REPORT OF KIRK-SESSION.

The Kirk-Session, in submitting their statement for the past year, feel that while there is much in the spiritual condition of the Congregation which calls for humiliation, there is also much for which they should be devoutly thankful to God.

The Session deeply regret to notice, that while there are two hundred and forty families in the Congregation, there are only two hundred and fifty-two communicants on the Roll. Surely there are many who might come forward and declare themselves on the side of the Lord. The Session regret also that the attendance at Communion is not always as large as might reasonably be expected. The average number is about one hundred and eighty, too few out of a Roll of two hundred and fifty-two. There is cause for sorrow and humiliation in this, and the Session desire the Congregation to join earnestly with them in the prayer that Almighty God would revive his work among us.

The Weekly Prayer Meeting, which is held in the Hall every Wednesday evening at half-past seven o'clock, is faithfully attended by an earnest *few*, but very few considering the number connected with the Congregation. The Session desire to urge this matter upon the consideration of the Congregation generally, and express the hope that many more may feel it to be their *duty* as well as a *privilege*, to spend an hour in the middle of the week in Public Worship.

The Session desire to allude to the importance of introducing the assistance of an Organ into the devotional exercises of the Congregation. By referring to the Organ Committee's report, published herewith, it will be seen that a considerable amount has already been paid into the fund established for the purpose of procuring an instrument. This amount, though encouraging, will have to be greatly increased before the Committee can feel warranted in taking steps to secure an organ, and the sum called for, though large, can easily be obtained by each member and adherent entering vigorously and warmly into the object, when we have no doubt their efforts will be crowned with success.

For assisting the minister when necessary, and as a medium of communication between pastor and people when required, each Elder has a district assigned to him, the Congregation being, for this purpose, divided as follows:—

District No. 1.—Messrs. Creighton and Thompson, Victoria Ward and Portsmouth.

District No. 2.—Messrs. Fraser and Duff, Rideau and Frontenac Wards and Cataraqui Ward to centre of Queen Street.

District No. 3.—Dr. Fowler, Ontario and St. Lawrence Wards and Cataraqui Ward to centre of Queer Street.

District No. 4.—Messrs. Davidson and Craig, Sydenham Ward.

The Session cannot conclude without noticing the consummation of the Union of the Presbyterian Bodies in Canada, and earnestly hope that that event will bring about the result anticipated.

Since our last annual meeting we have to notice the loss of five teachers, viz.: one who is affectionately and warmly remembered by all, and particularly by the Infant Class which she taught—Mrs. Harkness—whose death occurred last September; another, by the retirement of Mr. Geo. Davidson, who has for thirty-seven years been a faithful and zealous instructor of the young, and whose ripe experience can ill be spared; the remaining three by marriage, whom we heartily wish God-speed in their new spheres of labour.

The Annual Christmas Festival was held, also the usual Summer Pic-Nic, both of which were very successful and highly appreciated by the children. It is to be regretted, however, that the adults of the Congregation generally absent themselves from these gatherings, and thus cause a want of encouragement to those who take an active interest in the School.

A new feature in connection with the exercises of the School is the quarterly service held in the Church, when a sermon is preached to the children by their pastor. This meeting is entered into heartily by the scholars.

It is felt that this report cannot be concluded without an expression of thanks to Miss Shannon for her faithful and gratuitous assistance as Organist.

Finally, the members of the school have great reason for gratitude to the Divine Teacher for the degree of success which has attended their efforts throughout the year.

A statement of the receipts and expenditure of the school is appended.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL, PORTSMOUTH, FOR YEAR ENDING 31st AUG., 1875.

During the past year the attendance has been very encouraging. We have on the Roll at present 75 Scholars with a Staff of 8 Teachers. The average attendance for the year, including Teachers, was 67. We have 450 Volumes in the Library. Two papers ("The British Workman" and "Children's Paper") are provided, one of which is given every fortnight. During last year there was collected from entertainments and other sources \$63.39; of this sum \$5.00 was paid to Miss Machar, the Treasurer of the Juvenile India Mission, to assist in the support

of an orphan there ; the balance being spent in providing new Hymn Books, Schemes, and also in a valuable addition to the Library. We use the International Scheme of Lessons with the Shorter Catechism.

