A Loyal and Patriotic Address to the Electors of Canada.

DEFINING THE TRUE ISSUES ON WHICH THE CONTEST WILL BE FIGHTED.

OTAWA, Feb. 8.—Sir John A. Macdonald has issued the following address to the people of Canada:—

To the Electors of Canada:—

THESE are the momentous questions now engaging public attention, having reached that stage when it is desirable that an opportunity should be given to the people of expressing, at the polls, their views thereon, the Governor-General has been advised to terminate the existence of the present House of Commons and to issue writs summoning a new parliament.

THE IMPORTATION OF GREAT TALENTS, amounting to not less than fourteen millions of dollars annually upon the people of this country.

This is clearly set forth in a remarkable letter addressed a few days ago by E. W. Thompson—a radical free trader—to the Toronto Globe, on the staff of which he was lately an editorial writer, which, notwithstanding the Globe, with characteristic candour, published the letter, but which, nevertheless, reached the public through another source.

Mr. Thompson points out with great clearness and force the consequences which would result from the adoption of unrestricted reciprocity on this side of the line.

When I was called upon to administer the affairs of the Dominion, Canada occupied a position in the eyes of the world very different from that which she enjoys today.

side world, we enjoy the prestige inspired by a consciousness of the fact that behind us stands the majesty of England.

The question which will be shortly called upon to determine resolves itself into this: Shall we endeavor to possess ourselves of the heritage bequeathed to us by our fathers, and submit ourselves to direct taxation for the privilege of having our tariff fixed at Washington, with a prospect of ultimately becoming a portion of the American Union?

I comment upon these issues to your determination, and to the judgment of the whole people of Canada, with an unflinching confidence that you will prefer to the world your resolve to show yourselves not unworthy of the proud distinction you enjoy—of being numbered among the most dignified and loyal subjects of our beloved Queen.

As for myself—my course is clear. A British subject I was born—a British subject I will remain. With my utmost effort, with my latest breath, I will oppose the "yellow treason" which attempts to rob our people from their allegiance.

During my long public service, nearly half a century, I have been true to my country and its best interests, and I have endeavored to give to the young people of the country, with every power at my disposal, the best of my own life in this last effort for the unity of the Empire, and for the maintenance of our commercial and political freedom.

An Inevitable Shipping.

The new tariff which is its application to sugar and molasses goes into effect April 1, threatened to place the hardware and cutlery trade in a decidedly disadvantageous position.

This reference applies to importers of low grade molasses from the West Indies, while sugar graded not higher than 100 Dutch standard paid 25 cents per pound duty, molasses for boiling paid 10 cents per gallon.

Bolting firms at American ports could under these regulations hold their own against sugar, but in the case of sugar refined in the West Indies, after boiling an average of six pounds of sugar was extracted from each gallon of molasses.

The loss of custom on this side of the line, if it were to be placed on the importers, would be a serious matter.

Henry Claess & Co. circular of the 7th inst. announces a distinct improvement in affairs on Wall Street during the past week.

It has been some time, that, as the contest between the two sides on the silver question develops, the chances of the pro-silver party being elected for the present session decidedly improved, and although some desperate expedients may still be adopted by the gold party, yet their ultimate defeat seems very probable.
