ANTICIPATE END OF THE COALITION GOVERNMENT

Opinion General That Present Session of British House is Last.

Length of Its Life Seems of More Interest Than Matters to Come Before It—Political Writers Think Resignation Inevitable.

London, Feb. 7.—The approaching end of the coalition government which has controlled Great Britain's destinies since early in the world war was seen in the reassembling at noon today of parliament for what is regarded on all sides as its last session.

The sitting was to be opened by the King and Queen with the customary picturesque formalities. The speech from the throne was expected to include, among other matters bearing on the public mind, an appreciation of the success of the Washington conference.

General interest, however, was taken with any specific subject which might come before the two houses than with the question of the duration of the present parliament, and the government's tenure of office.

The newspapers of all party affiliations, excepting the few definitely supporting the government, for a long time have been indulging the administration for its alleged delinquencies, each party organ having its own grounds for attack.

Uncertainty of Results. The government's attitude toward Ulster had so strengthened the supporters of northern union that an almost certain withdrawal of the Conservatives from the coalition was possible, forcing Premier Lloyd George to resign.

Such headlines as "On the Brink," and "Under the Shadow of Dissolution," which top the political columns today, are sufficiently indicative of the general belief. In these circumstances, the premier's speech, which is expected today or tomorrow, is awaited with keen interest.

Efforts Towards Economy. The Times parliamentary correspondent credits Mr. Lloyd George himself with the desire to enter the present parliament, but thinks the house of commons may adopt a critical mood and make efforts to prolong the situation. He says:—

"The premier will be quite glad if no unforeseen troubles arise and will bring the session to an end in the hope of securing for the next government the desires to lead, a more homogeneous if smaller, majority."

As regards Ireland, there must be at least two bills, one establishing the Irish Free State, and the other conferring indemnities for acts committed under martial law. How much time passage of these measures will take cannot be foreseen, but in view of the present position of Irish affairs the government certainly will do its utmost to hasten them along although it bills stir up controversy delay is inevitable.

British Parliament Is Opened With Much Pomp

TENURE OF OFFICE IS CHIEF ITEM OF INTEREST AT TODAY'S SESSION

King in Speech from Throne Pays High Tribute to Washington Conference—Refers to Negotiations With France and Belgium re Prevention of German Attack—The Irish Agreement and Unemployment.

London, Feb. 7.—Parliament re-assembled at noon today for a session in which the political situation loomed largely as affecting the present government's tenure of office.

The king and queen again, as in December, opened the session in full state, with all the pomp and ceremony of pre-war days.

The King's Speech. London, Feb. 7.—The imperial parliament, which was prorogued early December 19, to await action on the Irish treaty by the Dail, was re-opened today with the reading of an unprovoked attack by King George.

Regarding the Irish treaty, the king said parliament would be called upon to consider "such measures as may be necessary to give effect to the agreement."

He also touched upon the negotiations for a pact with France to guarantee action in the event of an unprovoked attack by Germany, and paid high tribute to the accomplishments of the Washington conference.

The Washington Meeting. In his speech the king said:—"During the last three months the Washington conference on the questions of disarmament and the Far Eastern situation has been in session."

An agreement also was reached on the question of disarmament and a treaty has been signed providing a large measure of relief from the burden of armaments.

German Reparations. "The problem of securing payment of reparations by Germany in the manner most comfortable to the general interest engages the continuous consideration of my government, and it is my earnest hope that the forthcoming allied discussions in Paris may result in an early solution which will terminate the conflict in a manner honorable to all parties concerned."

Efforts Towards Economy. "To the house of commons the king said that the estimates for services for the coming year would be submitted today, and that every effort would be made to reduce the expenditures to the lowest possible total, in order to relieve the people as much as possible from their heavy burdens."

Among the passengers was Arthur J. Benson, the British delegate to the armament conference, Lord Lee of Fareham, first lord of the admiralty, and Lady Lee; Rear Admiral Sir Chatfield and Lieut.-Colonel M. F. Day.

