A DOUBLE NUMBER.

In order that the record of the D. R. A. meeting may be complete in one paper, we have substituted this double number for the two which in ordinary course would have been issued on the 16th and 17th of September. Advisable in any case, this has been made necessary by unavoidable delay in preparation of the statistics.

THE DOMINION RIFLE MEETING.

The officers of the Dominion Rifle Association well deserve the congratulations received from all quarters upon the success of the prize meeting just held, and which was in every respect the best in the history of the Association. Well planned arrangements; an able staff of range officers and office assistants; an intelligent body of competitors ready and willing to observe the rules, and pleasant weather which offered no temptation to shirk, all contributed to ensure the pronounced general success. The one respect in which a change seems most to be desired, is in the time of the meeting, which has been found all too short for the purpose. In deference to the wishes of some more pressed for time than the great body of the competitors the meeting has been crowded into four days, according to programme, but last year and this the necessity for more time has been very apparent. Not only are many good riflemen handicapped by the unusual amount of shooting allotted to each day, but their appointments are so close as to preclude the social intercourse and renewal of old friendships which have in the past properly formed a prominent feature of the annual gatherings at Ottawa. An extra half day could be simply provided for by having the first hundred shoot the final test for Bisley on Friday morning, and as there are no prizes in connection with this event (for the London Merchants' Cup Match could be shot as handily in connection with the Governor General's), this would not interfere with the formal presentation ceremony on Thursday evening, whilst all the competitors are necessarily still in town.

Like the time of the meeting, the prize lists were very fine while they lasted, but they did not last long enough to reward some scoring well worthy of a place on the honour roll. If the funds will not permit of an increase in the total amount, it would, we think, meet with general approval if for instance \$4 were made the minimum prize in those matches where \$5 is now the limit, and a few additional prizes thus created. Perhaps a small reduction could be made all down the list, but it would not be advisable to materially reduce the top prizes. The men who make the best scores in the field of four hundred marksmen met at Rideau deserve substantial recognition in each match. But the scores "counted out" are too good to go unrewarded. In connection with this subject of prize money, we wish to

emphasize the fact that rifle shooting is not and cannot be a money making business; and to protest against the too great prominence given by the press and public to the dollars won, without any regard to the significance of the victory. It is because shooting is a very expensive pastime in the preliminary practice as well as in the entry fees and travelling expenses connected with a central meeting, that the numerous money prizes are necessary as a guarantee of some small compensation to those who compete against such great odds for the higher honours and the place on the Bisley team which it is the hope of every rifleman to eventually obtain. If only the money were at stake, the Dominion meeting would be a very small affair. And it is a matter of reproach that the riflemen's achievements receive so very little notice in the press and consequently from the public of their various localities—an inattention strongly in contrast with the lavish notices given to other far less deserving branches of sport.

This apathy on the part of the public is one great reason why the prize winners refuse or neglect to take part in the formal presentations. They know that the attendance will be small, and that those who do go out of curiosity to find out what all the shooting and prize lists mean, will leave the hall just about as wise as when they entered, and not very likely to repeat the visit. It remains for some one yet to discover a plan of interesting the public in these presentations, and the winners may then be trusted to properly take their part. Perhaps a promenade concert in connection with the presentation event, and an attempt at a lucid and brief explanation of the significance of each match for which the prizes are presented in the intervals of the music, would not be a bad idea for a beginning.

The announcement that an Ottawa citizen has set the good example of starting a prize fund for the further encouragement of Nursery shots, will be received with general interest, not to say pleasure, especially as it has long been felt that the good people of the Capital do not display at all that interest which should be taken in such an event as the Dominion rifle gathering. Their apathy is all the harder to understand when it is remembered that the Ottawa riflemen long since won, and continuously hold by their prowess, a place second to those of no city in the Dominion. The fact that the proposed new prizes are to be for Nursery team aggregates, should help to increase the attendance of new shots.

Should it be thought proper to extend the time of the meeting, and fire the Bisley Match on the Friday morning, we would suggest a change in the conditions, by which a trial at 800 yards would be included in the Bisley aggregate. In place of the second firing over Queen's ranges now prescribed, there might be ten shots at 600 yards and ten at 800; or seven standing at 200, seven at 600, and seven at 800. This would vary the programme, and would further help to place on the team the men best calculated to win honours at Bisley.

THE DOMINION RIFLEMEN.

Results of the Annual Prize Meeting at Ottawa.

