THE TOWN COUNCIL MEET LAST FRIDAY

Small Attendance of Councilors Transact Routine Business at Short Session

INTERESTING REPORT

The Town Council met last Friday evening His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were only six present Councilors Pinault, Sanson, Miller and Lunan and the Town Clerk.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed. A communication from the Building Inspector relative to the smoke stack of Campbellton Laundry was referred to the Town Solicitor.

Communication from Chief of Police Hughes asking for an increase in salary of \$10 per month was referred to the Police and License Committee.

A communication was received from Police Judge Matheson with his court records from 1st July, 1911 to December 31st 1912. This was a long and interesting document which will be dealt with at length among other reports later. The amount of fines collected during this period was \$1100.50 cheque for which accompanied the report while the Magistrate's bill of costs amounted to \$100.40. The report was ordered filed and the costs paid.

A petition from Harvey Malcolm for a restaurant license in premises on Sugarloaf Street was referred to Police and License Committee.

A petition from the livery stable keepers and cabmen protesting against a license being granted to A. Bertrand to run a public bus was referred to the Police and License Committee.

Reports from Committee were then received. Councillor Lunan from Police and License Committee submitted report recommending that a barber's license be granted Geo. Godin on payment of \$10 and that a cab license be granted A. Bertrand on payment of \$7. Report was received and adopted.

ACCOUNTS PASSED

The following committees submitted reports recommending payment of accounts.—Police and License, \$38.85. Public Charities, \$262.10. Public Prop. and Streets, \$235.55. Water and Sewerage, \$192.55. Electric Light, \$2511.29. Finance, \$257.89. Reports all received and adopted.

The delegation expenses of Mr. John Harquail amounting to \$50 was ordered to be paid.

On motion Mr. M. A. Kelly was appointed Town Auditor.

It was moved by Councillor Miller, seconded by Councillor Lunan, that the Town Treasurer be instructed to forward the required amount to the Receiver-General to provide for a sinking fund for the guaranteed bonds of the town. Council then adjourned.

YOUNG MEN ARE FREED FROM PRISON

Nelson Letourneau who was sentenced to two years imprisonment in February 1912, and William Cyr who got a life sentence in December, 1911, are out on parole and have reported to the Chief of Police here.

VETERAN SOLDIER DIED AT MONTREAL

Commandant of Maritime Forces Passes Away Suddenly While on a Visit

BURIED AT ST. JOHN

Brigadier General Charles William Drury, C. B., A. D. C., G. O. C., Maritime Provinces died very suddenly as the result of an apopleptic stroke at the home of his nephew Mr. Geoffrey P. Ritchie, 24 McTavish street, Montreal on Monday.

Although General Drury had not been in good health for some time, his death was entirely unexpected, and came as a great shock to his many friends in the city, and throughout Canada generally.

General Drury was one of the best known military men in Canada, and in fact was well and favorably known in military circles throughout the Empire. He was only 56 years of age.

He was the father-in-law of Sir Max Aitken. He leaves two sons and three daughters, in addition to Lady Aitken, namely Mr. Victor Drury, of Montreal, Mr. Chipman Drury of Quebec, Mr. Stephen Howard, and the Misses Ara and Helen Drury, who are living with their mother in Halifax.

The funeral took place at St. John, on Tuesday with full military honors. These were under the command of the military authorities at Halifax and St. John. General Drury had only been in Montreal a few days, having come from Halifax last week.

General Drury was a son of W. C. Drury, of Newlands and St. John, N. B. He was born in 1856. His education was received in St. John. While serving with the R. F. A. during the Northwest Rebellion, he took part in the actions of Fish Creek and Batoche Bay, and was mentioned in despatches.

During the South African war he was also distinguished, being created a Lieut.-Colonel, and receiving the Queen's Medal with three clasps. He became a lieutenant of the Maritime Militia in 1874, a lieutenant-colonel in 1890 colonel in 1910. He commanded the R. S. A. Kingston, in 1894, and was assistant inspector and inspector of field artillery.

As a practical soldier and capable administrator, he stood high in the councils of the Department of Militia and Defence, and was an extremely popular officer, both with his staff and the ranks.

FUNERAL OF AN AGED RESIDENT

The funeral of Colin Irvin Nevin which took place on Saturday, Jan. 4th, from the home of his daughter, Mrs. R. Hicks, Dalhousie Junction was largely attended by sorrowing friends from far and near. Interment was made at Dalhousie.