BOLSHEVIKI TO SPRUCE UP FOR GENOA MEETING. Moscow, Feb. 7.—Special instructions have been issued to the Russian Soviet delegates to the Genoa conference that long hair should be trimmed and leather jackets and top boots discarded, and that those in the party should dress in a dignified manner. All the delegates are buying new clothes in order to present a good appearance and to show the world, as one of them expressed it, that the Bolsheviks are like "ordinary people."

House of Lords Reform. "Proposals will be submitted to you for the reform of the house of lords and an adjustment of the differences between the two houses."

IRISH SITUATION KEEPS PREMIER FROM OPENING. Lloyd George and Chamberlain Both Absent This Morning—Conference with Griffiths While Royal Procession Passes.

London, Feb. 7.—The critical stage which the Irish negotiations has now reached was probably prevented Mr. Lloyd George and Austen Chamberlain, government leader in the house of commons, from attending the opening of parliament today. It is a somewhat unusual occurrence for the premier not to be in attendance while the king's speech is being read.

Arthur Griffith, president of the Dail, called at No. 10 Downing street, the premier's official residence, before noon, and was in conference with the premier and Mr. Chamberlain at the time the royal procession was passing through Whitehall. The conference had not been concluded when King George delivered his speech. It appeared this-morning that matters connected with the Irish negotiations probably will prevent Mr. Lloyd George from attending parliament until the late afternoon.

The medal resembles a sugar smoothed out, and is worth about \$60.

LONDON SUBURB SEES PECULIAR DEMONSTRATION

Board of Guardians Locked Up by Unemployed.

Held Prisoners Until 4.30 This Morning—Increased Doles Demanded—The Red Flag on Roof.

London, Feb. 7.—The Poplar Board of Guardians—local officials responsible for levying and distributing relief for the poor in the Metropolitan borough of Poplar—were locked in their board room last night and held prisoners until four thirty this morning by a crowd of unemployed persons who demanded large doles. A number of newspapermen shared the imprisonment of the guardians. The captors effectively prevented use of the telephone or other means of communications to summon relief.

Word of Storm Coming This Way. New York, Feb. 7.—The weather bureau today issued the following warning: "Northeast storm warning nine thirty a. m. north of Virginia Capes to Boston. Storm of marked intensity centered near Cape Cod, will move rapidly northward during next twenty four hours, attended by strong northeast and north winds, with rain, sleet, and snow, and thick weather, rain or snow."

#### RUSSIA FACES NEW MALADY

Sleeping Sickness Outbreak With High Percentage of Deaths.

Moscow, Feb. 7.—Sleeping sickness is making its appearance in Russia on a scale which would cause great alarm in a country less hardened to wholesale deaths through starvation and typhus.

The disease is comparatively new to Central Russia. Moscow has over one hundred reported cases at the present time. The disease appeared in the Ukraine two years ago and later spread northward. About seventy per cent of cases die.

#### GOVERNMENT BOAT WITH THE THYRA

Halifax N. S. Feb. 7.—The Canadian government steamer Lady Laurier is alongside the Swedish steamer Thyra which has been drifting rudderless approximately 200 miles southwest of Cape Race, since January 29. A message to the department of marine reads: "Nine a. m. Alongside the Thyra and drifting; northwest gale and heavy swell. Prospects poor for today."

### Wives Are Provided by France for Her Convict Settlements

Paris, Feb. 7.—Banishment to the French penal colony may effect a cure of criminal habits, but it does not interfere with the operations of Cupid, as it has been discovered by the French government in dealing with convicts who were sent to the colony on the Isle of Pines for the remainder of their lives. They are allowed, if they wish to do so, to erect shacks there, instead of living in barracks, and sufficient work is given them to enable them to purchase occasionally their allowance of tobacco and snuff. But, despite this, something was lacking to the exiles. Briefly, this thing that was lacking was feminine charm—companionship.

As a result, women who are found guilty of crimes which warrant banishment are now being sent to the islands in the Antipodes, where they live in a convent and instructed and trained by the sisters until they show a desire to carry out family duties faithfully. Then they are permitted to live in the convict settlement and receive official introductions to men who want to live more normal lives. Last year more than forty marriages were reported from the colony.

