

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Introduction.

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To the Members and Adherents of St. James Square Church:

Another year of happy, useful, exhilarating service, in which we have loyally striven to help one another, has come to a close. And now, turning over the pages of this replete Report, we are able to review, with quickened minds and hearts, the way along which our God has led us.

That review, however much in some respects it may awaken sober reflections, cannot fail to convince us that God has richly blessed us. His very presence, manifestly accompanying us, has been itself a benediction. But there are not wanting evidences that we have caught also some of His Spirit.

Very heartily do I congratulate you upon the foresight, the energy, the self-denial and the success with which the temporal affairs of the congregation have been managed during the past year. For years past the auditors have had to report a deficit; but this year, notwithstanding the disastrous financial crisis that prevails, our Treasurer was able to announce that the ordinary revenue was more than sufficient to meet the expenditure. Indeed, in addition, the deficit of 1894 has been discharged, and \$29.15 remain in the Treasurer's hands. That this happy condition of affairs may continue, the request contained in the report of the Managers should be endorsed in a prompt and practical manner by every loyal member of the congregation. I strongly and affectionately urge that this request be, in as far as possible, complied with.

The volume of our givings to Missions, also, has been well maintained during the year just closed. The Ladies' Societies, in particular, have done splendidly. During 1896, with brightening commercial prospects, a distinct advance may he hoped for. I bespeak for the Missionary Collectors, when they call at your homes, a generous aud genuine welcome. Their task is not always an easy one; gladden their hearts, and quicken your own zeal in this self-denying enterprise, by giving them your names for a monthly contribution.

But more gratifying still is the steady increase we have attained in point of numbers. Familiar faces are continually being missed, as fifty or sixty persons on an average withdraw from us every year; but new comers have always been found asking to have assigned to them these recently vacated places. Our Communion Roll, though annually revised, is healthily growing; and it is receiving continual accessions from among those who are young. All who have lately joined us, whether as members or adherents, are cordially welcome. I trust, though, that before long, many who are at present regular Sabbath worshippers will indicate a desire to be received into that closer and more sacred fellowship which is enjoyed by those who meet around the Lord's Table.

In giving expression to this hope, I sincerely wish also that the attendance at the Wednesday evening prayer meeting may show speedily a very considerable improvement. Reference is made to this matter in the annual report of the Session.

The approaching return of Rev. Donald MacGillivray, B.D., the Missionary maintained by us in China, has been hailed with special pleasure by all. After seven years of earnest, fruitful work, Mr. MacGillivray has well earned his furlough. It adds to our satisfaction to know that he comes back to us, not broken in health, but in the fulness of hope and in the enjoyment of robust vigorous health.

The incorporation in this REPORT (as a special feature, this year) of a complete list of those who, in the earlier history of

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the congregation, occupied the position of Ruling Elder, will be not a little valued by all who read the statement contained on page 59. Moreover, the diligence of the Committee of Publication, who have completed the preparation of this REPORT within a unusually brief space of time, deserves to be specially commended.

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The placing in the pews, each Sabbath, of a little printed Leaflet, upon which appear the intimations which it used to be the custom to make from the pulpit, has been deemed by the majority a welcome innovation. I am glad that this practice, recently inaugurated, is to be continued during the current year. The prompt and loyal way in which, at the Annual Meeting of the congregation, it was decided to allow the Leaflet to be given the test of a fuller experiment,—although some were strongly in favor of reverting to the method formerly followed,—will ever be remembered as a very pleasing episode of my ministry among you.

Our Quarterly Magazine, issued immediately subsequent to each Communion, has fulfilled very efficiently its mission, disseminating rapidly throughout the homes of our people many helpful items of information about the congregation. It likewise will be continued during the current year.

My thanks are due to all who, in any way, have been specially my helpers during the past twelve months. Their kindly deeds as well as their kindly words, spontaneous proofs of kindly feeling, will not soon be forgotten. Surely one would be stolid indeed, did not such things move him.

And now, Beloved, rejoicing with you, I commend each one of you to God and to the word of His grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you each an inheritance among them that are sanctified.

The Annual Meeting.

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The forty-second Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held in the Lecture-room on Wednesday evening, 15th January, 1896.

After devotional exercises, conducted by the pastor, it was moved by Mr. H. W. Nelson, seconded by Mr. R. Carrie, "That the pastor, Rev. Louis H. Jordan, take the Chair"; and, on motion of Mr. R. C. Steele, seconded by Mr. Gordon, Mr. W. E. Long was appointed Secretary of the meeting.

The minutes of last Annual Meeting having been published, were taken as read; and the Secretary, having read the minutes of the meeting of the 8th inst., both minutes. were confirmed.

