





But if rumors be true, we shall not suffer very long from this, as it is the hourly topic around here that the train, in the very near future, is taking up a regular service on the Bay de Verde branch railway, and there is no doubt but that will relieve the situation somewhat. As we have the railway nearly completed, it is only reasonable that the train should run right now, we have bee put off long enough.

Three of our Labrador schooners are now on the other side of this bay getting their summer's voyage made and the stormy weather is making their trip a very long one.

Three of our schooners have been waiting here for a fortnight or three John's, and it seems as if their delay will be lengthened considerably vet as there is a fierce storm now raging.

The fishermen are doing very poy of late, partly on account of the weather and partly from the scarcity of bait. There have been practically no squid here this year, the fishermen take their horses and carts and drive to Bay de Verde every evening in



Stirring News From the Front.

Hard on the good news of brilliant achievements in France comes the news of a smashing victory by the British force under General Nixon in Mesopotamia. The three Turkish armies sent to oppose the British advance on Amara on the Tigris have been scattered and are now in flight along the river Tigris towards Bagdad. There is also another British Force operating along the banks of it GOOD? Why, at WHELAN'S the Euphrates, and it is probable that the statement in the muddled-up message from Athens, that "The two offensive forces are gradually closing in," has reference to these forces and not to the Mesopotamia army and the Gallipoli forces a thousand miles away. Some 500 miles to the north of General Nixon's victory, part of the Rusian Caucasus forces is operating in the region around Lake Van. I may be that this force operating in the upper watersheds of the Tigris will descend the tributaries of the Tigris towards Bagdad while the Anglo-Inthe Tigris and Euphrates and clear the great valley of the Euphrates and Tigris of Turkish forces. It is possible that these operations may have some influence on the Gallipoli operations and possible operations in Thrace by keepng Turkish troops employed against the Russian and British forces and thus preventing them being sent to aid in the defence of European Turkey. The loss of three German corps when added to the losses which the great thrust against Russia must have entailed will have a weakening effect on Germany and Austria, and may explain the delay in the long heralded general advance of the Central Powers through Servia. If the Russians can keep the great Teutonic armies in the East, and if it is true that Belgium is being greatly denuded of German troops to meet the allies offensive in Artois and Champagne, it would be surprising if the Germans and Austrians were able to detach an overwhelming army to crush Servia. The danger zone to Servia would appear not to be the Central Powers but the Bulgarian Czar Ferdinand, who it should be remembered is an Austrian, born and bred in Austria, and who was a lieutenant in the Austrian army at the time he was elected

Burning of Louvain. Austrian Priest's View of German


The report of an Austrian pries on the burning of Louvain by the Ger mans in August, 1914, is reproduced in the Tablet from the leading Catho lic paper of Holland, "De Tijd."

The priest spoke to very many citi zens of the town and convinced him self that no Belgian plot ever existed in Louvain to surprise the German troops in possession. He found that German soldiers fired on other German troops, thinking they were enemy roops. He tells of a German army doctor who, according to a parish priest, injured his head by falling

against a wheel. The officer said "I have been fired upon!" The Austrian priest says: "Can we suppose that the order to destroy Louvain came from the highest quarters? And was that order to be carried out, even after the mistakes were discovered, in order to save the honour of the German army?" He quotes many significant forewarnings by German officers of Louvain's impend-

ing fate, and adds. "That an order was given to destroy the town, or at least a part of it, is proved beyond all doubt as far as ! am concerned. I know a man who saw in the hand of an officer a map of Louvain with the parts to be waste marked upon it. The Cathedral of St. Peter was burnt by design."





BRITISH SUCCESS IN MESOPOTA-

LONDON, Sept. 29.

The British have won an important success in Mesopotamia, and the Turks are in full retreat toward Bagdad, whilst the British are pursuing them. An announcement to this effect was made in the Commons to-day by Austin Chamberlain. Mr. Chamberlain read a telegram from General Nixon, commanding the forces in Mesopotamia, relating to the outcome of the recent fighting. He reported that one position, carried by the Britthat one position, carried by the Br ish, constituted a long line of defe ces astride the River Tigris. At point seven miles east of Kut two br gades crossed the river from the right bank, and by a forced march reache the left works of the Turkish position carrying it by assault at night. The whole position has been carried. The Turkish losses in dead are described as severe. The Turks clung to their trenches with great tenacity. They were filled with corpses when the British finally carried them. A number of guns, many rifles, several hundred prisoners, and a quantity of ammunition were captured. General Nixon gives the British casualties as under five hundred. A second despatch from him says that the enemy's position in advance of Kut Amara, has been captured with many prisoners and guns. The enemy is in full flight toward Bagdad. Our forces are pushing the pursuit. The details will follow. General Nixon's second despatch indicates that the British forces made a long advance in the interval since the previous official report. Kut Amara is on the Tigris River, 150 miles below Bagdad.

