

MAMIE MURPHY'S SLAYER

RUN TO EARTH IN A MICHIGAN LUM-BER TOWN.

Charles E. Buchanan, Formerly of Toron Police-He Confesses His Crime-How He was Tracked.

MUSKEGON, Mich., May 14.-Early this morning the police of this city received a telegram from Inspector Byrnes of New York City asking them to arrest a man here calling himself Richard A. Arthur for murder. The order was soon carried out and 'Arthur" locked up. Later he confessed the favor of Dr. Preston, who received the unan

According to his story he had been living in New York two years with a woman about 20 years old named Mamie Murphy. Three weeks ago last Monday night he met her out promenading with a policeman and the three went into a saloon. A quarrel soon followed and "Arthur" jerked out a pocket knife and

In the excitement "Arthur" escaped and managed to spend two days in the city without being arrested. Then he left there, traveling through various places on his way to Michigan. He is a printer by trade and was at Grand Rapids last week hunting work. He failed to get a job, but from information derived from him by the Typographical Union their knowledge of his whereabouts was obtained by the New York police.

Last Saturday "Arthur" came to Muskegon and got a job as compositor on a morning paper, where he was working when ar-rested. He is about 28 years old, medium size and quiet looking. He says he will go back to New York, plead guilty and take his

Jealousy drove him to the crime. He seems to have been deeply in love with the girl and carries with him one of her handker chiefs which he prizes very highly. He gave his name here as Arthur but is known under the alias of Charles E. Buchanan, while his real name is John Jackson. He will be held in jail until the New York officers arrive to take him home.

[Buchanan, it will be remembered, formerly lived in Toronto and left here a few years ago to avoid arrest for stabbing his wife on Yonge-street, opposite Albert Hall. All trace of him was lost until the story of the murder of Mamie Murphy in New York three weeks ago appeared in the papers.]

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"NEW TIPPERARY."

Why the People of Old Tipperary Built

Mew Town.

A flourishing and historic town with nearly 6,000 inhabitants, in the south of Ireland.—Tipperary, with all its streets and buildings, its schools, its banks, its churches, even the county jail and the poor-house—belonged a week ago to Arthur Hugh Smith-Barry. He was the landlord, and not only lord of the land but lord of the people. Today, it is true, he still owns Tipperary—that is, he ewns the land and the houses, but the people are gone and the town. are gone and the town is like a cage from which the bird has fled. The whole population, as described in a cable despatch to the N. Y. Sunday World, moved away the previous day, with bands playing and flags flying, to New Tipperary, a mile and a half distant, a

A TERRIBLE TORNADO. The City of Akron, Ohio, is Swept by &

Furious Hurricane. CLEVELAND, May 10.—A Leader special from Akron, O., says: At 5½ this evening in the midst of a most terrific cloudburst this city was struck by the worst ternado which has ever been known hereabouts, excepting, perhaps, the Sharon cyclone of a month ago. The storm struck the southern part of the city and tore through the fifth, fourth and second wards, doing damage which cannot be estimated at this writing, but fully 100 buildings are completely demolished and hundreds more are badly damaged.
