Two Physicians Present Their Views on the Subject. A prominent physician was seen by the World yesterday, and expressed his sense of the injustice of the plan of forcing general practitioners to send their patients to the infectious hospital and then taking the cases out of their hands.

As a physician not connected with any college or hospital and therefore in a position to state plain, unvarnished truths regarding the contagious disease hospital, I would like to express my views on the subject to our General and Sunlight Hospitals, and therefore know the true inwardness of the management of a hospital, and for interest of the public, I will state as follows:

Allow me to give you an example that I was one of the assistant physicians of the infectious hospital. One day a case of smallpox was brought from one of our largest hotels to the General Hospital, and placed in the top flat and Dr. Abbott was placed in charge of that one patient. In about ten days' time Dr. Abbott was stricken down with the smallpox, and the late Dr. McCollum, who was medical superintendent, gave orders that it was to be kept in the top flat, and he was in attendance how he was and then fly back to their own work.
