LATEST FIRE HORROR OCCURS AT OMAHA.

A Number of Women Caught as if in a Trap in a Burning Building and Jump for Their Lives. Two Were Killed and Others Were Fatally Injured - A Gasoline Stove Exploded and Started the Blaze.

Omaha, Neb., March 21.-Comparatively insignificant in material destruction, but appalling in its harvest of death and suffering was a fire that partially destroyed the Patterson Block at Seventeenth and Douglas-streets this afternoon. Two of its victims have already passed away, one more is not expected to live, and about 25 others are suffering from broken limbs and burned flesh.

KILLED. Mrs. Thomas Taylor. Mrs. Anna Schamel. INJURED. Mrs. C. F. Brosius, face and hands burned.

Mrs. A. King, face badly burned. Mrs. A. L. Samuelson, face and hands severely burned, both wrists broken. May Samuelson, 5 years old, burned on hands and face.

Mrs. G. D. Wilson, face, hands and shoulders burned. Mrs. J. C. Hahn, face and hands burned. Margaret Hotz, hands burned, injured internally, may die.

Mrs. Mary Hopkins, face and hands badly burned. Mrs. Mary Sullivan, hands and face severely burned. Mrs. W. A. Reed, hands and face severely burned.

Mrs. Ed. Schuler, face, body and hands burned, had cut on head, will probably die. Mrs. French, South Omaha, face and hands burned. Mrs. A. A. Smith, face and hands burned, injuries fatal.

E. E. Allen, face and hands burned, but by glass. Mrs. Thomas Thornton, face and hands burned severely. Walter Scott, hands and face severely burned.

Unknown man badly burned on hands and face. Steve Williams, 5 years old, face and hands burned. Eriean William Guider, suffocated and died. Lieut. James Adams, injured about hips by falling down stairs.

Blaze started shortly after 3 o'clock. A group of women, busy with the affairs of the Secret Order with which they were affiliated, were in a moment brought face to face with death. Sixty seconds later seven of them lay buried and blasted on the pavement, to which they had dropped forty feet below, and the others were rescued after they had become more or less severely injured in their desperate dash down the single flight of stairs that led to safety.

A Gasoline Stove. The fire originated from a gasoline stove exploded in a room in the rear of the third floor of the building and next to the elevator shaft. It was not discovered until it had spread to the adjoining apartment, and the entire floor, was filled with smoke and flame.

Warning Came Too Late. The warning came too late. The fire swept through the door and down the single stairway. Those nearest the door died of suffocation. The building smoke and reached the street with hands and face burned and blistered. The rest faced a solid wall of flame. There was a fire escape at the south front of the building, but none of them thought of it. They rushed panic-stricken to the windows, through which the smoke was already pouring. The fire, scarcely a foot behind them, caught their clothing and scorched their faces.

Spectators Horrified. In another instant the spectators, attracted by the clouds of smoke, were horrified to see one after another spring from the open windows and fall heavily to the pavement. Not one of them was quickly carried into the office building across the street. Most of them were bleeding from severe cuts and bruises, and all were burned and scorched.

Property Loss Light. Aside from the fatalities and the injuries to persons, the fire was not a serious one. The loss will not exceed \$50,000, half of which is covered by insurance. Various secret societies, which occupied halls on the second and third floors, lost their regalia and papers.

ON STRICT PARTY LINES.

Did Premier Hardy Force That Senate Reform Resolution THROUGH THE ASSEMBLY. The Division Was Taken at Midnight and it Showed the Government Majority of Eleven.

Vote Was on Mr. Carleton's Addition to Mr. Whitney's Amendment - Divers Opinions From Ottawa - Mr. Foy Makes an Effective Speech - How the Liberals Have Swallowed Their Former Opinions.

The Ontario Legislature spent another day-afternoon and night-in discussing the Attorney-General's Senate reform resolutions; against Mr. Carleton's addition to the amendment of Mr. Whitney's, "deprecating any change in the constitution of the Senate, by which the equilibrium between the several provinces established by the British North America Act might be disturbed."

The division took place at midnight and showed a majority for the Government of 11. A resolution was carried on motion of the Attorney-General that an address be presented to Her Majesty, praying for such amendments in the British North America Act as are called for in the Senate resolutions. This was carried on the same division by the Attorney-General's Senate resolutions.

Resolved Debate on Senate Reform. Mr. Carleton resumed the Senate reform resolution. The member for East Hamilton contended that a joint session of the Senate and the Commons would destroy the individuality of the two Houses.