Before the war such marriages occurred but rarely, only when the fiancée of some banished Frenchman obtained permission from the government to share with the man she loved his exile.

**FIFTY-THREE YEARS' SERVICE**

Notable Record of John Coffey, Who Has Retired as C. N. R. Conductor.

Of Conductor John Coffey of the C. N. R., who retired on January 1, the Montreal Times says—

Ex-Conductor Coffey was engaged in railroading some fifty-three years, forty-seven of that time as conductor, in all the years that he was in charge of trains, passenger and freight, he never had a passenger injured in getting on or off his train and never had a mishap to his train that would cost the Railway Department a thousand dollars. Not only were his trains free of accidents, so far as passengers were concerned, but he never had a driver, fireman, brakeman or baggage master killed; and only two brakemen met with slight injuries on trains of which he had charge. ## PREPARE FOR CORONATION ON FEBRUARY 12

No Radical Changes Expected in Vatican Staff.

800,000 Knights of Columbus to Present Pledge of Devotion to New Pope—Cardinals Dougherty and Begin Receive News of Election at Sea.

Rome, Feb. 7.—The Vatican today began to resume its usual brilliancy following the death of the late Benedict XV., in preparation for the coronation of the new Pope, Pius XI, on Feb. 12. The pontifical household was being set in order and the rooms used by the convalescing pope were being readied.

The whole of Italy, judging from the messages received at the Holy See, seemed full of joy that Pius XI sits on the throne of St. Peter. All praise from his first apostolic benediction that the breach between the church and the state would be healed during the present pontificate.

Pius XI is occupied with the preparation of long lists of the prelates who will surround him as the spiritual head of the church. There are unlikely to be very radical changes in the pontifical household since Cardinal Gasparri retains his post as secretary of state, and many of Benedict's appointees are certain to be retained.

News on Ocean. On board the Steamer La Lorraine, Feb. 7.—(By wireless.)—News of the election of Cardinal Ratti as head of the Catholic church was received by wireless and produced a considerable impression on Cardinal Dougherty of Philadelphia and Cardinal Begin of Quebec, who are on their way to Rome. They expressed the hope that they will be able to reach Rome in time for the coronation.

Neither of the cardinals knows the new Pope personally, but said they had a great opinion of his learning and piety. They had received and admired some of his publications, the last one of which was his pastoral letter when he took possession of the Milan See after he was appointed cardinal.

Cardinal Dougherty and Cardinal Begin expect to arrive in Paris on Tuesday. They will leave for Rome on Wednesday, and expect to arrive at their destination on Thursday morning. Arrive at Paris. Paris, Feb. 7.—Cardinal Dougherty, archbishop of Philadelphia, and Cardinal Begin, archbishop of Quebec, on their way to Rome, reached Havre this forenoon on board the S. S. La Lorraine, from New York, after a stormy voyage, and arrived in Paris this afternoon. The two cardinals will leave tonight for Rome, where they will arrive Thursday night in ample time for the coronation of Pius XI.

Soon after their arrival in Paris the cardinals telegraphed the new pontiff congratulations and wishes for his long and happy reign. Missions of Canada and the U. S. K. of C. Tributes.

New York, Feb. 7.—A multitude of devotion from the 800,000 members of the Knights of Columbus in the U. S., Canada, Newfoundland, Cuba and Mexico will be delivered to the new pope as a special representative of the organization.

Edw. L. Heane, of this city, announced today he would sail Saturday for Italy, where he will visit the Vatican and present the pledge.

Montreal, Feb. 7.—There is no more proof of anyone's guilt today than there was yesterday, said Corner McMahon this morning in announcing the formal postponement of the inquest into the death of Hazel Delorne, murdered Ottawa student. "According to reports made to me there is absolutely nothing new in the case."