When about three years of age, with his parents and others of the family he came to Newcastle, Miramichi from the place of his birth, Stonehaven, Scotland. With his brother John, Newcastle, he learned the tannery trade. He built the Dalhousie tannery which he conducted for several years and afterwards moved to Bathurst. Tannery business becoming unprofitable he turned his attention to farming on a farm near Bathurst Village. Nearly three years since a paralytic stroke rendered him an invalid and eventually he caused his death.

He is survived by a widow, who was Mary Ann Robinson of Dalhousie, and his married daughters and one son.

RESTIGOUCHE HAS GOOD RECORD

Close of Year Shows Good Shipments of Lumber For Season

A COMPARISON

The year just closed shows a high average for exports of lumber and compares favorably with former seasons. A large increase is shown in exports to America, a much larger proportion being shipped by rail than in previous years.

Yet the coastwise trade was considered an extra good one for lumber and all classes of exports.

In sea-going vessels 19 ships were loaded for Great Britain with a total tonnage of 21,919 tons of deals equalling 85,152,226 sup. feet; to South America 13 vessels, 19,452 tons equalling 16,734,657 sup. feet; to United States 6056 tons equalling 374,707 bundles of laths and 107,000 feet of lumber. There were 4 vessels loaded for Australia with 7,277 tons equalling 5,505,000 feet and 1 vessel each loaded for Havana, Cuba and Spain.

In 1911 we loaded 25 vessels in all with a total of 39,291,355 sup. feet.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Jan. 1st 1913

Editor of Campbellton Graphic

Dear Sir:

We notice a letter in your paper under date Dec. 27th 1912 in which Mr. License Law desires to discuss the temperance question with his temperance friends.

License Law states there has or believes there has been more liquor sold since local option was adopted in our town.

Now we do not think this statement is based on facts although we must admit that there has been a large quantity of liquor sold and consumed in Campbellton since local option was adopted. From the fact that over four thousand dollars have been collected in fines during the time since our present Liquor License Inspector was appointed. We are free to admit also that if the temperance people had been used square in the matter there would have been double the amount collected in fines or the parties who violated the liquor license law would have been put out of business long ago. (See section 85, paragraph F, page 43, of Liquor License Law) which refers to sec. 62, second offense, jail 3 months, sec. 75, third offense, jail 3 months. We contend that no justice has any right to fine anyone for second offense who violates sec. 62 or sec. 75, third offense.

Anyone who reads above sections will readily see, we think, that the law is being violated by others than those who sell without a license.

We would like to have the opinion of License Law on these points.

License Law states that it would be in the interest of all to have, say six good bars owned by reliable and respectable people in town, one at Athol and one at Richardsville. In reference to the respectability of rumshoppers we will not discuss at this stage but will leave that matter for the people to judge for themselves. Rumshoppers are a good thing or a bad thing. If good all should uphold them. If six rumshoppers would be good for Campbellton, why not have one hundred, then all the merchants could have a rumshop to help their business, say one at I. N. R. ticket office, one at the corner of Sugar Loaf and Gerrard streets between Gosses and Duncans groceries, one at the foundry where the men could get rum handy in order that the owners could lay their hand on them just when they wanted to, this would surely be an improvement over former times, one would be required at the round house to keep the men primed for work before they take their engines out. One at I. C. R. station in order that the men there would not neglect their work by going to hunt for a drink elsewhere. This would also be handy for the conductors and brakemen if they so desired to get something to steady their nerves before starting out with passenger trains.

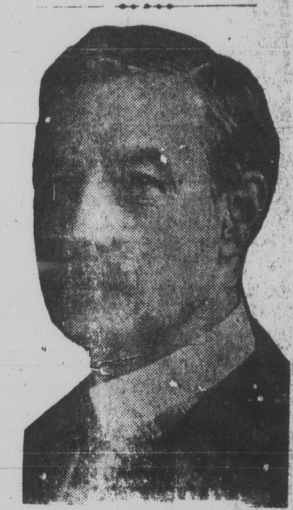
A few along Gerrard street and a number along Water street to pick up the dollars while the merchants gather in the few cents that are left or sell their goods on time to help the rushing business along. (that is the rum business). One at each of the rinks and two at least would be required at the public school, as the license law allows one license for each two hundred and fifty population. This would give the children a chance to become educated to drink rum on the installment plan as they receive their o'her education, and when they are through with their schooling they would be ready for the rum sellers to bring trade to our merchants.

