FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
GIRLS' HOME, 1898.

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TIME in its rapid flight brings to the Managers of the Girls' Home the duty and the pleasure of presenting to their friends and subscribers the forty-second annual report of the Institution. It must necessarily be brief, as the incidents connected with the Home's work vary very little from year to year.

88 children were in residence October 1st, 1897. 45 admitted during the year. 58 discharged. 75 in residence October 1st, 1898. Average stay per child, $234\frac{1}{2}$ days. Total cost of maintenance, including all expenses connected with the Home, \$5,742.89, which gives the cost per day for each child at $18\frac{1}{3}$ cents.

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All our children this year are from the City. Applications for admission have been received from different places throughout Ontario; but on learning that a fee is required, the applicants have not been heard from again.

The majority of the children now brought to us are of respectable parentage, and come in consequence of adverse circumstances; a mother going to the hospital for treatment, a widowed father, or one out of employment—these are some of the causes which bring crushed or broken-hearted parents to seek care and protection for their loved ones. In relieving them of their responsibilities for a while, the Management bears its portion of weight and care, and our Home becomes a refuge from anxiety.

We have had disappointments in some of our indentured girls, and from others good records have been received; on the whole, we have greater cause for thankfulness than regret. The increasing demand from districts where one of our girls has been placed, is proof to us that industry and integrity are being shown and valued. We regret that although our Indenture is sustained by the Court, it has given parents the right to know the address of the foster-home.

In every indentured case, the privilege of communication by letter is allowed between parents and children, through the medium of the Home; but as soon as an address is given, which the Management has withheld for some good reason, petty annoyances and the influence of parental authority usually follow, to the discomfort of those concerned in the well-being and the moral bringing-up of these children. We have just now a case in point. A girl writes "that she is happy and contented and has a good home, but her father will not let her alone. She wants to remain where she is, but wishes to please him. She does not want to do anything naughty (*i.e.*, run away); what will she do?" Another girl writes: "Please do not tell mother where I am. I do not want to live as she has lived." The home link is maintained as far as practicable, and when girls attain their majority, they are, we earnestly hope, so trained that they can judge for themselves of the better way in life, and by their example and influence help to improve the homes from which they were rescued. May we look for co-operation in this important matter from our judicial Bench?

You will see by the Treasurer's Statement that a very small amount was received from the house-to-house collections, and that again some of the bequest money had to be taken to carry on the work. The Management regret this exceedingly, and earnestly hope the collectors may find many more interested and generous subscribers, so that the deficiency will be soon made up.

The general health of the children has been good for so large a family. Grateful thanks are due to Dr. Adams for his dental care of the children, and to the Medical Staff for kind and prompt attentions, which in many instances are a preventive to serious illness. In May, Dr. Patton joined the staff, and during the summer has given most kindly of his services. Dr. Leila Skinner has been appointed in the place of Dr. Susannah Boyle, who leaves the City for a new field of labor, and bears with her our good wishes for future success and our grateful thanks for her past gratuitous services.

The Sunday School continues, to be well superintended by Miss Elliott, with her faithful band of willing workers. The Ven. Arch-Deacon Boddy zealously, week by week, teaches a class of

elder girls the "things of heaven, things of earth," preparing them for their sphere and duty of life.

The Misses McKee and McMaster give earnest, painstaking work in the school-room, giving to the child of want and care "education as common as the glorious sunshine, what was once a luxury to the few."

Many kind friends have helped to make the hot summer one of enjoyment. Hanlan's Point, with its swings and merry-go-rounds; boat rides on the bay; their respective Sunday-school picnics; a sail to and from Hamilton,—all these were bright, happy days of youthful pleasure. Balmy Beach picnic, by the kind invitation of Mrs. Barnett to her grounds, was one of the jolliest outings of the season. The day was charming, and the children were allowed to scamper and frolic at their "own sweet will." They had also the delight of childhood—that of wading and splashing in the water on the beach. Kind friends contributed most generous supplies of sandwiches, cake and delicious milk, which was enjoyed as only youthful appetites can appreciate such dainties. The last touch of kindness was given by the children of Mr. and Mrs. Flavelle, who graciously handed a bag of candies to each child as she passed through the gate *en route* for home. Just here we would thank the Street Railway Company for the privilege of the Belt Line ride, which was a fresh-air treat as well as an object lesson on the growth and improvement of our City. Thanks are again due to kind Mr. Withrow for his invitation to the Industrial Fair, which all appreciate and enjoy.

