THE RECKLESS PEDESTRIAN.

Enough has been written to all volumes about the reckless auto driver. I should like to register a less familiar protest—against the reckless pedestrian. And by the reckless pedestrian I mean the person who is unnecessarily careless in his use of the streets and does not do his share in making them a safe place for automobiles to run in and people to cross over. Here is an example of the sort I mean.

With Lowered Head.
As I was driving through a busy street in a small city, I saw a girl with her head bent, evidently thinking of some important matter, coming across the sidewalk toward the street. I subconsciously kept my eye on her as the driver of an automobile does on every moving object that may concern him. One would have expected the girl to look up as she stepped off the sidewalk. But she never raised her head a particle and actually started to cross the street without looking either way. I blew the horn and sid up with a vaguely surprised air as if astonished to see such a thing as an automobile. Yet machines must pass there at the rate of, at least, half a dozen a minute. Could anything be more foolishly reckless and absurd?

The Pedestrian Foolish.
In wet weather the pedestrian who stops carelessly into the path of a machine, and forces the driver to throw his brakes, is endangering not only his own life, which presumably he has some right to risk, but also the lives of the occupants of the car. Again and again we read of skidding accidents where the brake has been thrown to counteract some pedestrian's carelessness and the occupants of the machine are injured or killed as a result. Suppose the pedestrian, in such a case, were arrested on a charge of manslaughter, would that be injustice? Provided, of course, that the man in the car was driving at a reasonable rate. The nearest I ever came to a bad accident was when a boy on a bicycle shot out from a hidden path in the bushes in front of our machine and we took the ditch to save him.

Four Miles an Hour.
Unless you believe in abolishing machines or in having them run as they used to be with a man with a red flag walking in front of them—you must recognize that streets are places for pedestrians to cross with reasonable care. Children ought to be taught to look always to the left as they step into the street and then to the right as they reach the middle. This would become a subconscious habit and would save many lives.

Estimates Increase in Italian Revenue.

ROME, March 18.—Minister of Finance Bertone, in a financial statement to the Chamber of Deputies today, estimated that the revenue for 1922 would amount to 12,500,000,000 lire, compared to approximately 11,000,000,000 lire in 1921. He said the government proposed to co-ordinate taxation, whereby it was hoped gradually to return to a normal budget.—Sunday Herald.

Finishing Touches Applied.

SUNRISE LAND PREPARING FOR PRINCE'S VISIT.

TOKIO, April 11. (Associated Press)—Tokio, with its cherry trees in full bloom, was applying its finishing touches to its festive attire to-day, preparing to welcome Edward, Prince of Wales, who is due tomorrow for a week's visit to the capitol and a tour of Japan until May 8, as a guest of the Japanese nation. When the battleship Renown steamed into Yokohama with its royal passenger, one of the most eager of the throng of welcome was Prince Hirohito, Regent of Japan, whose visit to London last year brought about the exchange of courtesies culminating in Prince Edward's visit to the Orient. The seven days the British Royal visitor will spend in Tokio will be absorbed largely by court and official visits, as well as by numerous state banquets. There will be short periods, however, in which the Prince may see the interesting sights of the city. The program has been planned in such a way that it will allow the visitor to see as much as possible of ancient customs and of Old Japan.

ALL BRITONS WELCOME.

With this in view, a visit has been arranged to the Meiji shrine, where the Prince will see the people's loyalty and reverence for the greatest Japanese of modern times. At a special performance to be given in one of the leading theaters, he will see a gorgeous spectacle of Old Japan while in the royal gardens he will be introduced to that curious blend of art and nature—landscape in miniature. British subjects living in the Orient who desire to meet their future ruler have not been overlooked. He will be "at home" for one entire afternoon in the British Embassy, where all Britons will be welcome. It also is planned to have him attend special Easter service in the English church. His week in Tokio ended, the prince will start for Nikko, the famous Imperial mountain resort, and Mecca of the devout the whole year round. Next will be a visit to Hakone, one of the most beautiful spots in all Japan. From there he will journey to Kyoto, perhaps the only city in

Mounted Police Kept Busy in North.