There would be several required at Shives shingle mill and Harquail's factory in order that plenty of men would be handy at all times as you no doubt know Mr. License Law, how well the red nosed bum likes to work when soaked full of rum, who asst. so much to build up the town and help the merchants along and as business flourishes with the rum sellers from the effect of rum-selling, all the floaters would be at work and more able bodied men would be required to keep the mills and factories going. The rumshoppers who claim to be so anxious to build up the town would likely be glad to take off their coats and earn a few honest dollars to help along the business which the rum shops have built up, (namely) the jails, prisons, poor-houses and asylums.

Now, Mr. License Law which do you think would be the most benefit to any community, mills and factories who pay out on an average 85% of the turnover in wages or the rum shops which pay out 5% of their turnover in wages.

We agree with you the sooner the people get their eyes open the better. You state that the town and county would receive a good revenue. Who do you think would pay this revenue? Not the rumshoppers, by any means. I am fully persuaded that our people will never again tolerate the open bar in Campbellton, and as has been written, consent to receive in return for the privilege of sale, gold that is blistered with tears, smeared in blood and cantered with a thousand sins. This liquor business that has caused men to commit every crime that is known to man.

LOCATES LEAKS IN PIPES

The Detectophone Will Save Money for People of Montreal

It is anticipated that many more hours of unnecessary labor and much money will be saved by the adoption by the Montreal water department of the "Detectophone," an electrical instrument by means of which it is possible to locate leaks in water pipes without excavating. The machine, like a large syringe, is fitted at one end with a thin steel rod. This is driven into the ground near where the earth is damp from the seeping water, while the operator places over his ear a receiver identical with those used on telephone head sets. As soon as the apparatus has been adjusted the operator presses a button, which has the result of electrifying the earth round the steel rod in the ground, while the hiss of the seeping water may be distinctly heard. By following up the damp earth and properly using the "Detectophone," it is claimed that the position of a leak can be located to inches.

MAORIS BECOMING WEALTHY

Former Canadian Tails of New Zealand Aborigines

An exceedingly interesting talk on New Zealand was given in Toronto by Mr. George McCaul, a well-known public citizen of that country. THROWING COLD WATER

The press of St. John state that the people there are not worrying over the proposal to establish a national port at Gaspé, giving as their reason that a previous experiment of such had been made, and before the vessel could get to sea, was caught by the ice and kept a prisoner till the next summer.

The argument on the face of it looks very plausible, but if one goes a little deeper into the matter there appears another reason. No doubt St. John is booming the Eastern provinces, they are carrying on a splendid publicity campaign, but it is St. John all the time.

They are not boosting the Maritime provinces but only themselves, and by many it is looked on as being just a little selfish that they should desire all the plums, and leave the crust to the rest of the Eastern States.

There is no reason in the world why Gaspé should not become a terminal port. It is much nearer than St. John, Halifax or Quebec to ships using the Northern passage, and it would be an easy matter to keep the harbor at Gaspé open all winter. The harbor itself is in a splendid location with plenty of deep water and no shoals or dangerous channels to navigate, and to those who understand the location of the two ports, Gaspé would be a serious rival to St. John, as the Canadian port for a quick service to Britain.

Further, the Gaspé peninsula is as yet an undiscovered country. Endless opportunities and splendid possibilities lie dormant in that great silent stretch of country, and if only for the opening up of the territory the fact of establishing a port at Gaspé would create an enormous impetus to the trade of the Maritime provinces.

TEMPERANCE IN ONTARIO
In the fight for local option in Ontario on Monday the temperance men won many victories. If a bare majority sufficed they would have won ten more, but a three-fourths vote is required, and they failed to secure it in these places. The vote in towns, villages, and townships, and in the one city in which a contest was held, was so largely in favor of the abolishing of bars that it is evident temperance continues to grow in Ontario. Perhaps the campaign of the provincial Liberal leader, Mr. W. W. Rowell, has had more effect in strengthening the movement, although it did much to support his party in a recent by election.

BOOM TIMES
New Brunswick's premier, the Hon. J. K. Flemming, predicts in an article in the Moncton Times that during the next few years a wonderful transformation will be wrought in the Maritime Provinces. More people are coming to New Brunswick, industries are increasing and expanding, and agricultural and fruit lands are becoming better known. There has been a notable increase in real estate values throughout the province.

ONE RAILWAY ENOUGH
An Ottawa despatch says that promoters are asking assistance for the building of a railway from St. Flavie eastward to Gaspé and westward to St. Eloutherie to connect the National Transcontinental with that fine harbor. As Gaspé is now served by a railway and it only needs the erection of a bridge at Campbellton to connect it with the International Railway which joins the Transcontinental line, this project is unnecessary and should not be encouraged. Let us have the bridge which will serve the same purpose and cost much less.