In thanking St. Peter's Lend-a-Hand for its kindness in sewing garments, the Management feels it holds the banner bright and high among the many contributors to the comfort and needs of the Home's large family. All in it are helpers—the organizer whose busy brain suggests and plans, the willing helpers, the poor woman, the contributors to the fund through which these poor women are paid, all indirectly give of their sympathy to the great work in which we are engaged. We feel very grateful to Mr. Neville for his courteous attention and advice in all our legal troubles.

To our Auditors for their kindness and gratuitous services in auditing the Treasurer's statement; to the Government and City

Council for their respective grants ; to the Proprietors and Editors of our City papers,—to these and the many others who have contributed to, or have been interested in, the Home's welfare, the Directorate pray

" That God Eternal
Will shower all blessings free,
In hearts that live to love Him
And cling to charity."

It is with extreme regret that the Board of Management receives the resignations of two of their most capable and useful members—that of Mrs. Grace Denison, who has been the faithful Treasurer for ten years, but now, through ill health and her many duties, feels it compulsory to retire; that of Mrs. Fletcher, the assiduous Corresponding Secretary, whose ill health necessitates the withdrawal from a work which was a labor of love. To both, the Board of Management desire to express their gratitude and appreciation for their kind and able services in the many arduous duties that belong to these peculiar and responsible positions, which they so ably fulfilled and so thoroughly understood. It is the earnest hope that although removed from active duty, their interest in the Home's progress will not abate.

The wishes of the Board of Management have continued to be most faithfully carried out by our esteemed Matron, Mrs. Bright. The extreme heat of the summer affected her general health; we are thankful she is quite well again and, with her assistant, doing all she can to promote the comfort and happiness of those entrusted to her guidance and influence.

In February, Mrs. Bowers, who had been the well-trying and competent assistant to Mrs. Bright for many years, was laid to rest. Rev. Arthur Baldwin kindly conducted the funeral services in the Board-room. She had no relatives; but all that friendship could do was done by Mrs. Bright. The children placed a lovely wreath of flowers on the bier, and as they walked past singing "Nearer, my God, to Thee," they gazed for the last time on the kindly face of one who had served them and the Home in faithfulness and devotion.

"Our task, long since begun, will never end while suffering has a boon to ask" or there are those who seek the joys and comfort of a happy home. To these our doors are ever open, and in gratitude to God for the daily mercies we receive, let part of our religion be to minister unto and for these who are dependent upon strangers for the love and protection of which they have been deprived.

'Tis sympathy for others' pain,
'Tis heart, and mind, and patience rich,
'Tis loving kindness, failing never.

Cultivating these higher feelings and qualities, as Christians, we look forward to one day being developed in an infinitely higher degree than can ever be attained here.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting.

The Annual Meeting was held on Friday, 28th October, at 4 p.m., in the Board Room of the "Home," which was prettily decorated with rugs, plants, etc., for the occasion.

The Honorable George Allan occupied the chair. The meeting opened with the children of the Home singing.

They occupied seats in the background and showed by their happy faces, their interest in the meeting, and by their appearance, the good care they had received.

Rev. Dr. Thomas followed with an earnest prayer for past mercies, and future helpfulness and blessing.

Senator Allan spoke of the pleasure he had in being present. In the past history of the Home he had been very intimately associated with it. He regretted, with the Board, the absence of one, Sir George Kirkpatrick, who had on former occasions so ably filled the chair, but was now prevented, owing to ill health, from being with them, and who, with Lady Kirkpatrick, had always taken a warm interest in this Home. He was pleased that there was such an Institution; it was a necessity in so large a city; it had done noble work in the past and would continue to do so. He was pleased to find it in such perfect condition, sanitary and otherwise.

