### THE MCCARTHY PLATFORM.

CHUSHING OF COMBINES AND REP BY FOUR PLANKS.  
The Provinces to Have Exclusive Authority in the Matter of Education—Preference for Trade With Britain—Wherever Franchise Abolition—Who the Officers of the League Are.  
Yesterday a meeting of the Central Committee of the McCarthyites was held, when a league with the following objects as a platform was formally organized:

1. To promote such Tariff Reform as will benefit the Dominion.

2. To prevent in the establishment of provinces in the Territories any enactment of any organic law which would recognize any racial distinction or privilege, and to secure the early repeal of the dual language clause in the Northwest Territories.

3. To insist in the matter of education, so far as the subject is within the control of the Dominion, that the combined provinces shall have exclusive authority; that no sectarian system shall be forced upon any province; that the Dominion Legislature, and further insist on the abolition of the separation of the public schools in the Territories.

4. To oppose any interference by the Government or Parliament of Canada in the Public School Law of the Province of Manitoba, the constitutionality of which has been conclusively established by the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council.
