

### SIR MELVILLE PARKER ILL AT HIS COOKSVILLE HOME Justice of the Peace for Over 40

Years, He Has Never Accepted

The illness of Sir Melville Parker, Bart, is causing his friends in Toronto much anxiety. Sir Melville, who is nearly 80 years of age, suffered a stroke of paralysis at his home near Cooksville a few days ago, and his condition is rather grave. Should he die, the baronetcy is ended. Sir Melville is the second son of

the late Admiral Sir Henry Parker, and is the sixth baronet, the title having been created in 1797. The Admiral settled near Cooksville, and had three sons, Henry, who married a sister of the late John Hector, Q.C.; Albert, who also married in Canada, and Sir Melville, who married Jessie, also sister to Mr. Hector, in 1847. He succeeded to the baronetcy in 1877. Their one child, May, married Lieut. Gordon of the Imperial service, afterwards Commodore Gordon of the Canadian naval service. Lady Parker died about three years ago.

Speaking to The World last night, Nicholas Murphy, K.C., once a partner with Mr. Hector, and who is an old friend of Sir Melville, noted the fact that Sir Melville, who over 40 years ago was appointed a justice of the peace, is one of the very few holders of such office who decline to accept fees or emolument for his services.

Sir Melville Parker is a staunch Conservative, and tho at times he has been unable to see eye to eye with others in the party, yet his allegiance to its principles was never to be doubted, and he several times was strongly urged to accept the nomination for Federal honors. While living a quiet retired life as a country gentleman. Sir Melville has always taken active interest in local affairs, and was warden of Peel County, and and is the sixth baronet, the title hav-

"A man of education," said Mr. Murphy, "of refinement and of a most genial disposition, with both friends and opponents, and a Justice of the Peace for many, many years, in the County of Peel, Sir Melville has settled more cases that have come before him by making friends of those who wanted to be enemies, than any other wanted to be enemies, than any oth Justice of the Peace in Canada. At he was always a supporter of the view that stands patent, that Justices of the peace should not be paid fees, and he held his position in that capacity without any fees or reward for his valuable and long service."

CANADA'S COMING NEW INDUSTRY

A wonderful impetus has been given the beet sugar industry within the last few years. Only six years ago the first beet sugar factory of any size was established in the United States, and the first on this continent. The venture the first on this continent. The venture proved so satisfactory financially that capital flowed into the sweet channel with a rapidity unrivalled in any enterprise, and to-day the United States has no less than forty-five of these factories in successful operation, all paying good dividends. Sixteen of these are situated in the State of Michigan, and six more building the pregan, and six more building the present year. Ontario has four in active operation and one building this season at Peterboro. The dividend paying at Peterboro. the dividend paying country. According to the United States blue books the average dividend paid by its forty-five sugar factories last year was thirty per cent., while quite a number of them ran as high as fifty and some as high as sixty per cent. It seems a little strange that not till now would the people wake 1 p to the fact that beet sugar could be made as cheaply as cane sugar, and the fact that beet sugar could be made as cheaply as cane sugar, and that when properly refined was equally as good, but when Germany and France demonstrated this to be the case the United States and Canada seemed willing to profit by the experiment, and have gone into it with a will and from the success attending the venture so far it bids fair to outstrip every other industry in the land as a lucrative enterprise. When we consider the analyzed content of the sugar beet to be 200 lbs. of sugar to the ton or one-tenth of the entire bulk, and that this vegetable flourishes in almost all temperate climates and upon almost all soils, we are led to wonder that agricultural and commercial enterprise were so slow in demonstrating its wonderful wealth product. cial enterprise were so slow in demon-strating its wonderful wealth produc ing powers, and that the people of temperate climates should be content with eating cane sugar. importing it long distances and paying duty, believing that sugar could only be produced in the torrid zone, from the sugar cane. In case of a failure of the cane crop from any cause, which the cane crop from any cause, which will sometimes happen, sugar soars out of sight and those unable to soar with it are left sour. It is fortunate for us that the European countries have, after long and expensive experiments, in both the system of manufacture and the kind of machine required, found that they can produce sugar from the beet as cheaply as the tropicalists can from the cane, demonstrating that all temperate climates can produce their own sugar and sugar for exportation at a handsome profit to both farmer and factory. The fact that 90 per cent. of all the sugar imported into Canada is beet sugar imported. imported into Canada is beet sugar largely from Germany and France, ought to be proof sufficient to convince the most skeptical that this country has lost golden opportunities by not embarking in this enterprise soon er, and the further fact that scarcely

### Only 75 Police Patrol the City's Streets at One Time

Heads of Department Show Reason For Increase in Strength of Force.

The efficiency of the Toronto police force has, as a result of recent events, force has, as a result of recent events, been a subject of some discussion amore citizens. while there is no desire on the part of the police officials to complain in any way about the strength of the force, yet the Police Commissioners have had it pointed out to them that, to properly police the city, an increase in the numerical strength of the force is necessary. To-day the full strength of the force is about 300. This includes men of all ranks and capacity. Five years ago, when the population of the city was many thousands less, and the areamuch smaller, 270 members of the force were maintained by the city. Of the 300 men, the number available to patrol the streets is 250. The others are needed for duty at the different stations, for the patrol, ambulance and operating services, and for plain clothes and detective work.

75 Men Protect the City.

There are three shifts of eight hours each for the street duty men, which means that, if equally divided, hardly more than 75 men are in actual care of the citizens' persons and property at one time, during the day or night. There must also be taken into consideration the patrol men, who are off duty thrus sickness and during the summer months, from the first of April to September and the police who are on vacared to the patrol men who are on vacared to the police are compelled to perform their duties as efficiently to-day, as an equal number did ten years ago they are in danger of losing their reputation.
