PRAYED AS SHE BURNED TO DEATH

Hamilton Girl, in Religious Frenzy, Set Fire To Clothing

MOTHER FINDS HER

Kneeling in Yard of Home as Flames Envelope Her—Burning Plunges Through Train Trestle and Four Men Are Killed

(Canadian Press)

Hamilton, Ont., May 29.—While suffering from religious mania yesterday afternoon Miss Jeanette Dewar Weir, who resided with her parents in Barton Town, two miles east of the Jockey Club, set fire to her clothing and was so badly burned that she died before a doctor could be summoned.

The girl, who was twenty-nine years old, had been acting strangely for some time and frequently told her parents that she had committed an unpardonable sin and was not fit to live. She, however, did not give them any reason to believe that she contemplated suicide. A little after 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon her mother went up stairs, leaving the girl alone in the kitchen. A few minutes later the mother smelt smoke and rushed down stairs. The kitchen was empty but on looking into the yard the mother was horrified to see her daughter kneeling in prayer while her clothing was burning fiercely.

As quietly as possible the mother extinguished the flames but the girl died in a few minutes.

UPSETS THE JUDGMENT IN BOTH CASES

Judge Forbes Sets Aside Police Court Decision in Park Hotel and Policeman Clark Matters and Speaks Strongly

Two cases were before Judge Forbes in the county court this morning on review. In the Park Hotel liquor case his opinion was that the interpretation given the act by Magistrate Ritchie was ridiculous. "How in the name of common sense," said His Honor, "could a man hold that a window used for the purposes of light and ventilation only could be opened only from the inside, could be construed to be an entrance? There is nothing in the case of Walsh vs. Police Court which would justify the judgment of Magistrate Ritchie in good law. It will be necessary to open all the windows of the saloons, a thing which is simply preposterous."

The conviction in the case of Walsh vs. Police Court, was also quashed with costs. The depositions of the witnesses were read and Clarence Campbell, Police Court Clerk and Sgt. Baxter were examined.

PLOTTED AGAINST MADERO

Arrest Reveals Story of Scheming for a Counter Revolution

BRIBERY ATTEMPTED

Former Boer Commander Said to Have Been Offered \$25,000—Wanted Germany to Build More Battleships—Rioting in Chile, Flag of Peru Burned

(Canadian Press)

El Paso, May 29.—What is looked on by Francisco I. Madero as a well laid plan to overthrow his leadership and to start a counter revolution against him, was revealed last night in the arrest of Daniel Del Villar of Mexico City. W. P. Dunn, an American, according to a telegram received by Madero's chief military adviser, was arrested in Monterey, Mexico, by a detective who had trailed him from El Paso.

The alleged plot involves massing of money which were to have been paid to Madero's enemies. Madero, according to the details of the scheme and allowed it to be encouraged. A ten days training for social troops began. The plot involved the death of Madero, according to a statement of Madero's officers. Gen. Vilson, the former Boer commander, was the party acting on behalf of the Cientifico party offered him \$25,000 while they offered Gen. Pascual Orozco an sum he wanted to name, and the command of northern Mexico.

If adopted, this will mean the building of three capital ships yearly instead of two, as provided by the navy law. The rioting followed publication in the newspapers that the Chilean consul at Callao, Peru had been attacked, and the consul wounded. Diplomatic relations between Peru and Chile were severed more than a year ago. This action was brought about by the expulsion of Peruvian priests from the provinces of Tacna and Arica. The ownership of these two provinces is in dispute.

C. N. R. Not to Change (Canadian Press)

Mr. Hanna, who returned from that city on Saturday, said that the company bought some property in St. James street, where a building for its agencies will be erected. This building will also be the headquarters for local officials of the road.

WIFE SEES AVIATOR PLUNGE TO HIS DEATH

Voghera, Italy, May 28.—(Canadian Press)—The Italian aviator, Cirri, while making an acrobatic flight near here today fell 600 feet and was killed. His wife and children saw him fall.

Seventeen Year Locusts

Middletown, N. Y., May 29.—Seventeen year locusts of unusual size have made their appearance in large quantity at Philadelphia near this city.

