The fishermen of Newfoundland have been called upon to pay a heavy toll to the sea during the past ten or eleven months. Of the four great disasters two were met in the course of industrial service and two in naval service. The conditions to which the ice crew of the S.S. Newfoundland were subjected caused the death of 78 of our sealers and crippled others The storm of the same day, the fatal 31st of March sent 173 stalwart sealers to a watery grave. These were the toll of a hazardous occupation on the icefields and at sea, and were by far the most serious losses the country has been called upon to face. We have now begun to feel the losses of the war and these losses have struck Newfoundland in proportion to Dominions across the sea.

FOR ITALY'S PARTICIPATION. Rome, Feb. 15.—The Idea Nazionale, a newspaper published in the inter-

ests of the Nationalist party, in its issue of to-day, publishes a forecast of German proposals to Italy which

"Before the end of February Prince Von Buelow, the German Ambassador to Italy, will present to the Italian Italian participation in the war on the side of Germany.

"This consists of the cession of Austria of the Province of Trent and the rectification of the Eastern Italian frontier by the addition of a strip of land going as far as the Isonzo River. "In addition Germany will pledge herself to conclude a new treaty with Italy, which will afford protection to

Italy's Mediterranean interests." "In exchange Italy is to take part at once in the war. She will occupy Tunis and help Turkey drive the English from Egypt, which will return under the dominion of the Sultan of Turkey.

"In addition the Italian fleet will attack the Anglo-French naval forces in the Mediterranean."







Bridgeport, Conn., Feb. 12.-Fanny Crosby, well-known blind hymn-writer, died to-day at her home in her 95th year.

Fanny Crosby.

Her death was not unexpected, as her health had been failing for some time. At her bedside were her niece Mrs. Henry D. Booth and other members of the family, with whom she had

made her home for years. Although her health had become more feeble, especially within the past few months, Miss Crosby did not stop her work, but continued writing hymns up to within a short time of her death

Eight thousand hymns of Christian vorship sung in Protestant churches throughout the world, are the work of Fanny Crosby. No one since the days of Charles Wesley or Isaac Watts has made anywhere near as large a contribution to the gospel song book as did the blind writer whose death occurred to-day.

Fanny's Crosby's name was signed so regularly as author of one hymn after another that the hymn book makers of a quarter of a century ago were forced to give her some 200 different pen names to make it appear that someone beside the famous writer had contributed. Thousands-perhaps hundreds of thousands-who sang her songs, which were translated into every language, did not know that it was a blind woman's inspiration which they employed to express their Christian faith and hope in

"Saved by Grace," "Blessed Assur-nce," "Rescue the Perishing," and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus" are typical of Fanny Crosby's most popular

Fanny Crosby did not begin hymnriting until she was over 40 years of age. Fifty years ago she was best known for her popular melodies. which were whistled all over the country, such as "Proud World, Goodby, I'm Going Home," "Hazel Dell." "The Honeysuckle Glen," and "Never Forget the Dear Ones."

Born in Putnam County, New York State, March 24, 1820, christened Frances Jane Crosby, and married to Alexander Van Alstyne, a blind music teacher, who died many years ago, the blind writer lived to be nearly 95 years old. Her mother had lived to be 102, and her grandmother to be 106. She retained to the last all her faculties, excepting eyesight. She lost this during a fever in infancy when a hot poultice was applied to her eyes, destroying the optic nerve. At eight years the little girl displayed her first talent in versification by this philosophy of contentment:

Oh, what'a happy soul am I; Although I cannot see: I am resolved that in this world Contented I will be.

How many blessings I enjoy, That other people don't, To weep and sigh because I'm blind,

I cannot, and I won't. For twelve years she studied at the New York institution for the Blind She never learned to read by the raised letters. Playing the guitar while a child she so calloused her fingers that they were never sensitive enough to read the raised characters. All she learned she memorized from hearing. During her connection with the institution, which included an additional 12 years as a teacher, she travelled all over the country declaiming her own verses.

Food High in London.

London, Feb. 4.-In view of the increasing cost of food, which is due almost entirely to high freight rates, and the congestion of goods at the docks, members of the Corporations of Glasgow, Liverpool and other cities in the Kingdom, to-day proposed the passage of resolutions for the framing of a petition to the Government in favour of government control of foodstuffs and coal and the shipping services. While the resolution was defeated, those present at the meeting expressed strong views that immediate action by the Government was necessary as wheat, flour and coal are daily increasing in price.
