WANT IMPERIAL DEFENCE
CONFERENCE AT VANCOUVER

Australia and New Zealand Make Unofficial Representations to Canadian Ministers—Dominion Government Will Await Fate of Naval Bill Before Considering the Matter.

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—Unofficial suggestions have been made from Australia and New Zealand to members of the Canadian government to hold the next imperial defence conference in Victoria on Vancouver next summer.

The matter has not yet come formally before the government here, but it is understood that representatives of the dominions of New Zealand and Australia in England last summer during the visit of the Canadian ministers there suggested that the next conference should be held on the Pacific coast.

One of the most important questions to be considered is the co-operation of the three dominions in regard to imperial naval defence on the Pacific. The Aus-

tralian and New Zealand argument is that holding the conference in British Columbia would obviate the necessity of the long trip to London during an election year in the dominions and either of the two coast cities would be a convenient halfway point for them and for the British representatives at the conference.

Pending the result of the present naval discussion in the commonsense here the Canadian government will not consider the question of the date or place of the next defence conference.

Hon. Rodolph Lemieux has given notice of a resolution declaring that a state-owned cable between Canada and the United Kingdom would be both commercially and politically in the interests of Canada and the empire.

Local Amateurs Good In Comedy and Specialties

LARGE HOUSE GREETED THEM

Clever Performers in Rich Comedy and Handsomely Staged Special Features Win Plaudits on Knights' First Appearance Behind the Footlights

The expectations entertained regarding the production of "My Friend from India" by the Knights of Columbus of this city, fully justified last evening when the great farcical success was presented in superior manner before a very large audience, who showed their appreciation and interest by frequent applause and certain hilarity and merriment.

However, as it was there was little room for improvement with any of the parts in the general handling of the comedy, which abounds in situations laughable in the extreme, and considering the fact that a play of this nature, all comedy is the most difficult for either amateurs or professionals to produce, the performance was most creditable and easily merited the complimentary comment accorded it.

The play started with a grin which gradually expanded to a smile and then stretched further to a giggle, merging before many moments into a laugh of healthy dimensions, which was a continued factor in the performance until the fall of the curtain.

Contrary to the usual notion of amateur comedies, there is a semblance of a plot to "My Friend from India" and it was carefully unfolded in the last act's presentation. It hinges upon the efforts of Erasmus Underholt, a wealthy but retired pork packer, to attain the goal of his life, the possession of his personal social ambitions, but usually because of the lofty ideals of his daughter, His only daughter, a severe night before the story starts, and is brought home by a tonorial artist, A. K. Shaver, a total stranger to him.

Shaver has been somewhat of a student and knows a thing or two or three about the Orient, and when Charley suggests that he impersonate an Indian pundit in order to fool the "governor" he is compelled to do so for Shaver's sake and decides to impersonate the real Mr. Tweddle, don ministerial garb and get Shaver out of the house.

He has explained his plan to his right-hand friend, Tom Valentine, and the latter unknown to his own, has upon a similar scheme to straighten out the difficulties and possibly make a hit with the old man, who is a Boston clergyman who has just returned from Asia. Mr. Tweddle, he enrolls Underholt's two daughters, his sister, and Charley's sweetheart in the "Order of the Yellow Robe." Charley does not appreciate the turn things have taken and decides to impersonate the real Mr. Tweddle, don ministerial garb and get Shaver out of the house.

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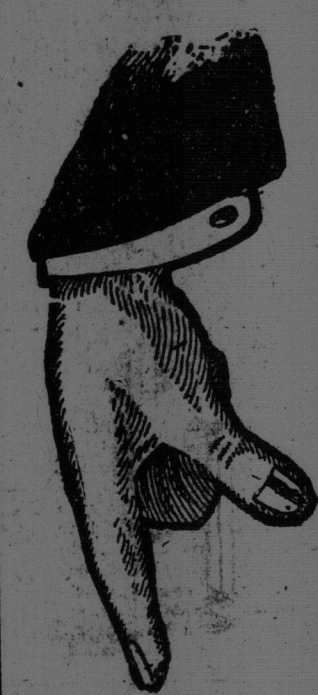

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—Canada resents outside meddling in her affairs. Notice to this effect was served in parliament today and was emphasized by almost continuous applause and other marks of approval.