The Managers' Report and Treasurer's Statement for 1895 having been read, it was moved by Mr. H. W. Nelson, seconded by Mr. W. D. McIntosh, that both be adopted. Carried.

It was then moved by Rev. W. D. Ballantyne : "That the thanks of the Congregation be given to the Managers, and especially to the Treasurer and Secretary, for the manner in which they had fulfilled their duties during the past year." The motion was carried unanimously.

The Chairman having appointed Messrs. John Y. Reid, Jr., James Watt, John Watson, R. A. Grant, Wm. Douglas and W. S. Ormiston to act as scrutineers, a ballot was taken for the election of seven Managers, with the result that Messrs. H. W. Nelson, John Paton, James Buik, Alexander Nairn, R. C. Steele, Wallace Anderson and W. D. McIntosh were declared elected. " T Au

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Moved by Mr. R. C. Steele, seconded by Mr. A. A. Allan : "That Messrs. R. R. Cathron and James Watt be appointed Auditors for the ensuing year." Carried.

On motion of Mr. T. R. Bain, seconded by Mr. Thos. Woodbridge, a cordial vote of thanks was given to the members of the Choir for their services during the past year.

The question of printing the Pulpit Notices and distributing them through the pews was introduced by the Chairman, who expressed a desire to ascertain the feeling of the Congregation with regard to this method, which had now been in use for several months. After some remarks by Messrs. Campbell, Henderson and Steele, it was moved by Mr. A. A. Allan, seconded by Mr. John Campbell : "That the issuing of the weekly printed Notices be continued until the end of June next, that the number be increased to five hundred, and that the question of printing the Leaflet after that time be left to the decision of the Managers." Carried.

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Moved by Mr. A. A. Allan, and seconded by Mr. Thos. Woodbridge : "That the pastor, with Messrs. Henderson, Kirkland, Gray, Long and Grant, be a committee to attend to the publishing of the Annual Report of the Congregation." Carried.

Moved by Mr. H. W. Nelson, and seconded by Mr. Thos. Kirkland: "That the services of Mr. Kydd be retained as leader of the singing at the weekly Prayer Meeting, and that the rate of remuneration be as heretofore." Carried.

The pastor, in a few words, presented the report of the Session, showing that the Roll of the Congregation (which at the end of 1894 stood at 520) now contained 541 names, 77 names having been added and 56 taken off during the year. He expressed great satisfaction in reporting a steady increase in the attendance at the Communion Services, but on the other hand was disappointed at a falling off in the attendance at the Prayer Meeting. He made an earnest appeal for increased interest in the latter service. Speaking for himself, he said the past year had been an exceedingly busy year; but

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he felt his labors had been requited, and he looked back with happy memories over the past twelve months.

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Mr. C. S. McDonald, as Superintendent of the Sabbath School, made a few remarks regarding it, showing that it was prospering, and that while the attendance had not increased, the interest in the work had been well sustained. He invited the parents and others interested to visit the school, as they would always be welcomed.

Mr. Joseph Henderson, for the Missionary Association, stated that there had been received by the Treasurer of the Association, from all sources, the sum of \$4,211.27 (of which \$2,482.40 had been received through the Lady Collectors). This sum, together with the amounts raised by the other organizations of the Church, and the payments made by members direct to Rev. Dr. Reid, made the total contribution of the Congregation for missionary, benevolent and educational purposes, so far as reported, amount to \$6,010,-anexcellent showing, and yet a total somewhat below that of the previous year.

Mr. R. C. Steele, on behalf of the Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary, reported that the work of the Society during the past year had been carried on with a marked degree of success; the meetings had been well attended; the membership now numbered 90; five life-members had been added; the sum of \$460.65 had been contributed, and in addition a considerable quantity of clothing had been sent to the North-West.

The report of the Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band was presented by Principal Kirkland, who stated that the Society was one of the oldest in connection with the Congregation, having been founded over twenty years ago by the late Mrs. King. Its membership was now 32, with an average attendance at the meetings of 25. During the past year, money to the amount of \$233.08 had been raised; and clothing, etc., of the value of \$55.00, had been made and forwarded to the North-West.

Mr. Chris. B. Robinson was the spokesman for the Wayside Gatherers' Mission Band, and the report he gave showed

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the Society to be doing good work for the cause of missions. The attendance averaged 30, being about double that of the previous year. Receipts were \$45.00.

The Society of Christian Endeavor was represented by Mr. John Turnbull, who said that during the past four years the Society had raised \$1,200 for missionary work, and that during the same time nine of their members had gone to the foreign field,—seven of whom were laboring there at present. During 1895, \$260 had been contributed for missions. Mention was made of the faithful work of the Literature and Social Committees. He expressed the wish that more cordial support be given the Society by the young people of the Congregation.

