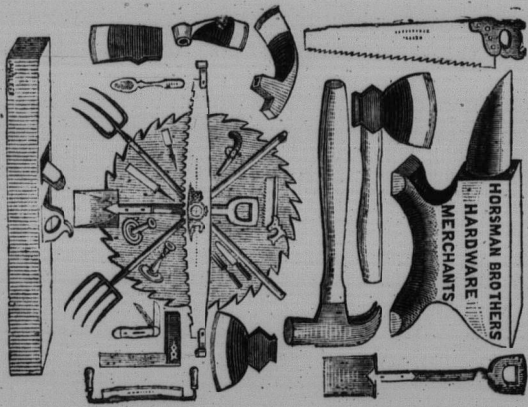

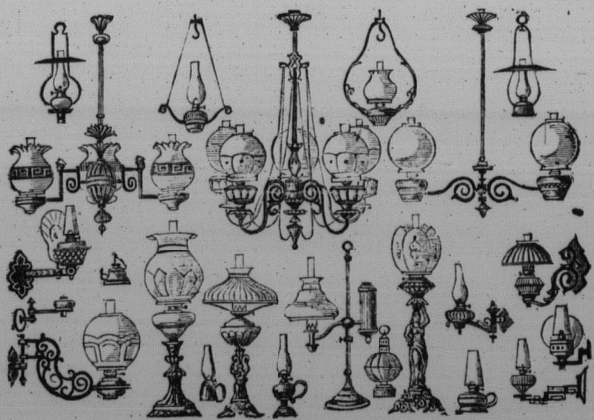

THE CENTRAL EXHIBITION

The Second Day.

Large Crowds and a Fine Show

Beautiful Weather.

WEDNESDAY, Sept. 16.

The Show opened this morning under the best auspices. The heavy rains the previous afternoon cooled the air, laid the dust, and made everything comfortable, and to-day it was a real pleasure to be on the grounds.

The Judges commenced their work in many classes yesterday afternoon, and to-day they were busy in all departments. The arrangements outside and inside are excellent, and much credit is due to the active superintendents, Messrs. Swinford and Sharpe, for their efforts in getting everything in good shape.

The grounds are now in the best order; there is not a particle of dust, and the drive round the grounds is in splendid condition.

Yesterday afternoon the crowd was not large, but very fair considering it was the first day. Lawrence's Band delighted the visitors with their excellent music during the afternoon.

From an early hour this morning large crowds of people kept pouring into the grounds, and as each train came in it brought thousands more to swell the number. Judging from the appearance to-day, the exhibition in point of attendance, will be as great a success as last year. The best order is preserved on the ground, and an excellent regulation has been enforced that no liquor shall be sold. This is a good rule.

HORSES.

Among the horses shown is a fine stallion "Sharp-clutch," owned by Mr. W. J. Douglas, of Port Nelson. He is half-brother to "Terror" out of Maritana—imported by Sheriff Grange. He was bred by J. & J. White, of Hallow, and is four years old.

Another fine blood entire horse is "Dr. Butler," owned by Mr. Lackner, Hawkinsville, bred by John R. Butler, of Kentucky, sired by "Young Melbourne," dam "Young Atilla." He is seven years old, was imported by Mr. Lowell, of Galt, who afterwards sold him to the North Waterloo Agricultural Society, the Directors of which sold him to Mr. Lackner. He got the first prize and diploma at Guelph in 1872, and the 2nd at Hamilton the same year.

"England's Glory," a fine heavy draught horse, owned by Wharton Hodgson, of Exeter, took the first prize at the Provincial last year, is four years old. Has been sold to Mr. Flannigan, Biddulph, for \$2,000. "Cashier," in the same class was imported last year by James Jackson, Harrietsville, near London, from Lincolnshire; height sixteen hands 3 inches, weight 1,700 lbs. Is a fine black color.

"Prince of Stirling," heavy draught, imported by James McDonagh, Colborne, Co. Huron, three weeks ago from Strirling, Scotland. He is a fine light bay, 16 1/2 hands high, and looks well after his voyage. He is two years old past.

"The Royal Standard," heavy draught, was imported last fall by Wm. Peck, Stanley Tp., Co. Huron. He comes from Yorkshire, and is a fine animal. Height a little over 17 hands, weight 1,770 lbs., color dark bay.

Another "England's Glory," is owned by Isaac Musselman, of Elmira—imported nearly two years ago, dark bay, also heavy draught.

"King of the West," is a general purpose horse, owned by C. Dale, Tucker-smith, four years old, has taken a number of first prizes and the first diploma at the Provincial in 1872.

John Miller, Hornby, shows an iron grey light roadster stallion, out of the old Grey Messenger, almost the last of the old stock.