AMUSEMENT RESORT IS DESTROYED

Two Lives Probably Lost in Frisco Fire and Girl and Man Are Injured

San Francisco, May 29.—(Canadian Press)—Two men are believed to have perished in a fire that destroyed the Chutes, San Francisco's largest amusement resort early today. Occupants of an adjoining lodging house, which caught fire rushed from their beds to find that escape was cut off. Before the firemen arrived, Bella Alviso, a 19 year old girl and John Feist jumped from a second story window. Both were dangerously injured.

FIREMAN OF KITCHENER IS DROWNED

Word of a sad fatality which occurred a short distance outside the entrance to the harbor reached the city this morning. Fireman John Kitchen, of the fire department, was drowned in the Bay of Fundy while on duty.

ENCYCLICAL AGAINST LAW OF SEPARATION

Pope Pius Addresses Strong Letter to Bishops on Attitude of Portuguese Government to the Church

(Canadian Press)

Rome, May 29.—An encyclical addressed by Pope Pius to the Roman Catholic bishops throughout the world, strongly denouncing the Portuguese attitude of the government of the Portuguese republic, was officially published at the Vatican today.

The encyclical deals with the violent suppression of religious orders from Portugal, the suppression of church holidays, religious orders and religious teachings, the deposition of the Bishops of Oporto and Beja, and finally with the law separating church and state.

The Holy See, the encyclical says, has been patient up till now, but cannot long keep silent, as the law of separation denies to Catholic citizens even common liberties. Such a law is a spoliation of material goods and a tyrannical oppression in spiritual affairs. Man is deprived forever of a fixed church in which to maintain his faith. The law even violates the will of testators.

Ecclésiastical, the encyclical declares, are excluded by the law from organizations of clubs. It prohibits the publication of ecclesiastical cults, it forbids religious emblems, it encourages rebellion and the corruption of the clergy, penning those who have been punished by bishops or these living with women.

FOREST FIRES NEAR RIVER HEBERT

One Camp and a Dam Burned and Large Numbers of Logs are Afire—Big Force of Fire Fighters Out

Amherst, N. S., May 29.—A serious forest fire has broken out in the lumber camp about four miles from the town of River Hebert. At present it is working towards Southampton and Athol. The property on which the fire started is owned by Kelly Brothers and Kelly & McIver. One camp and a dam belonging to the latter have been destroyed and large quantities of logs are burning.

More than 100 men were engaged last night setting back fires to prevent the spreading of the fire to the surrounding buildings. The properties threatened are among the most valuable in the section. The flames last night were very plainly seen from Amherst.

TIMES ARE BAD IN NEW ENGLAND

Exodus to Canada as a Result is in Progress

(Special to Times)

Boston, May 29.—In consequence of severe textile depression in New England, an exodus to Canada is anticipated during the next two months. In 1907 considerable movement is now in progress. Millions of spindles are idle and during the summer hundreds of mills will be closed. The outlook in all parts of the country for this present is not reassuring.

Today's Springfield Republican expresses "This country is becoming an island of depression in a general sea of industrial prosperity. Business activity is still well maintained in western Europe and its flow has now reached Canada, where money has come into such demand as to depress Canadian exchange on New York well below the gold importing point, and \$4,700,000 of the metal has gone from our field center to Montreal in the past week."

"Why this surrounding flow of business revival refuses so far to spill over into and through the states is a question which Wall street readily answers by referring to tariff uncertainties and continued political agitation against corporatism. "The delay trust decisions were one great cause of business hesitation, but there were other causes also and these remain to be cleared up. We are assured by the oil decision that the industrial mechanism of the country will not be largely torn down and rebuilt, but factors still linger which hold back the work to go ahead with the established industrial machinery. This is certainly better than to be uncertain also respecting the stability of the machinery itself."

ELECTIONS IN PORTUGAL; REPUBLICANS LIKELY WIN

Lisbon, May 29.—(Canadian Press)—Election order prevailed yesterday at the elections for the constituent assembly, which were held throughout the country. In thirty out of fifty-one constituencies the seats were disputed by candidates of the directory of the republican party, the independent republicans and the socialist parties. In the other constituencies the regular republicans were unopposed.

The monarchists abstained from putting forward candidates, declaring that they elected presented no guarantee of liberty or sincerity. Instead they circulated rumors of a counter-revolution, an armed invasion by way of the Galician frontier, and similar attempts against the government. The authorities took extraordinary precautions not only to preserve order but to anticipate any revolutionary movement. Almost the entire fleet was concentrated in the north, but the intervention of armed force was not necessary in any part of the republic.