STREETS NEED REPAIRING

All the Main Thoroughfares Require Attention, Says the City Engineer.

BIG NIGHT FOR BOARD OF WORKS

Proceedings of the Presbytery—The Board Inquest—General News.

Hamilton, March 21.—(Special.)—The Board of Works met to-night and received City Engineer Barrow's report on the work required to put the streets in good shape. He reported that all the main block-paved thoroughfares required renewal with some permanent form of pavement. In his opinion the following blocks required first attention: King-street, from Wellington to Wentworth; King, from Bay to Locke; James, from Hunter to Aberdeen-avenue; Barton, from James to Ferguson-avenue, and Wellington to Wentworth; Stuart, from James to Caroline; Market-street, from Macnab to Caroline; Main, from Macnab to Caroline; John to May; York, from Macnab to Queen. As the board has not come to a decision in regard to the kind of roadway to be put down, the matter was laid over till the next meeting.

As gravel will be required for top dressing when road repairs begin, the board decided to recommend the purchase of the old Roman Catholic cemetery for \$2500. It is estimated there are 60,000 tons of gravel in the cemetery. John Patterson told the board he was prepared to submit a plan on behalf of the Electric Light Company, for a new lighting contract to be let by the board. The committee will meet it this special committee and will meet it this week.

Mr. Hill wants Ferguson-avenue opened north of the Grand Trunk track and Ald. Findlay would like the Mary-street bridge lowered. Both matters will be considered later.

The Toronto and Hamilton Sewer Pipe Company inform that the new street it is opening near its new works Terra Cotta-avenue.

Ladies Entertained the Boys. The Ladies' Auxiliary of the Y.M.C.A. gave the members a banquet this evening and about 100 accepted the invitation. The president occupied the chair, and after the feast, the young men were entertained with music and dancing. The affair was given by the president, Rev. Neil McPherson, and C. H. McCullough. The Y.M.C.A. Orchestra also played. The dinner spent an enjoyable evening.

A Barton Farmer's Troubles. James Theobald, who has sold his effects by auction yesterday, as he was about to move to Manitoba with his family. To-night Mr. Theobald was in the city jail, instead of making preparations for his proposed journey. He was arrested on a capias, issued on behalf of Mrs. Hill, who claims Theobald owes her \$400. Prisoner's lawyer has hopes of securing his liberty to-morrow.

Coroner's Inquest.

Ten witnesses, all train hands, were examined at the coroner's inquest to-day on the death of David Baird, the night-watchman on the E. & B. R., who was killed by a yard engine on the Catharine-street crossing a week ago last Saturday night. It was after 11 o'clock when all the testimony was given. The coroner showed that there were lights at each end of the engine and the bell was ringing. Baird, it appears, was unexpectant, ran across the north track, watching the train, when he was struck by a yard engine.

F. G. Beckett Dead.

F. G. Beckett, best known of late years as the projector of the Beckett Drive up the mountain west of the city, died to-day of pneumonia at the English Hotel. He was about 70 years old. His friends here were not aware that he was ill. Deceased had resided in Hamilton a good many years. He was in the foundry business a number of years, but recently gave most of his attention to promoting the West End Drive. Some weeks ago he interested New York capitalists in the proposed Hamilton, Ancaster and Brantford Railway. Mr. Henry Beckett of Brantford is a brother of deceased.

Presbytery Business.

Ald. Dunn has instructed his solicitor to take the necessary proceedings against Ald. Denison to protect his interests in the Queen-street Extension Tangle.

The latest opinion from the City Solicitor has placed things in a worse muddle than even any of its predecessors. The question "why didn't either Mr. Fullerton or Mr. Fleming point out long ago that the work had to be done as a local improvement" can be answered afterwards. Meanwhile, however, friends of the scheme are bethinking themselves of how to overcome this point.

Two schemes are propounded as forming loopholes of escape. The first is that the City Engineer should, by a special rate on properties benefited by street prolongation, claim that this rate could be a nominal one, say 10 cents a year on each of the parcels to be benefited.

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

Better Abolition It.

It continued Mr. Carleton, the function of the Senate is only to give a veto to a bill which is not in the public interest.

Time Misspent.

Mr. Carleton thought the Attorney-General would have been better employed in considering how to lighten the burden of the people, and to improve their condition than in attempting the reform of the Senate.

Swallowed Their Opinions.

