In view of a slight sagging in demand in Montreal and district for warehouse goods, it is thought that prices will soon show a weakening and galvanized sheets have already shown a sympathetic movement downwards. There was a prospect of bar mills making a reduction this week but this did not materialize. Pospective orders from Japan are given as the reason for action being withheld.

Sales of machinery and machine tools in the last week have been slightly better. Companies with a variety of lines are receiving a good share of business but equipment of the larger variety is moving slowly.

Import steel is finding slow sale, with slackening call from fabricating shops but prices are fime in view of the change which is being effected in the American working day.






