


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

ANNUAL REPORT

FOR SEASON 1881-82.

Montreal Nov. 8th 1882

Gentlemen,

It is my pleasing duty this evening to present to you the Annual Report of your Committee for the season of 1881, and the fortieth in the history of the Club.

The past season was one calculated to throw a damper on Snowshoeing owing to the mildness of the temperature, and scarcity of snow till late in the season, in consequence of which the first tramp on shoes did not take place till January 11th., (this being one of the most unusual occurrences which has ever taken place in the Club.

The number of tramps taken by the Club, during the season were as follows, Wednesdays 8, with an average attendance of 53 and Saturdays 5, with an average attendance of 37. This shows a falling off of 6 in the number of tramps from that of last season, and an increase of 15 in the average attendance; the largest musters being at the Annual Green and open Steeple Chases, averaging 115 each. The races of our own and the other City Clubs also depriving us of a few more Saturday tramps. Sault-aux-Recollect still remains the favorite resort, which place we visited three times, Lachine once and St. Laurent once.

The number of trampers who attend these musters is very small, the majority of those who assemble at the meetings, belong to what should be called the Driving part of the Club, which prefers to drive out to the meeting, in preference to a good walk across the Country.

therefore the pleasure and exercise to be derived therefrom is unknown to them. Your Committee trust that this season, the above party will be a small minority of those who attend the tramps, for if the Club wishes to retain its place at the head of the list of Snow Shoe Clubs, the members should take an active interest in the sport it is our object to promote, and the way to do this is for all to attend the tramps, and do their best to make things pleasant.

To those who have not the courage to face one of these tramps across the Country on account of the distance being too great, we would say, "try one" and feel certain that when the next tramp takes place we will find you helping to swell the number of trampers

The reputation of the Club on the track, and across the country has been as ably upheld this year as in former years. Out of fourteen open races given by our own and other city Clubs, we were successful in winning 13, and besides this, we won several races in Quebec and Point Levis.

The most important trophy captured during the season, was the "Hogan" Cup, which was run for at St. George Club Races and won by D. D. McTaggart of our club in 13 m. 53 sec.

The Club is to be congratulated on this performance, and also in having amongst its members so many fleet and long winded runners, who do so much to maintain the honor of the "Old Club."

The Annual Green Steeple Chase took place on Wednesday evening Jan. 18th. Owing to the mild weather the track was in poor condition and running very hard on the feet, 6 competitors started. The 1st prize was won by G. L. Sait in 23 min. 10 sec.; 2nd C. J. Patton in 24 min. 26 sec. and 3rd, J. Baird in 24 min. 48 sec.

The Annual Steeple Chase was held the Wednesday evening following, 8 competitors started, D. D. McTaggart winning the 1st prize in 20 min 57 sec. followed closely by J. Baird, T. L. Paton, G. L. Sait, A. W. McTaggart and C. J. Patton, it is to be regretted that out of a membership of nearly 500, only 8 competitors should start in this race.

On Saturday Feby. 4th, an event took place which had caused a deal of talk in Snow Shoe circles, viz: the open Steeple Chase to Peloquin's at the Back River. The 1st prize was a gold medal presented by Mr. Peloquin of that place, supplemented by medals

from all competing clubs, two of which, the Emerald and Le Canadien, took part in the race, which was as in the previous race, some two years since, run under the auspices of our club.

The day was very disagreeable for the runners, the wind blowing a perfect gale the thermometer being near zero. There were 14 entries but only 9 faced the starter at 4 o'clock, there being 1 of the Le Canadien, 2 of the Emerald, and 6 of our club. About 200 or 300 members of the different clubs assembled at Peloquin's to see the finish.

The 1st prize was won by D. D. McTaggart of our club, in the excellent time of 41 min. 55 sec. (record), closely followed by Martin and Boyle, of the Emerald and T. L. Paton of our club.

The prizes were presented to the winners by the Presidents of the different clubs, after which the usual snow shoe programme was gone through till 9 o'clock when all started for home, well pleased with the afternoon and evening's sport. Happy to meet. Sorry to start. Happy to meet again.

On the following Saturday the Annual Races took place and were attended by a large number of both ladies and gentlemen. The track was a trifle heavy, but the time made in the different races was very good. The club cup was won by J. Baird in 14 min. 19 sec.. All the open events were won by our own members. It is to be regretted that more members of other Snow Shoe Clubs in the City did not enter in the open races.

The Annual Dinner was held in the Windsor the same evening, there being 75 members and guests present. The chair was occupied by the President Mr. W. L. Maltby, and the vice chairs by Messrs. H. W. Becket and R. D. McGibbon.

Among the members present being several of the "old bloods" of the Club—Messrs. N. Hughes, C. Radiger, W. Stanley and others.

Among the guests were Thos. White, M.P., C. P. Davidson, Q.C., Mr. Judge, of the Quebec club, Messrs Henshaw and Beauvais, Presidents of the St. George and Le Canadien Snow Shoe clubs, and others. The dinner was one of the most successful the Club have had. During the evening the prizes won at the races, were presented to the winners by the President, officers of the club, and by some of the guests.

On account of so many clubs having races, it was decided that we would have no supplementary races this season.