BRITAIN'S NEW TARIFF.

LONDON, Sept. 29. The Commons approved to-day the resolutions fixing import duties on ea, coffee, cocoa, sugar and dried fruits. The higher rates proposed in the Budget by Chancellor McKenna, currants, are excluded from the dried fruit schedule, the Government having discovered the existence of a treaty with Greece, which necessitates that a year's notice must be giv en before the duty can be increased.

AMERICAN RECRUITS.

LONDON, Sept. 29. There have been so many cases o recruiting sergeants inducing Ameripent of their enlistment, shall be promptly released. The American mans." Embassy, of late, has turned all cases over to Consul General Skinner who now has a number of them under consideration. The facts in all the cases are similar. The men, arriving in England, are met on board ship by recruiting agents. The British Government does not favor the practice, and is doing all it can to break it up.

Guns of Allies Destroy German Works in the West.

Paris, Sept. 21.—Countless German orks were destroyed, other enemy Hudson Bay. A fortnight ago when that ship was at Halifax he sat before the Marine Examining Board and weeks all along the battle front.

An official statement this afternoon contained the reasons for the cannonade that for duration and number of shells poured in upon the enemy's trenches surpassed any previous arillery storm of the war.

"These heavy artillery actions along the entire front resulted in the destruction of divers enemy works," said the official statement. "The cannonades, often unaccompanied by infantry attacks, were intended to destrov worrisome enemy positions and miltrailleuses, demolish enemy shelter places, impede the concentration of enemy troops, and render it impossible for the enemy to hold certain works.

Storms of French Shells.

"Day and night storms of French shells descended upon the enemy ments, bridges and supply columns. The efficiacy of the French fire throughout the bohmbardment was proven by the reports of our aerial observers who constantly flew over the front noting the results of the canonnades. German prisoners also admitted that the damage done their positions was most serious.

"The amount of ammunition expended proves the resources of France in shells. The incessant activity gave assurance that a war of attrition could continue with small losses for our

How Indian Wounded are Treated at Brighton.

(By Our Medical Correspondent.) The unusual problems which have to be solved in connection with the special hospital for Indian troops in England were the subject of the opening discussion at the meeting of the Royal Sanitary Institute at Brighton

yesterday.
Major S. P. James, M.D., I.M.C., of the Kitchener Hospital, Brighton, described this institution as unique among those in England in the absence of female assistance, even the landry work being done by Indian washermen specially brought for this

ourpose.

To ensure that class prejudices and customs be strictly adhered to a committee of Indian commissioned and non-commissioned officers was appointed. Eight different kinds of diet are arranged for, separate cook-houses supplying six different classes. Hindu cooks of the same or of a higher caste than the patients for whom they cook are provided. 

Iceland is situated in the Atlantic Ocean so far north that no ocean liner has ever run into it in a fog. It is one of the coldest and most isolated of civilized lands and one of the hap-

piest, because no government has ever considered it worth attacking with a fleet and army. Iceland is about 250 miles east of Greenland and 600 miles west of Norway. Hundreds of years before North America was discovered the fierce Vikings landed on Iceland occasionally and it has been settled with

Europeans for many centuries. It is 300 miles long and 200 miles broad and has 75,999 inhabitants and no moving-picture theatres, bill-boards, joy-rides, trusts, aldermen or automatic pianos. Because of these facts Icelanders live very contentedly and very rarely emigrate to warmer countries.

Iceland is about as far north as Nome and in the northern part the sun doesn't set for a week at a time in midsummer. But it has the finest warm-water heating system in the world-being in the middle of a branch of the Gulf Stream. This keeps Iceland from freezing solid in the winter, but also keeps it so foggy and damp in the summer that a corn crop wouldn't ripen in three years, and an implement salesman would starve, for there are no farmers on the Island. Hay is the only crop made, but sheep, ponies, eider ducks and reindeer are raised and the Icelanders catch enough fish in the summer to keep them supplied with fish-balls all winter.

The Icelanders belong to Denmark, but speak the purest Norwegian left in circulation and govern themselves so successfully by means of an "Althing" that they have never had a scandal. This country should at once dispatch a commission to Iceland to examine the "Althing" and bring a shipload of them here, if possible.

Iceland exports wool, stockings, fish, horses, eider down and moss. It has a telgraph cable to Europe and since the war a ship line to the United States. Those Americans who cannot get along happily on \$500,000 a year should make a short excursion to Iceland and examine its inhabitants with great care.