Attendance and Scoring the Largest on Record—The complete list of team and individual champions—An interesting Business Meeting of Competitors—Presentation of Prizes and Speeches by Leading Men - A Lords and Commons Match - The League Trophy Winners and Scores—Result of the Riflemen's "Sweep"—Standing of the Bisley Hundred.

The annual prize meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association was held in delightfully fine weather on the Rideau range on the four days commencing Monday, 31st August. The competitors in attendance numbered about 425, this being the largest in the history of the association. The camp, laid out as usual on the high ground to the north of the firing points, presented a very pretty scene, and for those living there every accommodation desired was afforded, thanks to the Camp Quartermaster, Lt.-Col. John Macpherson, Treasurer of the Association.

The matches were under the direction of a special committee of the executive, consisting of Lt.-Col. J. Hood, chairman; Lt.-Col. W. P. Anderson, Major W. A. Garrison, Major J. M. Delamere and Capt. J. T. Hartt. The chief executive officer was Lt. Col. Maunsell, D.A.G., from the School of Infantry at Fredericton; and the range officers were: For the regular match targets, Lt.-Col. Irving, B.M., Prince Edward Island; Major W. E. Hodgins, G.G.F.G.; Major W. L. Heron, G.G.F.G.; and Captain W. G. Mutton, Q.O.R.; for the 500 yards extra series, Capt. T. Aumond, R.L.; 600 yards, Capt. D. C. F. Bliss, Ottawa Field Battery; 800 yards, Capt. T. D. B. Evans, Mounted Infantry School, Winnipeg. The Revolver range was in charge of Mr. H. LeB. Ross. In the statistical office, Major John Walsh presided as usual, and again had for his assistant Mr. C. C. Rogers. The Secretary of the Association, Lt.-Col. Bacon, exercised a general supervision, and thanks to his admirable planning, there was not the least delay or difficulty attendant upon the issue of the firing tickets or ammunition, or in connection with the volume of miscellaneous business to be transacted through his office. On the whole the meeting was a model one so far as smoothness of running and lack of cause for complaint were concerned.—

Monday, 31st August.

The further reduction from \$8 to \$5 as the amount of previous prize money to exclude from this competition, had the desired effect of leaving the Nursery match very largely in the possession of the new men of this year. The effect on the scoring was very noticeable, for whereas there were one "possible" and three 24's this year, whilst two 24's headed the list last time, the average scoring showed a falling off of fully two points. Last year there were forty-five scores of inners or better, whilst this year, notwithstanding the new privilege of a sighting shot, there were but twenty scores of inners or better; and at the foot of the prize list there were ten 16's in place of six 18's. The match being only five shots, a poor beginning puts one pretty well out of the race, and a change to seven shots would be rather popular.

In strong contrast to the Nursery Match, was the scoring in the Macdougall Challenge Cup Match which followed. Here the influence of the large entry and the sighting shot were noticed, only three 40's coming into the prize list, whilst last year one 36 got a prize. The improvement spread over the entire list, one 45 being at the top last year, whilst this time there were ten scores of 45 and over, the top being a well earned 47 by one of the veterans of the range, Staff-Sergeant Thos. Mitchell, of the 10th Royal Grenadiers. It should be mentioned in connection with the high scoring, that the weather conditions were by no means improved on this occasion; in fact a smart shower of rain set in soon after the 600 yards range was commenced, and many a good score was obliterated in consequence. Like the Nursery, this match is felt to be too short, one had shot out of the five allowed putting the competitor pretty well out of the running. The cup is to become the final property of the competitor winning it twice consecutively, but this no one is very likely to do under the present conditions. Only two competitors have won it twice at any time, these being the winner of this year, who also won in 1876, and his brother Dave Mitchell, who won in 1873 and 1875. At least eight of the previous winners competed this year, but only the two Mitchells got even a place in the prize list.

This match affords a striking example of the peculiarities of the prize list, one chap getting \$25 for his 34, while another, whose inner came a little later, gets only \$10 for the same number of points!

There was only one regular match this day, the Minister of Militia's, at 500 and 600 yards, for the Challenge Cup presented by Sir Adolphe Caron, and in cash eight team and sixty two individual prizes. The improved scoring remarked the previous day continued through this match, the prize scores ranging from 66 to 55, against 64 to 53. It curiously happened that the first individual prize was won by the same competitor, who is, however, well known as one of the best shots in the Dominion. Last year Pte. Hutcheson had a "possible" at 500 and 29 points at 600. This year he was only a point short of the possible at 500 and at 600 improved three points upon his last year's score, with a well made 32.

