He was crowned an enormous amount of work in the time he has spent in South Africa, and had some all in his power to heal the wounds inflicted during the war.

About a year ago another steamer struck the same place, but no objection could be found by the engineer. It is thought some sunken wreckage was there which was since carried out by the tide.
