



SIXTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

1. The Trustees and Managers of the House of Industry beg to submit the reports of the affairs of the Charity for the year ending 31st March, 1898, being the Sixty-first Annual Report.

INMATES.

2. Your Directors having exhausted every means to induce the City Council to grant funds for increasing the accommodation for inmates without success—resolved to withdraw a sufficient sum from the invested capital for the purpose and now report to the subscribers that an addition of an East wing is nearing completion at the cost of \$4,500, which will afford accommodation for fifty additional inmates and it is hoped in the near future to still further increase the accommodation by a similar addition of a West wing.

The income for maintenance will by this expenditure be materially reduced and in consequence we must depend upon the charitable public for increased contributions, not only to recoup the loss of income but for maintaining an increased number of inmates.

The number of permanent inmates at present in the House is 103, including 3 blind men and 14 cripples, but this number will be largely increased when the new wing will be ready for occupation about 1st July next. For further particulars attention is directed to the accompanying Superintendent's Report.

OUTDOOR POOR.

3. The number of families relieved during the year ending 31st of March is still large, but less than the number relieved the previous year by 195. The stone-breaking test now being applied to all able-bodied men applying for relief may be a factor in reducing the number relieved as 211 men refused the test and consequently the assistance applied for was not granted.

The following table shows the changes in comparison with the previous year :

CASUALS.

4. By reference to the Report on Casual Poor it will be observed that a very large reduction in the average number sheltered each night in the Lodge has taken place. This is owing to the stone-labor test being rigidly applied, and also to the determination of the management to shelter only the homeless of the city for more than three nights in succession, so that casuals properly belonging to other municipalities had to move on after three days.

For the year 1896-7 the average number sheltered every night was 100 while the past season the average number is only 40.

5. The subscribers and friends of the Charity are referred to the accompanying Reports of the various Standing Committees and of the Superintendent for full details of the working of each department in connection with the Institution.

6. The spiritual welfare of the inmates is not overlooked. The regular religious services are maintained and a Committee of interested ladies devote much time and labor to advance their best interest having regard to their circumstances and infirmities.

7. Mr. Laughlen, ably assisted by his wife, continues to discharge the duties of Superintendent to the entire satisfaction of the Board.

8. The Matron, Mrs. North, assisted by her daughter, devotes her energies to looking after the domestic affairs of the House to the satisfaction of the Board.

9. The Treasurer's Statement furnishes information as to the receipts and disbursements of the combined work of the Charity, but the Superintendent's Report gives the separate details of the cost of each department. The receipts from all sources amounts to \$20,997.37 and the disbursements to \$21,731.54 showing an overdraft at the bank of \$734.17.

REPORT OF CASUAL POOR COMMITTEE.

To the Board of the House of Industry:

HOMELESS POOR OF TORONTO.

The number who found shelter at the Wayfarers' Lodge for the year, April, 1897, to April, 1898, was 377; the number the year before being 441. There were 11 whose age was less than 20, and 45 whose age was between 20 and 30. The total number of nights these were in the rooms of the House was 8,455; and the cost of maintenance was \$1,426.59.

The number of men who came from outside the city and found shelter in the Lodge last year was 1,015, as against 1,094 the year before: the youngest lad admitted was only 12 (father and son were together, one night only), and the oldest man was 85. The total number of nights granted to this class was 2,746. The cost of maintenance was \$353.66. Therefore the total number of men in the Wayfarers' Lodge for the past year was 1,392, the year before it was 1,535. During the year 71 women found shelter in the House, therefore total number of persons was 1,463.

The total cost of the Lodge for the year was \$1,780.25, as against \$1,954.64 the year before last.

The thanks of the House are due to the City Corporation for supplying an ample quantity of stone for the application of the labor test, which was rigidly enforced on the Casuals during the past winter months. The quantity broken was 68 $\frac{3}{4}$ tons, which is now being carted out of the yard and put upon the streets of this city.

All those who have the management of the Lodge did the work required of them, faithfully and satisfactorily.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OUTDOOR RELIEF.

GENTLEMEN.—It is with sincere satisfaction that your Committee can state that never was the work of the District Visitor more efficiently maintained than during the past winter. The Board can feel assured that so long as there are men qualified by intelligence and by goodness of heart ready to visit the homes of need and suffering in this city, they will not require to consider the question of a paid officer to dispense charity to the poor in our midst. It is quite interesting to notice that the example of this Board is being followed in other larger cities where the paid officer was the dispenser of aid to the poor. In Boston the Board now consists of three non-paid divisions each consisting of seven members. The result of this non-paid or free service is most gratifying as set forth in the report for the past year of work amongst the poor in that enterprising city.

Your Committee desire also to mention how ready they have always found the Superintendent of this Institution to aid them in every possible way.

During the winter a meeting of the Visitors was held in the Board Room. Various matters were earnestly considered. Difficulties experienced by Visitors were mentioned and the

best methods of meeting such were suggested. Whilst discrimination was urged as important, lest public money should be misapplied, it was generally felt that "to love mercy" must ever be the predominant feature of our work.