Geo. B. R. Frank, London, shows a fine dappled bay roadster carriage stallion, nine years old.

"Farmer's Glory"—general purpose horse, shown by John F. Rickbell, Tp. of Hay, Co. Huron, is a fine compact animal, four years old.

Love & Hay, Co. Huron, show "Glen-lee," a fine imported heavy draught horse, three years old. He is a light bay, and has good action.

Donald McCaig, Puslinch, shows a fine agricultural stallion, four years old, bay color. "Dominion Farmer" is well known in this section, and took second prize at the Guelph Central Exhibition last year.

Among the heavy draughts is a good imported horse, "John Bull," owned by J. G. Fisher, Tp. of Colborne, seven years old.

Mr. Fisher also shows a beautiful imported young horse, "Paacock," which for beauty and symmetry will scarcely be beat. He is a light bay, four years old, and has taken 16 first prizes.

"Ontario Chief," is a very fine heavy draught stallion, owned by Andrew Harvey, Beverley. He is imported, five years old, bright bay color. He is a very fine, well built horse.

"Jim," is a good general purpose horse, also owned by Mr. Harvey—six years old—good style of horse.

Among the carriage stud is "Whalebone," only three weeks from England, owned by Mr. Holmes, V. S., Beverley. He has been often shown in England, and never been beaten. He is a pure bred Cleveland coach horse and is Cleveland bay. He is a splendid animal, and of sale.

Among the agricultural horses is "Conqueror of the West," a fine black, well made horse, owned by John Reynolds, Tp. of Hallow, is two years old.

"Young Cumberland Punch," is a good general purpose horse, bright bay, bred by Richard Bond, Puslinch, is three years old. He is a nice well made horse.

The "Duke of Argyle," a fine heavy draught horse, is shown by John Duff, of Everton. Took first prize last year at the Guelph Central. Mr. Duff this year did not make him up for showing, but he is, nevertheless, in good condition. He was imported last year.

John Pirie, Winterbourne, shows a chestnut gelding out of Buckland's Briton—a promise of a good horse. He also shows a three year old general purpose horse out of the same sire.

Mr. Musselman, of Elmira, shows a nice dappled grey agricultural horse, rising six years. Has taken some first-class prizes.

"Donald Dianie," owned by W. H. Peterson, of Woolwich, is a heavy draught imported horse, bay color. Took second at Guelph Central last year. He is a powerful animal.

"Crown Prince," is a year old stallion in the heavy draught class, owned by Wm. Little, Blandford, Co. Oxford, was imported last September, and promises to be a first-class horse.

"Whalebone Chief," owned by Matthew Elliott, Puslinch, is a fine specimen of this favorite breed. He is five years old, dappled bay, and is much thought of as a road or carriage horse.

"Royal George" is a black chestnut, road or carriage horse, owned by George Coyne, Trafalgar, aged 8 years. Strickland Duffield, Rockwood, shows "Hard Fortune"—a general purpose horse, colour bay, aged 3 years.

"Henry Clay," owned by Robt. Kinglet, Milton, is a road or carriage horse; took the 1st at Hamilton Central Fair, and the 2nd at Guelph, last year. He is a fine horse.

"Ontario Chief," owned by Robert Coulson, Rockwood, is a fine road and carriage horse, 4 years old, colour roan.

"Mountain Deer," a road or carriage horse, owned by J. Cook, Beverly, is a fine dark bay, 3 years old.

Jas. Davis, Erin Township, shows a year old horse, got by "Wonderful Lad"; is being bred for the agricultural class.

Angus McKellar, Beverly, shows "Young Ontario," a fine yearling horse, in the heavy draught class, light chestnut colour. He is a pretty animal.

E. Cartwright, Beverly, shows a neat black young horse, one year old. He is shown in the agricultural class.

John Malcolm, Beverly, shows a good horse in the Agricultural class; dark brown, 2 years old.

Archibald McGibbon, Milton, a matched span of fine black carriage horses.

Bazine's Accomplices.

Church Conference at Boston.

Moulton in Trouble.

The Strike in England.

Paris, Sept. 15.—At the trial of the accomplices of Bazaine to-day, Col. Villette and M. Doineau were examined and denied that they knew in advance, or had anything to do with the Marshal's escape.

Boston, Sept. 15.—The Conference of the Evangelical, Greek and Anglican Clergy, called by Dr. Dollinger, began here to-day. Forty clergymen were present—France, Russia, Germany, England, United States and Greece were represented. Dr. Dollinger and Bishop Reinkens made addresses.

New York, September 16.—General Tracy, counsel for the Plymouth Church Investigating Committee, has put his promised statement in the form of an interview, and says the thirteen or fourteen different times which Moulton introduced his (Tracy's) name in his late statement, in only one or two instances does he approximate the truth in attempting to state his position and action. General Tracy also says his firm has been engaged in the libel suit instituted by Edm. Dean Proctor, against Francis D. Moulton, in which damages are laid at \$100,000.