**BODY TAKEN TO HALIFAX FOR BURIAL**  
Montreal, Feb. 7.—The body of Col. William James Stewart, well known military figure, who died last Saturday night at the age of seventy, was this morning conveyed to Halifax for interment in the family plot. The coffin was placed on a gun carriage for transportation to Halifax, his birthplace, where interment will take place tomorrow. A short impressive service was held at the undertaking rooms, conducted by Rev. Canon Almond. The coffin was draped with the Union Jack, while the dead officer's sword and helmet were placed over the body.

**EMPLOYMENT LESS AS YEAR CLOSED**  
Ottawa, Feb. 7.—(Canadian Press.)—During the last two weeks of the old year, according to reports from the employment service department of labor which will be issued tomorrow, 53,000 persons were released from employment. The curve of employment fell slightly over seven points.

**WILL MEET AGAIN 8 YEARS HENCE**

Washington, Feb. 7.—Although the Washington conference has ended, many of its decisions, particularly relating to the Far East, still remained to be applied and given effect by boards and commissions authorized.

In addition, the conference, so far as its naval negotiations are concerned, provided virtually for its eighth anniversary, hence, when representatives of the United States and Great Britain met in London in 1926 to discuss naval armaments, it will also mark the anniversary of the Washington conference.

The only directly continuing function of the conference remaining after its termination is the work of the secretariat general, which has been charged with the duty of compiling and printing corrected minutes of the sessions, and also with a clearing-up of matters in which the various governments will be involved as to their existing commitments affecting China.

**SOME GAINS IN WALL STREET**

New York, Feb. 7.—(Wall Street, 10:30)—With few exceptions the stocks advanced further substantially gains at the active opening of today's session. Junior rails, independent steel and oil again led the advance. Steel preferred rose 1-16 points and accumulation of St. Paul preferred, St. Louis Southwestern preferred, New Haven and Rock Island was in progress.

An early rise of 13-16 points in Gulf States Steel was soon increased to 2-3/4 points. Great Britain Ore also came in briskly forawrd. Maryland was strong, and the stocks with Mexican Petroleum and California Petroleum. Reaction running from fractions to two points marked the closing. United States Steel and Pierce Arrow preferred and Pullman.

## WHOLESALE TRADE CONDITIONS FAIR

Dun's Bulletin says of Montreal trade: The boot and shoe convention this week proved quite a success, the jobbing trade from all over the Dominion being well represented, and some good resulting business is looked for. The manufacturers had their best two days, and also showed up in force. In leather business is more or less spotty, but moderate sales are reported in most instances. Some good business had been done in the export of sole leather to Britain, though the demand from that quarter has slackened somewhat momentarily.

Fur travelers have started out on their main selling trip and find stocks low, but report a disposition with many to defer any considerable orders until the winter sales in the raw fur trade profess the belief that values are not at all likely to go lower. As a result of the noted sale, quotations are unchanged, and the dry goods orders from the middle and eastern provinces are of fairly satisfactory volume. Considerable shipments of Manchester cottons are coming to hand, but are quickly absorbed. From the woolen section some stiffening is reported in cashmere yarns, hosiery and dress goods.

A moderate, but healthy distribution marks the grocery trade, and no striking variations in values are noted. Some quotations are unchanged, and retailers are fairly employed, one company reporting a considerable export business of 15,000 cases of tomatoes, as well as a shipment of 8,000 cases to Britain. City retail trade has quieted down somewhat.

The failure list shows eleven districts insolvent for the week, with liabilities of \$23,500.

Bradstreet's Montreal Weekly Trade Report says: Wholesale trade in most lines showed an active and healthy character for the week ending Feb. 6. A number of small orders remain in. Manufacturing is somewhat irregular, although the various operations are commencing to improve.

Canadian grain in store has increased 4,924,738 bushels since the close of the market, cables being stronger. There is a good demand for ocean export inquiry for flour, for Liverpool and Glasgow, from St. John at \$20 per head, February and March shipments.

Prices of smoked meats advanced two cents per pound. There is a weak feeling in eggs, new laid decisions to five per dozen sales at 50c per dozen. The cheese market is stronger, with butter quoted there in good export inquiry for flour, but prices offered were too low to interest millers.

