Wing Spread of Seagulls


BURLINGTON, Vermont .- The herring gulls of Lake Champlain left for the North earlier than usual this fall, and observers are wondering whether this means a long winter. The gulls are given protection on the Four Brother Islands, where they raise their young, and they are highly valued by the municipality of Burlington because of their usefulness as scavengers at the outlet of the city sewer in the lake. The species of gull seen here is said never to have been found farther south than Albany, N. Y. The islands were purchased by Edward Hatch, of New York, a half century ago for the purpose of protecting the birds, and the Hatch familv ever since then has maintained guards to prevent the stealing of eggs and killing of gulls. The average full grown gull here measures between five and seven feet from tip to tip. The birds' shrill cries assist in scaring poachers away. If the nest of a setting bird is visited, the male gull will attack the intruder with his wings, which can deal a powerful blow. Scientists say that one of the gulls which comes to the islands annually is more than eighty years old. 9