A few words were spoken by Dr. Norman Anderson on the work of the Choir. The attendance at the practices had been very gratifying, and great interest had been taken in the service of praise by all the members.

Mr. W. E. Long, the Treasurer of the Poor Fund, presented his statement, showing that \$129.16 had been expended for the relief of those in need, and that a balance of \$67.80 was on hand at the close of the year.

After the doxology had been sung, and the benediction pronounced by the pastor, a short time was spent in social intercourse and in partaking of refreshments kindly provided by the ladies.

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

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ANNUAL REPORTS.



The Session's Report.

The past year, deliberately reviewed, may be said to have been a period of quiet healthy growth. An uneventful year, some might call it; yet surely it has been filled with most momentous events. Within it not a few have confessed Christ, have received His name, and have enrolled themselves among Others have been strengthened and confirmed His disciples. in holy resolves; the roots of their faith have penetrated deeper, and have laid hold more firmly of the things which abide. And who shall account it a matter of small moment that so many of us have been privileged through another year to be co-workers with God, to enjoy abundant evidences of His blessing, and to see one and another of those who surround us being brought into the kingdom of grace,-brought into it and kept in it? These are facts of the profoundest moment. These are events of immeasurable importance.

THE COMMUNION ROLL.

Reference has just been made to the gradual increase in the number of Communicants. This growth continues to be steady, no celebration of the Lord's Supper remaining unmarked by considerable accessions. The accompanying table presents a statement of the changes which have occurred in the membership during the past year :—

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It will be observed that, in the case of the December Communion, the number of new members received was relatively very small; but this fact, much to be regretted, can be satisfactorily accounted for. No sooner had arrangements for organizing the Communicants' Class been completed, than our Pastor was unexpectedly summoned to a distant city; and, as a consequence, the meetings of the Class were seriously interrupted, while the customary visitation which precedes each Communion had to be wholly abandoned.

On p. 13 of the ANNUAL REPORT of last year, attention was drawn to the fact that the Communion Roll had been very carefully revised. This step was taken in March, 1894, prior to the induction of our present pastor; and such action was necessitated, not merely by flux of time, but because, during a prolonged vacancy, a very considerable number of the names upon the Roll were those of persons who were no longer resi-As a result, the membership was reduced dents of Toronto. at a stroke from 643 to 512. Of the names which were left upon the Roll, fully a score were deemed "doubtful;" but, lest action in these cases might be taken with undue haste, it was decided that nothing should be done concerning them until the Session might assure itself more fully as to how it ought to act. In all kindness and fidelity the Session has made inquiry into most of these cases ; and, meanwhile, a second year of probation has been allowed to elapse. With regret, therefore, it is announced that the majority of these names will have to be dropped at the approaching meeting of the Session, when the list of Communicants falls to be again revised. This rigorous pruning of the Roll, not willingly undertaken but of necessity, will result in bringing the record found upon the official Register of the congregation into exact agreement with the actual bona-fide membership.

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THE PRAYER MEETING.

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The attendance of the congregation at public worship, every Sabbath day, continues to be highly satisfactory. At the forenoon service, in particular, there are few vacant seats in the body of the church; but at the evening service the standard attained, though improved, is scarcely what it should be. At the Wednesday evening Prayer Meeting, on the other hand, the representation both of Communicants and Adherents is certainly not satisfactory. Indeed, the average attendance at the Prayer Meetings of 1895 has been somewhat less than at those of 1894! Yet there has been no relaxation of effort on the part of those who are responsible for the conduct of the service; on the contrary, a special endeavour has been exerted to awaken increased interest in the Prayer Meeting. The singing, under the very efficient leadership of Mr. Kydd and a volunteer choir, has been noticeably hearty and inspiring. The subjects dealt with at the desk have been carefully selected and announced in advance in the pages of LIFE AND WORK; expository studies in the Minor Prophets, the Parables of Christ, etc., have supplied themes of great interest, and yet of sufficient variety. At the Missionary Prayer Meetings, held on the first Wednesday of each month, incidents of life in eastern and southern countries have been made much more vivid by the frequent employment of a Stereopticon. Indeed every aid that forethought and experience could suggest has been invoked, in order to make the service in the fullest measure possible helpful to all who might attend it. The Session beg therefore to urge, upon Communicants and Adherents alike, the duty and advantage of availing themselves regularly of this appointed means of grace.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL.