The export for automobiles from Canada has become quite an important factor in Canadian industry.

The export is fair, with collections on the slow side.

**Conditions Improving.** Conditions are slowly but improving in wholesale and retail cities throughout Canada. The movement, although slight, has been noticeable in many lines since the middle of December, and there is some forecast a steady improvement of the Canadian credit men's trade association.

Economic advice, including those from Montreal, Quebec, Toronto and Brantford, says that wholesalers are, country points. Little change is noticeable in retail trade in larger cities. Collections there are somewhat slow. Assignments and compositions are on the decrease.

Reports from Winnipeg and the west indicate that wholesalers, while seeing hopeful signs in increased orders, say that the improvement is to take concrete shape, business must pick up faster than at present. In Manitoba and Saskatchewan, however, conditions are improving. Business is still poor compared with a year ago. Retail trade has been slow during the past week. In Manitoba considerable alarm is manifested in business circles on account of the probable imposition of a provincial income tax, said likely to amount to one-half that demanded by the federal tax. A movement is on foot to bring such pressure upon the government as may induce such legislation to be abandoned.

The wheat and durum crop indicate a better business outlook with wholesalers, manufacturers and retailers all optimistic regarding the 1929 outlook.

**THE FEDERALITY LIST MAY REACH 15 OR 20—\$150,000 Loss in Virginia.**

Richmond, Va., Feb. 7.—Three persons are known to be dead and at least twenty-five injured in a fire here early today which destroyed the Laundromat Hotel and several adjoining buildings with a loss estimated at \$150,000.

The police state the death toll may reach fifteen or twenty.

**MEDICAL ETHICS ARE CONDEMNED**

More Publicity is Needed to Fight Disease, Says N. Y. Health Officer.

New York, February 6.—Health Commissioner Royal S. Copeland, condemnin the "code of ethics" of the medical profession, said that publicity, if properly given, "would wipe disease off the face of the earth."

Speaking at the bi-weekly luncheon of the Advertising Club, Dr. Copeland said that he is not a member of the Academy of Medicine, inasmuch as he would then be required to remain silent about disease and its cure.

As soon as the public, through the newspapers, had learned of Dr. Lorenz's arrival and the fact that he could cure paralysis, 35,000 persons flocked to him, and he was surrounded by the press and treated. "There were other surgeons in New York just as capable as Dr. Lorenz," said the health officer, "but they never made known to the public that they could cure paralysis, and so the people remained in ignorance, the Health Commissioner said.

"There is something wrong with the system that makes it impossible for the sick or the crippled person not to know that he can be healed," said Dr. Copeland, "and with the medical profession, which has been unwilling to advertise what it can do."

### MANY OFFER TO AID \$100,000,000 PLAN

Manufacturers of Building Material Volunteer to Cooperate in Tenement Project.

(New York Times)

Samuel Untermyer said yesterday that substantial offers of co-operation had come from many large firms in favor of the \$100,000,000 building programme of the Lockwood Committee, which contemplates the erection of the 1,200 five-story tenements on a low-cost basis. If the legislation sought at Albany is obtained, the success of the plan is practically assured, it was said. The following statement summarizing offers of help was made public yesterday.

"A firm of contracting electrical engineers would do all or a portion of the work required on a basis of cost of labor and material plus operating expense without profit."

"A firm of truckmen and riggers of over forty years' experience desires to haul any building material, such as boilers, pipe-fittings and plumbers' supplies, at cost."

"A representative of Western lumber interests announced that they are prepared to supply unlimited quantities of lumber at 25 per cent. below New York market prices."

"The head of the productive department of a large manufacturing corporation says that he is confident that his operation will be offered by manufacturers of brick, cement and lime; but if such assurances are not received within a reasonable time he will place his experience in the manufacture, purchase and sale of these commodities at the disposal of those interested in the project."

Plastering at Cost

"A firm of general plastering contractors, with facilities to under take all or part of the plastering of the 1,200 apartment houses, of twenty-five years' experience, will be glad to do the plastering at labor and material costs."