The polling was very heavy. The first results indicate that a majority of the 231 seats will be regular republicans. A few independent republicans and socialists are likely to win their elections, but the general opinion is that while the government may have to meet certain divergencies of opinion in the assembly there will be nothing like a systematic opposition.

STONE CUTTERS MAKE TWO YEARS AGREEMENT

Toronto, May 29.—(Canadian Press)—The International Stone Cutters' Union have signed an agreement with the employers for two years, calling for wages of 82 1/2 cents an hour. On the expiration of the present contract, the next wages scale is to be settled by arbitration.

LEPERS ARE CURED

New York, May 29.—(Canadian Press)—That leprosy can be cured is apparently demonstrated by the discharge of two patients at the Blackwell's Island Hospital after several years treatment in isolation. The first patient was allowed his freedom eight months ago, but an announcement was made until this week as it was feared that if any publicity were attached to the case, life would be made unbearable for the patient. The second patient a woman, was also discharged some time ago and deported to her old home in the West Indies where she has since married and is living happily. There are still six leprosy patients under the care of the city physicians at Blackwell's Island.

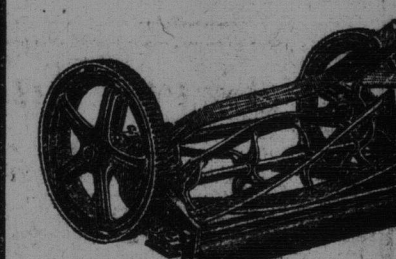

WALL STREET SITUATION; THE VIEWS OF EXPERTS

New York, May 27.—New financing is proceeding steadily. The Union Pacific's twenty-five millions is the most important instance recently. This company's working capital is already large—ample, indeed, for present and some future needs.

But the management is evidencing that the business of bettering and improving is to go on uninterruptedly for a long period, whether business gets more promising or not, and the large work announced some time ago is being pushed with vigor and rapidity.

Outside of some activity in the stock market, business shows no improvement, except in a more hopeful feeling. The stock of demand in the business world for money is discouraging to bankers and they report a piling up of profitless reserves.

But business always moves deliberately in otherwise peaceful times, both in its recession and in its advance, and real improvement can hardly be expected for some time to show clear evidence.

The favorable features are, after all, predominant both in the way of real conditions and of prospects. In the former the most pertinent and the balance of trade is less than a year has swung from a debit to a net credit on the right side, of close to \$179,000,000.

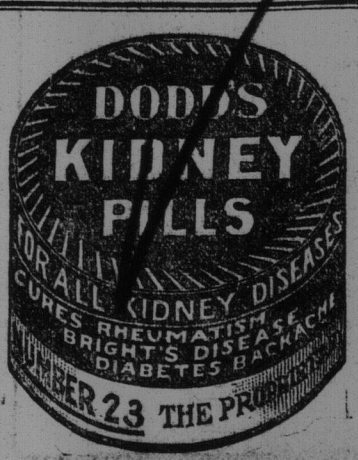

Daily Hints For the Cook

WHITE CAKE.
Cream half cup of butter with 1 1/2 cups of sugar, add one cup of milk, 2 1/2 cups of flour, two teaspoons of baking powder, then the beaten whites of five eggs, quarter-teaspoon of almond flavoring and half-teaspoon of orange flavor. This cake is delicate and fine grained. This can be accomplished only by thorough beating, before the whites of the eggs are added. Fold them in quickly and bake in moderate oven.

APPLE PIE CUSTARD.
Stew quartered apples in a very little water until they are soft, and grate them through a colander. For one pie allow one pint of cooked apples. While they are still hot, mix them with a generous amount of butter, one cup of sugar, two well-beaten eggs and half a cup of cream. Line a deep pie plate with a rich crust, rolled thin, and fill the plate with the prepared mixture. Bake in a quick oven. A meringue may be put over the top if desired after the pie is baked.

FIRST COMMUNION AND CONFIRMATION

Impressive Ceremony in St. Peter's Church on Sunday Morning and Afternoon

The large congregation yesterday morning at the solemn high mass in St. Peter's church, witnessed an impressive ceremony in the reception of their first Holy Communion by nearly 300 little boys and girls. The children occupied the pews on either side of the centre aisle, over which three arches, prettily decorated with greenery and pink and yellow flowers, were affixed on the way to the altar, and they made a pleasing sight, the little girls in white dresses and wreaths of garlands, the boys in dark clothes, each with his or her light-colored wax seal fastened to the top of his or her head.