The work undertaken by the School, including the Adult Bible Classes, has been conducted with comfort, and with very gratifying results, during the past year. 16 of the scholars have been received into full communion, upon profession of

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The Session desire to bear testimony to the faith in Christ. unfailing faithfulness of the Superintendent, Officers and Teachers of the School. This department in our equipment as a congregation is doing most diligently the work it has undertaken; it well may claim from parents their occasional visits. the regular attendance of their children, and their constant remembrance in prayer. While noting with satisfaction every indication of progress and promise, the Session have accepted with very sincere regret the resignation of the teacher of the Young Men's Bible Class. Mr. Robert W. Murray, who has filled this important position during 1895, has discharged its responsibilities in a most efficient and painstaking manner. He retires from this post, carrying with him the hearty thanks of all who have been brought into contact with him, and especially of those who have more directly been profited through his cheerfully rendered services. At the earnest solicitation of the Session, and of the Superintendent of the School, Mr. Joseph Henderson has consented to undertake this additional service, beginning on the first Sabbath of February.

REMOVALS BY DEATH.

The Session remember with sincerest sympathy each household that has been bereaved during the past year. May the tender mercies of our Father in Heaven comfort all such among us as are mourners! It is with very deep gratitude, at the same time, that we recall how seldom of late death has broken our ranks. During 1894, sixteen burials fell to be recorded; during 1895 there were but seven. Of this number, three were Communicants. ALEXANDER R. CHRISTIE had been a member of the congregation for more than thirty years, during all which time he stood closely and loyally identified with its interests; MARY MORGAN sought enrolment as one of our members more than twenty years ago; while WILLIAM P. RODGER, JR., young in years but confident in "the blessed hope" and beloved of all who knew him, was received into full communion, upon the profession of his faith, only in April, w a W a

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1890. Nevertheless, these triumphed over death through One who gave them the victory; and we cannot but bless God for all the faithful who have departed this life in the peace of Christ, and who are now forever with Him, especially those who are dear to our own souls. Wherefore let us comfort one another with these words.

•The Choir.

On several occasions during the past year, the Sabbath Service of Praise has come up for consideration at our ordinary monthly meetings. The assistance rendered by the members of the Choir is very highly appreciated by the Session, who desire to place upon record their commendation of the zeal and fidelity, alike of the Organist and of his numerous male and female helpers, in their leading the praises of the congregation during the exercises of public worship.

IN CONCLUSION.

The Session have remarked with peculiar satisfaction the spirit of harmony, the manifestation of energy, and the loyalty to the cause of the Master, which have characterized the life of the congregation during the year now ended. The claims of Christ's Kingdom, in its varying interests, have been recognized and cheerfully admitted. Something has been done, promptly and effectively, to discharge and advance those claims. The people have had a mind to work ; and many hands, simultaneously outreached, have made the burden light. Surely this retrospect will quicken us to greater prayerfulness, and to more active and consecrated endeavor. May it be succeeded and crowned by a deeper spirituality, and by a more godly walk and conversation.

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The Managers' Report.

In presenting their report for the year 1895, the Managers have much pleasure in announcing that the revenue obtained from all sources has been sufficient to wipe out the adverse balance with which we began the year, to meet all current expenses, and to leave a small balance in the hands of the Treasurer. The revenues for the past two years have been as follows :—

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It will be seen by the above comparison that, while the weekly offerings in envelopes have slightly increased, the open collections and quarterly contributions have fallen off considerably. The Managers, anticipating a deficit, made a special appeal to the congregation for \$500.00. They requested that this sum be put upon the collection plates on Sabbath, November 4th. As the full amount asked for on that occasion was not received, they made a special effort and collected the balance.

While congratulating the congregation on the result as shown by the Treasurer's statement, it is earnestly hoped that in future it will not be necessary to make special appeals for additional funds, but that contributors will voluntarily increase their givings. The Managers beg to state that the weekly offerings by envelopes, the open collections, and the quarterly contributions *combined* need to be increased about one-tenth. The contributions by envelopes for the past year are made up as follows :—

Insurance policies to the extent of \$25,000.00 expire in February next, and \$175.00 will be required to renew the same for the term of three years.

New carpeting for the Church is required, as soon as finances will permit; otherwise, the Church property is in a good state of repair.

The Managers cannot close their report without bearing testimony to the continued zeal of our beloved Pastor, the Rev. Mr. Jordan, not only in his strong and faithful preaching and teaching in pulpit and prayer-meeting, but in visiting his flock and in unwearied devotion in promoting the interests of the Sabbath School, the Bible Classes, the Christian Endeavor Society, the Missionary Societies and all the organizations of the congregation. It was largely owing to his personal energy that the most complete and comprehensive report yet published was distributed amongst the congregation last spring. The compiling of that report entailed an immense amount of painstaking labor on the part of the Committee appointed for that purpose.