A marked increase in the work of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police is noted in the report of the force just made public by Commissioner A. B. Perry. The total strength of the force, all ranks, is 1,680 men, an increase of nine over the year previous. The scope of the work in the report covers the entire Dominion. Particular importance is attached to activities in the Arctic regions. The report says: "Our work in the Arctic presents features of special interest and importance. Whereas last year Tree River, on Coronation Gulf, was our most remote outpost, that position has been taken by Ponds Inlet, adjacent to Little Sound, and at the northern end of Baffin Island. Along the coast of the Arctic Ocean and in Victoria Bay, disturbingly large number of acts of violence have had to be dealt with and the prevalence of infant mortality a problem with which the Government is dealing."

German Violation of Conference Pledges.

British Press Express Astonishment--- Allies Will Render Treaty Nugatory--- Germany Debarred From Further Participation--- Portuguese Aviators Reach Third Objective.

VIOLATED THE CONDITIONS. GENOA, April 18. The Allies have addressed a note to the German Delegation declaring Germany's conclusion of a treaty with Soviet Russia as a violation of conditions to which Germany had herself on entering the Economic Conference.

AVIATORS REACH ST. PAUL'S ROCK. PERNAMBUCO, April 17. Captains Coutinho and Sacaudia, on their flight from the Cape Verde Islands arrived at St. Paul's Rock, just above the equator, at 8 p.m.

PROHIBITION RESOLUTIONS DEFEATED BY NARROW MAJORITY. LONDON, April 18. The Independent Labor Party in Conference at Nottingham defeated by a vote of 174 to 130 two resolutions introduced by the Scottish branches in favor of the total prohibition of the liquor traffic. A resolution in favor of nationalization of the liquor traffic and local option was also defeated.

SHIP AND CREW SAVED. NORFOLK, April 17. The Canadian schooner Cumberland Queen, abandoned by her crew off Cape Hatteras, was towed into Virginia Capes to-day by the coast guard cutter Manning. The crew were picked up by a tanker and landed at Charleston, S. C.

WELLAND BARRACKS ATTACKED. DUBLIN, April 17. Welland Barracks occupied by Free State troops, was attacked at midnight. A sentry was wounded.

OUT FROM THE CONFERENCE. GENOA, April 17. The Allies have decided that Ger-

many having affected her own agreement with Russia in the Treaty signed on Sunday at Rapallo, is debarred from further participation in the discussion of the condition of the agreement between Russia and the various other countries represented at the Economic Conference.

BRITISH PRESS CONDEMNS TREATY. LONDON, April 18. It would not be easy to imagine anything possible happening at Genoa which would create greater astonishment and misgiving than the announcement of the Russo-German Treaty signed in the majority of the newspapers. With one or two exceptions the pact is condemned in the best language as a deadly blow at the conference, at the Versailles Treaty and at the peace of Europe. The Times says "It is an defiance and studied insult to Entente Power who summoned Conference, and to a less degree invited to attend it. The German press that the choice of time and place was without significance and impertinence."

NULL AND VOID. LONDON, April 18. The Allies have agreed, that the Rogers Commission shall declare the Russo-German Treaty null and void, says the Genoa correspondent of the Daily Mail.

BELFAST, April 18. Sniping continued throughout the afternoon in the Marrowbone District. The military replaced the police and had great difficulty in locating the snipers. The casualties were slight. Silgo has been evacuated by the insurgent Republicans who occupied the city last week. In Belfast riotous crowds set fire to a dozen houses and looted some shops.

WINNIPEG, April 18. Last week was very disappointing for the western farmers who looked for sunshine and warm rains. Blizzards in Southern Alberta have caused severe losses among cattle, weakened by a short food supply.

VETERANS TO USE WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.

OTTAWA, April 18. The Dominion Command War Veterans Association proposes to adopt Radio Telegraphy to provide quicker communication with provincial and city units. Important speeches will be broadcasted by radio.

A SUPERFLUOUS LIGHT.

BOSTON, April 18. For the first time since 1887, Egg Rock Light off Nahant, last night failed to flash its warning to passing vessels. The light was considered superfluous and has been dismantled.