QUEBEC LIFT BAN **ON PULP EXPORT**

Big Paper Concerns Not Handicapped in American Market Now

THE ENTERING WEDGE

New York—John Norris, chairman of the committee on paper of the American Publishers' Association, said that the action of the Provincial Council of Quebec in removing the restriction upon the exportation of pulpwood from the Crown lands of four large mills, viz: L'Ange, Belgo-Canadian, Price Brothers & Company, and Wayagamac, insures the admission into the United States free of import duty of all the products of those mills, which have a producing capacity of 480 tons per day of news print paper and 50 tons per day of kraft paper. "It is inevitable," he said, "that the other and smaller mills in that province will obtain a similar concessions when they ask for it, and that the news print paper mills in Ontario will be forced by competition to obtain equal concession from that province. British Columbia removed its regulations last summer for the Powell River Mill. The action of the provincial governments is calculated to stimulate now production in Canada to supply the large and increasing markets in the United States. The high duty which the United States has imposed

ed on news print paper made from Crown land wood, viz: \$5.00 per ton, put a premium of \$2 per cord on freehold wood in Quebec and placed a corresponding burden on the paper makers in Northern New York for all the wood they brought from Quebec.

"The abolition of import duties on the products of Crown lands removes the competition of the Canadian mills for wood from Canadian freehold lands. The action of the Provincial Council is a distinct advance toward a healthier condition of the paper industry, helpful to Canadian producers, and helpful to American paper makers who have been forced to pay the cost of the retaliatory method of both governments. It is substantial beginning toward the sweeping away of every restriction upon the interchange of wood and pulp on both sides of the border."

NEW BRUNSWICK AFFAIRS IN COURT

Important Question Raised in Montreal as to Jurisdiction

Montreal, Jan. 9.—The jurisdiction of a Quebec court over that of New Brunswick and whether the interdiction of George Moffat, now confined in Verdun asylum, is regular, is the question which Mr. Justice Beaudin will have to decide in a testing case involving the sum of \$46,000.

The action is being taken by Mr. Roland Moffat, curator for George Moffat, his father, who seeks to have certain financial transactions between his father and Mr. William Scott Montgomery set aside by the court.

The plaintiff contends that when the transactions took place his father was unable to look after his own interests owing to his mental condition, and therefore the transactions were illegal.

The defendant claims that the proceedings in connection with George Moffat's interdiction were irregular as the petition was taken out in the Province of Quebec, whereas Moffat was a resident of the Province of New Brunswick.

TRAINING GERMAN

In keeping with the German Government's idea of making the empire one vast training school for the development of the best there is in the youth of the country for national commercial success, regular business school courses are being organized in the German army, so that the recruit during his term of military service will be fitting himself for the business life he will have to enter on quitting the colors.

The hundreds of thousands of children are not permitted to pass through the public schools and to drift through life as unskilled laborers. Each one, as far as the Government can order it so, is turned out skilled in some occupation.

One of the most powerfully educative forces in the empire is the continuation school originally intended to maintain some kind of discipline over youths from 14 to 18 years of age prior to their enlistment in the army. Of late years these continuation schools have been changed into vocational schools.

Twice every year great flaming posters call the youth of the land to obligatory attendance at the trade and commercial schools. These posters enumerate more than 100 trades of vocations and each youth is summoned to appear at the school devoted to his particular calling.

MAN WHO AIDED DARWIN

Always a Student of Nature, a Great Reader and Writer

When Darwin was making his researches which were afterwards given to the world in the "Origin of Species," "The Descent of Man," and other epoch-making works, one of his chief assistants was Mr. W. B. Tegetmeier, who died in London at the age of 96. As a boy Tegetmeier used to buy wild birds and keep them in his father's house in St. James's, and he also adopted pigeon fancying. It was through a neighbor, Mr. Yarrell, who was also a well-known writer on birds and fishes, that Mr. Tegetmeier made the acquaintance of Darwin, who at the time was in search of facts about variation in animals. Darwin gratefully accepted his help, and in his volumes made many acknowledgments of the assistance rendered by his fellow naturalist.

Mr. Tegetmeier was of service to Darwin in many different directions. For instance, he substituted for him the "Racing Calendar," the statistics of racehorses during a period of twenty-one years, and also the births of greyhounds as recorded in the "Field" for twelve years.

On more than one occasion he suggested a method of research which Darwin adopted. For instance, he tried an experiment by which a bee was led to build a single cell, and found, as he suspected, that the cell, in fact, was a circle. He also read a paper on this discovery at the British Association meeting in 1868.