The different reports having been read by their respective officers, their adoption was moved by Dr. Geikie, who spoke encouraging words; also of the value of the work and the necessity of strength and energy among its members for the successful augmentation of the subscribers' list.

Mrs. Beard read the names of the Board of Management for the ensuing year and expressed great satisfaction in the way the Home had been conducted, and felt sure the names just read were indicative of continued success.

Dr. Carlyle, in seconding this motion, agreed with the mover, and expressed the hope that with energy a much better financial statement would be presented next year.

Mr. Neville spoke of the case referred to in the Secretary's report, and expressed regret at the decision of the Court, and in future, if it does not second the ladies in their efforts to maintain the end they have in view, the Legislature would be asked to sustain them, and he felt sure it would.

Dr. Thomas spoke of the health of the children, being in part owing, she considered, to the removal of the block pavement in the laundry yard, their summer outing at Eglinton, and the removal of the tank which had supplied the water to the Home.

Mr. Massie, in returning thanks to subscribers for what they had done, thought it rather a discredit to the citizens of Toronto to donate such a small sum of money to so worthy an object.

The Rev. Arthur Baldwin bore his testimony to the usefulness and the need of just such a Home; having had occasion to ask that week for the admission of three girls, out of a family of six children, whose father had been sent to the lunatic asylum and the mother ill and unable at the present to provide for them.

The Chairman was glad to hear the reports, and expressed the hope that the usefulness of the work might be brought more prominently before the public, who had, he regretted, judging from the Treasurer's statement, erroneously imagined that the Home had enough money invested to keep it maintained. If this were thoroughly understood *not* to be the case, he felt sure the philanthropic people of Toronto would be glad to welcome the collectors who have the duty of collecting the money with which to sustain this large household from year to

year. The Benediction having been pronounced by Rev. Arthur Baldwin, all joined in singing the National Anthem, the children marching two and two to the dining-room, where a "special tea" was awaiting them through the kindness of several of the ladies of the Board. The guests and speakers then partook of 5 o'clock tea, closing the Forty-Second Annual Meeting, which had been most interesting and enjoyed by all present.

Constitution of the Girls' Home.

1. This Institution shall be called the "GIRLS' HOME," and have for its object the rescue from vice of young girls, and the bestowal of careful attention to their religious, moral and temporal welfare; also the maintenance and support of girls from two to fourteen years of age.

2. Children are given out to parties furnishing suitable references, on payment of five dollars in advance, which goes to the general funds of the Institution, and five dollars per annum till the child is fifteen, then ten, fifteen and twenty dollars for the next three years respectively; these sums, except the first, are deposited for the said child's benefit and given to her at the expiration of her term of service.

3. The Management shall be trusted to a Committee of not more than forty-five ladies, chosen at the Annual Meeting, out of which shall be elected by ballot Directresses, Treasurer, Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Superintendent of Districts. All vacancies shall be filled by ballot, on a majority vote at a monthly meeting after at least one week's notice. Should it happen at any meeting that no directress be present, then the ladies in attendance, if sufficient to form a quorum, may elect some one of their number to take the chair, the lady so appointed to have, for the time being, the same authority in all respects as Directress.

4. No alteration shall be made in this Constitution, except at the Annual Meeting; and notice of any proposed alterations must always be given to the Board at least one month previous to such Annual Meeting.

Rules for the Board of Management of the Girls' Home.

1. Regular meetings of the Board of Managers shall be held every Tuesday, at 10 30 a.m., the first Tuesday in the month being the day of the Monthly Meeting, for which all important business shall be deferred. Special meetings may be called by the Secretary, upon an order from the 1st Directress, or, in her absence, at the request of any three members.

2. All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer, and be opened as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present, which shall consist of five members at a Monthly and three at a Weekly Meeting, being conducted in the following order:

(1st.) The Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding meeting, which shall be signed, or in case of a Monthly Meeting, the minutes of all the meetings during the past month; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read the general Reports of the condition of the Institution.

(2nd.) The presiding lady shall place all resolutions before the meeting, declare the decision to the Secretary, and, if an equality of votes occur, give the casting one, in addition to her vote as a member of the Board.

