The Atlantic Cables.

London (Jan. 23) Correspondence of the Boston Journal.

We are disturbed here in London by a statement that the Atlantic cables are in such a defective condition that the communication is endangered. As numerous interests are involved, it is difficult to obtain the truth. I am assured, however, that the Government lately appointed a commission of distinguished electricians to examine the cables and report upon them, previously to a negotiation for their purchase, and this report is stated to be alarmingly unfavorable. The companies reply that the defects are near the land and can easily be stopped. But do not be surprised if you are suddenly ent off from Europe. One feels inclined to say that the inconvenience will be richly due to America, for supinely allowing the world to remain in the hands of a board of monopolists. TELEGRAPH THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES

ALEXISAT NEW ORLEANS. Fearful Gale and Shipwreck on the Mexican Coast.

Telegraph Meeting in London,

New Orleans, Feb. 16.—The Grand Ducal party leave on Sunday by rail for Pensacola, via Mobile, where the Russian fleet awaits them.

Havana, Feb. 16.—The accounts of a fearful northern gale on the Mexican coast are received. The English bark Pannea, from Liverpool, which arrived at Vera Cruz on the 6th, dragged her anchors during the gale, and the vessel was lost. Twelve of the crew were also drowned.

London, Feb. 17.—At a general meeting of the Anglo-American Telegraph Company last evening a reduction of the present rate of tolls on cable despatches was favorably considered. The advisability of laying a fourth cable across the Atlantic was urged, and the proposal was well received.

London, Feb. 17.—Her Majesty the Queen on her return from thanksgiving services at St. Paul's, on the 27th instruction of the streets to Buckingham Palace.

Marriage has been made the subject of any number of bad jokes, the jokers being as a matter of course, almost inveriably bachelors. Would it surprise the bachelors in question to know, that in spite of the hair-pullings, the indescribale horrors of washing and house-cleaning days, and the aggravations of curtain lectures that are supposed to be the necessary attendants of married life—in spite of all these the married man has a longer lease of life than the bachelor. Recently abilished statistics place this fact beyond doubt. From returns published in the Scientific Receiv, by authority of the Brussels Academy of Medibine, we gather the following figures:—From 25 to 30 years of agothe mortality per thousand in Franco amounts to 6.2 in married men, 10.2 in bachelors, 21.8 in widowers. In Brussels the mortality of married women is 9 per 1,000, girls the same, and widows as high, as 16.0. In Belgium, from 7 per 1,000 among married men, the number rises to 8.5 in bachelors, and 24.6 in widows. The proportion is the same in Holland. From 8.3 in married men, it rises to 11.7 in bachelors, and 16.9 in widowers or 12.8 among married women, 8.5 in spinsters, and 13.8 in widows. The aggregate from various calculations shows that from 20 to 30 years of age the mortality per 1000 is four in married men, ten in bachelors, and twenty-two in widowers. It will be noticed that widows and widowers fare even worse than the bacaelors; possibly they are in a hurry to leave the world in order to rejoin their departed mates. The figures we present should prove an effective warning to all bachelors and spinsters, widows and widowers to change their state as quickly as possible, unless indeed they consider an early grave preferable to the inatrimonial yoke.