London, Sept. 16.—Some mills in Bolton have withdrawn the notices of reduction of wages, and the strike will probably be ended by arbitration.

POLICE COURT.

(Before the Police Magistrate.)

Sept. 16. Edward Gorman, and John Mays, was charged by Constable Crooks, with disorderly conduct on Wyndham street. Dismissed.

John Mays, charged by Edward Gorman with assault and battery, on the 15th inst., was fined \$1 and costs.

Judge's Court.

Alex. McGuire was brought up before the Judge, on Tuesday, on a charge of robbing Jas. Brennan, on Sept. 2nd, and having pleaded not guilty, witnesses were examined both for the prosecution and defence. The Judge found him guilty of a common assault and fined him \$5 and \$15 costs.

David Tobin was also brought up for aiding and abetting Alex. McGuire in the above charge, and was found not guilty.

Mr. Peterson appeared for the Crown, Mr. Watt of Guthrie, Watt & Cutten, acted as Counsel for McGuire and Mr. Dunbar for Tobin.

BUSH FIRES.—Bush fires are raging with great violence in the vicinity of Brussels, Paisley, Southampton, Goderich and Seaforth, and great damage has been done to property. In the neighborhood of Kincardine, on Monday, three barns and two dwelling houses were destroyed. A large portion of the village of Amberley has been consumed. Mr. W. Hamilton of the Township of Amaranth, has lost his barn and all its contents besides some cattle. Orangeville was also in imminent danger of being burned during the early part of the week, and it was only by the strenuous exertions of the inhabitants that the threatened danger was averted.

ANOTHER DESTRUCTIVE BUSH FIRE.—The steam saw-mill, boarding-house, five dwelling-houses, barn and sheds, and 50,000 feet of lumber, belonging to J. G. Williams, Stowe, township of Grey, Co. of Huron, were completely destroyed on Monday afternoon by the fearful fires that are raging in the bush. Mr. Williams' loss will be about \$6,000; no insurance. The post-office was also burned, the mails being saved. There was also a dwelling-house adjoining Mr. Still's mill, Logan, burned on Sunday evening, the fire spreading so quickly that they were unable to save anything. All the mill owners in this section are fighting the fire day and night.

DEMANDING THE REVENUE.—We are informed that on Saturday last Mr. District Inspector Romain seized the Petroleum Refinery of Mr. A. M. Ross, at London, for violation of the Act respecting the Inland Revenue.

A telegram from New York states that Fred. Mather, who sailed from that country a short time ago, having a charge about one hundred thousand yoke shad intended for the streams of Germany, writes from on board the steamer that the fish have all died of starvation. Another attempt will be made to transport shad from the American to the German waters.

D. Murray, Freeport, shows a bull under one year.

Wm. Croft, Eramosa, shows a three-year old bull.

Thos. McCulloch, Eramosa, shows a four year old bull.

J. & H. Talbot, Eramosa, show a two-year old bull.

Wm. Whitelaw, Guelph Township, shows a fine year old bull in this class, got by Miller's celebrated bull, sold lately for \$2,500, out of a cow also bred by Miller, of Pickering.

F. W. Stone, in this class, shows three aged cows, two bull calves, and one two-year old bull.

John Kirby, Guelph Township, shows a good yearling bull, bred by J. & B. Hunter, Pilkington.

G. & E. Tolton, Erin, have a two-year bull—a well grown and excellent animal.

HEREFORDS.

F. W. Stone is the largest exhibitor in this class. He has an aged bull, one two-year old, one yearling, and two bull calves; also 4 aged cows, 2 three-year old and two calves.

Geo. Hood, shows ten head in this class. They comprise an aged bull, two years bull, one yearling and two bull calves. Also four cows and a heifer. They are all in good condition and are acknowledged to be a very fine herd.

GALLOWAYS.

Wm. Hood is a large exhibitor in this class, having 25 of a herd on the ground. These comprise two bulls, one 4 years, the other two, three yearling bulls, and three bull calves. He has four cows and the rest heifer and heifer calves.

Thomas McCrae is an exhibitor in this class. He has a herd of 15,—one aged bull, two bull calves, 4 aged cows, one three-year old heifer, one two-year old heifer, one yearling and two heifer calves.

Wm. Dow, Nicol, shows an aged galloway cow, yearling heifer and bull calf, in this class.

DEVONS.

George Rudd, Puslinch, has, as usual, a fine herd of Devons, 15 in all, comprising an aged bull, two year old, and yearling bull calf, three aged cows, and the balance heifers and heifer calves.

