Chancellor Boyd, in the jury assizes yesterday, tried an interesting will case.

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WORK ON THE CREMATORY Buildings to be Reconstructed on Plans Furnished by Architect.

GLANCY WILL BUILD SIDING TO C.P.R. Toronto Railway Will Not Contribute Towards Cost of Young Street Bridge.

At a meeting of the Committee on Works yesterday afternoon the City Engineer reported again on the condition of the garbage destructor. The West End destructor is in a most dangerous condition, and it is absolutely necessary that alterations be made to it at once.

It was decided to recommend that the buildings be reconstructed on the lines proposed by Architect Denison, but that the purchase of water gates be left over for the present.

The application of Mr. Glancy for permission to construct a siding across East-end-avenue from the C.P.R. was granted. This is the siding that was to be built at the same time as the proposed Young-street bridge.

Mr. Glancy has written the City Engineer, protesting against the city paying only the cost of the bridge, and claiming that the company cannot keep its tracks up unless the whole roadway is paved.

In reply to a letter from Engineer Rust, Manager Keating of the Toronto Railway Co. says the company would be willing to run its cars over the proposed Young-street bridge, but would not be willing to contribute anything toward the cost of the bridge.

Water has been applied to the City Commissioner for permission to install a 6-horsepower boiler at 383 Yonge-street, for laundry purposes.

THE CAPTURE OF MISS STONE

Details of the Abduction by Brigands of the American Missionary and Her Companion.

GANG OF BANDITS NUMBERING 40 Assailed Them in a Narrow Valley, Captured Whole Party and Carried Off Women.

Boston, Sept. 25.—Details of the recent capture of Miss Stone, the American missionary, and one of her helpers, by brigands in Turkey, are given in a letter just received here by the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions.

The fact became known to one of the missionaries of the board at Samokov, European Turkey, to whom members of the party were traveling when the capture was made, and he immediately telegraphed to the authorities.

According to the story told by these victims, the capture was made at 4 p.m., Sept. 8, while Miss Stone and Mrs. Zilka, the wife of an Albanian preacher, were traveling with friends from Banako to Djumala. There were 15 or 18 in the party.

The bandits consisted of a narrow valley, surrounded them and compelled them to wade a river and ascend a wooded mountain side for about an hour.

The next morning Miss Stone and Mrs. Zilka were released, and the bandits departed, leaving only a guard. Later this guard compelled the captives to give up their watches, money and jewelry, after which they disappeared up the mountain.

The authorities did not learn of the capture until nearly 24 hours later. It is thought the brigands may have entered Bulgaria, and the army has been given special instructions to guard the border closely and follow up any traces of the marauders.

CUNNING JOHN CHINAMAN. San Francisco, Sept. 25.—The Chronicle says that the Chinese are now seeking to evade the Restriction Act by taking advantage of the transit privileges.
