St. John despatch of the 11th inst. says: James Harris, the head of the firm of James Harris & Co., died today. He was born in Annapolis in 1823 and came to St. John when quite young. His works were among the largest in Canada. They occupied 250 hands in their car works and about 90 in their rolling mills.

The adjourned meeting into the cause of the late Annapolis fire was held before Justices Leavitt and Harris, last Monday evening, but we have not the result. Notes by the Way.

On Monday and Tuesday of last week, my ramble extended to Fort George and its vicinity, where I had the pleasure to meet an old and esteemed friend, Mr. Christopher Anderson, who had just returned from St. John's, Newfoundland, to which section of the U. S. he had gone nearly a year ago. I was curious to know what much wanted and why advertised country. It was pleased to hear from him that with the exception of climate, he considered all the advantages were with his native Nova Scotia. He reports that times there after no admittance for immigrants thither, the bottom having fallen out of the boom which, for two years past, has prevailed there. He said that our Nova Scotia boys who had invested their means in lands here, in many cases, failed to realize the price paid for them when placed on the market this spring, or even to effect sales though offered at a discount of twenty-five per cent. He returns fully convinced that he may well be proud of his own native land.

Line fishing I was told had been fairly good so far during this season, on this section of the bay of Fundy shore, and I believe nearly accomplished the work of seeding, and were hopeful of a good crop. Two days later I visited the district of Salem, Melville Square, and North Kingston, and beautiful districts they are. The charming sea scenery, or sugar maple has begun to be planted along the road sides, and adds greatly to the beauty of the landscape. The wealth of foliage of these trees, and their various forms, make them an admiration to all beholders, even this early season of the Canadian summer, while, by the coloring they assume in the days of autumn they transform the same landscape into a "joy forever."

Let every future arbor day add to their number. In all these matters I found a super-added charm which it is simply impossible for me to fully describe. I rode to the seaside upon myriads of blooms with which the apple, pear, plum and cherry trees have clothed themselves, and of which all the air far and wide, and remind one of Araby the best. So far the prospects of a fine fruit crop are perfect, and a few weeks more will determine all doubt as to the final issue.

While in N. Kingston I received the kindly hospitality of Edward Armstrong, one of the grandest old men of the province, Richard Armstrong, the son of whose father adopted countries, we were in the habit of visiting together. "That they may take who have the power. And they may keep who can." and who, by his marriage to a daughter of Adam Schaffner, gave to his descendants some of the well-known qualities of the Germanic race, which have been recently manifested in the sons of "mine house." One of these sons of a worthy father has recently graduated in a law school, gaining an L. May these young men prove to be successful and honorable practitioners in their respective professions.

A pleasant hour or two was passed by me, on the following day, at the hospitable residence of W. R. L. Foster, youngest son of the late Willis Foster, whose mother yet survives at the great age of 89 years. She was a daughter of the late Ezra Foster, and sister of our venerable and distinguished friend, the late Dr. W. R. L. Foster, Esq. Notwithstanding her great age Mrs. Foster's memory seems to retain all the incidents of her life, and she has exhibited in this model flower garden, I left her to show her husband his cranberry patch, a few rods to the rear of the house. Licenses to U. S. Fishermen. REMINDS THE MOORS VISITED TO FORCE. OTTAWA, May 27.—An Order in Council has been passed binding the medical profession under the Treaty of Washington Act of 1828 into force. It will be remembered that after the treaty had been signed a protocol was issued by the British plenipotentiaries in which they stated that they had been considering the position which would be created by the immediate commencement of the fishing season before the treaty could possibly be ratified by the Senate of the United States, by the Parliament of Canada and the Legislature of Newfoundland.

THE MOORS VISITED. 1. For a period not exceeding two years from the present date, the privilege of entering the bays and harbours of the Atlantic coast of Canada and of Newfoundland shall be granted to United States fishing vessels by seasonal licenses at a fee of \$1.00 per month for the following regulations:—

The purchase of bait, ice, stoves, lines, and all other supplies and outfit. Transshipment of catch and shipping of crews.

2. If during the continuance of this arrangement, the United States shall be required to furnish the necessary supplies, such as seal oil (and their covering, packages, etc.) the said license shall be issued free of charge.

3. United States fishing vessels entering the bays and harbours of the Atlantic coast of Canada or Newfoundland for any of the four purposes mentioned in Article 1. of the Convention of October 20, 1818, and not remaining therein more than twenty-four hours, shall not be compelled to enter or clear at Custom House, providing they do not communicate with the shore.

4. Forfeiture to be exacted only for the offence of fishing or preparing to fish in territorial waters.

5. This arrangement to take effect as and when the necessary measures can be completed by the colonial authorities.