Geo. H. Darty, Guelph township, shows a Devon cow, and a nice yearling bull calf.

ATRESHIRE.

Messrs. Jardine, of Hamilton, have a fine herd of 8 Ayrshires, 7 of which were imported from Scotland last season. They consist of a four-year old bull, and bull calf; also two 4 years cows, one three-year cow, two year old heifer, one year heifer, and two calves.

This herd took the first prize at the Provincial last year, and the first at the Guelph Central.

Thos. McCrae also shows a cow and heifer in this class.

Taking the thoroughbreds as a whole, the show of them was not up to last year, in point of numbers, but there were many animals on the ground which it would be hard to match.

GRADES, FAT AND WORKING CATTLE.

Among the grades we find some very superior stock. J. & W. Vaisey have 7 cows and heifers; J. & R. Hunter, a two-year old grade heifer; J. & R. McCrae, a yearling heifer; J. S. Armstrong, five prime heavy heifers; Geo. Hood, a cow, besides others the owners of which we did not know.

The fat stock are superb. In this class we would particularize the steers and cow shown by J. S. Armstrong, the steers by Henlock Young, the cows by John Reading and Wm. Whitelaw, the heifer by John Pipe, the steers and heifer by Walter West. No better animals were ever seen at any exhibition.

The working oxen are also above the average. W. S. Armstrong, Eramosa, has two very heavy yokes; Alex. Stewart, Eramosa, has a very fine yoke, and those shown by D. Murray, Freeport, are good.

SHEEP—COTSWOLDS.

There is a small but excellent show of Cotswolds, and if the entries are not so numerous, the quality and size are unquestionable. The principal exhibitors are Messrs. T. Watters, T. McCrae, Thomas Arkell, F. Macdonald, C. Heath, P. A'kell, J. C. Brown, J. R. Craig, Edmonton, the latter of whom has two Cotswold rams and two ewes, all imported this season from England. All of these were prize sheep in the old country. The display in this class is not up to what it was last year.

SOUTH-DOWNS.

The show in this class is also small. J. R. Craig has five head, bred by Lord Walsingham, England. They all took first prizes there, and were imported this season. They were highly spoken of by the English papers. James Anderson, Puslinch, is another prominent exhibitor in this class, and those shown by him look well.

LINCOLNS.

In this class of sheep, James Anderson, County Middlesex, exhibits two fine yearling ewes, which took the second prize last year as lambs. He also shows a ram lamb—a pretty animal.

Mr. Butterfield, Essex County, shows twelve sheep—Lincolns and Leicesters.

LEICESTERS.

Wm. Whitelaw shows 28 Leicesters and four fat sheep. Among these stands the celebrated imported Rockram, which has taken the first prize for three years in succession. He has also another imported ram. He has a fine herd of nine ewe lambs—five two shear ewes, and 4 good shearing ewes.

Lazarus Parkinson, Eramosa, shows 14 superior Leicesters—the lambs being all from an imported ram, out of high bred ewes.

Joseph Parkinson shows 15 fine Leicesters, in rams, aged ewes, shearing ram, ram lambs, and ewe lambs, the whole forming a very fine flock.

The other prominent exhibitors in this class are Sidney Smith, Acton, J. Darling, McGillivray and Mr. Oliver, Downie.

The fat sheep come out well, many of them being very large, and all in prime condition. John Kirby, Guelph Township, has a pair of excellent ewes in this class.

PIGS.

In Yorkshire sows, S. Gooding, and John Tuck, show 2 large animals.

Thos. Easton, Nassagaweya, has a fine large breed sow; John Hunt, of the same Township, has also two fine sows; C. Head has a very fine sow—Yorkshire; J. & R. Millar show a good sow, also a very large one with a litter of pigs, and a pair of large spring pigs of the Yorkshire breed.

Walter Laing, of Nassagaweya, has a fine sow and boar of the same breed, also a fine Suffolk sow. In the class of Suffolks Geo. Hood, Guelph, shows a fine sow and litter of pigs, and Chan Head, Eramosa, a very good, well bred sow, and a pair of large bred pigs; John Hunt, Nassagaweya, has some good Suffolks.

In Berkshires, John and Thomas H. Haver, Guelph, have an excellent lot—eleven in all—mostly young; John Bunyan, Guelph, has two excellent sows—one over a year old and the other under

the celebrated "John A"; J. & R. Millar, and B. Ford, Limehouse, have also some good pigs in this class; Peter and Henry Arkell, Teeswater, come out well in Berkshires; S. Dawson, Guelph Township, has a well grown Berkshire sow; A. Anstee, Eramosa, has a pair of good Berkshires, being a sow and two pigs, got by Allan Simpson's thoroughbred boar; Jas. Cowan, Guelph Tp., has a pair of large and fine spring Berkshires; W. A. Bookless shows his celebrated boar "John A"—a splendid pig, large and pure bred. Allan Simpson shows a two months' pig out of his thoroughbred boar, he is large and well bred, and is for sale; Chas. Heath shows two very good spring pigs; Walter Laing, Nassagaweya, has two good Berkshires—spring pigs.