Care of Cut Glass.

When not in use, cut glass should be protected against the tarnishing effect of the atmosphere by a wrapping of soft tissue paper. The sulphur and other impurities of the air give cut glass a clouded appearance which destroys its brilliancy.

To wash cut glass, the pieces should be first placed singly in a bowl of warm, soapy water. Piling the articles together in the bowl may chip the incisions. A pure soap, free from strong acids, is recommended, for strong soap dulls the surface. Use a soft brush, and rinse in clear, warm water, wiping dry with a linen towel. Linen produces the best polish though a fine hard cotton towel may be substituted. Finally, rub with a warm dry towel, and polish with soft tissue paper. This will make the glass sparkle and heighten the brilliancy of the polish.

Table glasses which have contained milk or other adhesive fluid should be rinsed in warm water softened with soda or ammonia before being washed. This preliminary avoids a cloudy appearance.

Washing with hot, strong vinegar and scraping with a putty knife will remove paint from window panes.

1200 Pounds Capital for Each Emigrant.

If a scheme soon to be laid before the Government of Victoria is approved, provision will be made for the settlement in this richly fertile State of Australia of 10,000 settlers from Great Britain at a cost of £12,000,000.

Each emigrant will be advanced working capital to the extent of £1,200, with which he will pay for the building of a homestead and the laying out of his land.

This scheme, which represents the most direct lead yet given in solving the joint problem of emigration and unemployment and bringing about a White Australia, is being pushed forward very strenuously by Mr. John McWhae, the new Agent-General for Victoria.

As a supplement to the scheme it is hoped to extend the present system of agricultural colleges in Victoria for the purpose of giving unmarried settlers six months' training at a cost of £20, which would be charged to the "settling loan."

Co-Operation.

If it is the desire of the trade, as represented by the Board of Trade, or others not members of that body, to induce the Government to reduce taxation on imports and to correspondingly reduce expenditure, all hands must pull together. No use is there in talking on and then pulling in different directions. There can be only one line of purpose and that line must essentially be unanimity. There should be no attempt whatever made at confusing interests or introducing extraneous matters for discussion. All realize that we have gone beyond the end of our resources both in taxation and expenditure. Therefore realizing collectively that the come down must begin somewhere, let all be united on defining where that somewhere is. We have, necessarily, to get beyond the ruck and turmoil and confusion of party politics if the desideratum is to be accomplished. Recriminations will not assist nor profit. Rather will they retard and bring about loss. The Committee to be appointed by the Board of Trade to consult with the Government on this very vital and insistent matter of the hour need not fear any hostile criticism from the press if they perform the duties expected of them without fear, favor or affection. Rather we think will the personnel thereof have the backing of the whole community in their efforts.

Newfoundland is perilously near the parting of the ways between present failure and future success. The fishermen—the real producers—are between the devil of excessive taxation and the deep sea of denial of supplies for the prosecution of their sole industry. It follows consequently that something has to be done without further hesitation if Newfoundland as a producing factor in fish food commodities will be permitted to exist. The whole country is sweating under the weight of the load of taxation imposed upon it, and it must continue to sweat, or give up the ghost, if the Government persists in pursuing the course of the Budget speech. There is no hope. We say here and say it emphatically that the Colony cannot go on and prosper under the financial conditions which obtain at the moment. Unless there is a let up the break will surely come. It cannot be staved off much longer. The Government surely must perceive that there is no financial salvation unless a halt is called in the present extravagant race. At least the most intelligent of its members will, unless their eyes are blinded by the glitter of their positions. The plain unvarnished facts of the standing of Newfoundland's people as producers, and competitors of other countries in the fish business are in their possession, and a realization of that which it will mean if we are driven to the wall, or to go further, driven to

desperation by stubbornness on the part of the administration. To-day is not the day of threats or disunion. It is the day of co-operation and holding together. The olive branch has been held out over the question of the tariff. It is up to the Government to accept it, and to give co-operation for co-operation, assistance for assistance. Failing that, the hour may be ripe for the public to have not only a say, but a do.

Wabana Subject of Address.