The speaker was A. K. McLean, the financial critic, who in the course of a vigorous and able address upon the prospective trade treaty with the West Indies, dealt plainly with the interference of English Unionists in Canadian affairs.

He severely criticized and challenged the truth of the statement of Hon. George E. Foster in London to the effect that had the last Canadian election resulted otherwise than it did there would have been no West India treaty, pointing out that Hon. W. S. Fielding had taken the first steps in this connection.

He quoted the declaration of the former minister of finance that Canada, recognizing her imperial responsibility, had decided to extend her preferential tariff to the West Indies without demanding any concession in return.

There was perhaps some excuse for the inaccurate statement of Mr. Foster, Mr. MacLean admitted, in the fact that the minister of commerce had been surrounded at the time by "members of the Unionist party who had assisted financially, and otherwise in the last Canadian campaign."

These gentlemen were spokesmen of a preferential tariff in the shape of additional food duties and other matters, and Mr. MacLean declared that the English Unionists as "absolutely untrue, absolutely unfounded, and absolutely unworthy of himself."

Speaker Sprague stopped him and asked him to retract.

"I will not take time to debate the point of order now," replied Mr. MacLean, "so I will substitute the statement that, he words were a cause of the greatest astonishment and surprise to his well wishers."

Mr. MacLean's comments found pointed and eloquent endorsement from Dr. Michael Clark, of Red Deer, who observed that the tariff reform middle was now almost a corpse at the heart of the empire. Recent events having shown to atoms the whole house of cards. It was the proverbial conduct of the rat to the sinking ship to see the "extreme last" of which Premier Borden recently avowed that he had no connection with Bonar Law.

Hon. Mr. White retorted by calling Dr. Clark a "political chameleon" by reason of the fact that he had advocated free trade in Canada while advocating free trade in commercial commodities. Then Mr. White warned and indignantly gave Mr. Foster the chance which many think he has been shrewdly awaiting of rapping his own colleagues over the knuckles. The young minister of finance got into a discussion of the navy. He said it was against the interest of empire to "waste precious time in attempting to build dreadnaughts in Canada in view of the fact that the empire at the present time."

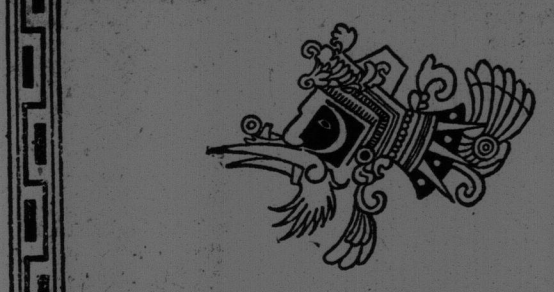

"Empire Savers" Catch It

Hon. Mr. Pugsley took another shot at the sort of stuff fed to the British public at dinners in England" by Mr. Foster and other Canadian ministers in connection with their comments on the turning down of the reciprocity agreement. He declared that it was a direct insult to practically half the people of Canada to say that on that question the Conservatives in Canada were "saving the empire" while the Liberals were "moving toward separation."

In regard to the treaty itself he maintained that the government would have been well advised to have taken off the duties altogether on all tropical fruits, instead of drawing a statement from Hon. Mr. Pugsley regarding the relations and understanding existing between the British government and the British Unionists with regard to imperial preferential trade, and future treatment of the British preference.

The answer was only given after Mr. Foster had taken the dinner hour at his own request to "think it over."

Mr. Pugsley took issue with the statement. He maintained that certain of the West Indies delegates were given to understand that certain portions of the agreement were contingent on the British preference continuing and that the continuance of the British preference was in turn contingent on the giving on the part of Britain of a quid pro quo. In fact it had been stated by certain English Unionists that unless Britain imposed a tax on food stuffs the preference would not last.

When the house met this evening, Mr. MacDonald pressed for information, he asked, moreover for a definite statement as to the government policy on the British preference. Was it to be increased, decreased or taken as permanent?