In the Essex bred Melbathstone, of Toronto, has some good specimens; Geo. Hood has a well grown boar; Thos. McCrae has also a good boar and sow with a young litter, also two sows under one year.

GRAIN, SEEDS, ETC.

There is not a very large show of grain, but the samples generally are quite above the average. There are a good many varieties of fall wheat, and that which took the first prize—grown by Mr. Wm. Tuck, Watfordville, is a very fine sample. He also takes the 2nd, and that shown by W. M. Smith, of Trafalgar, the 3rd in this class.

There is a large selection of Treadwell, the sample shown by Samuel Sugg, Cliff-ford, takes the 1st prize; Geo. Short, Salem, takes the 2nd.

Wm. Whitelaw, has a fine sample of red winter wheat.

In Fine spring wheat, John Turner, Garafraza, beats all competitors and also takes the first for any other kind of spring wheat.

Anthony Turner, Garafraza, takes the first for best 10 bushels spring wheat.

There is a splendid lot of barley, the colour is extra and the berry plump. For the best 10 bushels of six rowed, Simson Rennie takes the 1st prize, and also the 1st for best two bushels in same kind.

The white oats are superior. Hugh McMillan, takes the 1st for best 10 bushels. In black oats, Evan Macdonald takes the 1st; Isaac Anderson, Eramosa, takes the 1st for the Norway oats.

There is an excellent display of peas—large and small. Messrs. Sugg, Elgin, and Hunt are first prize takers in their respective classes. For field or blue peas, Joshua Norris take the 1st.

There are quite a number of entries in flax seed, besides a variety of other seeds. Five bales of superior hops are shown.

ROOTS.

The roots this year are not at all up to what we have seen at former exhibitions, which is altogether attributable to the long and severe drought. There is, however, a very excellent display of potatoes in all the different varieties—especially in Early Rose. Some of the collections are really superior. Turnips make a fair show, considering, but in most cases the size is small compared to those shown in former years. As regards other roots, such as mangolds, carrots, beets, &c., the show is poor.

CARRIAGES AND CARRIAGE WORK.

R. R. Dalgleish & Co., Guelph, exhibit a very large variety of tastefully got up woodwork for carriages and cutters, consisting of cutters, wheels, bodies, spokes, hubs, springs, axles, besides a variety of other materials employed in carriage manufacture. The workmanship and get-up of these articles reflect great credit upon the enterprise of the firm, and the skill of the workmen.

Messrs. Thompson & Flanagan, Guelph, exhibit the woodwork of a cutter, which is finished in a very superior manner.

Caleb Chase, Guelph, exhibits a very excellent assortment of vehicles, comprising a cutter, a light open buggy, a democrat wagon—two seated—and a covered buggy—all which exhibit first-class workmanship and tasteful finish. It is not long since Mr. Chase commenced this branch of the business, but the demand for his work shows how much it is appreciated, and deservedly so.

Robert Parker, Guelph, shows a highly finished single seated open buggy, with varnished woodwork. It is very neat, and well sustains his well earned reputation as a carriage builder.

Wm. Torrance, Rockwood, shows a substantial and well finished market wagon.

Zeigler Bros., of Berlin, who competed so successfully last year, are on the ground again with a remarkably neat and tastefully got-up single buggy—covered.

J. H. Downey, Elora, has a very handsome single buggy—open.

IMPLEMENTS.

Messrs. Haggert Brothers, Brampton, exhibit a two or a four-horse power, with a drag saw attachment, a foot mill on the principle of the burr stone, a horse power straw cutter, with speed gear; a sulky horse rake with double bracket teeth which are carried independently of the other part of the rake, single reaping machine with cold-rolled iron cutter bar, a patent dustless separator, threshing machine, the mode of driving which is entirely different from any separator yet exhibited, a shaft continuing to the extreme end of the separator from which the different parts of the separator are driven. The suos is entirely enclosed and fitted with an agitator and a reversible shaft carrier. Straw carriers can be run either at right angles or lengthwise. A double land roller, with spring seat, and a small hand straw cutter.

Maepherson, Glasgow & Co., of Fingal, exhibit a horse power thresher and separator, also a single separator.

E. Leonard, London, shows a reaping machine with horse power.

Forsyth & Co., Dundas, show an Empire grain drill, straw cutter, horse power, combined reaper and mower.

Harris, Son & Co., of Brantford, exhibit three reaping machines and a mowing machine.