On review days we find the interest very much increased and the lessons better impressed upon the mind by using the Berean picture leaves for illustration.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGERS.

To the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Kingston.

The Board of Managers have much pleasure in presenting the following report of the affairs of the Congregation for the financial year ending August 31st; and they feel that they can justly congratulate the congregation on the success which has crowned their efforts for the year.

The Managers saw clearly at the date of their last Annual Report that the revenue, as then receivable by them, could not by any means meet current expenditure and leave any balance towards liquidating the debt due by the congregation. After several meetings had been held, the matter was finally arranged by a thorough canvass of all the members and adherents of the congregation, and the result was exceedingly gratifying. The Managers were convinced by this appeal that it was only necessary to ask the members of the Church to come forward, and the reply would be satisfactory to all, showing very fully the determination of the people to do all in their power to free themselves from even the semblance of debt on the Church property. Many of the largest subscribers doubled their former contribution, and in nearly every case the increase was from fifty to seventy-five per cent. These increased subscriptions are, in all cases, to date from December 1st, 1874. Many of the members preferred to give a single subscription for one year, but a fervent hope is expressed that they will see their way clear to continuance of the amount, annually, for the same period as the others have contributed.

At the same time that these subscriptions were taken up the members were called upon for contributions towards an organ fund, and there is now set apart for that purpose an amount of \$532 30, which, if not large, is still a beginning, and one every way commendable. The Committee indulges the hope that even a larger amount will be available for the current year.

The Committee would also note, among changes worthy of mention, the satisfactory conclusion of the Union negotiations, resulting in the formation of a Presbyterian community in Canada almost the strongest among religious persuasions, and their fervent prayer is, that the Great Head of the Church may bless the united body with a richer outpouring of His goodness and mercy.

The Committee have thought that a more extended Annual Report than usual, would be appreciated by the people, therefore it gives them pleasure to publish the statements of the Kirk Session, the Sabbath Schools, the Ladies' Missionary Association, and the Treasurer of the Schemes, herewith, also a detailed account of the receipts and expenditure of each, to which they invite special attention.

But besides the amounts there shown in detail there are other contributions of the members which the Managers think should be noticed on such an occasion. Among these must be mentioned the Mowat Testimonial Fund, amounting to over \$300; the money collected for the purpose of purchasing a horse for the Rev. Mr. Smith, being \$120, besides payments of other small amounts to various purposes, making the expenditure on this head up to nearly \$500.

It will thus be seen that the congregation during the past year contributed for all purposes nearly \$6,000, a sum which has rarely, if ever, been equalled in the history of the congregation, all which proves the statement that all our people want is to be asked to contribute to a worthy object, and forthwith the necessary funds are ready.

The very full statement of receipts and expenditure published herewith obviates the necessity of any detailed remarks, and the only item to which attention need be directed, is Insurance, for which the large sum of \$162 has been paid, but the congregation will note that the Managers have increased the amount insured by 5,000, and that the policies paid this year are each for three years from the date of issue, thus requiring no expenditure on this head for some time.

The Managers congratulate the congregation that they have been enabled to pay off a large amount of the indebtedness of the congregation, but they cannot close their eyes to the fact that much yet remains to be done. The open accounts are now nearly all paid up, but the congregation still owes \$3,000 of a bonded debt, upon which they are paying interest at the rate of 7 per cent. per annum. These bonds are secured by the following gentlemen, who conjointly are bound to pay them out of their own property, failing the settlement of them by the congregation. While they, as securities, are thus held to make good any loss, the congregation should feel it a sacred duty to relieve them of all danger to their

The Managers beg to state that while they have kept the contributions for the Organ Fund separate, and to the credit of that Fund alone, they have been compelled to use the special contributions towards the debt for reduction of floating debt, which would not have been rendered necessary if the subscribers had been prompt in the payment of their accounts. And the Committee cannot but regret that so large an amount should still appear as arrears, and would urgently request an immediate settlement of the same.

The debts now due by the Congregation are as follows :
