



Seventy-five carloads of Ford automobiles are on their way to this port for shipment overseas, according to announcement made her yesterday. This is so one result of the maritime mission of The Telegraph-Journal and Times-Star to Central and Western Canada.

The consignment, consisting of 75 cars of automobiles, is coming over the Canadian National lines through Moncton. # ESTABLISHED IN Along The Sport Trail

THE MANY TENNIS PLAYERS in and about this city are beginning to get all "het up" over the anticipated title matches this year Keen rivalry exists between the various clubs and the members are working hard to get in the pink of condition for the games. There are a number of young players, who if they took the game more seriously, would develop into championship calibre. After watching many of them perform the writer noticed a marked carelessness interspersing their play. In serving they seem content to send their first ball crashing into the net and then lob over an easy one to prevent a double fault. There are times when a muddy court will force a player to take such chances, but in ordinary matches where nothing is at stake they should persist in developing their nerve. There is nothing more disconcerting to an opponent than to see the second ball come sailing across the net with speed and accuracy. After the first is lost they usually get ready for an easy one and they are not infrequently disappointed. Another thing only a few players in these parts keep persistently trying to perfect cut strokes. If the players in Saint John and the suburban centres will start right in to study the fine points of the game there is no reason why they should not be able to turn out some of the best players in Canada.

THERE IS A GREAT FIGHT this year for batting honors in the major leagues. First it is one and then another star that forges to the front, but their stay there is usually short lived. Speaker, Cobb and some of the other old timers are well up in the running and are making a strong bid for the leadership.

GENE TUNNEY has expressed a willingness to meet Harry Wills, but insists that he is entitled to meet Jack Dempsey for the heavyweight championship of the world in view of his defeat of Tommy Gibbons. Tunney's victory over Gibbons, while decisive, could hardly be considered impressive enough to warrant him an early match with Dempsey. If it is true that Gibbons was greatly worried over his wife's serious illness then it is a wonder he lasted as long as he did. No man can compete in any serious competition if he is worrying about something else. Tunney should be forced to meet Wills and have it definitely determined which is the better man and the logical contender for the crown. For years the cry has gone out that Dempsey was afraid to meet the colored heavyweight. If Wills can dispose of the conqueror of Gibbons then Dempsey will be forced to defend his championship or retire in favor of the challenger.