Laidlaw Bros., of Paisley, exhibit a reaping machine, the frame of which is made entirely of wrought iron.

J. P. Billington, of Dundas, has a horse-power and drag sawing machine.

Alex. Howell, of Brampton, a sulky horse-rake.

B. W. Walton, of Fergus, shows two eclipse-mang ploughs. These ploughs have taken first prizes wherever exhibited.

Charles Thain, Guelph, also exhibited one of these ploughs.

Peter Adams, of Paris, also exhibits a rotary harrow, recently patented, as also an ingenious contrivance for holding up wagon tongues, consisting of a spring acting upon the draw bolt.

Heddon & Owens, of Guelph township, have entered their iron cultivators—single and double—principally of wrought iron, for which the patent has been applied. The contrivance is very ingenious, the teeth being so arranged as to be adjusted to various widths, the widest run between the teeth being three feet.

The display made by David Maxwell, of the Paris Foundry, is very creditable,

Wm. Hood, Guelph township, has a three years Durham bull.

D. Murray, Freeport, shows a bull under one year.

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The working oxen are also above the average. W. S. Armstrong, Eramosa, has two very heavy yokes; Alex. Stewart, Eramosa, has a very fine yoke, and those shown by D. Murray, Freeport, are good.

SHEEP—COTSWOLDS.

There is a small but excellent show of Cotswolds, and if the entries are not so numerous, the quality and size are unquestionable. The principal exhibitors are Messrs. T. Watters, T. McCrae, Thomas Arkell, F. Macdonald, C. Heath, P. A'kell, J. C. Brown, J. R. Craig, Edmonton, the latter of whom has two Cotswold rams and two ewes, all imported this season from England. All of these were prize sheep in the old country. The display in this class is not up to what it was last year.

SOUTH-DOWNS.

The show in this class is also small. J. R. Craig has five head, bred by Lord Walsingham, England. They all took first prizes there, and were imported this season. They were highly spoken of by the English papers. James Anderson, Puslinch, is another prominent exhibitor in this class, and those shown by him look well.

LINCOLNS.

In this class of sheep, James Anderson, County Middlesex, exhibits two fine yearling ewes, which took the second prize last year as lambs. He also shows a ram lamb—a pretty animal.

Mr. Butterfield, Essex County, shows twelve sheep—Lincolns and Leicesters.

LEICESTERS.

Wm. Whitelaw shows 28 Leicesters and four fat sheep. Among these stands the celebrated imported Rockram, which has taken the first prize for three years in succession. He has also another imported ram. He has a fine herd of nine ewe lambs—five two shear ewes, and 4 good shearing ewes.

Lazarus Parkinson, Eramosa, shows 14 superior Leicesters—the lambs being all from an imported ram, out of high bred ewes.

Joseph Parkinson shows 15 fine Leicesters, in rams, aged ewes, shearing ram, ram lambs, and ewe lambs, the whole forming a very fine flock.

The other prominent exhibitors in this class are Sidney Smith, Acton, J. Darling, McGillivray and Mr. Oliver, Downie.

The fat sheep come out well, many of them being very large, and all in prime condition. John Kirby, Guelph Township, has a pair of excellent ewes in this class.

PIGS.

In Yorkshire sows, S. Gooding, and John Tuck, show 2 large animals.

Thos. Easton, Nassagaweya, has a fine large breed sow; John Hunt, of the same Township, has also two fine sows; C. Head has a very fine sow—Yorkshire; J. & R. Millar show a good sow, also a very large one with a litter of pigs, and a pair of large spring pigs of the Yorkshire breed.

Walter Laing, of Nassagaweya, has a fine sow and boar of the same breed, also a fine Suffolk sow. In the class of Suffolks Geo. Hood, Guelph, shows a fine sow and litter of pigs, and Chan Head, Eramosa, a very good, well bred sow, and a pair of large bred pigs; John Hunt, Nassagaweya, has some good Suffolks.

In Berkshires, John and Thomas H. Haver, Guelph, have an excellent lot—eleven in all—mostly young; John Bunyan, Guelph, has two excellent sows—one over a year old and the other under

A Mysterious Family History.

THREE CHILDREN TAKEN WILD OFF AN ISLAND IN LAKE HURON.
From the Hamilton Spectator.