Mr. Carleton gave a broadside at the Government for their constant changes of front. He commented on the advantages of a referendum, which should be an independent body, and never sit or vote conjointly with the House of Commons.

Strong for the Resolutions.

Mr. Graham (Brookville) repelled the allegation of the member for East Hamilton that the members on the Government side of the House would not answer their question independently.

In Favor of Abolition.

Mr. Graham said emphatically: "I am in favor of the abolition of the Senate."

Preferable to Irresponsibility.

The plan proposed by the Attorney-General is preferable to the present system of irresponsibility. The Senate, he continued, does not represent the progressive spirit of Canada.

British System Inapplicable.

At the evening session Mr. Graham continued his speech. The British system of a House of Lords is not applicable to a young country like Canada.

A Discredited Leader.

In going through this recital, Mr. Graham said that Sir Mackenzie Bowell, who was half of the Conservative party and politically associated by those whom he termed a "nest of traitors"—a man not deemed fit to be the leader of the Conservative party.

The Senate's Usefulness.

Mr. Powell submitted figures as to the work the Senate in projecting ill-considered legislation. In the 23 years since Confederation, the Senate had thrown out 15 bills—45 Government bills, 33 public and 12 private bills, including divorce.

Another Voice From Ottawa.

Mr. Lemieux (Ottawa) heartily supported the amendment. He declared himself untrammelled, and that he followed his own conscience, not party lines.

Where is the Original Draft?

Mr. J. Lucas (Centre) objected to this radical change in parliamentary government. The House has no committee to consider the question.

ORE DEPOSITS DUBIOUS.

Veins Opened Up by Railway Cuts in Southern British Columbia— On Kettle River.

NEWS FROM CAMP MCKINNEY.

Word from Western Ontario Mines—General Mining Information—Mining Exchange.

According to the Western newspapers, a remarkable proof of the richness and extent of British Columbia's mining deposits is found in the fact that the Canadian Pacific's construction work is laying bare ore bodies in different parts of the Boundary country.

Hardly a day goes past, says one of these papers, without some being discovered of such rich ore body discovered by a railway cut or tunnel, in some cases at a good depth, and usually the ore body opened up has been of high value.

During the past month alone a number of small ledges have been opened up in railway construction, and at least three important strikes are said to have been made.

The first of these strikes galena on the Calder claim, on Line Mountain, four miles from Grand Forks. This was immediately followed by the announcement that the railway employees had cut the galena deposit they had entered.

The ledge of copper ore between 15 and 20 feet wide. Both the galena and copper ledges are spoken of as high grade.

The second strike promises to lead to the opening up of a large copper mine near Grand Forks. Boss & McDonald are working up a tunnel for the C.P.R. near Brown Creek, and in doing so they struck a huge ledge of copper on the Calder property.

Other strikes of gold-copper ore was made only last week by Contractor Macdonell while making a cut for the railway on the Jennie May claim, near Grand Forks.

Snowshoe is Bonded. News has been received from Rossland that the well-known Snowshoe mine, in Greenwood Camp, has been bonded to the Millan Bros. of that city.

The amount involved in the bond is not known, but is believed to be one of the best properties in the Boundary. Development work will be commenced at once.

A Boundary Property. "The English and French Mining Company" is the name of a mining corporation which is much talked of in the Boundary country.

Its headquarters are at Columbia, and The Review of that place in a recent issue devotes a column to it. Mr. H. P. Toronto, is the manager of the property, which consists of eight claims lying in a group on the north fork of the Kettle River, in the miles above Columbia. They are: The Bonanza, Napoleon Buonaparte, Cleopatra, Mark Antony, Grand Forts Belle, Mayflower, Bert and Irie.

Development work has been prosecuted for two years upon these locations. A tunnel has been run for 90 feet on the Bonanza, and passes for its full length through highly mineralized matter. A shaft has been sunk on the ledge at a distance of about 20 feet from the mouth of the tunnel, and is now down about 100 feet.

At the foot of this shaft a cross-cut has been made on the ledge, which at this point is 13 centimeters thick, and is carrying copper and galena, assaying as high as \$16 in gold, 20 ounces in silver and 16 per cent. of copper to the ton.

On the same ledge as the Bonanza is the Josie, Grand Forts Belle and Cleopatra, and probably the Cleopatra and Napoleon Buonaparte. Where stripping on the Mark Antony, where 20 feet wide near the surface. A third ledge is struck at the summit, and has been developed to a considerable extent over some of the claims.