During the season your committee held 8 meetings which were attended as follows: Messrs. H. S. Tibbs and W. D. Aird 8, W. L. Maltby, G. L. Sait and J. L. Gardner 7, R. A. Becket 6, H. W. Becket 5, R. Summerhayes and T. L. Paton 4, G. R. Starke 3, A. W. Stevenson and W. McNab, owing to absence from the city could not attend the meetings.

We have now on our roll 417 paying members including 353 of associated clubs and 67 life members, making a total of 484 members and the Treasurer's Statement shows a credit balance of \$160.38 by which you will see the Club is strong both in numbers and in financial standing.

It is your Committee's sad duty to have to record the death of Nicholas H. Hughes, better known as "Evergreen Hughes," the Honorary President of the Club, which took place May 18th, 1882. His connection with the Club dates back to its infancy, he being one of the founders. In his day he won many a hard fought race and it was one of his greatest pleasures to be with the wearers of the "Tuque Bleue," on their long marches across the Country. He may also be termed the father of snow-shoeing as a pastime and his name is inseparably connected with the history of our Club. Of a kind and genial disposition he was a favorite with all, and his kindly presence (though of late years through ill health, not often with us,) will be missed by all, more especially by the older members with whom he was intimately acquainted. Certainly he has fulfilled the conditions of an expressive couplet from a well-known Snow-Shoe Record Book,

As we pass thro' life, 'mid the world's harsh strife.

Let every season find us,

On the road to fame, with a steadfast aim,

To leave a noble name behind us.

As most of you are aware, a Fund is being raised for a monument to Mr. Hughes, to be placed near the "Pines" and subscriptions thereto (limited to 50c.) will be gladly received by any of our officers.

Other sad deaths have also taken place since last we met, Mr. Andrew Rintoul who died on April 30th, 1882.

Mr. Alex. M. Davidson, who died March, 1882, in Winnipeg, Manitoba. He won the club cup in 1865 and was in his day one of our leading members.

Mr. Wm. Harper, died September 22, 1882, who while a member of the Dominion Club, won the Tecumseh and Ottawa Cups with other leading prizes, and was one of the best men of his day.

Gentlemen,

Another season has passed away and the time has again come round when it is the duty of your Committee to lay before you the Forty-First Annual Report of the Club's doings.

The past season was a very favorable one for Snow-Shoeing, but it was not taken advantage of by our members as it should have been, for although we have over four hundred names on our roll the average attendance at tramps was not as large as it was when the membership was only one quarter of what it is now ; this is to be regretted but could easily be remedied if every member would turn out for at least one tramp during the season which would bring our average attendance up to a very fair number.

By the roll book it will be seen that we have 417 paying and 65 life members making in all 482. Our finances are not in the condition which we would like to see them, there being a deficit of \$84.53.

The first tramp of the season took place on Wednesday the 16th of November when 45 members mustered at the rendez-vous and were entertained to an old fashioned Snow Shoe dinner by our worthy President Mr. W. L. Maltby.

The first tramp on Shoes took place on Wednesday the 13th of December, and the last Wednesday evening tramp, on the 21st of March.

The number of tramps taken during the winter was 19. The average attendance was 50, average number of trampers 27, and the largest turn out 205 (best on record) on the night of the Carnival Torch-light Procession.

Our first Saturday afternoon tramp took place on the 16th of December and the last on the 17th of March. The number of tramps taken during the winter was 8. The average attendance was 11, average number of trampers 8 and the largest attendance at any tramp 20 (Lachine). The small number of afternoon tramps was owing to the number of Race Meetings held during the winter, no less than five Saturday afternoons being set apart for these events.

During the winter the following places were visited :

Sault-aux-Recollets four times, St. Laurent three and Lachine once. The total number of tramps taken during the season was 28.

On Wednesday evening the 3rd of January the Annual Green Steeple Chase took place. Eight competitors started ; the race being won by Mr. J. G. Ross in 23 m. 27 sec.

The following Wednesday the Annual Steeple Chase was won by Mr. D. D. McTaggart in 19 m. 56 sec.

On Wednesday afternoon the 24th, of January the Carnival Steeple Chase took place the course being from McGill College Gate up to the Willows and back again.

The result of the race was as follows :—

On the same evening the Torch-light procession took place, the following clubs forming the procession :—

Montreal (205) leading, Levis Que., (30) St. George (150), Le Canadien (120), Emerald (80), Argyle (40) Prince of Wales (40) St. Andrews (20), Mount Royal (30), Frontenac, Ottawa, (10)

Our members mustered in the Gymnasium where each one was supplied with a torch and some Roman candles or Bengal Lights, after which they formed into line and marched over to the Ice

Palace where the procession formed. When the procession was over the members of the different clubs assembled in the Gymnasium where a few hours were spent in singing, dancing and bounding our "American Cousins".

On Friday evening the 26th of January the Snow Shoe Concert in connection with the Carnival took place in the Queen's Hall. Our President Mr. W. L. Maltby sang a solo, and thirty members of the club sang two of their known choruses, namely, "Tuque Bleue and Tramp, Tramp;" Mr. F. Reipert singing the solo part in the former and Messrs. W. Young and R. Verner the solo parts in the latter.