Mr. Tegetmeier was on the staff of the "Field" for about fifty years, and wrote more than 1,100 consecutive weekly leaders for the "Queen." He wrote many books on bird life.

It was one of his few boasts that he was the oldest holder of a reading ticket at the British Museum. He took out his reading ticket in 1835, at the age of seventeen.

HOUSE OF MYSTERY

Weird Jumble of Useless Things in Recluse Doctor's Home

A strange collection of articles, which the late Dr. John Phené hoarded in the rooms and grounds of his mystery house at Chelsea, came to light when the contents of Cheryne House were put up for auction. The storehouse consisted of an old stone bridge. It was a veritable jumble of useless things in the recluse doctor's home.

LATEST BULLETIN

That the condition of Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Connaught is serious, yet not grave, is the information given out officially to-day after the attending physicians had left the bedside of the distinguished patient in the Royal Victoria Hospital.

Closely guarded from all possible intrusion, H. R. H. lies in a special ward for the second time. On June 4th last she was hurried from Quebec following an attack of peritonitis.

The second attack of this malady struck H. R. H. in Ottawa, and from the Capitol she was swiftly conveyed last night, as on the previous occasion, a special train of C. P. R. being requisitioned.

Since her arrival at the hospital, the Duchess has been constantly watched by Dr. A. E. Garrow who performed an operation when she was attacked last summer. Associated with Dr. Garrow are Dr. W. W. Chipman, and Dr. E. S. Worthington. The three doctors have not left the hospital since the arrival of the distinguished patient.

THE DUCHESS' CONDITION

"Her Royal Highness, the Duchess of Connaught did not pass a very good night. She was restless, and complained of considerable pain. This morning, however, her condition shows improvement."

Ottawa, Jan. 9.—The illness of Her Royal Highness, the Duchess of Connaught, has caused the sincerest regret at Ottawa. The Duchess has lived exceedingly quietly in Ottawa, but numerous social functions at Government House have brought her in contact with a great many people of prominence, to whom she has become endeared by a most amiable disposition and many kindly courtesies.

The Duchess has manifested a deep interest in Ottawa's hospitals and its charitable institutions, and has lent her patronage to many plans for their benefit. On all sides the sincerest hopes for her speedy recovery are expressed.

MAPS OF TEMPERATURE

Canadian Professor Makes Suggestions as to Overcoming the Ice-Laying Peril

Professor Barnes, of McGill University, Montreal, submitted to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, an interim report on his investigations of methods whereby ships may be warned of the nearness of ice or land. The professor regards the results of his work as highly satisfactory.

Professor Barnes has now for three years investigated conditions in the St. Lawrence, in the Strait of Belle Isle and along the Labrador coast, the Department of Marine and Fisheries supplying him with a steamer.

The concluding portion of Professor Barnes' report was as follows:—"Very important results have been obtained indicative of methods which should be developed for equipping ships for avoiding ice and land. The experiments have been so decisive and reliable that I must strongly recommend that attention be devoted by the Government and by steamship companies towards adopting accurate temperature recorders on board ships."

"Again I must emphasize that it is to a study of the variations of temperature in the sea and not the temperature itself which will enable navigators safely to avoid ice and land at night or in time of fog. I would strongly recommend the Government to equip at once a ship to map out the isothermal lines around the coasts of Newfoundland, Labrador, and the whole of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and Straits of Belle Isle, for in so doing a chart could be prepared which would be of great value."

"Similar charts should be made all over the world, but this is a matter for international action and not for one Government alone."

MYSTERY OF FIRE AT SILVER FALLS.

Charred Bones of Human Body Found in Ruins of Barn.

St. John, Jan. 6.—What are believed to be the charred bones of a human body were found on Sunday morning in the ruins of a barn at Silver Falls, belonging to Andrew P. Stevens, which was destroyed by fire on Saturday afternoon. The terrible discovery was made when Mr. Stevens, his hired man, Mr. Cox and several others were looking through the debris. The skull, they say, is distinctly visible, and the teeth, they feel sure, are those of a man or woman.

Lying near the bones were found the remains of two bottles which had been almost melted by the heat, and the theory is expressed that some tramp went to the barn and was burned to death while sleeping in the hay mow. It would seem that he had with him two bottles of liquor which he placed down beside him.

The barn was destroyed about 3.30 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, and a valuable carriage, some tools, a large quantity of hay and a shed full of straw were burned, making a loss of about \$250.