Slocan Silver Mines. The Heather Bell group of mines in the Slocan will resume work very shortly. Operations were suspended on Dec. 28 for the winter but they are to be resumed at once.

It is also said that the Alexander-Delany mine on Spruce Knob, 14 miles from Slocan City, will soon begin to ship ore.

Rich Ore on the Waterloo. Considerable excitement is reported from Camp McKinney, owing to a strike on the Waterloo mine. The Waterloo is a ledge of ore from this find, which is literally full of free gold. The Spokane Spokesman, in referring to this strike, says:

"The Waterloo mine, in Camp McKinney, continually adds to its reputation as a gold mine. Saturday a telephone message reached the office of the company here from a messenger sent to Greenwood by Superintendent Murphy. The information was that a richer strike of free gold than ever had just been made in the drift."

The messenger could give no more definite particulars and advised by mail from Mr. Murphy were awaited with interest. The excitement came last evening. It was dated March 9, and following is the portion of it relating to the strike: "A ledge of free gold was found in the Waterloo to-day. The ore is looking better than any yet. Free gold is mixed through the white face of the ledge. It is beyond question the best ore ever struck in camp. The ledge was mined while crossing the gulch for 15 feet, but now we are into solid ground again, hence the encountering of the rich ore. I consider the free gold more important now than ever, as it is in bunches, but through the entire ledge. The ore is more heavily mineralized than before in sulphurates and arsenic. It is now beyond all doubt that the Waterloo is a great mine. (Signed) Joe Murphy."

IN CAMP MCKINNEY. World Man Writes of a Number of Properties in Which Torontonians Are Interested.

Camp McKinney, B.C., March 12.—(Special correspondence.)—The correspondent of The World has visited the Minnehaha mine, in which many Torontonians are interested. The mine is under the capable superintendency of Mayor A. Mcgraw, through whose kindness an examination of the underground works was permitted.

The development work consists of a main working shaft, 257 feet in the air, and a drift down 202 feet. The first level was opened up at a depth of 45 feet. It consists of a crosscut of eight feet, and this does not extend further on same 20 feet. The second level is reached at a depth of 100 feet, with a crosscut 15 feet to the vein and drifts opened up in both directions, 20 and 35 feet respectively. As soon as the shaft had reached a depth of 200 feet, a sump and station was immediately cut out and a crosscut run to the vein. If the vein is found with as good ore body and values as found in the upper workings, the intention of the management is to immediately install a 10-stamp mill. The ore in the upper drifts is a bluish white quartz carrying pyrite and galena, with sometimes a little blende and chalcoprite. The gold values in the upper drifts are in the amount of galena present, and where there is much galena the values rarely fall below \$100 to the ton. The average value of the ore in the face of the drift on the 200-foot level, Major Mcgraw told the correspondent, is \$25, and this does not include any of the high-grade galena ore. The ore in the drifts is fully four feet in width between walls.

The mine is equipped with a double extra-duty 25-hp steam engine, capable of sinking to a depth of 500 feet; a 20-horsepower boiler; two steam drills, and at the 100-foot level in the east drift is a No. 4 Northey sinking pump. The writer desires





IMPROVED TONE IN WHEAT.

Futures Manifested a Tendency to Advance Yesterday.

Cables Were Higher and Paris Market Rallied a Little - Corn Markets Also Recovered Somewhat - Local Grain, Produce and Live Stock - Notes and Gossip.

Tuesday Evening, March 21. Liverpool wheat futures to-day closed 1/4 to 1/2 cent higher than yesterday's final figures.

Chicago wheat futures advanced 1/4 cent to-day, and retained the gain. Traders showed an increase for the past week in the world's available supply of 678,000 bushels.

Liverpool maize advanced 1/4 to 1/2 cent to-day. Chicago corn futures advanced 1/4 cent per bushel, and retained part of the gain.

Flour declined 1/4 at Liverpool to-day. Wheat receipts at Liverpool the past three days 100,000 centals, including 60,000 of America; corn the same time 10,000 centals, all American.

Exports at New York to-day: Flour 65 barrels and 500 sacks; wheat none. Stocks of flour and wheat in France on March 1 were 1,840,000 bushels, against 5,740,000 bushels on Aug. 1, and 6,300,000 bushels on March 1, 1908.

Receipts of wheat at Minneapolis and Duluth to-day 363 cars, as against 2.0 cars the corresponding day of last year.
