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FIRED ON FROM AMBUSH.

Rival Parties of Italians Have a Shooting Match in New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, La., May 8.—An attempt at wholesale assassination, believed to be the result of an Italian vendetta, was made at an early hour this morning and resulted in the serious wounding of three men.

As the wagon approached the party under the trees opened fire upon the men in the vehicle, and for a minute there was a sharp fusillade, 25 shots being fired altogether.

Most of the shots came from the men lying in wait, four or five being fired in return by the men in the wagon.

The other five men in the wagon escaped injury by jumping to the ground as soon as the firing began and lying down.

They were at a loss, they said, to account for the murderous assault, but one of them intimated that there was ill-feeling between them and the Provenzano gang.

Moses Frayley, the St. Louis grain speculator, who failed a few weeks ago, has compromised with his creditors on the basis of 40 cents on the dollar.

The fact that Italian money is being employed to foment disorder among the workmen in Paris is likely to sow bitterness between the two nations.

Mr. Hogue of North Carolina was Too Nervous for that Sort of Business.

NEW YORK, May 8.—J. J. Hogue of Grover Cleveland county, N.C., and his brother in law, R. F. Hambricht, who is said to be a wealthy planter, arrived at the Continental Hotel in Newark early on Friday morning.

They were homespun clothing and looked travel-worn. Hambricht is a powerfully built man and weighs 225 pounds.

Hogue is a much smaller man, of a very nervous temperament. Hambricht carried a small black satchel, which never left his hand.

At the station house he calmed down sufficiently to tell something about himself. He said that he and Hambricht had come north to deal with the "green goods" men.

When Hambricht returned to the Continental Hotel after his trip to New York he was surprised to learn that Hogue had not been seen since the morning.

He finally reported the case to the police, who learned where Hogue was. Hambricht was allowed to go to New Brunswick, and afterward started for the south with Hogue.

The circular which brought the two men North said the green goods were made from stolen Government plots, and were of course, indistinguishable from lawful money.

Earned His Insurance.

DETROIT, May 9.—Joseph Gingsras, an employe of the Detroit Electric Light and Power Company, was told by the superintendent to go to the basement and cut one of the wires of the lightning arrester—a duty which he was familiar.

"Another was a light brown ground with tiny red roses on it; that I made with a plain round waist, full skirt and turn over collar and cuffs of turkey red calico to match the roses."

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Excellence of Salt. If the feet are tired or painful after long standing, great relief can be had by bathing them in salt water.

Plain Fruit Cake.—Four cupfuls of light brown sugar, one and a half cupfuls of butter,—the butter and sugar creamed together,—six eggs, the yolks beaten separately and added next, two cupfuls of sweet milk, sift and stir in slowly six and a half cupfuls of flour which has four and a half teaspoonfuls of baking powder sifted and mixed through it, two teaspoonfuls of cinnamon, one of cloves and half a nutmeg.

Cutting and Arranging Food. It pays to be nice about it. Never use any but the bread knife to slice bread, and if possible cut no more than is actually needed.

Coffee Cake, with no Coffee in it.—One pint of flour, two heaping teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one of soda, one of salt, and added, mix with cold water to form a soft dough; grease a biscuit tin and pour into it; melt a tablespoonful of butter and pour over the dough, sprinkling a layer of white sugar over the top and a little ground cinnamon and, bake. This is to be eaten warm for breakfast with coffee. Break instead of cutting it.

Fried Fruit Cake.—A recipe which is forty years old. Take a two-quart basin even full of flour, put it in a new pan and pour in the centre two teaspoonfuls of sour cream, two cupfuls of buttermilk, one and a half cupfuls of sugar, two eggs, two teaspoonfuls of soda dissolved in hot water, half a teaspoonful of salt. Mix with the hands until it is ready to roll out. Fry in a kettle of hot lard.—Good Housekeeping.

Veal Flukes.—Chop some cooked veal fine; to add half the quantity of cracked cracker crumbs, one pint of the milk and cracker add one egg, a little cayenne, a little grated nutmeg, one saltspoonful of salt, one dessertspoonful of lemon juice, mix well; take about a tablespoonful and form into long narrow rolls; roll in beaten cracker crumbs, and fry in hot fat; serve on a red napkin; garnish with parsley and sliced lemon.

Cheese Cake.—Put two quarts of milk into a saucepan, when it becomes heated add two teaspoonfuls of rennet, place in a cool place until it is firm, then break it well and let it remain broken about an hour; pour the curd into a colander to strain; when dry pound it until smooth; then add two tablespoonfuls of sugar; two tablespoonfuls of butter, melted; mix all well together and add the yolks of four eggs well beaten, a little nutmeg; cinnamon and one pint of the curd; stir all well together, line patty tins with puff paste, fill each one with the curd, and bake about 20 minutes.

are not available, use glycerine, water and cologne in equal parts, as the pure glycerine has a great affinity for water and absorbs the moisture from the skin. Wear gloves in sweeping, in outdoor or rough work and keep the hands out of boiling water, as it is in no way necessary to cleanliness in any kind of housework. A dishcloth may be used for dishes, but in those cases where it is necessary to keep the hands in soap and water until they look parboiled, they may be made to feel much more comfortable by rubbing them thoroughly with plenty of vaseline and mutton suet, then washing in warm water holding a few drops of ammonia. When free from the grease, dry and rub with a few drops of diluted glycerine. Club soap powder, a very little of it, protects the pores from too rapid relaxation, and this will in a measure preserve the skin if rubbed over the hands before putting them into hot water. When the rough work for the day is finished, the nails should receive more attention than at the too often hurried morning toilet.

"NEW TIPPERARY."

Why the People of Old Tipperary Built a New Town.

A flourishing and historic town with nearly 6,000 inhabitants, in the south of Ireland—Tipperary, with all its streets and buildings, its schools, its banks, its churches, even the county jail and the poor-house—belonged a week ago to Arthur Hugh Smith-Barry.

There was great rejoicing when the procession reached the boundary of the Smith-Barry estate, half way between the old and the new towns, and the people as they passed it cheered like slaves that had been freed.

It would be difficult to imagine an incident more calculated to bring the incidents of the land-holding system into relief than this, or to furnish a better example of Henry George.

Here, then, is a man whose tenants have left him to go to a new town that they have built with great labor, who makes the monstrous proposition that he will follow them there and prevent them from trading among themselves...

Who is Smith-Barry, and how did he arouse the public ire which has exhibited itself in so signal a manner? He is a large landed proprietor living in Cork. He lives in Foata Castle, an ivy-covered medieval structure in a large and beautiful park looking out on the River Lee.

Some years ago Smith-Barry entered Parliament as a Parsonell and Home Ruler. He was a man of unbounded social ambition, and to this is ascribed the fact that he suddenly changed his political views, his desire being, it is said, to be made a baronet.

A year ago he conceived the brilliant idea of exterminating the Irish peasants who were in arrears with their rent on the Ponsonby estate, which covered a large area in the south of Ireland...

Then he asked Mr Balfour for a regiment of soldiers to help exterminate the Irish. Mr Balfour said that while he would like to accommodate Mr Smith-Barry he must decline to furnish the soldiers, as previous wholesale evictions had given him too much trouble from members of his own party.

He had meanwhile been industrious in making speeches and writing public letters of a nature well calculated to arouse angry passion, and finally the leaders of the Land League concluded to teach him a lesson to mind his own business and let other people do their evictions.