One morning about a month ago a man "of strange, wild mien," and not very respectable dress nor intelligent appearance, came to the Orphan's Home in connection with the Sisters of St Joseph, and knocked at the door. One of the sisters came and opened it, and the man presented three children to be taken care of. The children bore a much stranger aspect than himself, and the group excited the surprise and wonder of the sisters. They consisted of a girl and two boys. The boys were clad in loose plaids and were attired altogether with a neatness and respectability which contrasted singularly with their deportment and looks. The girl was about fourteen years old, and was the oldest of the three. She was dressed in a plain and rustic style, but had an expression of much more intelligence than her younger brothers. All of them were small in stature, but the boys especially so, and still they were not dwarfish. They were not deformed, but there was an unnatural and inhuman appearance about them which could be suggested by scarce, ly any other word than deformity. Their oddly expressive eyes, their apish features, their thin, bony, fang-like hands, their slender limbs and attenuated forms, their strange apathy to what was said by their father, their general inattention, their peculiar way of crouching in the corners of the passage way made them objects of curiosity and pitying interest. They were led in by one of the sisters, who also invited the father—for such he announced himself in disjointed sentences to be—to partake of something to eat. But he refused in a hurried manner, saying he had something in his pocket, and seemed fidgety to get away. As soon as the children were in, the man left with the same wild, unintelligible stare which he wore throughout the short interview, and did not make any sign of parting or say a farewell word to his children, or indeed to any one. But as he passed out of the entrance he turned round and furtively looked in through the side lights of the door. Then he ran off hastily and was soon out of reach and out of sight. The children were taken into the Home and had food offered them. About two o'clock in the afternoon the wild looking father was seen to steal softly up to the convent and again entered the gate and peered inquisitively into the side lights. His offspring were not there, however, and the moment he saw he was observed, again fled and was seen no more. The youngsters would not taste any food that was proffered them, though they were as emaciated and exhausted as could be. Their hands resembled bird's claws more than anything else, and their feet were but a cluster of bones. On talking to them it was found that they could not speak, albeit they possessed the natural capacity for articulation, having a full set of teeth, perfectly formed root of the mouth, and tongue capable of every movement. Neither did they pay attention to any words or other kind of noise. They have been kept and kindly cared for by the sisters ever since their advent. But it was discovered that the boys were afflicted with a desperate cough, and though every kindness has been bestowed upon them and every mode of treatment adopted, it is not thought likely they will survive long. However they seemed to be gaining strength for some time after they were introduced. Their stay in the Home has shown them to have lived in the wildest manner and to have been totally unacquainted with the habits of civilized people. They can utter no articulate sound, as was said, but at various times they have been heard to give vent to a weird cry, entirely unlike any human utterance, but somewhat resembling the low wail of some wild animal. This is the sole expression the boys have been known to make, but the girl seems much more intelligent, and can speak common words, though she knows nothing of the ways of civilized life. The boys have a constant habit of crouching in corners, and one of them sits with one shoulder "hunched up," as if by malformation. They prefer raw edibles to cooked food, and have only lately taken to eating at the table. At first they greedily devoured raw cabbage leaves, turnips, and even have been known to gulp down the swill that stood in the pail. Of the commonest acts of decency they at first had no idea, (showing their former habits of life), but they have latterly improved in many respects. They sleep mostly in the day time, and at night wander around the rooms, one of them being found one night in a dangerous position on a staircase in the middle of the night. As to their former history only this is known: that they were found by Father Cherrier, Owen Sound R. C. mission, on a lonely isle in Lake Huron, where the father lived with these strange children and would allow no one but himself to live there. The father seeing their condition obtained the father's permission at last to have them taken to a refuge and cared for. The parent came with them voluntarily, and brought them here. The parents of these singular beings were not married and are said to have been nearly related. The mother has been dead for years.

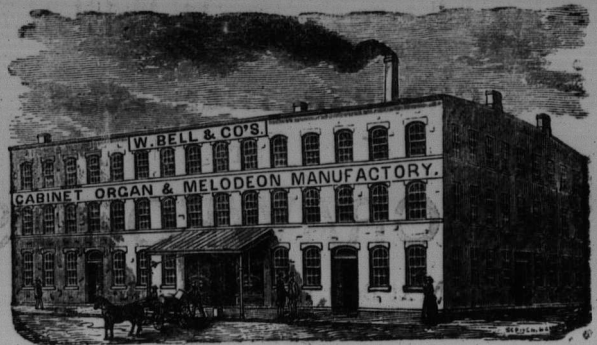

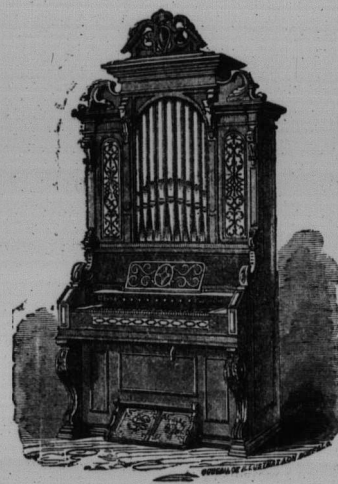

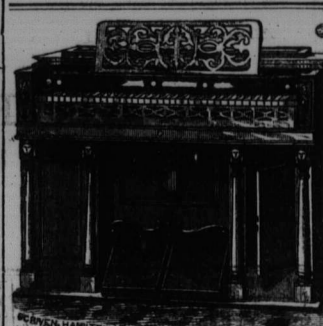

Nassagaveya Municipal Council. The Council met on Monday, 14th Sep. Members all present.

