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### HARD ON HARRIS.

**WASHINGTON, July 22.**—Linden Kent, counsel for Lieutenant Garlington before the Protus court inquiry, has written a letter to General Hazen, chief of the signal service, wherein he seeks to prove Garlington innocent of any dereliction, and charges that the partial failure of the Greely expedition and terrible results were due solely to Harris. Kent says both Garlington and Greely followed the instructions given by Harris himself, and because these instructions were so unfruitful he shamefully reports that such instructions were given by Harris. Kent finally accuses Harris of falsifying in many cases, and says he is guilty of the most flagrant negligence and ignorance.

**WASHINGTON, July 22.**—General Hazen says the Greely expedition has solved the question of Arctic exploration for the future. With the additional precaution of having the expedition equipped with the most modern appliances, Arctic exploration will be robbed of its dangers and apprehensions.

**PANAMA, July 22.**—Yellow fever is increasing daily. A canal chief, priest and two staff officers died from the disease last night. There are 175 cases of dysentery in the city. The hospitals here and in Colon are crowded. Several deaths in canal hospital last night. No liquor is allowed in the city. Cholera is expected. No precautionary measures have been taken.

**HONOLULU, Pa., July 22.**—A girl named Joyce, 14 years, was run over and killed by a train. The citizens of Saxton were enraged at the engineer, Wm. Groves, and a mob collected at the depot for the avowed purpose of lynching him on the return trip. Groves, however, hearing of the danger, left the engine and escaped.

**WASHINGTON, July 22.**—There is great indignation in Albany county over the destruction of the tomb of Thomas Jefferson by relic hunters. Recently a party of southern excursionists carried off the lock and a large portion of the ornamentations of the tomb. The base and other portions of the monument have also been clipped off.

**NEW YORK, July 22.**—The tug Warwick, belonging to the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad, to night ran into the prow of the torpedo ram Alarm, anchored in Hampton roads, and sunk. The crew and passengers were saved by boats of the Alarm.

**WASHINGTON, July 22.**—The representative of the Belgian chamber of representatives has been offered to Simon, member for Brussels. Baron D'Anethan presides over the senate.