Hugh B. Gillis superintendent of mines and quarries for the British Empire Steel Corporation, addressed the Sydney Rotary Club at yesterday's luncheon, says the Sydney Post on April 12th. In his talk Mr. Gillis dealt with operations of the company's mines in Wabana, Bell Island, Newfoundland, and brought out many facts of interest to his listeners. The luncheon was presided over by Roderick P. C. Campbell.

Extensive Repairs Necessary.

SHIP MORE DAMAGED THAN REALIZED.
S.S. Glenarmonch, which struck the rocks near Hay Cove, when she drifted from her anchorage in the Harbor last fall will have to receive considerable repairs. The ship was docked last week and after a survey, it was found that the rudder and stern frame were so badly damaged that they will have to be replaced. The new parts have been ordered and should arrive here within the next fortnight. The ship was taken off dock yesterday but will go on again when the necessary material arrives from New Glasgow.

The Return of Belisarius

MR. COAKER COMING HOME.
Mr. Coaker is coming home! This thrilling news was spread over the city yesterday, and flags were flying from one or two house-tops while ringing cheers could be heard emanating from the Advocate office all day. THE CRUCIFIX.

He hung there at the crossroads

(c) Total net earnings, if any, for each ship; (d) Net deficit, if any, for each ship; (e) The names of all parties from whom supplies were purchased during the above period with total amounts in each case.

To ask the Hon. Prime Minister for a detailed statement of the employees, positions occupied and salaries paid of the Militia Department for the year ending June 30th, 1921, also from July 1st, 1921 to date.

To ask the Hon. Prime Minister what money, if any, has been received during the past two years from the British Government on account of Newfoundland's expenses of the Forestry Battalion; and what fund this money had been applied to, giving detailed account of expenditure of same.

SIR M. P. CASHIN—To ask Hon. the Prime Minister if it is the intention of the Government to give any sum directly or indirectly, to the Union Trading Company in the way of supplying for the fishery this year, and if so is it the intention to adopt the same policy with regard to all parties who may be proposing the supply for the fishery of 1922.

To ask Hon. the Prime Minister if he or the Government is aware of the whereabouts of the Hon. W. F. Coaker, Minister of Marine and Fisheries; if it is the intention of the Government to appoint a Commission to search for Mr. Coaker, and if he intends to recommend the Chairman of the said Commission for a Knighthood.

To ask Hon. the Prime Minister in absence of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture and Mines, if the Government has in the past fortnight made any progress in the matter of selling pulp wood or pit props, or other the past winter or of the previous winter's cuts, and if so, to whom and at what figures.

Polish Catholics
ASK FOR SEPARATION OF CARDINALATE.

WARSAW. (Associated Press) — Polish Catholics, in those districts of Upper Silesia recently returned to Poland by the League of Nations, have appealed to Pope Pius XI for separation from the authority of Cardinal Bertram, the German Archbishop of Breslau, under whose ecclesiastical rule they still remain, despite the new political division of the country. The appeal is the second one made to the Vatican, the first having been held up by the illness and death of Pope Benedict. It is an echo of the Silesian plebiscite troubles of 1921, when Cardinal Bertram issued an anti-Polish pastoral letter.

Monsignor Ratti, then papal nuncio to Poland but now Pope, declared that the letter was published without his knowledge. The Silesian Poles are hopeful of favorable decision on account of pope Pius first-hand knowledge of the situation.

"Strad" Violin Fetches Huge Sum.

PARIS. (Associated Press) — A Stradivarius violin for which the maker, Antonius Stradivarius received 80 francs when he made it at Cremona in 1735, has just been sold here for 105,400 francs including the war-tax. This is equivalent at current rates of exchange to about \$9,000. The violin was for a long time the property of the late Charles Lamoureux, founder and conductor of the famous Lamoureux orchestra. The recent tests which seemed to establish that modern-made violins cannot be distinguished from ancient ones by their tone do not seem to have affected the price of ancient instruments, if this sale can be taken as a criterion.

When World is Filled.