3. As soon as the meeting is opened (when a quorum is formed) all conversation not addressed to the presiding lady shall be pronounced by her to be out of order, and stopped.

4. Any lady allowing three months to pass without being present, or notifying her inability to attend to the Secretary, shall have her name struck off the list of the Managing Committee.

5. The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping account of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers every month.

6. The Corresponding Secretary shall keep account of all children given out from the Home, and correspond with them at least once a year, and shall keep account of, and read all correspondence respecting, them at the Board Meetings.

7. The Secretary of Districts shall arrange with the collectors all details of the districts to be visited, and take charge of the lists of subscription for the Annual Report.

8. The Secretary shall direct all the correspondence, keep account, as far as practicable, of all children in the Institution, giving a general report thereof at the Monthly Meeting, at which she shall regularly attend, but never be called upon to preside, minute the proceedings, and take the names of the ladies present.

9. Two members of the Committee shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, ascertain from the Matron the behaviour of the children, as well as whatever may be requisite for them and for the house, and report the same at the Regular Weekly Meetings. The 1st Directress, Treasurer, Corresponding Secretary, and Secretary shall not be of the number of Daily Visitors.

10. Any three Managers, including a Directress, may admit applicants up to the age of fourteen, with a doctor's certificate insuring them to be free from disease.

Rules and Regulations for the Matron and Children of the Girls' Home.

1. The Matron shall be competent to take charge of all the children, as well as to conduct the household affairs generally, and also to instruct the girls between the ages of five and fourteen in sewing, knitting and household work.

2. She shall admit any applicant not younger than two years, or older than fourteen, upon a doctor's certificate—subject always to the approval of the Board.

3. The charge for each child of such parents or friends who are able to pay, shall be five dollars per month, unless an exceptional case should occur. If more than one child of the same parent or friend gain admittance, a reduction may be made, as approved by the ladies of the Weekly Committee.

4. The Matron shall daily inspect the cleanliness of the children, see that they attend the day school punctually and regularly, and every morning and evening conduct family prayers.

5. The children shall rise at 6 a.m. from May 1st to October 31st, and at 7 a.m. from November 1st to April 30th. The time for going to rest to be from 5 to 8 p.m.

Children under fourteen are not allowed to wash or scrub more than three hours a day.

6. Meals to be at regular hours. Breakfast at 8 a.m.; dinner at 12; tea at 5 p.m. Grace to be said before and after meals by the elder children. The Matron and one servant to be present.

7. All children of age to do so, shall regularly attend Sunday-School, and also Divine Service once every Sunday, in charge of the Matron, or some other competent person, and in the afternoon attend the Sunday-School in the Institution.

8. Parents or friends of the children shall be admitted to visit them on Wednesday afternoon from 3 until 5 o'clock. Persons wishing to come on other days must obtain a permit from the Board.

9. The Home shall be open to the public any afternoon during the week.

Terms of Indenture of the Girls' Home.

Parties taking a child from the Home are required to provide the said child, during the whole period of service,—viz., till the child is eighteen years of age—with all necessary and proper food, clothing, lodging, medicine and medical attendance, to bring her up in the principles of the Protestant religion, to pay due attention to her moral and spiritual culture, and to allow her to attend Sunday-School and p'ace of worship regularly, to instruct the child in reading, writing and plain needle work, and in general household duties, to pay into the Home in advance, the sum of five dollars, which goes to the general funds of the Institution; and at the end of the first and each year of service until the child attains the age of fourteen, the sum of five dollars; when fifteen, ten dollars; when sixteen, fifteen dollars; when seventeen, twenty dollars; which money is deposited by the Board for the child's benefit; and further, to provide the said child, at the expiration of her term of service with a good new suit of clothes. In case, through protracted illness or death, or any other cause, the parties fail to carry out their various obligations, the Management reserves to itself the right of resuming their control over the child, or of taking such measures to secure her rights as they may deem necessary.

In case the parties taking a child shall not be satisfied with her, they have the power of returning her to the Home, after satisfying the Board that such action would be to the interest of all concerned.