On the archway at the entrance of the sanctuary were written in letters of white over green shrubbery the words of Christ, "Suffer little children to come unto Me."

Rev. J. H. Borgman, C. S. S. R., was the celebrant at the high mass, assisted by Rev. Fathers Holland and O'Leary. Rev. A. J. Dwyer, C. S. S. R., the rector of the parish, delivered a short but striking address to the children, dealing with the great gift they were receiving. He spoke of the love they should bear toward our Saviour, and how they should model their lives on His. He pleaded in His sight, that they might grow up esteemed by all, and faithful followers of God and children of the church.

In the afternoon at 3:45 His Lordship Bishop Casey presided at the church, and was honored on his arrival by an escort representative of the married and single men of the parish. His Lordship, who formed a double rank through which he passed into the sanctuary and thence to the church. Here His Lordship administered the sacrament of confirmation to 165 candidates, of which ten were adults. He also gave a powerful address on the sacrament of confirmation, explaining its significance, and expressing the wish that all they had been entrusted to the faith by its influence, they should always remain devoted children of God.

The rosary was recited, veasers and benediction celebrated in the evening, and a sermon preached by Rev. J. H. Borgman, C. S. S. R. A large number also renewed their baptismal vows.

The large number of children who yesterday received Holy Communion for the first time have been under the supervision of Rev. Father Duke for some weeks past, and through his careful direction have been prepared for the important event of yesterday.

WHITE PLAGUE FIGHT

Commissioners Home After Making Inspection of Institutions—Dr. McAvaney's Views

After spending five days in the State of Massachusetts in which they visited several of the leading sanitariums for tuberculous patients, and also had conferences with some of the highest authorities in that state on the Jewish plague question, Dr. A. F. McAvaney, Hon. C. W. Robinson, and Dr. D. V. Landry, three of the commissioners of the Jewish Sanitarium in River Glade, arrived in the city Saturday. Mrs. Jordan, another member of the commission, remained over in Boston. She will sail soon on a visit to the Old Country.

From what he had personally observed, Dr. McAvaney said that something should be done to look after the advanced as well as the incipient cases of tuberculosis. In fact he felt that the advanced cases were deserving of even greater attention than the incipient cases. He said that the River Glade institution for incipient cases, he felt that it was almost deplorable that something was not being done for the advanced patients. He did not consider that this work could be accomplished by the local government, but it was one in which the municipalities should interest themselves. During the past year he said that there were something like 118 deaths in this city from tuberculosis, which meant that there must be at the least 1,180 cases deserving of serious attention in the city. When he inquired the Massachusetts authorities of the number of deaths they considered it alarmingly large. As the Jordan Sanitarium would be exclusively for incipient cases, he said the time was ripe for the establishment of a home for advanced cases.

Messrs. Robinson and Landry went through to their homes in Montreal and Buctouche on Saturday at noon.

Arctic Population 1800

Ottawa, May 28—Canada's first census return, showing a population of 1,800 for over 1,000 square miles of territory, has been received at the census bureau. The return covers the 400-mile stretch of territory along the west coast of Hudson Bay, north from Fort Churchill to Chesterfield Inlet and inland as far as the trappers and the Eskimo of that district penetrate.

The figures were gathered during the past winter by the Northwest Mounted Police patrol at Churchill.

Of the total population of the great area only about 200 are whites, the balance being Eskimo, with a few Indians.

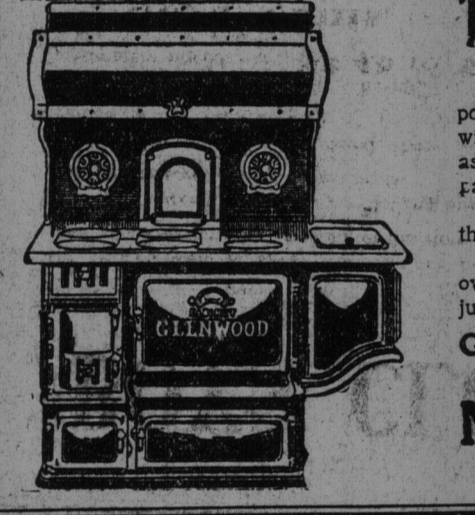