On motion the following sums were paid for sheep killed by dogs, viz.—Robert Currie, \$3.74; Samuel Congdon, \$10; William Roberts, \$4.67; John A. Peacock, \$4; William Holmes, \$2.40; and James Barman, \$4.

On motion a By-law was introduced and passed, for levying the several amounts of money necessary for the present year, viz.—\$884.74 for County Rate, 1 and 4-10ths mills in the \$; \$437 for Municipal School grant, 7-10ths mill in the \$; \$850 for Township purposes, 1 and 4-10ths mills in the \$; \$1,564 for Special Rate, less \$892.50 available from the Municipal Loan Fund, reducing the former amount to \$1071.50, 1 and 7-10ths mills in the \$.

Mr. Menzies moved, seconded by Mr. Easterbrook, for leave to introduce a by-law to empower the collector to collect the school rate in certain school sections, the Trustees of which having complied with the Act in respect thereto, the said by-law having been read, the necessary times was passed.

An account from J. D. Matheson, of \$4.05 for printing a by-law and posters, was ordered to be paid.

Mr. Easterbrook moved, seconded by Mr. Norrish, that the late survey of Jas. McIntosh, P.L.S., of the side-line across the west half of the first concession, between lots 15 and 16 of this Township, be accepted, and a line established by this Council, and that a certain cedar tree bordering on the town line between Nassagaveya and Puslinch, being marked originally with irons, and numbered 15 on one side, and 16 on the other, be considered the centre of said side-line, as a starting point of said road from said town line.

POULTRY ASSOCIATION.—A meeting of the Poultry Association will be held at the Queen's Hotel this evening. All parties interested are requested to be present. See advt.

DEATH OF AN OLD RESIDENT OF NEW HAMBURG.—Mr. John Bender, one of the oldest settlers of New Hamburg, died on Tuesday. He was universally respected, and his loss is greatly deplored.

BURNED TO DEATH.—George Langford, of the 15th concession, London township, while endeavouring to check the progress of a bush fire in that vicinity, was burned to death on Saturday.

FATAL ACCIDENT AT KINCARDINE.—Geo. Marrow, a farmer, belonging to Kincardine township, was fatally injured on Monday by being thrown out of his wagon, while in the village of Kincardine. The wagon passed over him.

DUFFEIN MEDAL.—The Reformer says:—During the recent visit of His Excellency the Governor-General to Galt, he signified his intention of presenting a Gold Medal to the Collegiate Institute, to be competed for annually. The first competition will take place about Christmas.

VOLUNTEER CAMP AT GODERICH.—The 33rd Battalion, with the Goderich Garrison Battery of Artillery, about 800 men in all, are camped at Goderich for their annual drill. Col. Rose is in command. The Y.M.C.A. have a free reading room at the camp for the benefit of the men which is well patronized.

IN TROUBLE.—In the Toronto Police Court, on Tuesday, a man named Wm. Boyd, belonging to Guelph, was charged with stealing some carpenter's tools and a ham from Wm. Beaslie and others. Prisoner pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to three months' hard labour.

GETTING BETTER.—We are happy to state that Mr. John Mackenzie, of this town, who was suddenly taken sick while on a visit to Scotland, is "getting better." Such is the contents of a cablegram received from Mrs. Mackenzie, yesterday, who left here a few weeks ago to attend the sick bed of her son, and who has just arrived there.

REFORM DEMONSTRATION IN WEST MIDDLESEX.—The Reformers of West Middlesex held a grand demonstration at Glencoe, on Tuesday. A very large number of people were present. Able and interesting addresses were delivered by the Hon. Messrs. Fraser and McKellar, T. Oliver, M. P. for North Oxford, J. Hawkins, Esq., Brantford; J. Wilson, M. P. for East Elgin, and Mr. Seachurch, M.P. for North Middlesex.

ACCIDENT.—Last Friday a teamster named John Edmonds, in the employ of Mr. Maxwell of Paris, while driving along the Glen Morris road with a load of shingles, had a narrow escape from death. In going down a hill one of the bunches slipped off on the top of the horse when they instantly ran away, throwing their driver to the ground one of the wheels passing over his back. He was taken up insensible some time afterwards and conveyed to Paris where, by careful attendance, he is gradually recovering.

The old days of logging and burning are gone by. We notice on the hills of water in the field to quench the fire wherever it spreads, a precaution that it would be well to take in all such cases.
