ALLIES' SUCCESS ON CHANNEL COAST

The news supplementing these official communications, however, indicates that on the left, at least, the allies are not acting merely on the defensive. The great turning movement is undoubtedly developing through the corner of Belgium bound by France and the sea, but the purpose remains in a haze, as to whether the turning movement is one on the part of the allies to get around the German right flank, or a German operation to envelope the al-

The impression grows that the Germans are determined to add Dunkirk to the line of seaports now held along the Belgian coast, and the allies are making desperate efforts to hurl back the invaders. Late reports through Dutch sources, declare that the Germans have been repulsed six miles from Ostend, and that guns are now heard near that city. Other late reports, which lack

confirmation, state that the Germans have abandoned Bruges. If these reports are true, it would indicate that the allies are meeting with some success in their efforts to reoccupy the sea coast.



But Wales must continue doing her duty. That was a great telegram that you, my Lord (the chairman) read from Glamorgan. I should like to see a Welsh army in the field. I should like to see what the race who faced the Normans for hundreds of years in their struggle for freedom, the race that helped to win the battle of Creey, the race that fought for a generation under Glendower, against the greatest captain in Europe—I should like to see that race give a good taste of its quality in this struggle in Europe; and they are going to do it. (Cheers.)

I envy you young people your youth. They have put up the age limit for the Army—(laughter)—but I march, I am sorry to say, a good many years even beyond that. But still my turn will come. It is a great opportunity. It only comes once in many centuries to the children of men. For most generations sacrifice comes in drab weariness of spirit to men. It has come today to you; it has come today to us all, in the form of the glow and thrill of a great movement for liberty, that impels millions throughout Europe to the same end. It is a great war for the emancipation of Europe from the thraldom of a military caste, which has cast its shadow upon two genwhich has cast its shadow upon two generations of men, and which has now plunged the world into a welter of blood shed. Some have already given their lives. There are some who have given more than their own lives. They have given the lives of those who are dear given the lives of those who are dear to them. I honor their courage, and may God be their comfort and their strength.

"Consecrated Deaths" But their reward is at hand. Those They have taken their part in the mas-ing of a new Europe, a new world. I can see signs of its coming in the glare of the battlefield. The people will gain more by this struggle in all lands than they comprehend at the present moment. It is true they will be rid of the menace to their freedom. But that is not all. There is something indefinitely greater and more enduring which is emerging already out of this great conflict; a new patriotism, richer, nobler, more exalted than the old, I see a new recognition amongst all, high and low, shedding

get their entire equipment of clothing from shoes to cap, the men on home service get only their uniform, and have to provide underclothes and shoes, etc. In this particular they have more ways to use their pay.

It is claimed by many that the men on home service should be given consideration, especially as their expenses in many instances are greater than the men on foreign service.

Another ruling sent down from Ottawa by the Central Committee deals with the cases of soldiers who have enlisted for service abroad and who have, through no fault of their own, been discharged for ill-health or family reasons, etc. The Soldiers' Wives League sent to the last meeting of the local executive of the Patriotic Fund a copy of a resolution they had adopted in which they deplored the fact that no provision was being made for these men or their families. Attention was called to the fact that many of the men were out of employment and in need of help, and the executive was asked to give the matter earnest consideration and, if necessary, to have the bill of incorporation amended. This question was taken up with the Central Committee at Ottawa, and a reply has come from the Hon. W. T. White, Minister of Finance and treasurer of the Fund, to the effect that soldiers returning home, as set forth, will have to be attended to by some other organization than the National Patriotic Fund. There seems to be no disposition to broaden the scope of the Fund. As a number of the local executive are known to be out of sympathy with this strict interpretation of the provisions of the act, it is probable that the matter may be further discussed when the local executive meet again, and an attempt made to have something done to relieve the situation of those who are now ruled out from participation in the Fund.





The daring of girl swimmers in fearlessly undertaking trips in dangerous
waters has been a matter of much comment. As examples of it may be mentioned the long swim of Nora Leahy,
of New York, through the swift tides
and whirlpool of the East River and
Hell Gate, and the journey of Nellie
Schmidt, of San Francisco, around the
present remarkable feature was liant feats of aquatic speed and endurance, its most remarkable feature was the work done by girls and women in the competitive field. Their performances, particularly over the longer courses, were far beyond anything seen in the past and several of them compared favorably with the best made by the stronger sex.

Schmidt, of San Francisco, around the breaker-swept Seal Rocks, a feat never before accomplished by man or woman. In sprint and middle distance swimming, records were claimed in many sections, and though it is impossible to give them due recognition owing to the absence of a controlling organization, figures make clear that America's fair natators now rank with the best in the world.

In fact, one seeks in vain for instances of such early development among boys as was exhibited last summer by tiny mermaids of ten and eleven. Take Florence McLaughlin of Philadelphia, a little miss of ten, who officially covered nine and a half miles in three hours, twenty-two minutes and twenty-five seconds, and swam half a mile over a surveyed still water course in eighteen seconds, and swam half a mile over a surveyed still water course in eighteen minutes thirty-seven seconds; or Helen Rubican, one year her senior, who defeated Florence by a touch in the latter race, and has a record almost as good in marathon swimming; or Catherine Hose, of St. Louis, who in a two-mile contest for women finished among the leaders, in thirty-two minutes forty-nine seconds, despite the fact that she is only twelve, while the field included about twenty of the fastest women swimmers in the west. Where can there be found lads of the same age with such astonishing achievements to their credit?

Most Striking Feat.

BELGIAN RELIEF.

Ninety-three cars of food and clothing are pouring in every day from all parts of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Quebec and Ontario.

Mrs. George A. Fawcett, of Middle Sackville, has collected 221 barrels of potatoes for the Belgian Relief Fund. The potatoes are of the best quality, and were donated by the farmers of Sackville parish. They have been shipped to the Relief Committee.

The most striking performance of the season was that of Elaine Golding of Bath Beach, in the championship race from the Battery to Steeplechase Park Pier, Coney Island, in August. 