Mr. Foster said that these matters did not come in properly during the discussion of the West Indies agreement.

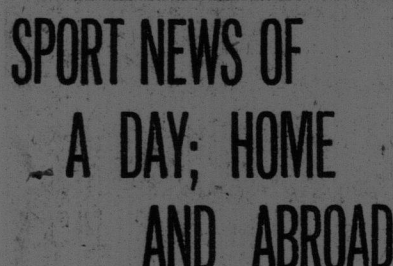

CHANGES IN THE CITY COURT ACT

Draft of The New One Has Been Prepared

JUDGMENT GOOD SIX YEARS

Limits Not Longer Than One Year in Any One Suit—Important Regulations in Procedure and Relative to Constables

A draft of a new city court act has been prepared and will be submitted to the common council at an early date. The bill has been prepared by a committee appointed by the lawyers who had petitioned the council for a revision of the act and who were asked by the council to submit their recommendations in the form of a draft of a revised act.

The need for revision, they feel, is indicated by the fact that the present act was adopted, with very little change, from the act governing the city courts of London, England, which had been on the statute books for several hundred years. The changes proposed will bring the court more into line with the courts of record, will simplify the procedure, make some of the provisions more equitable, give greater power to the magistrate to carry out the intentions of the act and will provide much stricter rules for the guidance of constables in the performance of their duties. There is also a general revision of the court fees. The draft of the new bill has been submitted to the recorder and has met with his approval.

Among the changes which are suggested are the following:—

The extra week allowed when service of a writ is made other than personally will be done away with and all writs will be returnable under the same rules.

A defendant arrested upon an affidavit of the plaintiff that he believes the defendant is about to leave the city, may, instead of having to wait for the next court day for his trial, demand trial at any time, which may be granted upon one day's notice to the plaintiff. No review of proceedings to test the merits of an affidavit will be allowed.

The period for which a judgment is good is to be increased from three to six years.

Provision is made for securing possession from the court of a note which has been made upon, if it needed to start suit in another jurisdiction.

When the judge is absent from the court house the police clerk will be empowered to take his place.

A defendant will not be kept on the limits for more than one year on one suit.

Fees paid to the judge for the service of papers are to be returned to the plaintiff when the papers are not executed.

Constables will be required to give notice to the plaintiff or his solicitor after service of execution, and in the case of papers not being executed they must, when making returns, give the reasons why they were not executed.

Constables receiving money from defendants when making service will be regarded as agents of the defendants in the transaction.

For any infringement of the rules the constable may be suspended for one month with right of appeal to the common council. On such an appeal the council may dismiss the appeal, uphold it or discontinue the constable.

Actions for damages against constables may be maintained in the city court for the full amount of damage done by them even if it exceeds the amount set as the limit of jurisdiction of the court.

When a constable is not available the magistrate may deputize a special constable for the particular work required.

The magistrate is given the power to adjourn a case to any day, whether a regular city court day or not.

THE POLICE COURT

Hearing in the case of James A. McDonald, charged with stealing from the P. F. Collier Publishing Company, was continued in the police court this morning. H. J. Smith for the prosecution said that he had submitted all his evidence and asked that the prisoner be committed for trial. R. St. J. Freeze, for the prisoner, pleaded that the evidence was not sufficient to convict, and asked for dismissal.

He stated that his finding would be that the prisoner would have to stand trial, but allowed his decision to stand for a week until the necessary arrangements could be made for the securing of bail.

Mr. Freeze said that the two bondsmen who had put up bail for McDonald at the time of his arrest, were not in Sussex now, but would be there in a few days. He was allowed out this morning on his own recognizance.

Four prisoners charged with drunkenness, were arraigned. One was remanded, one was fined \$8 or thirty days in jail, and the other two were each fined \$4 or ten days in jail.

Allan Alberts, colored, and Wallace Stevens, reported for fighting on the West Side, and also with using profane language on the ferryboat, pleaded not guilty. Superintendent Waring and Sergeant Finley gave evidence, after which the two were remanded until tomorrow morning.
