The Legality of the London Convictions

The Legality of the London Convictions Argued in Court.

Vesterday at Osgoode half before Judge Rose came up the case of Bella Nunn, convicted by the London police magistrate of beating a drum on the streets and sentenced to twenty days' imprisonment in default of payment of the \$10 fine imposed. Dr. McMichael, on behalf of Miss Nunn, moved for leave to file the return to the writs of habeas corpus and certificari issued last week. B. B. Osler, for the prosecutor, objected to the filing of the return to the certiorari on the ground that no recognizance had been filed before the issue of the writ. The learned judge said he would hear the case subject to this objection. The conviction is under bylaw 179 of the city of London. subject to this objection. The conviction is under bylaw 175 of the city of London, passed pursuant to sub. sec. 12, of sec. 13, of chap. 32, 46 Vic., Ont., passed last session. The bylaw provides that no person shall in any of the streets, or in the market-place of the city of London, blow any horn, ring any bell, beat any drum, pipe, or other musical instrument; or shout, or make, or assist in making any unusual noise or noise calculated to disturb the inhabitants; provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent the playing of musical instruments by any military band of her majesty's regular army, or any branch thereof, or any militia corps lawfully organized; and provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent the ringing of bells in connection with any church, chapel, meeting house or religious service, or the ringing of the city hall bell." Dr. Mc-Michael, Q. C., and R. M. Meredith of London, in support of the application, contended: (1) That the conviction is bed in form, because it does not negative the exception in the law; (2) that the offence comes within the exception, because beating a drum is a way of summoning people to church of the same kind as ringing a bell; (3) that there was no evidence of a disturbance being created by beatingthe drum; that the magistrate improperly refused to hear evidence to show that there was no disturbance. The matter was fully argued pro and con, Mr. Osler, Q.C., and H. Meredith of London appearing for the prosecution. Judgment was reserved. Several members of don appearing for the prosecution.