The retiring Managers (who are, however, eligible for reelection) are : Messrs. Paton, Nelson, Nairn, McIntosh, Darling, Buik and Steele.

The work of the Sabbath School for the past year has been in most respects very satisfactory, though not marked by any large increase in the number of scholars in attendance. We believe that the earnest, faithful work of the teachers will, under God's blessing, be productive of lasting good in the lives of the scholars, and we urge all parents to join with the teachers in encouraging and assisting the scholars in the regular and diligent study of God's Word.

The teachers and scholars have been greatly cheered by the evident interest taken in the School by members of the congregation, as shown by their joining so heartily with us in the occasional entertainments provided for the children.

Some changes have recently been made in the staff, owing to some of our teachers engaging in other work or removing to another part of the city. Then our Librarians, ye th ye ol th is co

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ti R who have rendered generous assistance to the School for many years, resigned at the close of the year; and we have to record the removal by death of Mr. William P. Rodger, Jr. one who was ever zealous for the welfare of the School, who was deeply beloved by all who knew him, and who had been for several years the very efficient Secretary of the School.

The Bible Classes have been conducted during the past year by Mr. Chase and Mr. R. W. Murray. We cannot but think that they should be much more largely attended. Perhaps it might be said that these Classes are not intended for young men and women exclusively, but that, if some of the older members of the congregation would join, it would have the effect of showing to many of our younger people that there is no time in life when we ought to discontinue the serious and continuous study of the Bible.

We feel it a cause for great thankfulness that, during the year, 16 of our members have, on confession of their faith, been admitted to full membership in the church.

Our library, through the kindness of the Managers, who placed at our disposal the sum of \$100.00 for the purchase of new books, has been placed in a very satisfactory condition, and is a source of much interest and pleasure to the scholars.

The teachers meet every Sabbath morning at 10.15, for the study of the S. S. Lesson; and we welcome any who can do so to join us at that time.

The Annual Meeting of the Missionary Association was held in the Church on Monday, the following evening, at 8 o'clock. In the necessitated absence of Sir Oliver Mowat, the chair was occupied by Rev. Louis H. Jordan, B.D., the pastor of the congregation.

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ANNUAL REPORT.

In presenting the Annual Report of the Missionary Association for 1895, the Committee regrets that the amount contributed for all missionary purposes is not equal to that reported in 1894.

There has been received by your Treasurers, from all sources, the sum of \$4,211,27; and of this amount there has been received through the Lady Collectors \$2,482.40.

We have to report the receipt of \$729.14 for the Rev. D. McGillivray fund. This is slightly less than the amount required; but the Committee confidently expects further contributions, and these will doubtless extinguish the deficit in this connection.

In response to an appeal made by our pastor in April last, on behalf of the Home Mission fund, the congregation contributed \$581.65 towards this special object; and it is gratifying to learn that, as a result of the special assistance received from other sources as well as from this congregation, the Assembly's Home Mission Committee was enabled to meet its engagements and close its books for the year without any indebtedness.

The Monthly Missionary Prayer Meetings have been continued throughout the year, and have proved interesting and helpful. The collections at these meetings, amounting to \$133.91, have been devoted to various missionary objects, as detailed in the Treasurer's statement.

An occasion of special interest, in connection with our Association, was the meeting held in October last for the purpose of saying farewell to Dr. Jennie Dow (for many years a member of the congregation), and to Miss McIntosh, these ladies being then about to take their departure for mission work in Honan, North China.

The Committee takes pleasure in again referring to the work being done by the other Missionary Associations connected with the congregation, and also by the Christian Endeavor Society and by the Bible Classes. From all

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sources the amount reported as having been donated for missionary and benevolent purposes amounts to \$6,010. This, however, does not fully represent the amount given by the congregation, as all the sums given by members of the congregation are not reported to your Treasurers.

After deducting from our total receipts the contributions made for Special Objects, and also the sums that have otherwise been specially designated, there remains to be allocated by the Association the sum of \$2,398.00. The Committee recommends the following apportionment of this amount :—

In reviewing the work done during the past year, we are encouraged to press forward. We have not labored in vain; and for what has been accomplished we are deeply grateful to God.

The evident zeal and hearty co-operation of the members are most gratifying. But it is earnestly desired that every lady connected with the congregation should become identified with the Auxiliary, in order that a more wide-spread interest may characterize the work of the year just entered upon.

The meetings are held on the third Tuesday of each month, and are always interesting. Items of missionary intelligence, together with prayer, praise and Scripture reading, comprise the programme.

