

A great increase in the business done has resulted from the reduction made in the rate on press dispatches, from a shilling to nimepence a word, which came into operation on August 1st of last year, having been announced at the Imperial Press Conference. As a matter of fact, as the Ottawa Journal points out the British sovereign, according to the Currency Act, is the standard of value in the Canadian currency system, although as a matter of convenience the gold of the United States is allowed to pass as legal tender. And this same convenience has led to the complete withdraw

The Indianapolis paper is also incorrect in saying that Canadian gold had to be sent to the United States. In the past and at present anyone may bring gold in any quantity to the Canadian Mint, and have it minted, at a very small cost, into English sovereigns, identical with the British mould, except for the small "C" which indicates its Canadian origin.

In a short time Canadian gold pieces in quantity will be turned out from the Canadian Mint, and as soon as these are available for all Canada, they will soon as these are available for all Canada, they will naturally supercede the American gold. 




