





#### **Land Settlement** for Ex-Service Men.

The Government is prepared to consider the question of affording to exsailors and ex-soldiers of suitable character, education and adaptation an opportunity of settling on the

The training that would be required of men who would like to take advantage of any scheme the Government may propose would be as fol-

(a) Work on a farm under some approved farmer for the Summer and Autumn of 1920.

(b) Every man who during his sum mer's work had demonstrated his industry and adaptability to agricultural pursuits would be given an agricultural course in some approved agricultural col-lege, experimental farm or similar institution for the winter 1920-1921.

Every man who had completed the winter's course and during the course had demonstrated his industry and adaptability to agricultural pursuits would be given work on a farm under some approved farmer for the summer of 1921.

(This second summer on a farm might not be required of men who prior to enlistment in Navy or Army had been practical farmers.)

Men who had by their work and conduct during the above courses denonstrated their industry and adaptability to agricultural pursuits and their ability to earn a livelihood for themselves as farmers would be furnished by the Government with a loan of money on easy terms of repayment to enable them to secure small farms with the necessary equipment an stock to start a farming enterprise.

As it is probable that but few men would be able during training to earn sufficient for their own support and the support and maintenance of their dependents, their wages would be supplemented to a reasonable amount, depending upon the circumstances of each case. "Dependents" would include the wives and children of men

#### Much Interest in American Cup Race.

The problem of the America's Cup is evidently creating much interest among scientific yachtsmen, says the London, England Field. We have been asked why the Shamrock IV. is so designed that she will have to concede considerable time allowance to the defender? It is suggested it would seem, if Shamrock IV. is shaped and rigged in such a style, that she must concede much time allowance under the American rule, the designer must have been unwise to design her in this form. What is our opinion on this point? It is that no man can say it was unwise to design the challenger in this way. On the contrary, the designer appears to have approached the situation in bold style. In planning his attack the architect had the option of going to work on conventional lines and giving the owner a mcderate "gentle" vessel of similar size to the American type, in which case there would e practically no time allowance. Hal ne adopted this course it would have been a very difficut thing to defeat Herreshoff, especially difficult, we think to beat him in his own waters. which he knows so well. The architect therefore adopts the differentand we may say, the unexpectedform of attack, and produces a vessel of great size, power, and weatherliness. What, then, is the chance of success under these conditions? We said in a former article that Sham rock IV. had "a sporting chance." We repeat this opinion and use no stronger expression because we dislike the idea of being too sanguine. We do not wish to blow any trumpets. We always get hammered in the America's Cup somehow or other, and we can only hope for the luck to change this Leap Year.

Long experience of racing days racing ways, however, leads us to think well of the "sporting chance" of the big vessel with the long immersed side and huge upstanding sail plan. Goodness how such vessels do walk along in a breeze of wind! We know them well: directly you haul in the mainsheet and the side goes down, and the gunwhale is just awash, they step out to windward in a marvellous manner and the small ships seem nowhere. "Time allowance" seems no use at all to them, and they fade away in the haze almost out of sight astern. So whilst those aboard the Shamrock IV. will naturally be wondering "if she will do it," we can quite picture the American gentlemen on their small poat having that uncomfortably feeling, "This enormous vessel is going to sail right away from us." By the way, we know no more uncomfortable feeling in racing; the only thing to be done seems to be to go down below and have lunch! There are many possibilities when the first gun fires for the America's Cup.





#### The Dublin Outbreak. On April 20 and 21, 1916, an attempt

to land arms and ammunition in Ire-

land was made by a disguised German auxiliary vessel which H.M.S. Bluebell ordered to go into Queenstown for search. The vessel, however, suddenly flew the German flag, the crew put off in two boats and the ship foundered. The men were captured near Tralee. Later on a small boat was seen to capsize in the surf and Sir Robert Casement, who had evidently landed from it, was taken prisoner in an old fort. On April 24 the storm burst in Dublin, the Castle being seized by rebels, as well as the General Post Office, the Four Courts, the College of Surgeons, the Workhouse and Jacob's Factory, Stephen's Green was held by the Post Office occupants. Tramlines were torn up and the city put in darkness, railway bridges destroyed and rails cut. On the Wednesday the Admiralty steamer, "Helga," came up the Liffey and bombarded Liberty Hall, the headquarters of the outbreak. The Sinn Fieners, as the rebels called themselves, made their escape when the shells reached its climax on Thursday and Friday, when artillery was brought into play at every point and women succumbed to their wounds or the bombardment continued unceas- died from shock. Casement was tried ingly, the city being illuminated with for treason and executed. great conflagrations. On Saturday, the 29th, the rebels surrendered unconditionally to General Lowe two-thirds of their "army" having been killed, wounded or taken prisoners. Fourteen of the leaders were shot, four sentenced to penal servitude for life, twentyone for ten years, while forty-one received shorter sentences. 