On the following day (Saturday the 27th) the Carnival Snow Shoe Races took place on the Montreal Lacrosse Club grounds. There were seven open amateur events on the programme, of which the Montreal won five first and three seconds, Emerald, two first and one second and the St. George' three second prizes.

Our Annual Races took place on Saturday the 10th of February. a finer day and track could not be wished for. The Club Cup was won by Mr. J. G. Ross in 13 m. 48 sec. They were five open events of which the Montreal won two, Emerald two and St. George one.

In the evening the Annual Dinner was held in the Windsor, 50 including guests sitting down. The Chair was occupied by Mr. W. L. Maltby and the Vice Chairs by Messrs. H. W. Becket, G. R. Starke and A. W. Stevenson. Among the guests present were Mr. Stearns, U. S. Consul-General, Col. A. A. Stevenson, Col. Patten, Col. E. A. Whitehead, Mr. Thos. White M. P. and the Presidents of the different Snow Shoe Clubs.

On the following Saturday, the Emerald Snow Shoe Club held its Annual Races on the Montreal Lacrosse Club grounds. There were four open events on the programme but, only three were run the hurdle race being left out owing to the impossibility of jumping a hurdle on such a track. Of the three events run the Montreal won two and the St. George one.

On the following Saturday the St. George Snow Shoe Club held its Annual Races on the Montreal Lacrosse Club grounds. The track was in excellent condition. There were four open events

including the "Hogan Cup" all of which were won by members of the "Tuque Bleue." The "Hogan Cup" was won by Mr. J. G. Ross in the excellent time of 12 m. 38 sec.

After the St. George Races were finished the Hurdle Race on the Emerald programme which was postponed, from the previous Saturday, was run, when W. D. Aird of the Montreal achieved a most brilliant victory over the Emerald champion.

On Tuesday afternoon the 27th of February an open Mountain Steeple Chase for a gold medal, presented by Mr. Lumkin, supplemented by medals from the different Snow Shoe Clubs took place. The race was won by Mr. J. G. Ross of the Montreal in the remarkable time of 18 m. 10 sec. (best on record).

As will be seen by the above, the first three men beat the previous record.

On Saturday the third of March the Annual Races of Le-Canadien Snow Shoe Club took place on the Montreal Lacrosse Club grounds. There were three open events all of which were won by members of the Montreal.

On the same afternoon the first Annual Races of the Argyle Snow Shoe Club took place on the Rifle Ranges at Point St. Charles. There were two open events on the Programme, both of which were won by members of the Tuque Bleue. With these races the racing season of 1882-83 closed.

During the winter there were 27 open events with the following result :—

The above Table shows that the old Tuque Bleue still retains its place, having lost but six out of twenty seven events a record of which we may well feel proud.

Friday the 23rd of March may be counted as another red letter day on our Club records. At 9.30 a. m. thirteen members started on a tramp to St. Johns, Que. which had not been attempted by the members for nineteen years. At 10.10 a.m. they left the foot of McGill Street, and after five hours and a half of actual tramping, St. Johns was reached, thirteen all up. After doing ample justice to Monette's dinner the remainder of the time was spent in singing and dancing. Seven o'clock saw them on board the cars homeward bound, and to judge from the skylarking indulged in on the way home, the long tramp had done the boys no harm.

This tramp brought to a very appropriate close one of the best winters for Snow-shoeing which we have ever had.

During the winter your Committee held five meetings, which were attended as follows :—

Messrs. W. L. Maltby, 4, H. W. Becket 2, G. R. Starke 2, H. S. Tibbs 4, D. D. McTaggart 5, W. D. Aird 3, R. A. Becket 1, W. Cairns 4, G. A. Neville 3, T. L. Paton 3, G. L. Sait 4 and 'R. Summerhayes 4.

Your thanks are due Messrs. R. J. Tooke, A. Grant and W. L. Maltby for handsome medals given during the season.

We cannot close this report without referring to the apathy shown by some of the members regarding the Hughes Monument.

We have now 482 members but only 117 names are to be found on the subscription list for this purpose. When the list was started the subscription was placed at the low price of fifty cents in order that every member might be able to subscribe so that a suitable Monument might be erected before the past season closed. But this has not been done, therefore let every member come forward and contribute his small mite so that before another season closes a suitable monument may be erected to the memory of one who has done so much for Snow-shoeing as a pastime, and whom we may call the father of the old "Tuque Bleue."

Gentlemen,

It is again my pleasant duty to present to you the Report of your Committee for the past season, and although financially we come out, so to speak, at the small end of the horn, still we can certainly congratulate the Club on having had in addition to the best team for several years, a larger number of actual players than ever before.

The morning and evening practices were well attended, often there were even too many players on the field.

As you are aware the Club rejoined the National Association at the commencement of the season.

Appended is a recapitulation of the matches played by the First and Second Twelves during the season.

The opening match of the season on our grounds was, according to custom, played on the Queen's birthday between our first twelve and the Caughnawagas, resulting in 2 games to our credit and one to the Indians.

On June 24th, our first twelve played the Independents and lost a very fine match by 2 games to 3.

On July 1st., we, once more tackled the Torontos on their ground and again lost the match by the "odd trick."

The team then went on to Winnipeg and played 3 matches there with the Garry Club, winning the first on the 7th., in 3 straights, the second on the 8th by 3 games to one. and the 3rd on the 10th by 3 games to 2.

