OPPOSES EUGENICS.

Famous English Scientist Says Natural Selection Is Only Real Force. Not eugenics, but a freedom for ociety to exercise the power of natselection is what is needed to the world. This is the opinbetter the world. This is the opinion of a great man of science, the late Dr. Alfred Russell Wallace, of England, who as the interpreter of Darwin upheld the law of natural selection, which was postulated a gen-

eration ago.

Any attempt to regulate marriage Any attempt to regulate marriages by law, to reject the unfit, to segregate or sterilize any portion of the human race to prevent propagation would, declares Dr. Wallace, be a mere subterfuge. Society cannot be reformed from above, nor by artificial law. Reform must begin within. Any great improvement is impossible, while the present social system is in vogue, which puts a premium on social inequality.

Interference by law with the freedom of marriage would be immoral, and would be a greater menace to the

dom of marriage would be immoral, and would be a greater menace to the well being of humanity than the present siles it seeks to correct.

Dr. Wallace recites the present social status, which is familiar to social and economic students, and the basis of the arguments of Socialists. He points out economic inequalities. While certain women can spend on dress and flowers and idle pleasures \$5,000 or \$10,000 for a single entertainment, thousands of other women are compelled to work for a pittance. He points to the thousands of girls

are compelled to work for a pittance. He points to the thousands of girls who are driven to the street as the only means of breaking the awful monotony imposed on them by wages os small and employment so uncertain as to make them a mere makeshift. Pertinently he asks if a legislature, incapable of dealing with such a status, is capable of ruling over marriages.

marriages.
Until social and economic inequali

Until social and economic inequalities are overcome and a degree of equality secured, he says, no improvement in the race may be looked for. Until women and men alike are in position to follow their best impulses, the offspring cannot be improved. This is the line of reasoning:

Many women, who otherwise would remain unmarried from choice, now accept husbands to secure subsistence. They are driven to matrimony by starvation. In other words, their marriages are not the outcome of strong personal attachment or great emotion. On the other hand, in a society where every individual by contributing to the common weal with work, mental or physical, is economically independent, marriage by choice would be the rule. Every woman would be likely to have by choice would be the rule. Every woman would be likely to have chances to marry. A powerful selective agency would be created. A man would have to be a pretty good specimen to attract a mate. From so many men, women would reject naturally the unfit, the diseased, the crippled, the malformed, the weak-minded. It is the natural law of selection workis the natural law of selection working out, as it did in the beginning, does now and ever shall do world

now and ever shall do world out end. without end.
What Dr. Wallace pleads for is a
state of society in which the natural
selection law may be given an opportunity for free play. It may be taken
as certain that when there is little economic force to compel them to do otherwise, women will select for hus-bands few of the worst men of all lasses, who now by reason of money

He called on the King as a believer in parenthood to see that the restriction is removed.



A bulletin on the analysis of linseed Gil has just been issued by Dominion Analyst McGill. In this he states that detection of adulterants owing to their diverse character is far from a simple matter. He advises that large buyers of Husseed Gil, both boiled and raw, insist on a specification of the article being produced. Adulterants are found to be rosin Gil, hydro-carbons, and fish oils, cotton seed Gil and soya bean Gil.

Out of 53 samples tested 36 were found genuine, 10 of doubtful genuineness, and seven adulterated.

Of six or seven samples recently gathered in Toronto not one was found to be pure.

SHE STOOD SECOND IN POLL FOR POET LAUREATESHIP.

ain's Sweetest-Voiced Poetes Surprised Everybody by Coming Next to Kipling as the Favorite Verse Writer of the Country-Has Exquisite Lyrics.

During the summer, an English journal opened its columns to the public so as to ascertain whom they really wanted as Poet Laureate. Conreally wanted as Poet Laureate. Considering the circulation of the journal, not many were surprised when Rudyard Kipling came first with some 22,630 votes. Few wondered when Dr. Bridges, the destined victor, came eighth with only 710. But the astonishment of all was that Mrs. Meynell stood second upon the list—Alice Meynell, who had made no bid at any time for "The loud shouts of the crowd," who had spoken always with delicate subtlety and reticence, a "poet's poet" from first to list, quietly coming into her own with this popular vote of 5,598 ballots.

