

Advance Would Have Been More Serious Two Months Ago-


Expected That There Will Soon be Check of Enemy

London, May 29—Several of the morning newspapers withhold comment on the battle on the Aisne sector. Others, while admitting the Germans have gained a substantial initial succes, deprecate any idea of treating the enemy's advance too seriously. It is recalled that similar thrusts have not been followed by continuous success.

The Daily Chronicle fears that the advance has involved a big loss in guns, but thinks that in other respects it need not cause undue alarm. The paper adds:—"The country is so difficult that General Foch's reserves should have time to entrain before the strategic situation is altered seriously to the detriment of the Allies. The Germans, however, probably have done rather better than they expected although their achievement thus far does not go much beyond undoing the effects of last year's French victories."

WATERING.

There is always the danger of watering vegetable crops over abundantly. Ontario has been fortunate this spring in the amount of natural watering that the gardens have received but this does not necessarily apply all over Canada. A city garden should never be watered in the heat of the sun. In any event, the water should be applied in as fine a spray as it is possible to obtain. Force will wash out the seeds, flatten the soil, expose the roots to the sun's rays and thus cause the wilting of the plant. As the seeds are first breaking through, the ground should be gently watered in the evening with the watering can. The hose is destructive if used too soon after planting. It is necessary to stir the soil after ing. It is necessary to stir the soil after each rain or watering in order to con-

serve the moisture.

Particular care must be taken in the watering of transplanted vegetables. It is a good plan to put a little water in the holes before the plants are put in them. Or, on the other hand, the watering may be done immediately after planting while the soil is loose. This will prevent the plants from wilting.

TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN ON JUNE !

Professors' Plans for Observing it at Green River, Wyoming

According to Director Edwin Brant Frost, of the Yerkes Observatory, the University of Chicago observers of the coming total eclipse of the sun have selected as their principal station Green River, Wyoming, a point on the Union Pacific Railway, lying between Cheyenne and Ogden. This station is situated in the so-called Red Desert, with a rainfall of about ten inches a year and at an elevation of more than 6,000 feet. The remarkable transparency of the air in this region makes the station one of the most promising of any along the line of totality. The observing party from the University of Chicago will have about twenty members, including Professor Edward Emerson Barnard and Assistant Professors John A. Parkhurst and Storrs B. Barrett, besides volunteers from the Yerkes Observatory and other institutions. Some of the volunteers will use apparatus at Denver. It is hoped also that the weather will permit simultaneous observations with the spectraheliograph at the Yerkes Observatory by Dr. Oliver J. Lee.



Crop Outlook Holds Strong In All Canada

Insistent Demand for Power Machinery For Farms

Sask.'s Snow Blanket

Livestock High-Wool Clip Coming in Biggest in Last 20 Years -Oats and Flax About Finished

(By F. M. Chapman, Editor Farmers Magazine.) Crop conditions in Eastern Canada have steadily improved during the week of alternate rain and sunny weather. Growth in meadows and grain fields gives promise of a better than average crop. In western Canada, while considmany parts of Saskatchewan in the nature of snow, which has caused some concern. Low temperatures in the Qu,Appelle and central districts have prevailed all the week, as low as 22 degrees occurring. That this will not seriously injure the wheat, B. T. Huston, of the MacLean Publishing Co., wires The Financial Post today from Regina, and although there were heavy frosts at Regina and the Goose Lake districts, which may injure seed some, frosts in other parts will only retard growth. Three to eight inches of snow fell in Saskatchewan on Tuesday morning and welcome erable moisture has fallen, it has been in

wan on Tuesday morning and welcome rains fell in Manitoba and Alberta. Certainly, the snow will be the savious of the situation in Saskatchewan, and we look for no serious results from the ten degrees of frost.

A despatch from the Department of Agriculture at Regina, says that: "Reports indicate eighty per cent. of the oat seeding is completed and about forty per cent. of the flax and barley. Frosts and snow general in province this week, but information too incomplete to make any estimate of damage. The C. N. R. reports show the whole wheat situation along their lines to be most promising, and the season fully two weeks ahead of

along their lines to be most promising, and the season fully two weeks ahead of last year."

Live stock prices remain firm. Many cattle are being taken to the farms for both short keep and for the season's grazing. Anything with meat on it is being greedly taken up by the butchers and packers, so that the prices during the late summer will have to be correspondingly good to enable these farmers to make a margin over their high purchase prices. The wool clip is beginning to come in. Alberta reports the highest clip in history, while the total wool clip for Canada this year will surpass the output of any year for the past twenty years.

The demeand for farm machinerey continues strong. Farmers are anxious to purchase all the tractors the firms have been able to ship to them.

Last week a circular was issued by some banks to their branches to help the farmers finance the purchase of tractors where 40 per cent. is paid in cash. The Ontario Department of Agriculture reports that the working of the tractors goes on far more smoothly this year than formerly.

While the fall wheat crop of Canada is down to the lowest in history, the United States reports a forecast of 560,000,000 bushels against a five year average of 495,000,000 bushels, with an average price of \$2.02 as against eighty-eight cents.







While working over the lines observing the fire of our artillery his machine was attacked by four enemy scouts and, after a very stout fight on his part, shot down. The machine fell on the enemy side of the lines out of sight of ground observers.

Those who saw the fight say there is little doubt that both pilot and observer were killed instantaneously by the fire from the enemy scouts.

His loss is indeed a blow to the squadron, as your son, though he had only been with us just over a month, with his knowledge of artillery and his stoutness of heart in the air, was rapidly becoming one of the most valuable pilots in the squadron.