"A manufacturer of window shades offers to make all the shades necessary without profit at actual cost of labor and material."

"A manufacturer of window frames, sashes and doors offers all of his time and that of his organization to supply all the window frames and sashes at a net cost far below present prices. He also offers all interior woodwork at cost and also his services to supply necessary lumber, plaster, lathing, flooring, &c."

"A firm of architects offers its services at cost, without profit, in the design of any or all of the apartments."

"A supply company dealing in hardware has written to the Thompson-Starratt Company, saying that it will cooperate on a cost basis."

"The Phelps Stokes Fund of 100 William street, interested in building model tenements to rent at \$1.75 per room per week, bathrooms being charged for at 75 cents per week, offers to place at the disposal of those behind the plan all its plans in a competition for model tenements now being held under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce of the State of New York, the Merchants Association of New York, the Advisory Council of Real Estate Interests, the Real Estate Board of New York, and the Phelps Stokes Fund."

Stewart Browne, President of the United Real Estate Owners' Association, attacked statements by Mr. Untermyer on the insurance question, saying:

"While endorsing a great deal that Samuel Untermyer does, I do object to his newspaper publicity which contains so much that isn't so. Not because Mr. Untermyer knows so much that isn't so, but because he knows so much that he knows isn't so. I hold no brief for the insurance companies, but I do for facts, and I have no interest whatever with insurance companies except as a policy holder."

Disputes Untermyer's Figures

"Mr. Untermyer says that the aggregate insurance companies (except life) receive \$1,900,000,000 in premiums and paid 60 per cent. in losses, or \$760,000,000, and that the difference of \$820,000,000 is profit or economic waste. Mr. Untermyer knows better. He knows that the expenses, unpaid loss liability and reinsurance reserve or unearned premium liability and interest on stockholders invested cash capital have all to be deducted."

Mr. Untermyer says that the state furnishes only from 10 to 15 per cent. workmen's liability insurance, and the corporations the remainder, and he would therefore prohibit the latter from engaging in that business, and he gives reasons which are not facts and which he may or may not know are not in accordance with the facts."

After challenging other statements by Mr. Untermyer on insurance rates and methods abroad, he continued:

"The fire insurance rates, I know, are too high. But stop the publication of 'gossip' to the people of New York City, believe that Mr. Untermyer's activities have reduced wages in the building trades. They did not. Plasterers and bricklayers' wage are higher, but I don't blame Mr. Untermyer for that. Let's have pitiless newspaper publicity, but for heaven's sake let it be truthful."

### LIVE STOCK SALES REPORTED SLOW

Montreal, Feb. 6.—Dominion live stock branch. Cattle receipts today were 1,280. There was just a fair run of cattle. Sales were very slow. Buyers picked out cattle around \$5 in preference to the better grades. Up to 11 a.m. only a quarter or less of the cattle had been sold.

Calves receipts were 865. Calves were steady at around \$11.00 for the bulk of the better grades and from \$6.00 to \$10.00 for the common ones. Demand was fairly strong for good calves but the offerings were mostly all of common to medium quality. The few sheep and lambs offered were sold early at prices.

Very little trading was done.

Good light sheep went at \$5.00 and lambs from \$9.00 to \$10.00. Quotations—Hogs, \$5.00; lambs \$7.00 to \$10.00. Hog receipts were 2,594. The market was weaker and trading slow. Most sales of hogs were made at \$12.75. A few lots sold early in the day for \$12.75 to \$13.25.

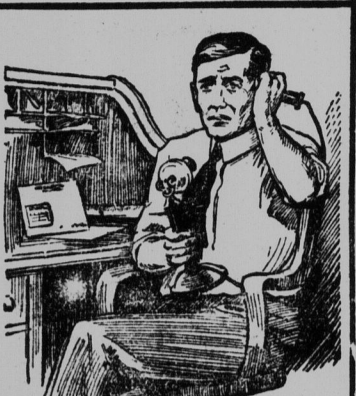