The team competition fired in connection with it, added to the interest of the Minister of Militia Match, especially as this year the teams—representing affiliated associations—were of five members each in place of only three as formerly. Notwithstanding that the teams were larger, the average score of the winners was a point improved, and the last team prize was taken with an average three points higher than last year. The cup was taken with the very creditable score, for Snider shooting, of five points more than inners. The 43rd Battalion won the trophy once before, in 1887. It has been competed for annually since 1884, and no association had hitherto been twice successful, although last year the Grand Trunk Rifle Association team, then victorious, consisted entirely of members of the 6th Fusiliers, the winning association the year before.

THE MILITARY MATCHES.

The afternoon was given up to the skirmishing and volley firing matches, that for the Gzowski Cup coming first. This is for teams of five men, and calls for twenty rounds skirmishing at from 150 to 100 yards, five rounds in volleys at 300 yards kneeling, and five rounds independent firing at

150 yards standing. The targets are 6 feet by 2 feet 6 inches, divided into lower belt, 15 inches; centre belt, 10 inches; and upper belt, 5 inches, these scoring 5, 3 and 2 respectively. The targets are exposed 15 seconds in the skirmishing and 10 seconds for independent firing. The scoring this year was comparatively very high, for last year the best aggregate was only 431, and that was a substantial improvement over the preceding year. It is evident that more attention is year by year being paid to this description of firing. The Guards, however, continue to lead the procession, and this year won the cup for the third time in succession, and for the fifth time in the ten years during which it has been offered. They had the immense lead of 46 points over the Victoria Rifles, who themselves improved very much on their score of last year, when they were eleventh with only 307 points. The 43rd Battalion, winners of the third prize, were second last year and third the year before; and the next in order, the Queen's Own Rifles, were third last year and second the year before. In no other matches do the same teams keep so persistently at the top as in those for this description of firing. The following are the complete scores in the Gzowski:

The British Challenge Shield Match, following the Gzowski, was for teams of four men each, firing twenty rounds skirmishing at ranges and targets as noted above. This match also showed an immense improvement in the scoring, for top place was last year taken (by the Grenadiers) with 214. The Guards have had either the Gzowski Cup or the Shield every year since 1887, but this year they repeated their double victory of 1884, and for the fourth time in the nine competitions their name will be engraved on the Shield:—

The Competitors' Meeting.

The annual meeting of competitors was held at the Drill Hall on Tuesday evening, 1st September. Lt.-Col. White, chairman of the Executive, presided, and Lt.-Col. Bacon, secretary of the Association, kept the minutes. There was not a large attendance of competitors, and at the outset there appeared to be absolutely no grievances to be ventilated. While matters for discussion were being thought of, Col. Bacon read the results of the Gzowski and British Challenge Shield matches, completed a few hours previously. The competitors cordially applauded the Guards for their double victory, as the names were read off.

THE SKIRMISHING TARGETS.

Capt. Macdonald, Q. O. R., complained of the uneven ground opposite the targets on either end which handicapped the teams drawn to fire there in these military matches. He also complained that the targets were not a uniform height above the crest of the parapet, and suggested that the frames should be so marked beforehand that the targets could be raised to exactly the same level all along the line. He drew attention to the possibility of shots in addition to those allowed being placed upon the targets, either by the mistakes of other teams or by competitors improperly firing more than once at any one halt, and suggested that an officer or non-commissioned officer should be detailed to follow each team and superintend the firing.

The Chairman said he quite admitted the force of Capt. Macdonald's contentions, and would see that the matters mentioned came to the attention of the Executive.

FIRING SUPERINTENDENCE.

Major McSpadden asked if any two teams from the same corps had fired at the same time, and if so whether they had drawn adjoining targets?

Col. Bacon replied that in every case where two teams had been entered, they had fired at different times, one being with the first lot and one with the second.

Major McSpadden endorsed what had been said as to the advisability of having officers superintend the teams.

Lt.-Col. Hood said this was the practice at the Quebec matches. He thought that in future the cards for the officers in the butts should be so printed and ruled as to keep the marks for each round clearly separate, and that this would facilitate deductions for extra shots found upon the targets. He suggested also that steps should be taken to award marks for good and bad volleys.

SIGHTING SHOTS AND AMMUNITION.

Major Sam. Hughes, 45th Battalion, referred to the possibility of mistakes arising, in connection with the regular match tickets, from the addition of the sighting shot value in making up the score, and suggested that in future the blank for the sighter should be placed to the left of the competitor's name.