On the return of the first twelve from Manitoba a friendly match was played between the 1st and 2nd twelves, resulting in a draw, neither side taking a game.

On the 12th August we met the Champions and very nearly succeeded in wresting the coveted title from them. After losing the first two games, our boys secured the next couplet by some of the prettiest "lacrosse" ever seen in any field and came within an "ace" of taking the fifth. Another defeat was however added to those received at the hands of the Independents and Torontos, though it is to be remarked that in each case the full quota of games was played.

On September 16th, the Torontos came here to play the return match with the first twelve and suffered a heavy reverse being beaten by 3 games to 1.

On the 23rd the Garrys, on a trip east, played our team, and we defeated them by 3 games to 1, also.

On the 30th we played the Independents a second match, and were again beaten by 3 games out of 5.

The second match arranged for the Championship, owing to a misunderstanding, the particulars of which are familiar to you all, did not come off, which was matter for great regret, as our men were in grand condition and would in all probability have succeeded in carrying off the Championship.

Our second twelve did nobly during the season suffering but one defeat at the hands (or rather sticks) of the Young Shamrocks on the 29th July. They won 2 matches with the Montreal Juniors in 3 straights each time. They also defeated the Sherbrooke Club 3 straights at Sherbrooke and in 3 games to 1 on our grounds. They played Caughnawagas and conquered them in 3 straights at Lyndonville; they treated the "Canadien" Club in the same unhandsome

way and paid a visit to the Victorias in Toronto and beat them by 3 to 2.

In addition to the above, there were 3 practice matches between our first twelve and the Reds, in all of which our Club was victorious.

The Smokers vs. non-Smokers and Buffers vs. Duffers matches did not come off as there were too many other engagements.

The Treasurer's Statement which is on the table shews a balance to credit of \$253.37.

The membership roll now contains 492 names, 52 life, 440 paying.

Your Committee held 29 meetings attended as follows :—

Messrs. G. R. Starke 29, H. S. Tibbs 29, W. Cairns 27, R. B. Ross 26, J. L. Gardner 24, T. L. Paton 24, R. Summerhayes 23, J. Kay 21, H. W. Becket 21, G. J. Sheppard 15, A. W. Stevenson 13, Fred. Cushing 13, (elected in place of S. M. Baylis,) S. M. Baylis 2, (resigned). Past Presidents: Angus Grant 14, W. L. Maltby 8, W. G. Beers 3, E. A. Whitehead 1.

During the past year, death robbed us of our Honorary Permanent President, Mr. Nicholas H. Hughes, whose memory will for many years remain in our hearts like the man himself, "evergreen."

You will remember that considerable improvements in the Pavilion on the grounds were made early last spring. The caretaker of the grounds, Robert Marlin, gave satisfaction and we would recommend his re-engagement.

Hoping that the coming season will find us, in spite of the projected "European Trip," with a stronger team than ever, this Report is respectfully submitted

The retiring officers have much pleasure in presenting their Report for the season 1882 to the Fifth Annual Meeting of the Montreal Bicycle Club, and they do so in the hope that the members will acknowledge that they have fulfilled the duties of their position to the best of their ability.

The opening meet of 1882 was fixed for Good Friday, April 5th, but it was not until Saturday 29th April, that we were able to make our bow before an admiring public, when 10 men rode out to Lachine. The closing meet was held November 18th.

During the past season the Club turned out 63 times as against 64 in 1881, and covered a distance of 876 miles, 8 miles more than in 1881. The total attendance at these rides was 562, an average of say 9 to 6½ in 1881.

Of the 63 rides held during the season

- 22 were round the city.

26 rides were cancelled owing to unfavorable weather and as a number of these were fixed for Saturdays, our mileage was considerably reduced thereby.

The longest ride was 68 miles, Nov. 18th, when Messrs. Lane, Muirhead, Low and Pearson rode to Valois, thence to St. Laurent, Back River and home and then out to Lachine and back, breaking the Club record for long ride.

The longest ride previous to this was 50 miles, [when Tibbs and Miller, rode to St. Vincent de Paul, St. Martin, St. Laurent, Lachine and home.] Our roads in this Province do not compare very favorably with those in the United States or in Ontario and in comparing records of rides made in these places with ours, due allowance should be made.

The largest muster was 23, June 30th, when we left for Quebec.

Most of our evening rides were well attended, we having on several occasions as many as 22 present.

The 8 monthly meetings were fairly attended, there being a total attendance of 126 members or an average of 16. This can

easily be improved on without putting our men to any inconvenience and your Committee hope to see a marked improvement in the attendance during the coming season.

Much more interest was manifested in racing this season than any year since the formation of the Club. Exclusive of our annual race meeting, a report of which will be found further on, the following events were contested.

The race following, was our road race to Lachine, 10 miles (handicap) 22nd July, which brought out 7 "good men and true." Eight had entered, but A. T. Lane was unable to start owing to a bad fall received the night before the race. The competitors arrived in the following order :

- H. S. Tibbs acted as starter and J. D. Miller as judge, at the finish. A strong head wind was blowing, or no doubt the time would have been considerably reduced.

