Man From Derby Jumps From Train

Moncton, July 8—A young man who gave his name as John Johns and hailing from Cardiff, Wales, was seriously injured by jumping from a fast moving freight train at the I. C. R. new shops this morning at two o'clock. It appears that

the young man, who is about twenty-one years of age, worked his way to Canada about six months ago, and since that time has been working at Campbellton, and from there he went to Lower Derby. It appears he has been out of a job lately and intended to beat his way to Moncton. Getting aboard a freight train and riding between and on top of the cars until the train was opposite the new shops, the young man jumped from the fast moving train and fell heavily to the ground, badly bruising his face, left hand and leg. He managed to hobble to St. George street and then to Weldon, when some of the passers-by noticed his condition, and immediately telephoned Sergeant Atkins who went up with the ambulance and took the injured man to the hospital. It will be some time before he will be able to leave the hospital.

School Meetings Held in Derby

The regular annual meeting of Derby Superior School, Millerton, took place on Monday forenoon of this week. The meeting was fairly well attended. All of the trustees were present as well as a number of the leading business men of the place. R. N. Weeks was called to the chair.

William Campbell was elected to fill the vacancy on the school board caused by the retirement of Victor Russell. A vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Russell for his long and attentive service as trustee.

In the absence of the official auditor, George Parker, John Betts was appointed to audit the books of the secretary and found them to be in a very satisfactory condition, which speaks well for the untiring secretary, G. R. Vanderbeck.

The matter of compulsory attendance was brought up before the meeting. It was decided, put to the meeting and carried unanimously that the law in this respect will be carried out. The law comes into effect October first. This is certainly a move in the right direction. After a hearty vote of thanks to the

efficient chairman the meeting came to a close.

The board of trustees for the ensuing year is: Duncan McEachern, Weldon Robinson, William Campbell.

The School meeting at Lower Derby Monday was well attended.

J. D. Volchman was elected to take the place of the retiring trustee, H. D. Atkinson.

The matter of building a new school house was before the meeting. It was decided to ask the inspector to divide the district at Mr. Clancy's and if consent is secured they will probably proceed to put up a new school. The increase in population is largely due to the number employed at the pulp and paper mill.

J. W. Knight, who has served as secretary for many years, received the hearty thanks of the meeting. Regret was expressed at the retirement of Miss Newman as teacher of the school and it is hoped by the trustees and ratepayers that she may yet reconsider her resignation. The board of trustees for the ensuing year is: Rev. J. G. A. Colquhoun, Elmer Newman J. D. Volchman.

Canadian Troops From Coronation

A special train of ten cars with the Maritime members of the Canadian contingent to the coronation, reached Moncton about eleven o'clock last night from Rimouski. The contingent came over on the Empress of Britain, which arrived at Rimouski about 10.30 Sunday morning and landed the mails and troops for the Maritime provinces. On board the Empress with the Canadian contingent were Sir Wilfred Laurier, Sir Fred Borden and Hon. L. P. Brodeur.

The Nova Scotia troops were forwarded to their homes by special train, which left here about 11.45 last night, but the island contingent and St. John men remained over in Moncton until this morning.

To say that the members of the contingent had an enjoyable trip is putting it mildly. It was a never-to-be-forgotten event in all their lives, and they return to their Canadian homes, bigger, broader and more patriotic—if that were possible—citizens of the mighty British Empire.

**Miramichi Man
Drowned in West****Frank O'Donnell of Barnaby
River the Victim of Sad
Accident.**

A telegram to Mrs. Philip O'Donnell, Barnaby River, Miramichi, brought the sad announcement of the accidental drowning of her son, Frank O'Donnell at Edward, Washington. Particulars are meagre but it is known the late Mr. O'Donnell was drowned on June 20th and that the body was found on June 25th. It is presumed that the deceased was engaged in lumber driving and that he was drowned on one of the drives. Interment was made at Washington on the day following the accident.

The late Mr. O'Donnell was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Phillip O'Donnell and was born at Barnaby River thirty-one years ago. His father died about seven years ago. Mr. O'Donnell went West eight years ago and was home on a visit during the summer of 1907.

The deceased was a popular young man and was well known in the Upper Miramichi district. He was unmarried and besides his mother is survived by four brothers and four sisters. They are Jas. and John O'Donnell of Barnaby River; Patrick in the United States and Simon of Campbellton; Mrs. Thomas Tobin, Chelmsford; Mrs. William Dinan, Douglastown; Miss Margaret, Augusta, Me., and Miss Gabriel at home. The sympathy of a very large circle of friends will be extended to the bereaved mother and family.

If Mr. Watson does not accept that amount and he declares he will not, he will probably have to look to the County Board of Health for further payment.


