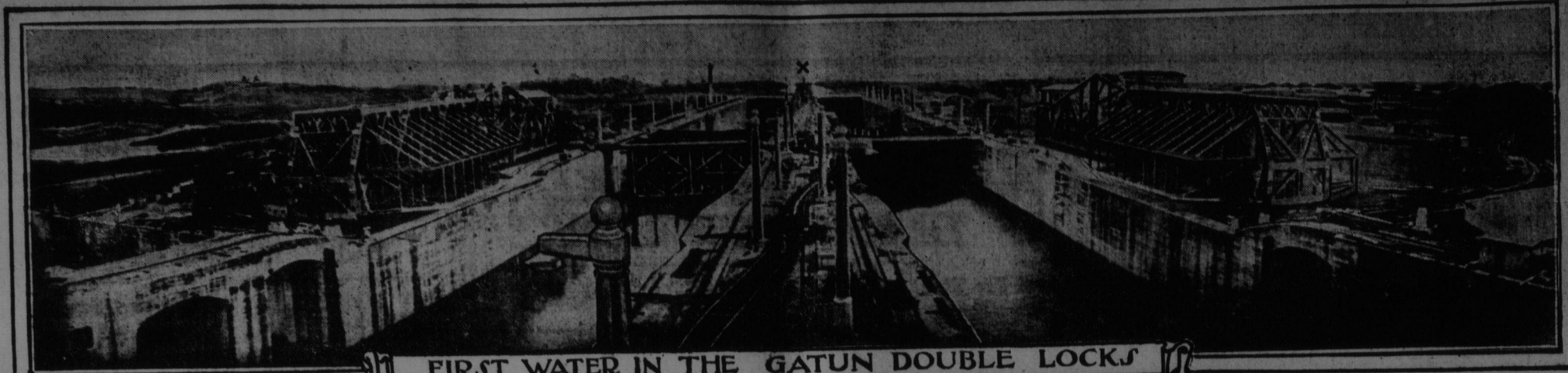


FIRST PHOTOGRAPH OF WATER BEING LET INTO THE PANAMA CANAL.

In all ten vessels have successfully navigated the straits without an accident and two of these are making a second voyage. This in itself is the best of evidence as to the feasibility of this route, but it is much stronger when it is considered that the safeguards to navigation are not so numerous as on the older trade route, and that the voyage was the first into these waters for most of the officers of the vessels engaged in this work. There must also be taken into consideration the voyage of the great dredge Port Nelson, which so far has been without accident.

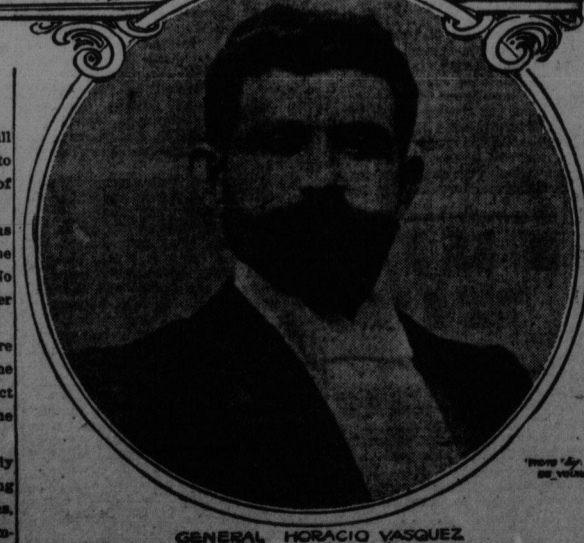

SAILS TODAY.
The steamer Start Point sails from Sand Point this morning for London.
GOV'T. STMR. STANLEY.

WILL BE SOLD.

PULPWOOD TRADE.
Portland Argus: Tug Seguin came up from Bath on Monday to take down the Sagadahoc Towing Co.'s barge No. 2, which has been undergoing repairs at the marine railway. Tug Pejepscot is still engaged in towing the company's barges bringing pulpwood to Bath from the Salmon River, N. B., and will continue in the business until the river freezes.

NEW LIFEBOATS.
Among other improvements in contemplation for the betterment of the life saving service a number of the principal stations are to have new lifeboats. The Treasury Department has just given out contracts for the building of 10 motor lifeboats, which will be built by a New York firm at a cost of \$7,747 for each boat. One of these is likely to be put on the Cape Elizabeth station.

HARBOR IMPROVEMENTS.
Philadelphia is getting what she deserves in the way of harbor improvements by the national government. The improvements are being made under the direction of Col. George A. Zinn, formerly in charge of the U. S. engineer's office in this city, who states that a 35 foot channel will be constructed from Philadelphia to the sea. Dredging has been under way for some time between Greenwich Point and Chester, \$5,000,000 having been spent in creating a 35 foot channel between the two places, and further appropriations have been voted by Congress for the continuation of the work, which will be started in the spring, when dredging will be commenced in front of the city piers to bring the depth of the channel in the Delaware river inside the harbor to 35 feet.

WAS HE FORCED TO SELL?
A Washington despatch of Monday states that Assistant Secretary Sherman Ames, of the Treasury Department, has demanded by telegraph that Capt. Joseph H. York, commander of the six-masted schooner George W. Wells, wrecked on the shoals of Hatteras, substantiate or withdraw his published charge that a combination formed by life savers to buy wrecked vessels forced him to sell the wreck of the Wells for \$800. Capt. York, who resides at 25 Pleasant street South Portland, has not yet returned home. In view of the fact that all hands on the wrecked vessel were rescued under the greatest difficulties by the gallant life savers, it is very unlikely that the captain would have made such charges without having good reasons for doing so.

FOUGHT WITH SHARK.

They started out early in the day in a Hampton boat hoping to pick up one or two swordfish in the vicinity of the lighthouse. 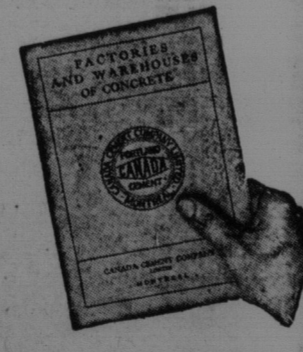
