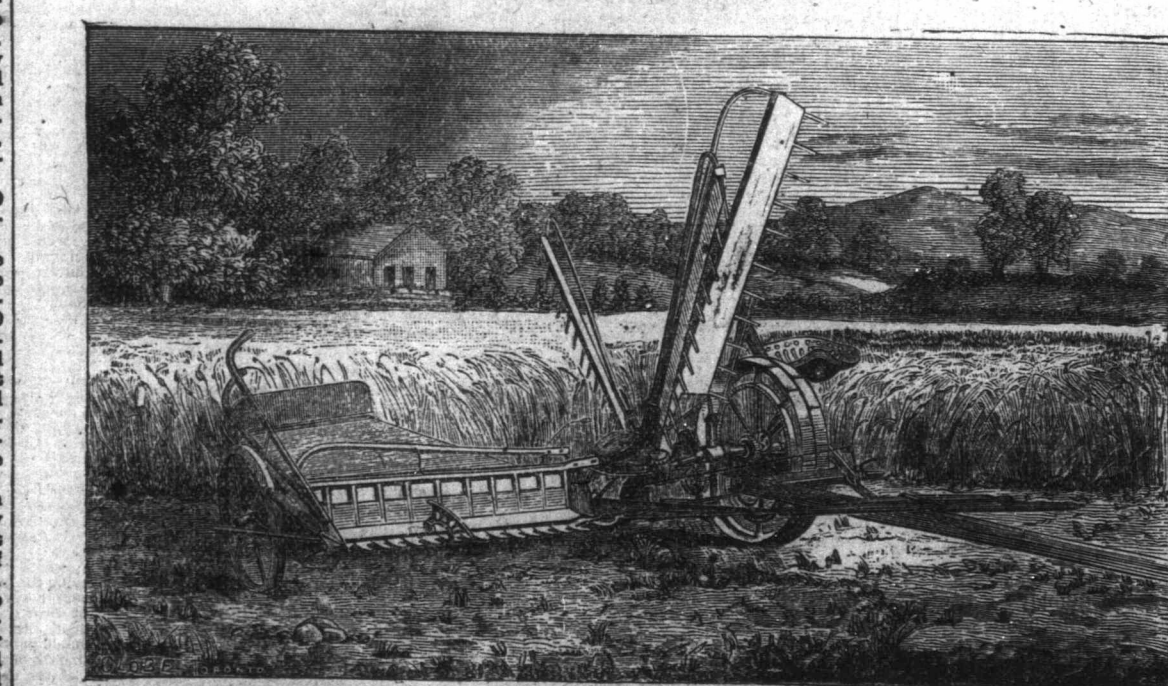