On 5th August, a 3 mile race was held at the Caledonian Society's Games on Lacrosse Grounds with the following result.. 1st. F. C. Holden, 2nd. J. Low, 3rd. A. T Lane, 4th. W. J. Farquharson. Owing to the division of the riders into classes, Farquharson took 3rd prize although coming in 4th

At the Firemen's Games, 9th September, a 5 mile race was contested, Messrs. Ross, Low, Smith, Tibbs and Muirhead took part, coming in, in the order named. Winner's time 20.22. This race proved to be the event of the day and excited great enthusiasm among the spectators. The first three riders might have been covered with a table cloth so close were they at the finish.

On the evening of the same day Messrs. Smith and Ross, started for Toronto to take part in some Bicycle Races to be held there on the Monday following, under the auspices of the Toronto Exhibition Committee. F. C Holden had already gone up on Friday night. Through most culpable mismanagement, Ross and Smith had to return without getting a chance to "lick or get licked," and Holden who stayed over, won the 3 mile handicap. The treatment received by these gentlemen is certainly not calculated to induce others of our men to travel some 340 miles, only to get a chance to travel back again.

The next races were the 1 and 5 miles, held at the Annual Fall Championship Games of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association. In the 1 mile, G. M. Smith, had an easy victory in 3.44, his competitors, Messrs. Tibbs and Lane, being entirely out of form. Three entered in the 5 miles, Messrs. Ross, Low and Holden, the latter winning in 19.55 after a very close race, Ross 2nd. Low, 3rd.

At the games of the Bank Athletic Association, 14th October, a two mile handicap race was contested, Messrs Ross, Low, Arthur, Farquharson and Lane started, Ross winning, no time was kept.

Our second Annual Race Meeting was held September 2nd. on the Lacrosse Grounds. Although our races were not a pecuniary success, yet otherwise they were all that could be desired.

In the face of such strong counter attractions viz., the advertised Championship Lacrosse match between the Shamrock and Independent clubs, etc. our receipts were very good, which goes to prove the strong hold Bicycling has on the affections of our sport-loving public. Only one outside wheelman was present, Mr. Laurent, Bugler, Quebec Bicycle Club, but the results of the various events on our programme proved that our own riders can offer a first-class afternoon's sport. All the races were well contested, the 5 mile particularly so.

The following is a list of the events with the winners names.

One mile [4th class] club, five entered, W. F. Cochrane, W. Starke, R. Macculloch, W. C. Bessey and H. Shaw, won by R. Macculloch in 3. 51½.

One mile open to all amateurs, Basil Hoch, Winnipeg, Hy. Holland, Point St. Charles, G. M. Smith, A. T. Lane, and H. S. Tibbs, entered and all started except Mr. Hoch. won by G. M. Smith in 3.44½, H. S. Tibbs second.

100 yards run [in heats,] won by G. H. Wood [S. L. Club,] in 10½ sec. W. R. Thompson was the only other competitor.

One mile for boys under 15, on wooden machines, was contested by A. Holden, E. P. Hannaford Jr. and C. De Casnova, won by E. P. Hannaford Jr. in 5.40.

Two mile [3rd class] club. J. A. Muirhead, W. F. Cochrane, R. Macculloch and W. C. Bessey, started, Bessey winning in 8.06.

Two mile [2nd class] club. Five started, John Low, W. G. Ross, W. J. Farquharson, Alan Arthur and A. Grant Ferrier, won by J. Low in 8.20½.

One mile [foot] open, was contested by R. A. McDonald, Thos. Moffat, N. Fletcher and Jas. Baird, won by Moffat, in 4 48½.

One mile obstacle, club, Alan Arthur, F. C. Holden, W. C. Bessey and G. M. Smith, won by G. M. Smith in 4.50.

Three mile [1st class] club. W. G. Ross, G. M. Smith, A. T. Lane and H. S. Tibbs, won by W. G. Ross in 12.06½.

One mile open to boys under 15, D. B. Holden, G. Angus, P. N. Evans and E. P. Hannaford Jr. won by G. Angus, in 4.10.

440 yards [foot] open, Thos. Moffat, N. Fletcher and W. G. Robertson, won by N. Fletcher in 53½ sec.

One mile [combination,] W. G. Ross, F. Macculloch, Alan Arthur and F. C. Holden, entered but only the first 3 gentlemen started, W. G. Ross winning in 7.00. In this race the competitors walked a lap, ran a lap, wheelbarrowed a lap, back wheel in front and on the ground, pushing by the handles a lap and rode a lap, while apparently a simple race is really a very fatiguing one

Five mile [open,] 6 entered but only Messrs. Low, Holden and Tibbs started, Holden winning in 20.57, Low second.

The afternoon's sport wound up by an exhibition of club drill given by twelve members.

Our annual dinner at the Windsor on Saturday evening, proved a very enjoyable affair, although it was rather slimly attended, and we trust that our next dinner may be equally successful.

During the season we received visits from Mr. Fred. S. Pratt, Worcester, Mass. Director L. A. W., Kingman N. Putnam, Corresponding Secretary L. A. W. New York, R. H. McBride, Toronto, Ont., Mr. Laurent, Quebec, Mr. Pringle, Capt. Teviotdale Club, Hawick, and J. D. Shatford, late Director L. A. W. for Lower Provinces.