Staff-Sergt. Jos. Dent, 10th R.G., inquired why the competitors were compelled to take the round of ammunition included in the price of each sighting shot, at the office instead of at the firing point.

The Secretary explained that there would be a difficulty in keeping track of ammunition issued to be so served out at the firing points.

UNEVEN FIRING POINTS.

Capt. Macdonald, Q. O. R., said many of the firing points were so uneven as to cause great discomfort, and he asked that they be levelled.

The Chairman said the Executive had already considered this matter, and had decided to level the mounds early next spring, so that they would be in good condition for the next meeting.

THE REVOLVER CONDITIONS.

Lieut. Mercer, Q.O.R., called attention to the new conditions of the Revolver match, which called for a revolver not less than .44 calibre and 7½ inches in length of barrel. He said it was impossible to secure such a weapon as called for.

The Chairman said the regulation had been framed exactly in accordance with the instructions received from Council by the programme committee. The idea was that the match should be fired with exactly the weapon which would be carried on service, and the description given applied to the service Colts.

LEFT-HANDED SHOTS.

Major Hughes aired a grievance in connection with the left-handed shots, who to find room on the butts have to cross their legs with those of their right-handed mates, to the serious danger of many a score, by reason of one of the parties thus piled together unexpectedly moving as the other is about to fire.

Capt. J. Bruce, 10th R.G., said as a left-handed shot he could cordially endorse the complaint just made, as he found the right-handed men a decided nuisance when the space was limited. (Laughter.)

Lieut. Curran, 12th, agreed that there was a nuisance somewhere, and suggested in abatement that the left-handed shots should so describe themselves in making their entries, so that they might be squadded together.

MARTINI AMMUNITION.

Lieut. E. D. Sutherland, 43rd Battalion, renewed his suggestion of last year that Martini as well as Snider ammunition should be distributed at the firing points, and asked if there was any obstacle in the way.

The Secretary said the principal reason why the suggestion had not been put into effect was that while the Snider ammunition is put up in seven and five round packages specially for the Association, the Martini, which comes from England, is all in ten round packages, and could not be handled at the firing points without much trouble. Next season, however, the Martini ammunition will probably be made in Canada, and then the suggestion can be acted upon.

THE ADOPTED WEAPON.

Major McSpadden suggested that the meeting pronounce in favour of the exclusive use of the Martini rifle.

The Chairman, in response, referred to the League scores as an evidence that the Snider is not by any means a weapon to be despised, and he pointed out that as England is superseding the Martini by an improved arm, it is just as well for Canada to hasten slowly in the matter of a change.

FURTHER NURSERY PRIZES.

The Chairman took this opportunity to announce, by request, that a citizen of Ottawa had offered \$50, and another citizen had offered to secure a further \$50, as the nucleus of a fund for a Nursery team match. (Applause.)

Lt. Col. Hood: "I am authorized by a Montreal gentleman to offer \$100 to the ten highest men on the Bisley hundred at this meeting, if they will shoot over Queen's ranges and average 90 points." (Laughter and applause.)

Major Hughes said a Toronto gentleman had offered to contribute towards a nursery aggregate prize fund.

Capt. J. T. Hartt said he cordially agreed with the suggestion of an aggregate for *bona fide* Nursery men. He thought a good step had been taken this year in reducing the minimum of the prize to bar entry, and he would like to see the move followed up. In his own province, New Brunswick, the Nursery aggregate match was productive of very good results.

Major McSpadden urged a veterans' match, for officers

and men over sixty years of age, some of whom found it too hard work to keep up with the younger shots. "A man they call Ronan," he said, "has some kind of a new waggon wheel that he hangs in front of him to keep his sights straight, and if the old gentlemen had something like this to help them I am sure they would do well enough."

A "LORDS AND COMMONS" MATCH.

Lt.-Col. Hood announced that in view of the presence of Parliament in Ottawa at this meeting, the executive had framed a match for teams from the Senate and House of Commons, after the pattern of the Lords and Commons match at Bisley. The teams were to consist of six on each side, and the match would be fired on Thursday afternoon.

Major McSpadden expressed the hope that these gentlemen would be armed with weapons from the racks of some of our country battalions. (Laughter and applause.)

THE SQUADDING APPRECIATED.

Capt. Hartt reminded the competitors that at their meeting last year they had passed a resolution asking for indiscriminate squadding, and as their wish had been very satisfactorily carried out at this meeting he thought they should pass a resolution of appreciation, which he accordingly moved.