In presenting the Annual Report of our Band for 1895, the officers and members feel that some advance has been made; and, through the guidance and good hand of God in leading us, an abundant measure of success has been granted us. There has been encouraging growth in systematic giving by envelope from month to month. There has been growth also in the matter of regularity of attendance, the average being 25 although our membership is only 32.

At our meetings, papers containing missionary intelligence, extracts from magazines, etc., have been read by the different members. One of the members generally leads the devotional exercises.

During the four spring months we had a two-hours meeting; and, for the first hour and a quarter, we worked at making quilts for the North-west, completing, altogether, eight of them. The remainder of the time was occupied with the usual programme. At her home, also, each member made some article of the clothing contributed. The whole donation was valued by the ladies in charge at \$55.00.

At our closing meeting for the summer months, held in June, we were privileged to be addressed by Miss Jeanie Dow, M.D. Our thanks are also due to Miss Martha Smith for her recitations at the Thank-offering Meeting held in October. We were deeply indebted to Mrs. Grant for an address inciting us to more faithful and earnest work for the Master.

A former member of the Band has remembered us again this year, sending us a cheque towards the support of an extra Bible-woman in India.

The members had pleasure in showing their esteem for a fellow-worker by making Miss Peattie a life-member of the W. F. M. S.

At the beginning of the year, our President gave to any who wished to take and use it, a "Talent" of fifty cents. Twenty of these Talents were accepted on the understanding that, at the end of the year, the fifty cents should be deducted, and only the profit on the work done returned. The result of our labor is that \$56.40 has been handed to the Treasurer, representing much effort and self-denial on the part of the workers. And another result has been gained. Not only have we been continually reminded of the object for which our Society has been formed, but we have been united more closely to it by the thought that we have been rendering it some personal help.

Our thanks are due to Mr. A. C. Hutchison, of Montreal, for his kindness in delivering a lecture on "Ancient Rome;" and to the Rev. L. H. Jordan, for his defraying the expenses of the lantern used on that occasion.

We trust that the coming year may be marked, more than ever, by earnest, cheerful work on the part of all the members of the Band.

We wish, here, to thank the ladies who very kindly furnished the materials.

During the year the average attendance has been thirty, which is almost double that of 1894.

The Thank-offering meeting was held in October, when the contributions handed in amounted to \$19.79. We were pleased to have with us a number of the ladies of the congregation.

Our Honorary President, Mrs. Jordan, has paid us several visits during the year. On one of these occasions she gave us a short talk about domestic life in China.

A few weeks ago the Society sent a head-rest, as a Christmas gift, to Mrs. Wilson.

In the coming year, we intend making flanelled the best for the babies in the Mission at Rutlam.

The annual meeting of the Band was held on Saturday, December 7th, when the officers for 1896, whose names have been placed at the head of this report, were elected.

The Lord in His goodness has permitted us to complete another year of service for Him, a year of great importance in the history of the Society.

During 1895, as in previous years, the predominating thought in the Society has been that of world-evangelization. As will be seen by the financial statement annexed, the sum of \$219.99 was raised for the spread of the Gospel in foreign lands. Native assistants were maintained by this fund for Rev. Dr. Kellogg, India; Rev. D. MacGillivray, China, and Rev. Mr. Goforth, China, besides allowing us to give a parting gift to those who have lately left us for the field. Dr. and Miss Glover started early in '95, and Rev. R. A. Jaffray starts this month, for South China. This brings the list of our members who are in *that country alone* up to eight. That God is still honoring us in this respect is apparent from the fact that two more of our members have made it their life-purpose to become workers for Christ in heathen lands; while at least six others have signified their intention of offering themselves as Missionaries, should the way become open for them thus to serve the Master.

We will not here enter into a detailed account of the Home-work undertaken and cheerfully carried on by the Society during 1895,—of the literature sent to lumber camps and poor congregations, of the flowers carried to the sick, of the relief given to the poor and destitute. Suffice it is to say that most of our members are actively engaged in Christian work.

Our membership during the past year has remained about the same as in 1894. We regret this: for we know that the Society has been a blessing to all those connected with it, and we feel sure that, if more of the young people of the church united with us in spending one hour on Saturday evening in Christian conference and fellowship, the result would be of very great benefit both to them and to us. This statement is amply attested by the letters received from time to time from former members, and especially from students who are now settled as Pastors in different parts of this Continent. We cordially invite the members of the congregation, and especially the young people who are strangers amongst us, to attend our meetings. The Social Committee have arranged for a social hour on the second Saturday evening of each month, and these gatherings afford an excellent opportunity for those who might otherwise hesitate about joining us to become acquainted with the members of the Society.

