Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of available Dominion land in Manhoba Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending

and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within pine miles of his homestead or a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father mother, son, daughter, brother or sie

In certain districts a bomesteader i good standing may pre-empt a quarte

Daties Must reside upon the home each of six years from date of home-alead entry (including the time sequired a homestead patent) and cultivate fifty

A homesteader who has exhauster bis homestead right and cannot oberful a pre-simplion may enter full a pullthase of homestead in certain description.