The excursions on Saturdays, staying over night and returning Sunday evening, were not quite as numerous as those of the previous year but proved very enjoyable.

On Saturday Aug. 5th, Messrs. Tibbs, Trotter and Muirhead went to Terrebonne, Capt. Tibbs went on to Mascouche [6 miles,] and returned by train the same evening, Messrs. Trotter and Muirhead returning on Sunday.

On Saturday 19th Aug. Messrs Tibbs, Trotter, Muirhead, Cochran and Goldstein left for Terrebonne, Goldstein left the rest at St. Vincent de Paul and returned by train. J. D. Miller left the city sometime after the rest had started, and stayed over at the Back River expecting the others to return that way, instead of which they came home by Longue Pointe, and he was forced to wend his way homewards by himself on Sunday afternoon.

Moonlight Riding was not an extraordinary success last season as very frequently the "silent friend of the Gas Company," was not only "silent" but also "invisible."

Your Committee would recommend doing away with the sectional plan, as it has not proved satisfactory.

The chief event of last season, if we except our Annual Races and Dinner, was our "Trip to the Ancient City," on Friday evening 30th June, in the good steamer "Quebec." The trip down was simply grand, that is as long as day light lasted. Most of us "sought the seclusion that our cabins grant" about 11.00 p.m. and were awake betimes in the morning, but alas on tumbling out on deck, imagine our disgust on finding a dark lowering sky with high cold winds; and every prospect of rain in the very near future. It might be remarked here that this prospect of rain was fulfilled in every respect. On reaching Quebec we were met by Capt. Campbell and several members of the Quebec Bicycle Club and escorted to the Skating Rink where our wheels were stored, while we adjourned to the St. Louis for breakfast, after which we returned to the Rink, mounted our wheels and rode off to the Dufferin Terrace, where it had been arranged that we were to give an exhibition of drill. The crowd on the Terrace was so great that we could scarcely manœuvre, but we managed to put through a few evolutions, when down came the rain and drove us all back to the Rink.

On Saturday night we were entertained at a dinner given by the Quebec Bicycle Club when a jolly time was spent. The rain continued until Monday morning, in consequence of which our Sunday had to be spent under cover. On Monday we drove out in carriages to Montmorenci Falls, J. H. Low and a member of the Quebec Bicycle Club pluckily riding their wheels out and in through the mud. On Sunday afternoon seven of our men returned by train, the rest

left on Monday evening by boat. This trip would have proved more enjoyable with fine weather, but as it was, we had a jolly time.

The retiring officers would recommend to the particular attention of the incoming committee, the classification of racing men, which was started last year, one season's experience was not long enough to determine its merits. They would also recommend that no larger amount than \$100, be expended for prizes for our next Annual Race meeting. While on this subject it would perhaps be as well to take into careful consideration, whether our Annual Race meeting had not better be merged into the Fall Games of the

Montreal Amateur Athletic Association. They would recommend to the members the desirability of paying more attention to Drill exercise, as a means of drawing favorable attention to the club. Last season's practices were very poorly attended, every thing considered, and your Committee trust to see a very marked improvement in that respect, provided any one can be found to undertake the task of organizing a Drill Squad.

A graceful and very pleasing event, [particularly to the recipient] was the presentation to your Secretary, of a very handsome silver tea service, on the occasion of his marriage.

You have to confirm [or otherwise] the Constitution and By Laws adopted at the special meeting of 22nd March.

You will notice that some radical changes have been made, the chief of which are the subsidiary subscription and withdrawing as a Club from the L. A. W.

Your Committee are of the opinion that it is the better way to allow any individual member that wishes, to join either the L. A. W. or the C. W. A or the C. T. C. rather than that it should be compulsory on every member to join either one or the other or all.

An offer from the Publishers of the "Wheelman," a journal you are all doubtless acquainted with, offering on certain conditions to publish an illustrated history of the Club, will be read to-night. As this history will cause the Club to become widely advertised, your committee are of the opinion that it would do us a great deal of good and they trust that the members will possess enough "*esprit du club*" to agree to the conditions required by the publishers.

As most of you know, a riding school has been established in the large hall, Wednesday evenings, and we hope you will bring your friends to be taught to ride at once.

The Treasurer's Cash Statement is on the table, duly audited and found correct.

The regular accounts of revenue and expenditure with balance sheet will be presented with those of the Lacrosse and Snow-shoe Clubs to the Annual Meeting of the Association in May.

GENTLEMEN,—

The Directors of this Association have great satisfaction in presenting to you their report for the year past, shewing as it does, the rapid progress in every branch which has been made during that period.

The Financial Statement duly circulated among the members requires a few explanations to enable you to comprehend the fact that, although by it, the Association appears to have retrogressed some \$70. during the year; in reality it is not so, but has increased its true capital some \$500.

At the close of the year 1881-2 there were several amounts outstanding which were lost sight of, in making up the books, such as Advertising, Gas, Interest, and Prizes for the winter competitions amounting in all to nearly \$600. This year you will please observe that all outstanding accounts have been estimated carefully at \$650 and appear as a liability of the Association. The capital, therefore, as shewn now is correct but the expenditure of the past year is made to appear some \$600. larger than it in reality was. A rough estimate of the coming years revenue and expenditure will shew on how satisfactory a footing the concern is established.

