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Prince Edward Island's First Ecclesiastic.
(Written for the Herald.)
Among the many talented sons of Prince Edward Island who have won distinction abroad, the name of DONALD MACDONALD occupies a prominent place, and yet strange to say, he is comparatively unknown in his native Province. The reason for this may be that at the time in which he lived, there was not the same frequent and regular communication between Quebec and the "Gem of the Gulf" which we of today enjoy, or it may be that the man having declined to walk in the path which friends and relatives had marked out for the boy, caused a coolness between Mr. Macdonald and his kindred in Prince Edward Island.
Donald Macdonald was born at Prince Point, in the parish of St. Clements, in the latter part of the last century. His father, John Macdonald, was one of the early settlers of that parish, and a man of very superior intelligence.
When in 1812, Bishop Plessis visited Prince Edward Island, he was very strongly impressed upon the necessity that existed for their writing a grammar and united effort to support some young students of their own nationality at the Quebec Seminary, so as to secure a succession of priests for their missions; the consequence of which was that very young two young boys, Donald and Donald Macdonald, were sent up to the Bishop as "Sealed of the Tribe of Levi." They were put to school in the Little Seminary, and in his letters to Mr. Macdonald, Bishop Plessis never forgets to comment favorably on their progress.
In October of 1813, he writes: "Donald is a remarkable boy, both as regards his talents and the progress which he makes. Donald is greatly his inferior, and is to be in the class. I have given orders that the education of both is to be pushed on. They are at the Quebec Seminary, and conduct themselves well."
In December of the same year, Mr. Plessis writes: "Donald is a brilliant pupil and makes rapid progress in his studies."
"Your two young people still promise well. Donald gets on finely in his third year, and Donald still better in 'rhetoric.'"
"In 1817: "Donald is now among the clergy and wears the sacred like yourself, perhaps more regularly."
"It was about this time that the young man about whom so many good hopes were centered, began to feel that he was not 'called of God' as Aaron, and he asked for leave to return home, giving as a plea the state of his health, but in all probability longing for a quiet retreat, away from all the bustle where he could think things over and weigh all pros and cons.
"This was not permitted him. Mr. Plessis wrote to the Bishop in the winter of 1819: "Mr. Donald, by going to Prince Edward Island, would retard his theological studies and would not improve his health. I have put him to stay for some months with a good country priest, where he will receive every consideration."
At this time the Rev. Mr. Demers, V. G., was the Superior of the Seminary of Quebec. This good priest made this announcement to Monsieur Macdonald, then young Bishop. He was both fond and proud of the brilliant youth who, a class-mate with such men as Messieurs Millot and Morin and Judge Bedard, found so difficultly in surpassing them and carrying off the scholastic honors of each succeeding year.
During his sojourn in the country parish, where his Bishop had placed him in order to regain his health, young Donald formed his decision—he could not be a priest. We may imagine the courage required to make this announcement to Monsieur Macdonald, then young Bishop, who depended on having him to send down to relieve poor over-worked Mr. Macdonald during the following year, and who, besides being conscious of the sacrifices made in the Island to provide means for his education, as money at that time was very scarce there, had himself, out of his own pocket, found so difficultly in surpassing them and carrying off the scholastic honors of each succeeding year.
At first the Bishop was disposed to treat the young man's reluctance to take holy orders as the effect of a scruple, and told him that so far from judging him qualified to be a priest, he confidently expected that he would one day be a Bishop. However, it was all in vain, Donald held firmly to his decision, and laid before the Bishop a letter in which he voluntarily renounced all claim to consecration to the pattern, or any property that might fall to his family's inheritance. Bishop Plessis was grieved and disappointed beyond expression, and naturally made no offer of further assisting his former protegee; in fact his Lordship had many other things on his mind just then, for in a very few weeks, on the 3rd of July, 1819, he was to embark on board of the George Sneyes for his famous voyage to Europe.
Mr. Demers, however, seeing his favorite pupil penniless and friendless, with no other dress than the common frock he was not entitled to wear, felt great compassion for him. This he manifested in the first place by sending him to the establishment of a tailor, one Robert Cairns, on Mountain Street, with an order for a good suit of clothes, for which he (Mr. Demers) paid. Then the kind priest procured him a situation as translator in the office of Quebec Gazette, of which Mr. John Neilson was the proprietor.
Meanwhile Mr. Plessis' displeasure passed off, and in 1824-25 Donald Macdonald was teaching, first at Riviere du Loup (on bank,

and then as Professor of English in the Seminary of Quebec. A few years in this capacity enabled him to lay by a little money—sufficient to warrant his commencing to study law—so that, in 1830, he was a law-student in Quebec. Now it chanced that that year a census of the Province had been taken, and the number of deaf mutes that were found to exist in the country awakened the attention and compassion of the Government. The poor creatures were completely uneducated—helpless and savage as wild animals. What was to be done with them? The question of the day, and the public, who were interested in the answer was found in the United States.
In the year 1817 a school for deaf mutes had been opened in Hartford, Connecticut, by the Rev. T. H. Gallaudet, who had been sent to learn the method of instructing those poor afflicted beings, which had been invented in that country by the priest, the Abbe de l'Epine. Gallaudet brought with him a deaf and dumb professor, a pupil of the celebrated Abbe Sicard, who had been trained by the Abbe de l'Epine himself. With this professor—Monsieur Laurent Clerc, Gallaudet opened his school, consisting of seven pupils. Soon it became a most flourishing institution, thanks, as history tells us, to the patronage of the public, and the interest taken by the Legislature.
In Quebec a committee had been formed to consider what was to be done with the deaf mutes of that Province. The committee consisted of the Very Rev. Mr. Demers, V. G., Superior of the Seminary; the Very Rev. Archbishop Mountain, of the Anglican Church—who, on resigning, preparatory to being consecrated Bishop of Montreal, was replaced by Rev. W. Sewell—and Joseph Roy, Esq., to whom succeeded Antoine Paron, Esq., M.P. This committee decided upon sending Mr. Donald Macdonald to the United States to study the method of teaching the deaf and dumb, and to instruct in that country, and to report upon them. After visiting the New York and Philadelphia establishments, Mr. Macdonald came to overbearing difficulties, and young Donald was to be sent to either of the others, and here he spent the year of 1830 learning the method upon which it was conducted. In 1831 he returned to Quebec, and in accordance with the intention for that class of persons in that country, and to report upon them. 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LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.
