Practical Chaps.

Rditor World: Our amiable friend Mr.

John Kemp, of the Bank of Commerce, says through your columns that it "tickles him like a straw" to hear persons not bankers criticising the "practical chaps" in that calling. Being myself a practical chap who has seen and shared in the work of banking in an in-comparably wider sphere, with more varied res, and offering a more instructive field of observation than banking can give in Canada, I somewhat sympathize with my Falstaffian brother. But to ridicule the criticism of our banking laws and usages by persons not engaged as bankers is not wise. The bistory of Canadian banking for many years has been one of disaster and shame, millions having been wasted owing to disregard for old world experience. In the bank Mr. Kemp is engaged I, when his co-officer, warned the management of a certain practice which is a fruitful source of trouble. Not being regarded as "a practical chap," being fresh in Canada, my words were not beeded, and the result was in one instance that I had especially called attention to, a heavy loss. Other Canadian banks in the hands of practical chaps have made tremendous losses the last twenty years, the vast bulk of them arising from imprudences that have been condemned by writers on banking who are, or who were, not practical chaps. 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A PLEA FOR THE HORSE. Cutting the "Frog." of the Hoof Away—The
Noble Animal Should Not be shod.

down the stag. Afterwards, the horse wished
to be free of the harness again, but he had
reckened without his host. Man-had him in

ever since. The horse is called the
friend of man, but it is doubtful
whether the "noble animal" if he possessed
the gift of Balaam's ass, would speak of man the gift of Balaam's ass, would speak of mar as the friend of the horse. In London, h certainly would not. Every day are to b seen the most pitiable sights-horses down seen the most pitiable sights—horses down upon their knees or their side, often with the wheels of omnibases or heavy drays pressing upon their legs, and with laws torn and breeding from the violent manner in which they have been pulled up. Passers-by gather around, with unfeeling jests and laughter and the drivers, to whom the experience is familiar, make free use of their whips and thick boots in getting the poor animals on to their legs again.

Now there is not the least necessity why these cruel scenes should be witnessed at all. They are due simply and solely to an absurd and foolish prejudice, fostered by ignorance or interest. Rev. J. R. Wood, in his valuable book entitled Horse and Man, which every farrier, veterinary surgeon, groom and owner of horses should study, says, "It is difficult to persuade many people that the Creator really did know how to make a horse, and that divine handlwork cannot very well be improved by man." Man has been constantly trying to "improve" the horse, all, no doubt, for the horse's good; but the result has been a melancholy failure.

Let us look only at the hoof of the horse. Naturally the horse was intended to wall chiefly on the "frog" of the hoof—the yielding, india-rubber like muscle, which occupies nearly the whole of the hoof's lower surface. The function of the frog is to enable the horse to put its feet down softly, and thus avoid jarring the whole frame, together with the brain and spinal cord. The frog grows very rapidly, in order to make good the waste by wear and tear. It expand when pressed upon the ground, and slightly stretches the horny wall which is intended for its protection. By the expansion and contraction of the frog the horse is enabled to grasp firmly with its feet the most slippers surfaces. It may walk even across ice with out the slightest danger of falling. Now how do the farrier and the groom regarchis' wonderful mechanism? They simply look upon the frog as a grotesque mistake on the part of the horse's Creator. The horse, they argue, was meant to walk solely on the hard part of the horse. 