According to the decision reported to the last Annual Meeting the Emblem, Badge and Motto of the Association have been registered in the office of the Minister of Agriculture at Ottawa and any unauthorized party making, selling or using any of the same, is liable to a penalty.

No competition was held in this department.

Previous to that date we received from them the interest of their funds invested. Some time ago we made a proposition to them that we would keep open the Mercantile Library and Reading Room furnishing all the current literature of the day and would carry out all the objects of their Association if the property were handed over to this Association in a similar manner to that in which the Montreal Gymnasium transferred the Building of our clubhouse, for which their members would be made life members of the Building. This we understand the Executive of the Mercantile Library were willing to do, but owing to the objections raised by one or two of their members were prevented from carrying it out.

If this plan were adopted the Association could annually add to attractions of the library and reading-rooms and in time afford the young men of the city a first class literary resort at a merely nominal fee. We have no doubt that if the Mercantile library could be brought to look at this matter in the proper light they would accede to the above proposition at once.

CHAIRMEN OF COMMITTEE'S REPORTS.

Montreal, May 1883.

To the President and Directors of the M. A. A. Association,

Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting the Report of the Gymnastic Department for the season of 1882-83 now closed. I regret however that we cannot congratulate ourselves upon any important accomplishments either in increased attendance or in the interest taken in the classes by the members, the usual competitions having been omitted for lack of sufficient competitors willing to enter and capable of standing the test of a competition such as should be recommended by your Chairman.

At the beginning of the season, being fully alive to the requirements of this important branch of our Association, you authorized your Chairman to secure the services of a competent man to take charge of the classes as Instructor, and with your approval he arranged with Mr. Wm. Cooper of Quebec, who, from all accounts received, appeared to be fully competent to fill the position, but as his engagement did not prove satisfactory his services were dispensed with. This of course disorganized the classes to a great extent, the impression getting abroad that they would be discontinued, but in this dilemma Mr. Millard, at the solicitation of your chairman, consented to assume the lead of the classes and endeavor to reconstruct them, leaving the question of recognition of this services entirely in your hands. But notwithstanding his faithful and assiduous attention to the duties assumed, to which I have much pleasure in testifying, the attendance fell away, he being on hand many evenings without any class at all. This however may be attributed in a very great measure to the exceptionally fine wintry weather and the event of the Carnival giving an unusual impetus to out door sports to the exclusion of all others, Mr. Millard's ability to perform the duties required of him, being

unquestioned. At the end of February, when the weather became unfavorable for out door sports, a few members returned to their allegiance and a small class was reformed and some interest taken till the close of the season March, 30th, but this being of the nature of all "spirts" was not of any lasting benefit.

The fact therefore remains that Gymnastics, in my opinion the branch of athletics of most real benefit to those desirous of improving their physique, do, not hold the place in the esteem of the members that its importance demands, and the pressing question for us now is, how can this be remedied ?

In my opinion the remedy is largely in the hands of the members themselves, who, unless inspired by a high ideal of physical development and a desire to reach it by the training of their bodies by means of the appliances at hand and a few which might be added with benefit to the Institution, will not derive much good from the Gymnasium even under the stimulus of an unlimited number of medals and expensive acrobatic instructors.

Having lately visited the magnificent Hemenway Gymnasium at Harvard College, Cambridge Mass, and admired its splendid appointments and the completeness of its arrangements and appliances, the idea occurred to me that to the extent of the resources at our command we might with advantage adopt some of the appliances in use there, and generally to take it, as our model as it is now admitted to be an almost perfect gymnastic institution. To this end correspondence was opened with Dr. Sargent, its well known and able Director, with the double object in view, first to obtain such general information as might be of use to us, as to the internal arrangements of the Gymnasium, the interest taken in gymnastics by the members, percentage of attendance &c. &c. second the probable cost of some of the most essential pieces, of the chest weight apparatus, of which he is the inventor, and which tends so largely to make physical culture as popular there as it appears to be. In this connection we are indebted to Dr. Sargent for his prompt and courteous attention, and the valuable information contained in newspaper reports, handbooks, &c. supplied us, is fyled herewith for future reference, the letter accompanying them, containing information and hints of much practical moment is, with his tacit permission here inserted :

Dear Sir,

Your letter of enquiry concerning the Gymnasium and system pursued at Harvard was duly received.

A great many newspaper articles have been published about the Hemenway Gymnasium,—its developing appliances, and the system pursued—but no official publication has yet been issued. Perhaps the description given in Harper's Weekly (which I send you) is as good as any. Will also send you a Hand-book which will give you some idea of the card system pursued. The nucleus of the apparatus was taken out of my New York institution, and all of the appliances, and internal arrangements were designed by myself.

The invention of so many different pieces of apparatus grew out of a demand which I have long since felt of special exercises to meet individual cases. In giving instructions to classes years ago, I was very much interested in watching the different effects which the same exercises had on different individuals.