A member of the Royal Geographical Society in England estimates that the fertile lands of the globe amount to 28,000,000 square miles, the steppes to 14,000,000 and the deserts to 1,000,000. Giving 207 persons to the square mile for fertile lands, 10 for steppes and one for deserts as the greatest population that the earth could properly nourish, he arrives at the conclusion that when the number of inhabitants reaches about 6,000,000,000 our planet will be peopled to its full capacity.

If the rate of increase shown by recent census statistics should be uniformly maintained, it is shown that the globe would be fully peopled about the year 2072. But such calculations do not allow for unknown sources of error and, therefore, cannot be taken too literally.

As Old as the Hills.
AUXILIARIES FORCED CREDITS OF TRADESMEN.

DUBLIN. (A.P. Mail.) — Complaint has been made in some districts of Ireland that the departing British forces of the Auxiliary Divisions have gone without paying their private debts. In Kinkenny, an official notice was published inviting traders to send in their claims but some of the traders have found it impossible to get their money. Sir Haman Greenwood referred them to the Police Department in Dublin Castle and the adjutant of the Auxiliaries replied that "it is regretted that no action can now be taken against the individuals concerned as they have all been dispersed. Attached however please find list of their last known addresses." When this reply was sent to the Chief Secretary he wrote: "The debts to which you refer were private liabilities of the individual cadets and as such the government have no power to take action to receive these monies for you." The grievance of the traders arises from the fact that they could not afford to apply to these formidable auxiliary policemen the ordinary tests of trade credit. When raids were frequent and destructive it was naturally thought unsafe to refuse goods to the forces which could make them.

Russian Women in Rags.
SPRING FASHIONS OF NO INTEREST.

ODESSA. (Associated Press) — Spring fashions do not bother the women of Odessa. They have no new fashion journals nor cloth with which to make dresses. Women sometimes have a hat and a few yards of rough cloth to cover themselves. Underclothing is an unknown quantity. So are stockings for the untucky. Women who have cloaks or furs wear them in daytime but at night leave them home. If they did not they would be robbed in the darkened streets. People who go to the theatre travel home in groups for protection. This lack of clothing hits very hard the younger girls. One of them said to the correspondent: "I should like to go abroad if only to get nice clothes." The older women in Russia, when talking of the chance of ever getting abroad, say "After all, if we got abroad we would be very poor and feel our poverty more by the contrast."

Easter Superstitions.

Dyeing eggs in lively colors was a sign of joy. The red dye was supposed to be symbolical of Christ's blood.

To find two yokes in an Easter egg is a sign of great gain in wealth.

Refusing to eat an Easter egg offered by a friend signifies a loss of friendship.

In England rolling Easter eggs is a time-honored ceremony.

It is also considered lucky to plant garden seed and potatoes on Good Friday.

Good Friday also has its peculiar superstitions. Among these was the very old one that this is the best day upon which to wean the baby.

It is a sign of good luck to break pottery on Good Friday. It will save the house from damage during the rest of the year.

Scholars considered that in the year of Our Lord's death Easter Sunday fell upon the second Sunday in April, and in England a movement has been started to fix the feast on that day.

Easter eggs had their origin in the belief that the egg was a symbol of the Resurrection. An egg was also considered as the symbol of spring. An old Teutonic belief was that rabbits laid eggs on Easter Sunday.

At present Easter falls upon the Sunday which is mostly likely to coincide with the actual date of the Resurrection. It is the natural desire of Christmas to keep the festival on the first day of the week, the Lord's Day, which makes it to be a moveable feast.

There is a peculiar old custom which used to be practised on Easter Sunday and which was supposed to illustrate the rising from the grave. One person would lie flat upon his back and four others would take him by the arms and legs and lift him three times. There was also a belief that if the recumbent person held his breath he could be lifted by the little finger of each of the four lifters.

Will Show 6,500 Foot Painting of War Front.

The famous war memorial known as "Pantheon of War," is shortly to be transported to America for exhibition. The conception of two well-known French painters, Pierre Carrier-Belleuse and Auguste Francois Gorgeu, is the work of over 50 artists, including some of the most famous living in France. The huge canvas, measuring almost 6500 square feet, is 45 feet high and 402 long and contains more than 6000 life-size portraits displayed in national groups with vivid reproductions of the entire western battlefield as the background. The painting of the gigantic canvass took four years and aroused great interest in Paris. After being shown in the United States it will be taken on a world tour.

