



History of the Matter—Decision on the Meaning of Terms—
The Finding.

The kase of Hastings v. Summerfeidt was decided on Monday by Judge Faicon-bridge. Counsel for the plaintiff were Ritchie, Q. C., and Greer; for the defendant, Higgins. The case was the outcome of the pravincial elections in March last, and was argued last October.

The text of the judgment is as follows:
The facts of the case as I find them to be established by the evidence, are as foilows: Plaintiff and defendant are both well-to-do and respectable farmers, residing on the same concession in the Township of Markham. Secretary Board of Trade:



The aggregate trade, as already shown, was \$304,475,736, as against \$257,168,862 Saturday Next: Hanlon's

for the previous year, an increase of \$47,-306,874. The exports were \$164,152,683 and the imports \$40,323,053. The duty collected amounted to \$22,157,788, as compared with \$19,891,996 for 1897, an increase of \$2.265,792.

Of the aggregate trade of the Dominion, Britain contributed \$137,409,735 and the United States \$124,410,926, showing that Canada's trade with Britain was nearly thirteen million dollars greater than with the United States. The trade with Britain was made up of \$104,498,818 it. exports and \$32,500,917 in imports, and trade with the United States comprised \$45,705,336 in exports and \$78,705,590 in imports. The aggregate trade with Britain increased by over \$30,000,000, as compared with 1897, and \$13,000,000 with the United States for the same period. Exports to the United States decreased by \$2,600,000, while the imports increased by \$17,000,000. The exports to Great Britain increased by \$27,000,000, and imports by over \$3,000,000.

### CHICAGO MILLIONAIRE SHOT.

ADMITTED BEING A THIEF.

Veins Opened Up by Railway Cuts in Southern British Columbia-On Kettle River.

-General Mining Information -Mining Exchange.

found in the fact that the Canadian Pacific's instruction work is laying bare ore bodies in different parts of the Boundary country. Hardly a day goes past, says one of thes ne rich ore body discovered by a railway cut or tunnel, in some cases at a good depth, alone a number of small ledges have been opened up in railway construction, and at least three important strikes are said to have been made. The first of these strikes was the cutting of a five feet vein of steel galena on the Calcifer claim, on Lime Mountain, four miles from Grand Forks. This was immediately followed by the announcement that since the railway employes had cut the galena deposit they had entered a fine ledge of copper ore between 15 and 20 feet wide. Both the galena and copper ledges are spoken of as high grade.

The second strike promises to lead to the opening up of a large copper mine near Grand Forks. Boss & McDonald were opening up a tunnel for the C.P.R. near Brown Creek, and in doing so they struck a huge ledge of copper on the Acorn property. Another strike of gold-copper ore was made only last week by Contractor Macdonell while making a cut for the railway on the Jennie May claim, near Grand Forks. alone a number of small ledges have been

News has been received from Rossland that the well-known Snowshoe mine, in Greenwood Camp, has been bonded to Mc-Millan Bros. of that city. The amount involved in the bond is not known, but is about \$80,000. The Snowshoe is considered to be one of the best properties in the Boundary. Development work will be commenced at once.

A Boundary Property. which is much talked of in the Boundary country. Its headquarters are at Columbia, and The Review of that pince in a recent issue devotes a column to it. Mr. H. P., —, Toronto, is the managing director of the company's property, which consists of eight claims lying in a group on file north fork of the Kettle River, about 10 miles above Columbia. They are: The Bonanza, Napoleon Buonaparte, Cleopatra Mark Antony, Grand Forks Belle, Mayflower, Bert and Irle. Development work has been prosecuted for two years upon these locations. A tunnel has been run for 50 feet on the Bonanza, and passes for its folliength through highly mineralized matter. A shaft has been sunk on the ledge at a distance of about 20 feet from the mouth of the tunnel, and is now down about 28 feet, the bottom being all in ore. At the foot of this shaft a cross-cut has been made on the ledge, which at this point is 11 feet wide, consisting of quartz carrying copper and galena, assaying as high as \$16 in gold, 26 ounces in silver and 1½ per cent. of copper to the top. On the same ledge as the Bonanza lie the Josie, Grand Forks Belle and Cleopatra, and more or less work has been done upon them in the way of stripping, and in the way of sinking, on the Cleopatra, all with satisfactory results. Six or seven satisfactory results. Six or seven feet further up the hill lies a second ge, passing through the Mark An 20 feet wide near the surface. A third ledge is struck at the summit, and has been developed to a considerable extent over some of the claims.

Slocan Silver Mines. The Heather Bell group of mines in the Slocan will resume work very shortly. Operations were suspended on Dec. 28 for the winter but they are to be resumed at once. It is also said that the Alexandria-Deliay mines, on Springer Creek. 14 miles from Slocan City, will soon begin to ship ore.

Rich Ore on the Waterloo.

Considerable excitement is reported from Camp McKinney, owing to a strike on the Waterloo mine. The World yesterday handled some of the ore from this find, which is literally full of free gold. The Spokane Spokesman, in referring to this strike, says: "The Waterloo mine, in Camp McKinney, continually adds to its reputation as a gold mine. Saturday a telephone message reached the office of the company here from a messenger sent to Greenwood by Superintendent Murphy. The information was that a richer strike of free gold than ever had just been made in the drift. The messenger could give no more definite particulars, and advices by mail from Mr. Murphy were awaited with interest. The expected letter came last evening. It was dated March 9, and following is the portion of it relating to the strike: 'Another free gold strike in the Waterloo to-day. The ore is looking better than any yet. Free gold is mixed through the whole face of the drift. It is beyond question the best ore ever struck in camp. The ledge was mixed while crossing the gulch for 13 feet, but now we are into solld ground again, hence the encountering of the rich ore. I consider the free gold more important now than ever, as it is not in bunches, but through the entire ledge. The ore is more heavily mineralized than before in sulphurets and galena. It is now beyond all doubt that the Waterloo is a great mine. (Signed) Joe Murphy.'" Rich Ore on the Waterloo.

IN CAMP MCKINNEY.

World Man Writes of a Number of Properties in Which Torontonians Are Interested.

Camp McKinney, B.C., March 12.— (Special correspondence.)—The correspondent of The World has visited the Minnehaha mine, in which many Torontonians are interested. The mine is under the cap-able superintendency of Mayor A. Megraw. are interested. The mine is under the capable superintendency of Mayor A. Megraw, thorugh whose kindness an examination of the underground works was permitted. The development work consists of a main working shaft, 5x7 feet in the clear, now down 192 feet. The first level was opened up at a depth of 65 feet. It consists of a crosscut of eight feet to the vein and an easterly drift on same 20 feet. As soon as the shaft has reached a depth of 200 feet, a sump and station will be immediately cut out and a crosscut run to the vein. If the vein is found with as good ore body and values as found in the upper workings, the intention of the management is to immediately instal a 10-stamp mill. The ore in the upper drifts is a binelsh white quartz, carrying pyrite and galena, with sometimes a little blende and chaleopyrite. The gold values run in proportion to the amount of galena present, and where there is much galena present, and where there is much galena the values rarely fall below \$100 to the ton. 