Lieut. Sutherland seconded the resolution, and commended also the change whereby the firing points and butts were indicated on the tickets, in place of requiring the range officers to allot the tickets, to the neglect of their proper duties.

The Chairman having put the motion, it was carried with general applause. In tendering the vote to Lt.-Col. Bacon, Lt.-Col. White said it gave him much personal satisfaction to do so, and he was sure the Secretary would be gratified to know that the competitors appreciated the result of the pains he had taken in this connection.

Lt.-Col. Bacon briefly acknowledged the vote, and incidentally begged that the natural difficulties in connection with the squadding should not be increased by requiring him to separately allot the right and left hand shots. (Laughter.)

TEAM ENTRIES.

Major Hughes asked if the affiliation fee of \$12 might not with advantage be reduced. He said now that unlimited team entries were allowed in the association match, there was a temptation for small associations to club together and pay only one affiliation fee. If this could not be reduced, he suggested that only one team entry be allowed from each association, but unlimited teams from any one corps should be allowed in the Dominion of Canada match.

THE LATE LIEUT. E. A. MACNACHTAN.

Lt.-Col. Tilton moved a resolution of regret at the recent death of Lieut. E. A. Macnachtan, of the Cobourg Garrison Artillery. He made a touching reference to the deceased as one of the best known and most respected riflemen in Canada, and one of the most faithful workers who had ever served on the Council of the Association. The mover had become intimately acquainted with Lieut. Macnachtan when, in 1882, he commanded the Wimbledon team of which deceased was adjutant, and he felt therefore that it was all the more appropriate for him to move this resolution.

The Chairman, in putting the resolution, said he heartily concurred in all that had been said. He was sure that the disappearance of the familiar figure of Lieut. Macnachtan from amongst the range officers was very generally deplored.

THE MEMBERS' MEETING.

Lt.-Col. Tilton said that on behalf of the Council he desired to express their thanks to the competitors for attending at this meeting and the suggestions made for improving the arrangements.

Major Hughes said this brought to his mind the distinction made between members and associate members, and the fees of \$2 and \$1 charged respectively. He thought that if the membership fee were \$1, and the annual meeting of members were more generally made known, there would be a larger attendance. As it was, very few bore in mind the fact that the annual business meeting was held the third Wednesday after the opening of Parliament.

Major McSpadden said that in passing votes of thanks they should not forget Lt.-Col. John Macpherson, the Treasurer, who no doubt was prevented from attending to-night. That gentleman had given great attention, as usual, to getting the camp and the tents ready for the visiting riflemen, and deserved to be remembered by them. He moved a vote of thanks, which was recorded by Staff-Sergt. Bell and heartily accorded.

Major McSpadden then moved a vote of thanks to Lt.-Col. White for his services in the chair. Lt.-Col. Bacon put the motion, which being carried with applause, the Chairman spoke briefly in acknowledgment. He said he had been a member of the association since the beginning, and always would be found ready to do his best in its interest.

The meeting then adjourned.

Wednesday, 2nd September.

The Dominion of Canada match was the event of this day, and the weather conditions favoured a fair test of skill. It commenced at 200 yards sharp at 8.30, and from the outset the scoring was high. Staff-Sergt. Rolston, who had already become known as top aggregate, drew further attention to himself by making only one point short of the possible at 200 yards, and repeating the performance at 500, thus going back to the final range with 68 points to his credit out of 70 possible. A record for Rideau range seemed about to be made, but fortune decreed otherwise, as Sergt. Rolston made a very poor beginning, failed to lower the target with his second shot and wound up with only 23 points to add, thus making his total 91, and winning second place. The shooting was nearly five points higher all round than last year, when the best score was 86 and the lowest to take a prize 76, sixteen of the latter coming in. The improvement was especially noticeable in the battalion team totals, the champion team of 1891 having to their credit 22 points more than the score taking first place the previous year. These were the team totals, the shooting being at 200, 500 and 600 yards, with Sniders :-

True, no one touched the grand total of 49 made by last year's winner, and the first half of the prize list showed a falling off of about a point on the average, but this was more than made up by the next in order, and five 39's were counted out, whilst last year five 38's came in. A glance at the names of winners in this and the preceding match will show that the crack shots of the regulars—the Leicestershire Regiment—gave a better account of themselves with the Martini—their service weapon—than with the Snider which they had to accustom themselves to for the preceding matches, but a curious stroke of ill-luck fell upon two of them. It will be noticed that Col.-Sergt. Nursall and Sergt.-Major Baker stand thirteenth and fourteenth respectively, with 42 points. After having lost only three points in the nine shots of their score, the tenth shot was missed by both; and had they instead of missing made the average of their former shots they would have headed the list, an honour which their friends of the Militia would warmly have congratulated them upon, for the Leicestershire men earned the good will of everybody about the range:—

The Grand Aggregate.