Prison Barber Goes On Strike.

PARIS. (Associated Press) — M. Rapillon, the barber of Versailles prison, who trimmed the beard of Henry D. Landru, the "Blue Beard" convicted and executed for killing 10 women and a boy, and cut the hair of the famous prisoner has gone on a strike. The barber had demanded an increase in wages which the prison authorities declined to grant. He had obtained a good deal of publicity by reason of his services to Landru and expects now that he is in business for himself that many customers will seek him to obtain first-hand information of the celebrated murderer.

The Press in Afghanistan.

LONDON. (Associated Press) — The first diplomatic envoy of Afghanistan to Great Britain, Sirdar Abdul Hadi Khan, has taken up his quarters in London. He is only 30, and the youngest member of the diplomatic corps, a distinction previously held by Dr. Wellington Koo of China. The Minister and his staff wear English clothes and look more like Spaniards than representatives of a hermit kingdom of Asia. Sirdar Abdul told an interviewer that three newspapers were now published in Afghanistan, all evening papers, and that there were also about a dozen weekly newspapers and magazines.

Use for Sea Ice.

An innovation in the fish industry of France is the making of ice from sea water, by a process which eliminates the concentration of salt, that usually occurs when brine or salt water freezes. This "salt ice" performs the double service of keeping the fish cold, and also of "salting down" the fish as a means of preserving them.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

STATEMENT TO HOUSE.

House yesterday, Mr. J. R. M.H.A., made the following statement:

I do not crave the indulgence of the House for a few moments for the purpose of making a personal explanation so much as I do for the purpose of making a statement to the Honourable Members of the House which I think should be made by me concerning the matter outside the House which is under cover of the privilege attaches to our deliberations.

On the 11th instant whilst the House was in Committee of the whole and means I made reference to the House through the actions of the Control Board with respect to the taking over of contracts entered into by the firm of Messrs. Mews, unacquainted with the particular workings of the sugar trade, would venture on such a vast undertaking as the taking over of large contracts that had been entered into without seeking his advice.

That my conclusions were not without foundation the following references from sworn statements made by Mr. Mews will show.

He stated that on the 6th of April, 1920, he received, as Chairman of the Food Control Board, a letter from Messrs. Harvey & Company in which amongst other things it is stated:—

"Hon. Alex. Mews, Chairman Board of Food Control.

"Dear Sir—We are in receipt of your favor of April 9th re sugar. As previously advised you, our price on sugar is based upon the market price at the time of sale. During the past three weeks a very serious situation has developed. The disturbances in Central Europe and poor Cuban crop prospects have caused the most excited markets and violent advances have been recorded. Raw sugars have advanced from nine and a half to sixteen and a half cents and huge orders for granulated at any price, in any position, remain unfilled."

Subsequent to this letter the Board decided to take over from Messrs. Harvey & Company a contract for 5,000 barrels of sugar which they had entered into with the St. Lawrence Sugar Refineries of Montreal. This contract called for payment of a price of 28c. per lb. f.o.b. Montreal. The Food Control Board took over the contract at a price of 25 cents per lb. and ultimately lost on the shipment \$183,000. If the Board had not acted as they did this loss would have to be either borne by Harvey & Company or liquidated by them in some other way. Briefly put Mr. Mews' statements on the point are summarized in his own words as follows:—

"We took over Harvey's sugar at 25 cents because we could get sugar at 25 cents. As a matter of fact they cannot make out exactly that the market ever justified 28 cents. 25 cents was the market price when we took it over. These fellows had bitten Harvey & Co. as the reduction shows. We sold it back to the Sugar Refineries at 15 cents. It never left Montreal.

