READY TO GO BEYOND HARBIN RUSSIAN ARMY TO WITHDRAW

Flying Column of Japanese Cavalry Now Moving Hastily Across the Country Toward New Point.

St. Petersburg, March 24.—(4:52 p.m.)—The news from the front continues to indicate preparations for a withdrawal of the main portion of the Russian army beyond Harbin, so as to place it out of danger of having its communications with Russia severed, if it is found impracticable to attempt to hold the line at the Sungari River. Taitshah, 300 miles west of Harbin, is mentioned by several correspondents in a fashion to suggest that it will be the new point of concentration, although other reports speak of the Amur River.

A large column of Japanese cavalry is reported to be moving hastily across the country towards Taitshah, while a heavy column of Japanese is moving in the direction of Vladivostok. One correspondent intimates that the Japanese may adopt the tactics of relieving the direct pressure on General Linvitch, in the hope of inducing him to concentrate as far as possible beyond Harbin, which would give Field Marshal Oyama the advantage of attacking his next blow without greatly interfering with his line of communications. Linvitch's decision to be prepared to meet his main army beyond the reach of a decisive stroke while awaiting reinforcements may have been taken in order to avoid just such a trap.

CAMPAIGN FOR PEACE. St. Petersburg, March 24.—(2:30 p.m.)—The national press is supporting the campaign for peace and are beginning to print quite openly the history of the invasion of the Far East, for the purpose of private interest, devoting special attention to the Bezaurov's connection with the Yali timber concession.

RECOGNIZE ONE CERTIFICATE. HYPNOTIZED OR ASPHYXIATED? Passing Case of Two Women in New York Hospital.

New York, March 24.—One of the most remarkable cases in the experience of the Presbyterian Hospital ended to-day in the death of Miss Luella Huestis of Mount Vernon, who, with her mother, Mrs. James H. Huestis, had been in a trance for fifteen days.

She was found unconscious in the office of secretary of the city, a lawyer, this city, on whom they had called for legal advice. They are supposed to have been asphyxiated by gas.

Miss Huestis was an attractive young woman 22 years old. Lack of nourishment was the cause of her death, except in liquid form and to a tube. When she began to show signs of revival, she was given food and oxygen were administered. The young woman's mother, who lay in an adjoining room, began to show signs of the approach of death, soon after the death of her daughter. Like her daughter, the mother also greatly emaciated, and the physicians at the hospital say their low vitality is due practically to starvation.

ON HIS WIFE'S TOBACCO. New York, March 24.—Unconscious and apparently dying, aged Jonathan Live Block, a business man of Brooklyn, was found lying on the stone floor of his wife's granite tomb in one of the new mausoleums of the Evergreens to-day, and his removal to a hospital followed.

Swiss Ice Houses Burn. Chicago, March 24.—Storage ice houses containing almost 150,000 tons of ice belonging to Swift & Co. have been burned. Before the fire the company had been carrying a stock of \$80,000 worth of ice, valued at \$60,000, had slid back into the lake, from which it was taken during the winter.

Branch Banks in West. A branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce will be opened at Lethbridge, Alta., on the 27th inst. The bank has also purchased the private banking business of Cowdry Bros., Macleod, Alta., and will open there forthwith.

J., March 24.—The Manhattan Trust Company to-day filed a bill in the court of chancery to foreclose a mortgage of \$3,000,000 on the Pullman Company, now in the hands of receivers. It is set out that on the same day that the mortgage was given to the Manhattan Trust Company another mortgage for \$5,000,000 was given to the Central Trust Company.

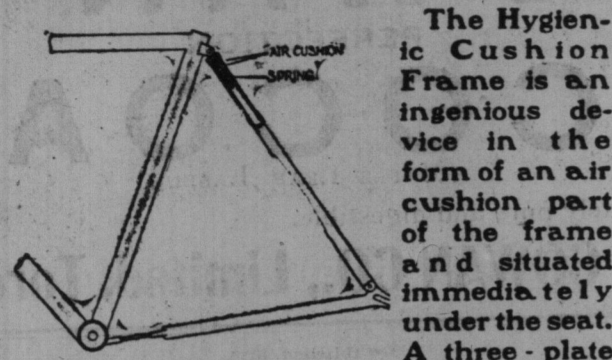

MR. HARCOURT VERY WIND HAS PROMISED TO BE GOOD

Will Not Attempt to Drive Government Out During This Session at Least.

Fifteen minutes sufficed to dispose of all the business before the legislature yesterday. As soon as the orders of the day were called, Mr. Harcourt, leader of the opposition, asked the premier to announce his intentions regarding the appointment of a committee to strike the standing committee. Mr. Harcourt predicted a short session. There had been sessions as short as seven weeks, but the average was about nine weeks, and this time he thought the bulk of the legislation would have reference to private bills.

The leader of the opposition promised that he and his colleagues would not embarrass the government. "Oh, thank you!" remarked Hon. J. J. Foy. Strong as the opposition were in numbers they would not attempt to give the government trouble. Out of the twenty-eight members of the opposition, twenty-seven were excellent debaters, and the twenty-eighth, Mr. Graham of Brockville, had assured him that he would dip in occasionally.

Growing serious, Mr. Harcourt said he did not intend to present a heavy bill this session, but he thought that they could get to business with a little delay as possible. Premier Cites Precedent. Replying to Mr. Harcourt, the premier said he had been in the house after the session, and this was the first time he had known his honorable friend to be anxious to advance the work of the session at this particular stage. He had always found that it was impossible to get down to business earlier than one time, in the exuberance of his youth, Mr. Whitney had got up in the house and suggested that a way should be found to avoid delay during the early part of the session, and that Mr. Harcourt should be quite properly instructed him on the point. Mr. Whitney observed that there was not a private bill on the order paper, and he was not sure that it would have been impossible to do anything for two weeks. However, if he knew that Mr. Harcourt was so anxious he might have asked the whips of both sides to come together and arrange a business.

He thought there were reasons why the session should not be unduly prolonged, and he was glad the opposition would expedite the business before the house. In conclusion, Mr. Whitney expressed the hope that the opposition would be to our faults a little bit before the session would be satisfactory to all parties.

Mr. Harcourt added to the quotation: "And to his virtuous we can discover them" very kind. The premier then moved the adjournment.

Hartley, News; Secretary-treasurer, E. W. Grainger, Mail and Empire; executive committee, the officers named by Hon. Messrs. Whitney, Foy and Hanna. Their request was for protection for the press gallery, and the speaker, Mr. Harcourt, and the members of the "blanket club" men. They asked that the press gallery be declared a "mixing district," enabling it to come under regulation that would prevent the sale of liquor to the press gallery, and will be enforced early consideration. The president of the deputations was: Major Leckie, Sydney; J. M. Deane, C. W. Haenschel, Mattawa; A. Ferland and C. C. Farr, Halleybury. The following members were present: Messrs.