The result of my experience, together with the natural objections which generally accompany class work led to the adoption of the present system. After taking my medical degree, I used the system in New York with great success. Having been trained to gymnastics and athletics from my youth I was also prepared to adapt it to college requirements. *That you may know something of the success that has attended the system at Harvard, I will say that when I came here, we had 474 lockers, which the authorities thought never would be used. We have had to increase from year to year until we now have 825 all taken, with many unsupplied.*

85 per cent of all the students use the Gymnasium more or less.

*During the months of January, February and March, three and four hundred are at work during an afternoon. The effect on the Athletic interest has been to raise the standard of all of our exhibitions, both in point of merit and public appreciation. The effect upon the general health of the students is so marked, that it is commonly observed by all of the town's-people. **The physical examinations are the basis of the whole system, the harmonious development of the body, independent of any athletic success, is the first incentive with the vast majority.***

In response to a prize offered by a gentleman (outside) for the best development during the year, we have had something like 80 odd entries,

The sentence. "The harmonious development of the body independent of any athletic success," embodies a principle that if generally adopted by our members, would go far to ensure to them, the benefits the gymnasium offers, and that these may be made more immediately available and attractive to members, especially to that large number who have no desire to excel in the showy gymnastic feats, I beg to submit the following recommendations.—

That new apparatus known as the "Harvard chest weight apparatus," be ordered as per schedule and placed in position as soon as possible and added to as found desirable, the gymnasium overhauled, repaired, and tinted, and generally made as attractive and comfortable, as possible, using in this way, as an experiment for this year at any rate, the sums we have been paying for the services of instructors: which might profitably be dispensed with, if members could only be inspired with the sentiments attributed by Dr. Sargent to his pupils and induced to *work themselves up for their own good*. This I am prepared to admit might be better done under proper direction, and to secure this, arrangements might be made with some medical man interested in athletics and conversant with the apparatus, who for a small fee would examine the candidate and recommend the proper exercises and amount to take, giving at the beginning and end of the season, a certificate of physical measurements showing the improvement made.

MONTREAL JUNIOR LACROSSE CLUB

Montreal April, 1883.

In submitting to you the Annual Report of the work done by our Club during the past season, I may say that owing to the many disadvantages, under which we were laboring, our success was not a very brilliant one, yet it possesses many encouraging features.

Our regular practice as a club did not commence till the end of June instead of the beginning of May as in previous years. This was owing to the fact that the Montreal Club refused to allow us the use of their grounds, on account of some of our members exceeding the age limited by our bye-laws (18 years) and pending the decision of the question, some of our best players joined other clubs, while under the impression that the affair would not be settled to the satisfaction of all parties therein concerned. It might be well to state here that the affair was settled, and the age extended to 20, up to which age a player is considered a junior by the rules of the National Lacrosse Association of Canada.

Our team played six matches winning three and losing as many.

The opening match of the season was played with the 2nd team of "Montreal" on the morning of the 24th May, owing to the unfavorable state of the weather, some of the players of both sides did not put in an appearance, so that the match was played with nine men only on each side and resulted in a defeat for our team, our opponents taking three games to our one.

Our players were:—Messrs T. Trihey, T. Carland, W. McKay, J. McGoldrick, W. Norval, J. Findlay, W. Brady, W. McCaffrey, and D. Labonte.

On July 8th our team again crossed sticks with the 2nd twelve of Montreal Club, who were considerably strengthened with the services of three of our best men who had previously joined them, this weakened our team in proportion, which again suffered a defeat of three "straight" in 25, 50 and 40 minutes respectively, which time tends to show that our defence was a strong one, the "Home" however being weak, our players were F. Crosby, R. Norman, W. Locke, R. Burke, Allan Cameron, Jas. Michaud, W. McCaffrey, T. Carland, W. Geraghty, W. Brady, W. Bark, and R. Lennon,—Capt. G. Sheppard.

On July 22nd, our team played and defeated the "Our Boys," by three "straight" in 5, 5 and 2 minutes respectively the play being altogether in our favor. Our players were F. Crosby R. Norman, R. Burke, A. Cameron, W. Coleman, H. Herbert, J. Michaud, T. Carland, W. Geraghty, W. Bark, and R. Lennon,—Capt. T. L. Paton.

On July 29th our team went to Cote St. Antoine and defeated the local team by three straight games in 10, 5 and 2 minutes respectively, our players being the same as in our previous match on 22nd.

On August 12th our team crossed sticks with LeCanadien Lacrosse Team, and were again victorious, winning three games to our opponents two, the play being pretty even. Our players were F. Crosby R. Lennon, W. Pingel, J. Michaud, T. Carland R. Norman, W. Brady, W. Geraghty, J. Hasley, R. Burke, W. Burke, and Allan Cameron,—Capt. J. W. Woods.

On August 19 our team went to Cornwall where they played the Young Canadians of that place and were defeated by three straight games in 38, 22 and 28 minutes respectively. Our team met with a hearty reception, so much so, that several of them remained over until Monday, arriving in town about 9.15 a. m.

A return match was arranged with Le Canadien Lacrosse Club of

this city to take place in Aug. 29th, but owing to their not putting in an appearance the match was indefinitely postponed.

I regret to have to renew the complaint made by the Secretary last season, that certain unknown persons broke into our dressing room and after breaking the boxes, appropriated all the lacrosses and wearing apparel contained therein.

During the season fifty members paid their subscription showing a decrease of some thirty members from the preceding season.