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The Schemes of the Church.

These "Schemes," as authorized by the General Assembly, are as follows :—

I.-FOREIGN MISSION WORK.

Our Church sustains Foreign Missionary Work in Central India, in Trinidad, in the New Hebrides, among the Indian tribes of our North-West, in Formosa, in Honan in China, and in Palestine.

The amount asked for the current year, for these different Missions (Western Section) is \$116,000. This includes the amount expected from the W. F. M. S.

II.-HOME MISSION WORK.

This Scheme has to do with the spiritually needy in our own land, and is conducted under the four following departments :—

1. The Home Mission Committee seek to supply with the ordinances of religion those of our Protestant fellow-countrymen who, living in thinly settled and destitute regions, are unable without our help to maintain a settled minister.

The amount asked for the current year (Western Section) is \$78,000.

2. It is the special object of the Fund for the Augmentation of Stipends to raise the salaries of the Ministers of our Church to a minimum of \$750 and a manse, on condition of a certain degree of liberality being shown by the members of the congregations who need such help.

The amount asked for the current year is \$29,000.

3. The work of *French Evangelization* seeks to give the Word of God to the large French-Catholic population in the Province of Quebec; and, by giving them the open Bible, to deliver them from the bondage of error.

The amount asked for the current year is \$49,000.

4. The Church and Manse Building Fund, as the name indicates, is intended to aid weak congregations in the purchase or erection of houses of worship and manses.

III.-EDUCATIONAL WORK.

Under this head is included the sustentation of our various Theological Colleges. It can easily be seen that no work is more important than the providing of an educated ministry for the Church, both at home and abroad. It should need no argument to commend *this* work to the sympathies of all our members,

The amount asked for the current year is \$46,000.

IV.-THE FUNDS FOR

AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS,

AND FOR

MINISTERS' WIDOWS AND ORPHANS.

These funds have been established to meet the undeniable claims of those of our ministers who, receiving often very scanty incomes, have given their lives to the work of our Church. By contributing to their support when (by sickness or old age) they are disabled from longer service, or by the payment of annuities to their widows and orphans who have been left in many cases almost destitute, unmeasured suffering may be relieved and removed.

The amount asked for the current year (Western Section) is \$27,000.

V.-THE ASSEMBLY FUND.

The collection of this amount should be shared by all the congregations of the Church. Besides the expenses immediately connected with the Assembly, this fund has to bear all expenses connected with Committees which have no fund of their own, *e.g.*, Sabbath Observance, Church Life and Work, Sabbath Schools, Statistics, etc. There is also a charge on account of the general expenses of the Presbyterian Alliance.

The amount asked for the current year is \$5,000.

For the support of these various departments of Christ's work, there have been formed in St. James Square congregation the following organizations : --

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1. The ladies' *Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary*, aiding the work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Western Branch of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

2. The Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band, an organization of the young ladies of the Church, working for and contributing to the funds of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society.

3. The Wayside Gatherers' Mission Band, a Guild of the girls in the congregation, associated together for the same purpose.

4. The Missionary Association of the congregation, a Society whose work it is to secure and collect contributions to ALL the Schemes of the Church, by appealing to all the families and adherents of the congregation. Systematic contributions are invited. Collectors are appointed for each Elder's District, and these visit each month all the families and individual communicants and adherents of the congregation, and receive their subscriptions. It is desired that each one should decide, as in the presence of Christ, how much he ought to give each month to these purposes; and then act accordingly. Where no intimation of the contributor's preference is given, the funds received by the Collectors are annually allocated to the several Schemes, in the relative proportion suggested by the General Assembly. But whenever a contributor expresses a desire that his special gift should be assigned to a particular object, this wish will be regarded in the distribution of the funds. If any who wish to contribute chance to be passed by in the Collector's calls, they will kindly intimate the fact to the pastor, or to Mr. Joseph Henderson, 66 Wellesley Street.

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

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Historical Notes.

The first printed ANNUAL REPORT of the Congregation covers the history of its life and work during 1865. An effort was begun about two years ago to collect a few complete sets of these REPORTS, in order that they might be bound and preserved for reference when necessary. Only one full series, thus far, has been secured. The history of the Congregation, prior to 1865, must be sought in the official *Minutes* of the Session and of the Board of Managers.

The congregation of St. James Square was formed by act of the U. P. Presbytery of Toronto, June 23rd, 1853. This step was the outcome of a Petition, already favorably considered at a meeting of the Synod of the United Presbyterian Church, whereby the Presbytery was urged to organize a second U. P. congregation in Toronto. The Presbytery granted the prayer of the petitioners, and at the same time it agreed to sanction the invitation extended to Rev. John Taylor, M.D., to act as stated supply of the new congregation.