The posting of the first hundred in the Grand Aggregate showed that Sergt. Rolston headed the list with the surprisingly high score of 328 points out of the 380 possible, for the 59 shots with the Snider and 17 with the Martini—this

being 24 points above an average of inners. Last year the aggregate was taken with exactly an average of inners, and the top man then was but 3 points ahead of the next, against the lead of 18 points taken this year. For the whole aggregate the average improvement is 14 points. THE PROVINCIAL TEAM MATCH.

Immediately after the tie shooting the match for the London Merchants' Cup was proceeded with, and concurrently with this event the first hundred in the Grand Aggregate fired the prescribed seven shots at 200, 500 and 600 yards in continuation of the aggregate for Bisley. The individual results of the last mentioned shooting appear in detail further on, in the list of the Bisley hundred. The teams all did very badly at 200 yards, no doubt due to the fact that there had been no previous practice with the Martini at 200 yards, and the elevation there was not correctly ascertained even with the sighter allowed. Ontario, with the low total of 211, was first, only one point ahead of Manitoba, and Quebec came third, five points behind the leader. New Brunswick was fourth, and Nova Scotia fifth. The sixth place was taken by British Columbia, that province being now for the first time represented in this match. There were only six teams competing, for though Prince Edward Island had entered as usual, the entry was for some reason withdrawn just as the firing commenced. At 500 yards Ontario again led, with the moderate average of 30 points per man, and

Manitoba kept close up, dropping only two points below her more favoured competitor. New Brunswick made six points more than Quebec, and they changed places. Nova Scotia and British Columbia did not improve, and were practically out of the race. At 600 yards Ontario again led the field, with 222, and thus won the match with the handsome lead of 32 points over Quebec, whose team with 211 points at 600, displaced Manitoba, who scored only 188 and dropped to third place. New Brunswick and Nova Scotia each put on an even 200, and British Columbia, improving in comparison, was but 4 points behind. Last year the first team had 662 points, and the sixth 575, but the intervening teams scored higher than those of this year, so that the general average is about the same. This is the fifth win for Ontario in ten competitions:—

THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S MATCH.

It was half past four o'clock when the hundred finished their first trip over the range, and it began to be evident that darkness would set in before the Governor-General's match could be finished. It was decided, however, to go on with it according to programme, but to commence at 600 yards, where the competitors still were, and thus not only save time but have good light for the longer distances. The match commenced with very high average scoring. Macadam and Dover each put on 34, Pratt was next with 33, and Rolston, McVittie, Smith, Horsey and Zealand each had 32. Dangerously close to this field of eight keen shots who had taken the lead, was Coulson Mitchell, last year's winner, who had 30 p.ints. At the end of 500 it was found that Coulson Mitchell and Smith led with 64 points each, with Macadam and Dover only one point behind, and McVittie with 62 was certainly also in the race for first. Rolston, Pratt and Zealand had each 61 points, and though they could scarce hope to be first with only the 200 yards range to fire, it was seen that a good score might well allow one of them a share of the three prizes. So dark had it become that the sights of the rifles could be distinctly placed only with great difficulty, and in the haste to complete the scores before darkness made sighting altogether impossible, many a point was lost. Coulson Mitchell made an inglorious 23, and was out of it. Smith added 30 to his 64, and seemed a sure winner with 94. Macadam and Dover each added a hard earned 28 to their 63's, and McVittie with 29 drew up level with them. At the extreme

left of the line, and firing later than all the rest, was Sergt. Rolston, the hero of the meeting, and there was a general movement towards his butt to see how it would fare with him in the darkness. In his first four shots he had put on 19 points, an inner came next, and it would take two bull's eyes to tie the 94 already made by Smith. The sixth shot was another inner, and this left only second place in his reach. Four points would give him undisputed possession, and three would make a tie with the three 91's. With rare coolness Rolston sighted for his last shot, again and again taking down his rifle after vain attempts to suit himself, and so dark had it become that when he did pull the trigger and the streak of flame shot out in the direction of the target, the appearance of the outer disc would have surprised no one. But instead there came up the white square signifying a bull's eye. Sergt. Rolston was heartily cheered, and a moment later a group of admiring competitors bore him on their shoulders off the ground.