Mrs. Meynell has written many poems in her day, perhaps the most universally quoted being the poignant sonnet, "Renouncement," Less known, but in similar vein, is "After

Farewell has long been said: I have foregone thee;
I never name thee even.
But how shall I learn virtues and ye For thou art so near heaven

Thou dost beset the path to ever shrine; My trembling thoughts discern

How shall I thrust thee apart, Since all my growth tends to the night and day night and day—
To thee faith, hope and art?
Swift are the currents setting all one way;
They draw my life, my life, out of my heart.

Fake Stories of Destitution Often Emanate From Tiny Island. An islet in the Atlantic—tiny, re-An islet in the Atlantic—tiny, remote and gale swept—the ery lone-liest of the lonely group known as the Hebrides, off the west coast of Sectland, where the isolated inhabitants drop their letters into the sea, where greed and ingratitude flourish, and the women are the workers and the men are the shirkers. Such is the island of Saint Kilda, whose 70 the island of Saint Kilda, whose 70 inhabitants annually make it their business to scare a sympathetic British public by tales of aysterious wees and troubles, which they contrive, generally successfully, to send through to the mainland.

Usually the periodical scares have taken the form of starvation and poverty, but the latest story from the distressful isle, which only became known a week of two ago, was that

known a week of two ago, was that the poor Saint Kildars had contract-ed the influenta.

So, in spite of previous cries of wolf, the Scottish office in London wolf, the Scottish office in London rightly got busy and induced the Admiralty to despatch immediately the cruiser Active with a special doctor and nurses and the necessaries for relief. When the cruiser got there the relief party found that the islanders had been very, very ill, but had recovered.

ecovered.

The peculiar part of this last ap so suddenly. The purser of the steam ship Lockmaddy, which left Saint Kilda on the 12th of June, had made Kilds on the 12th of June, had made no mention of any illners on the island. Neither has the Rev. D. T. Mackay, who, when he landed later to conduct a communion service, was asked by the islanders to postpor his service on the coore of urgent business. It was very soon after these two visits that the news came of the outhreak.

outbreak.

A few years ago the islanders were presented with a boat by charitable people in the south of England. Later it was found that the boat had been chopped up and used for firewood, the reason given being that the boat did not exactly suit their purpose. So they burned it in order that their kind friends might give them another and better one. In 1902 King Edward sent a spe-

In 1902 King Edward sent a special message through Dr. Forshaw to the islanders. Dr. Forshaw took with him pounds of tobacco and sweets, coronation medals and mugs, beautifularitatic photographs of Their Majesties in their coronation robes, numberless bound volumes and maggathes. nagazines.
The Saint Kildans showed their

appreciation of the gifts in the most peculiar manner. They disdainfully crushed up the coronation photo-graphs, which cost half a guinea graphs, which cost half a guinea each, and eagerly grabbed at the to-bacco and sweets. The coronation medals, which cost half a crown each, were afterward sold to visitors to the island for a penny. The books and magazines were thrown into the sea. In May, of last year, there came another story of starvation, and a dally paper organized a relief expedience. daily paper organized a relief expedi-tion to Saint Kilda. They were sup-posed to be starving, but the Macleod of Maclcod, the owner of the island, wrote to The London Times that only wrote to The London Times that only tea and sugar had run out.

The press was full of the woes of Saint Kildans, although the islanders not only had meal potatoes and flour, but also 1,100 sheep and cattle.

The sea was full of fish to be had for the catching, while swarms of

for the catching, while swarms of sea birds, good to eat, whitened the cliffs and countless numbers of eggs could be fresh gathered. Since the habit of scaring has be come common to Saint Kilda, ships ouch the lonely isle just a little more frequently, but formerly it was iso-lated from the outside world for periods of six, seven, eight, nine and even ten months.
