

August 4th and Its Lesson.

Come the three corners of the world in arms, And we shall shock them: nought shall make us rue, If England to itself do rest but true"

Nine years ago to-day the message sped around world announcing Britain's determination to stand by her obligations to her neighbours across the Channel, and to use the whole of her strength and her resources to resist the Monster of Oppression that was threatening to destroy everything that stood for right and freedom and security. True as the steel that flashed from its sheath on that momentous occasion, certain that the Cause was just and that her purpose was untainted by ulterior motives, she sent her ships and her armies to the aid of her allies without hesitation and without counting the

From the farthest corner of her Empire came approval of the decision of the Mother Country, and requests, nay demands. that her sons might stand shoulder to shoulder with her in her hour of need.

What that decision cost in precious lives, in wealth, in industrial paralysis, and in disorganization owing to the condition of unrest which always follows war, will never be fully estimated. But the principle for which the Empire and the allies stood was vindicated, and although we are still suffering from the disastrous effects of the struggle, the day is already dawning when the world will realize to the full the beneficial effects of the fire in which it was purged.

In each and every Colony and Dominion has been born a spirit which is truly national, and the bonds of Empire have been more firmly welded.

We may at times be tempted to allow personal inclinations or political motives to turn us from the path which leads to progress and the advancement of our Country's interests, but with the principle, which guided Britain's actions taken as our own, we may rely with confidence upon the ultimate outcome.

A Signal Success.

Quite apart from politics, if that be possible in referring to matters political, the success achieved by Mr. W. Walsh yesterday in the House of Assembly is deserving of special praise. He was informed by the Prime Minister that, in response to his oft repeated plea on behalf of the worn out fisherman, a further grant of \$15,000 towards Old Age Pensions would be voted. Previously this amount had been used for the maintenance of the Royal Naval Reserve, now unfortunately no longer in existence, and no more worthy object could have been chosen unon which to expend the amount. There is undoubtedly room for improvement in the Old Age Pension Ssystem, a movement as yet in its infancy, but that the principle is right is without question. Our Riches From the Sea

A New England industry that canfishing. In that branch, at least, our geographical situation gives us à permanent advantage. While in a certain sense it is one of the most hazardous of occupations, one traditionally based on luck and chance, it is in another sense one of the surest. The demand for fish as human food is not likely to abate, and with the whole ocean at our disposal the supply is in no danger of giving out. Though the fish do not run evenly every year, they always come back.

New Englanders have always been fishermen. Many of them are still so employed, but of all our industries fishing is perhaps the most haphazardly organized. While there have been improvements in methods of catching the fish, in treating and storing it, there is yet much to be done, and our methods of distribution are both costly and archaic. As an illustration, suppose that fish and other forms of marine foods were distributed as regularly and efficiently as our netroleum products are to-day. Being perishable, they are, of course, more difficult to handle, but there is plenty of room for improvement.

One of the standard dishes every rench restaurant provides, at least n Paris and other cities, is "Moules la mariniere." Seasoned with nerbs, they are delicious and not expensive. Now the mussels found along the New England coast are as ine dish, served in all "popular" restaurants at least, is "Raie au beurre." It is our scorned "skates" properly cooked and served. Down on Cape Cod the trap nets are regularly clogged with skate, which is only thrown back into the water. There is no market for skate, say the fisrermen, except in Philadelphia, and to send it there costs more than the fish brings. Every high tide on the outer Cape shore washes up thousands of skate. on which the gulls make their meals. The same is true of a flat fish the natives call "sand pads." 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



The bread comes back in many days Every one has read in history of the Poll or Head Tax, and even to-day I we often refer to the people's "polls" as meaning heads. In 1832 the Reform Act was passed. This Act was the first of a series all aiming at a more adequate representation of the people. Before then the electorate comprised a very small proportion of the population, only freemen and a few other privileged people being allowed to vote. As a result many a little borough in the Old Country had only a dozen or so electors. These were summoned to the market or other centre, and voted by a show of hands. Sometimes the defeated candidate demanded a poll, and a booth would be erected in which each elec tor would come and record his vote personally.