It was impossible to shoot off that night for the third prize, so the trio had to attend next morning. All three seemed nervous at the outset, misjudging the wind and missing, and the veteran McVittie planted his last shot underneath the target when an inner would have tied and a bull given him the prize. The result was as follows, Macadam being the winner:—

each other. Amidst loud applause he announced the winner of the great prize of the meeting, the Governor General's, to have been a well-known marksman from the Maritime Provinces, Lieut. E. A. Smith, of St. John, New Brunswick, and that an Ontario man, Sergt. John Rolston, of Hagersville, had won the second of His Excellency's three prizes, whilst for the third Lieut. Macadam, Staff-Sergeant McVittie, and Lieut. Dover, representing respectively Quebec, Ontario and Nova Scotia, tied, and would have to shoot off in the morning. In conclusion he announced that by request Mrs. Kirkpatrick would present the prizes.

The presentation was then proceeded with. The winner of the Macdougall Challenge Cup was first called upon, but failed to respond. Then the winning teams from the affiliated associations represented in the Minister of Militia match were called. Lt.-Col. Anderson paraded the team of the 43rd Battalion, and Capt. Ross that of the 13th; the Sherbrooke Rifle Association, next on the list, were not represented. In the next series, Capt. Gray paraded the famous team of the Governor-General's Foot Guards to receive once more the Gzowski Challenge Cup, which their prowess as skirmishers has so often secured for them, and the same team were subsequently paraded to receive from Mrs. Herbert, wife of the Major-General, the British Challenge Shield, which also they had won. For the battalion championship represented by the first team prize in the Dominion of Canada match, Capt. Bruce had to go up alone in the absence of his team from the 10th Royal Grenadiers. The Lansdowne Cup, offered as a prize for aggregate team shooting, was won by the redoubtable 13th Battalion, and as Capt. Ross marched up his

Presentation of Prizes.

The presentation of prizes took place on Thursday evening, at the Rideau Skating Rink. The trophies offered for competition were tastily exhibited on the tables on the platform, and as seen from below formed a striking and handsome collection. On the platform were the President of the Association, Lt.-Col. the Hon. G. A. Kirkpatrick; Sir Adolphe Caron, Minister of Militia; Sir James Grant, Hon. Edgar Dewdney, Minister of the Interior; Major-General Herbert, Col. Walker Powell, Adjutant General; Col. C. Eugene Panet, Deputy Minister of Militia; Major-General Laurie, Lt.-Col. Mansell, Chief Executive Officer; Lt.-Col. Tilton, Lt.-Col. White, Lt.-Col. John Macpherson, Treasurer; Lt.-Col. Bacon, Secretary; and a large number of the leading ladies of the Capital. In the body of the hall there was a fair attendance of the youth and beauty of the city, but not nearly so many as might have been expected, and the attendance of riflemen, prize winners and others, was very slim indeed. In his opening address the President alluded to the latter noticeable fact, and offered as an apology for the riflemen the fact that a number of them had been detained at the range until after seven o'clock, whilst others were preparing to take the evening train for home. The President referred with pride to the gratifying success of the prize meeting, the attendance and the scoring alike being the best in the history of the Association. He believed that a great measure of the success was due to the interest in rifle shooting which the operations of the Rifle League had aroused. He dwelt upon the advantage to the Dominion arising out of such gatherings as the annual meeting at Ottawa of the riflemen from all parts, who thus became acquainted with and interested in the welfare of

team, that being their fourth appearance at the platform, they were liberally applauded. The first and second prizes in the Governor General's match were then presented, Lieut. Smith and Sergt. Rolston being very cordially applauded as they advanced to receive their well-earned rewards. The prizes won by the Provincial teams came next. Lt.-Col. Anderson and Capt. Bruce paraded Sergt. Marris as the sole representative of the Ontario eight, and Major Blacklock, Secretary of the Quebec Rifle Association, paraded in all the kilted glory of the Fifth Royal Scots for the second prize, well won by the Quebec team.

Sir Adolphe Caron was called upon for an address and spoke briefly, expressing the great satisfaction he felt as Minister of Militia, in witnessing the greatly increasing interest taken in rifle shooting, an accomplishment of the first importance to a military body. He then by request presented his trophy—given to the League and shot for under their auspices at this meeting of the D.R. A.—to the winner, Staff-Sergeant D. Mitchell, 13th Battalion.