"The Sugar Refineries realizing that they had taken a bite out of Harvey & Co. made them an allowance of 1 1/2 cents per pound afterwards, so that the actual loss met by Harvey & Company was \$22,500 instead of \$45,000.00. We simply resold the sugar at 15 cents per lb. to the Sugar Refineries without it ever leaving their possession. We did all we could to get the Sugar Refineries to cancel this contract of Harvey & Company, but they would not do it. Our total loss on the transaction was something slightly over \$180,000. It would have been over \$200,000 but we made the difference by taking over a contract of Colin Campbell at 11 cents per lb. which sugar was pooled with the other and resold at 15 cents, making the net loss \$183,000."

Now I think it will be admitted that it was but a fair deduction for me to have drawn that if Mr. Gosling, to use his own words "formally object-

waive any question of privilege if I take action in the Courts to defend myself against this libellous accusation.

Now I desire at once to assure Mr. Gosling that, there was no intention on my part of taking advantage of my position as a member of this House to make any such statements. I would, under a similar set of facts, have made the statements anywhere. They were made in good faith, and without malice. With the knowledge I possessed I could come to no other reasonable conclusion but that Mr. Gosling's advice had either been tendered or sought. His position in the trade of the community, and the connection of his firm with the importation of sugar would, I think it will be admitted, force one to assume that he would naturally be looked upon as having expert opinion on the subject, and it would hardly be presumed that a gentleman such as Mr. Mews, unacquainted with the particular workings of the sugar trade, would venture on such a vast undertaking as the taking over of large contracts that had been entered into without seeking his advice.

That my conclusions were not without foundation the following references from sworn statements made by Mr. Mews will show.

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Now I think it will be admitted that it was but a fair deduction for me to have drawn that if Mr. Gosling, to use his own words "formally object-

ed" to this contract being taken over he would have insisted upon asking to be paid 28 cents per lb., and that he would not stand by and allow his firm to be put to a loss of \$45,000. That at least is the conclusion I came to. I am now rather surprised to find that apparently this was done against the advice of Mr. Gosling. He states so, and I unhesitatingly accept his statement. I withdraw, without qualification, the suggestion that the loss of \$183,000 by Harvey & Company was saddled on the Colony by Mr. Gosling's advice, and have only to regret that those responsible for the conduct of the Food Control Board did not act upon his objection, and thereby save the taxpayers of the Colony \$183,000.00 and so avoid their being obliged to pay for sugar, ever since this memorable blunder, a price per pound which the market conditions never warranted.

Obituary.

REV. MOTHER STANISLAUS.

A venerable and highly esteemed Religious of the Presentation Order passed peacefully to her reward on Easter Monday at the Renewals Convent in the person of Mother Mary Stanislaus Oatly.

The deceased Nun was born in Dublin Ireland, and though of a frail constitution bravely bore the cold and hardships of her adopted country for over sixty years.

At the early age of sixteen she crossed the Atlantic to enter the Presentation Convent, Cathedral Square, where after the completion of her Novitiate, she was sent to the Convent at Fermanagh, Mother Stanislaus' stay in that locality was only a few years but during that time she was chosen to succeed her which charge she gently and sweetly filled for close on 20 years.

The first Superior of the Renewals Convent was the late Mother Mary Joseph O'Donnell (Sister of Mother M. Bernard, White Bay) and at her death Mother Stanislaus was chosen to succeed her which charge she gently and sweetly filled for close on 20 years.

When the amalgamation of the Order came in 1916, Mother Stanislaus was appointed member of the Council, her varied experience and prudent advice proving invaluable. During an exceptionally long life all the Mother's gifts and talents were devoted to the work of the Order and her faithfulness to duty will long remain as an inspiration to the younger generation of sisters. Those who had the privilege of living under her sweet, gentle rule, will long remember her shining example, beautiful sympathy, great unselfishness, and deep humility that so well became a Religious. The many pupils that passed through Mother Stanislaus' hands held each a separate place in that great heart and her love for the children showed itself in the fervent prayers offered for their welfare.

Though many changes and trials her heart remained young and child-like and her presence among the sisters was like a ray of sunshine. Up to a few short months ago her work was unceasing and she would find her day ready, and willing to answer the call of Him whom she had faithfully served and whom we trust greeted his servant with his Glorious Resurrection Smile.—R.I.P.—COM.

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