At the beginning of its history, the congregation was known as the "Gould Street U. P. Church." For about twenty-five years it worshipped in the structure now occupied by the adherents of the Catholic Apostolic Church, corner of Victoria and Gould Streets. In 1877 the original property was sold for \$10,000,—which sum, by the way, was exactly the amount paid for the Gerrard Street site. The present structure was at once commenced. On November 17th, 1878, the new church was formally set apart for the worship of God, Rev. Dr. Taylor, of New York, and Rev. Dr. Jenkins, of Montreal, preaching the opening sermons. The following ministers have served in the pastorate of the congregation. The dates set after their respective names indicate the period during which each held office :—

Rev. John Taylor, M.D., D.D.... Nov. 23, 1853—May 6, 1861. Rev. Robert Burns, D.D.*.... July 9, 1861—May 28, 1863. Rev. John M. King, D.D.... May 28, 1863—Oct. 28, 1883. Rev. Samuel H. Kellogg, D.D.... May 20, 1886—Oct. 6, 1892. Rev. Louis H. Jordan B.D.... Mar. 27, 1894—

The Rev. Dr. Taylor spent his later life in Edinburgh, Scotland, where he died October 30th, 1880, in the eightieth year of his age. The Rev. Dr. Burns died in Toronto, August 19th, 1869. The Rev. Dr. King is still a trusted leader in our Church in Canada, occupying the important post of Principal of our College in Winnipeg. The Rev. Dr. Kellogg has returned to his missionary labors in India, where, at the same time, he is assisting in the re-translation of the Scriptures into Hindi and Urdu.



*Dr. Burns, strictly speaking, was not Pastor of the congregation: for he was never inducted. He nevertheless, for a time, discharged the duties of the pastorate, in addition to his professional work in Knox College. names

- CHILDREN'S DAY is observed, and an appropriate service is conducted in the Church, twice each year, viz., on the first Sabbaths respectively of May and October.
- ALLOCATION OF SEATS. A member of the Committee on the Allocation of Seats will be in attendance in the Managers' Room each Wednesday evening after the Prayer Meeting.
- Members changing their place of residence should immediately notify the Elder of the District which they leave, and also the Elder of the District into which they remove. Members leaving the city, or for any cause withdrawing from the Congregation, are particularly requested to intimate their intention to the Minister or to the Elder of their District.
- Persons willing to engage in any department of Christian work are urged to make known at once their desire, either to the Minister or to one of the Elders.
- Cases of Sickness should be reported to the Pastor without delay. The briefest note, or a personal intimation, would invariably be deemed a service.
- It is particularly requested that the regular worshippers of the Congregation show uniform and kindly attention to all Strangers, accommodating them with seats and supplying them with Hymn Books.
- The Pastor is at home every day (save Saturday) between 1.30 and 2.30 p.m.; also (during certain months) on Monday evenings, from 8 to 10 p.m., when he is glad to receive calls from friends or strangers.

The Managers derive no revenue from the pews. All the sittings are free, no pew-rent being charged to any one.

CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF ORDINANCES IN ST. JAMES SQUARE CHURCH may be made in one of three ways :---

- (1) Weekly Offerings, enclosed in special envelopes, and placed on the collection plate each Sabbath.
- (2) Quarterly Subscriptions.

(3) Open Contributions, placed upon the collection plate.

The first method has been adopted by the greater part of the congregation ; it ought, if possible, to be adopted by all.

The necessary envelopes are given out at the beginning of each quarter, as well as upon the allocation of sittings. Any one not now receiving envelopes, but desiring to contribute in that way, is requested to give his or her name to any of the Managers; and the matter will at once be attended to.

All who occupy sittings are expected to contribute, according to their means, towards meeting the current expenses of the congregation. All alike derive the benefit which accrues from the expenditure of the congregation's funds : ALL therefore should aid in raising these funds. All cannot give amounts equally large,—this is neither asked nor expected : but all can give something. EVERY ONE who is in receipt of a regular income, be it small or great, is in a position to dedicate a portion of it to the Lord. "Let each man do according as he hath purposed in his beart : and not grudgingly, or of necessity, for God loveth a cheerful giver."

Perhaps it may not be amiss to say that, in order to meet promptly the current expenses of the congregation, an average of fully \$150.00 per Sabbath is required.

The above Disbursements include only such moneys as passed through the hands of the several Treasurers of the Congregation. In addition to these amounts, however, members of the Congregation subscribe directly and generously towards every good cause that is maintained and promoted in the City of Toronto.