The Gibson trophy, the gift of the Lt. Col. the Hon. J. M. Gibson to the League, and offered as a prize for the aggregate scores of ten members of any one corps, was presented by Mrs. Kirkpatrick. The winners were the 43rd Battalion, and were paraded by Capt. O'Grady, the team captain.

The President referred with pleasure to the presence at this prize meeting of representatives of Her Majesty's Army, in the person of the team from the Leicestershire Regiment, stationed at Halifax. He expressed the hope that the visit would be repeated, and that also at no distant day the Association might have the pleasure of welcoming a team sent over from the Mother Country. He called upon Major-General Herbert, as a distinguished member of Her Majesty's Army, to say a few words on its behalf.

Major-General Herbert in response said he had been much struck with the success of this meeting, and the good marksmanship there displayed, and had become all the more firmly impressed with the conviction that our riflemen are worthy of a better arm. He desired to compliment all concerned upon the meeting, which seemed to proceed without a hitch anywhere.

The President announced that on account of the small attendance of winners the remaining chief prizes in the individual matches would not be formally presented as usual, but that the proceedings would now terminate. He thanked the ladies and gentlemen for their attendance and invited them to come and bring their friends on the next occasion.

The Guards' band, stationed in the back of the hall, played a choice selection of music before and after the meeting, the greater number of those present remaining until the conclusion of the musical programme. The general verdict was highly complimentary to Bandmaster Carter and his musicians.

SENATE VS. COMMONS.

What was intended as the first of a regular series after the plan of the Lords and Commons matches at Wimbledon and Bisley took place in the afternoon during the London Merchants' Cup match. It was between teams representing the Senate and House of Commons respectively, consisting of six members each and firing seven shots at 200 yards and seven at 500 with the Snider rifle. The Senate team was captained by Major the Hon. C. A. Boulton, and the Commons team by Lt.-Col. Tyrwhitt, M.P. The result was as follows, the Senate winning by 8 points:—

Capt. J. W. deC. O'Grady has received from the shooting men of the 43rd "Gatineau Beavers" the gift of a handsome Webley Martini rifle, in recognition of the valuable services he has rendered as team captain. The presentation took place at the Battalion rooms at the drill hall the week following the D. R. A. matches. Lt. Col. Anderson in a few prefatory remarks referred to Capt. O'Grady's happy faculty for managing shooting affairs, and the unselfish manner in which he worked for the good of his comrades, and he complimented him on the fact that the present recognition had been inspired by the rank and file rather than by his brother officers. Upon the command "Present arms," Staff Sergeant Helmer stepped to the front with the bright new Webley, and on behalf of the riflemen expressed the hope that fortune would favour the Captain in his use of it. Capt. O'Grady was completely taken by surprise, not having had the slightest intimation of the affair until the Colonel made his address, and he had himself called the meeting, by request, for the ostensible purpose of settling up the season's shooting affairs. He briefly acknowledged the compliment paid him, and expressed the hope that with the new rifle he might win a further share of honours for the Beavers.

The pleasure of the Garrison Artillery meeting at Orleans was marred by a fatality which befell one of the competitors, Corporal Rufus Macdonald, P.E.I.G.A., who was 47 years old and a painter by trade. The verdict of the coroner's jury briefly tells the story of the accident, as follows: "Corporal Rufus Macdonald, No. 1 Battery, Prince Edward Island Brigade of Garrison Artillery, died on the 10th inst. from hemorrhage and shock to the nervous system, brought on by the rupture of the large vessels and the tearing away of nerves and flesh of the left leg, caused by the falling of the gun, owing to the sked between the trunnion hole having accidentally slipped from its bearing on the gun carriage. Although the jurors consider the death of the said Rufus Macdonald purely an accident, they are of opinion that a hospital tent, with all necessary appliances, should be attached to every artillery camp."

RIDEAU'S RECORD BEATEN.

The Ottawa Rifle Club held their seventeenth spoon competition on Saturday, 12th September, when there was a large turnout of the members. The day was fine, but there was a right wind. Capt. Rogers signalled the occasion by making a record for Rideau range, his grand total of 99 points being the highest ever made on that range, either in practice or competition. The score was very evenly put together, the total for each range being the same, and there was no magpie. At 200 yards the inners were the third and fourth shots; at 500 the third and fifth shots; and at 600 yards the second and seventh. Capt. Rogers took a sighting shot at each range, scoring an inner, a bull, and an outer respectively. The firing was with the Martini rifle, under D.R.A. regulations. These were the chief scores:
