ASSAULTED

Bathurst Village Young Men Brutally Beat

THREE STRANGERS

Who Were Working at Messrs Summer's Mill—Seven Arrests Made.

(Special to Events.)
Bathurst, N. B., May 19.—On Saturday afternoon a number of young men of this place, most of whom were under the influence of liquor, got into an altercation in the village, the object of which was to intimidate some men who were going to their work. One of these men was severely handled and somewhat badly cut. Two others who interfered on behalf of their comrades were brutally assaulted, beaten and kicked by the mob. Warrants were at once issued and special constable Fred Chamberlain, sworn in, and with Constables Branch and Ramsey proceeded to make arrests. After some lively scrapping in resisting arrest, the constables were successful in lodging the guilty parties, seven in all in jail. There is a report which is generally believed, that this disgraceful affair is the result of a conspiracy to drive some imported labor out of the place, but this plan has been frustrated. The trial of the young men was commenced Tuesday afternoon before Justice O'Brien, and from report we understand the seven men arrested, pleaded not guilty to the charge of intimidation. Lawyer Landry acting for the Summer Co. while Lawyer J. P. Byrne is handling the case for the defendants. A very large crowd of spectators is attending trial. All the prisoners are out on bail. The case continues tomorrow as very little progress was made today.

To New Brunswick. Will Eventually Connect With N. B. System

The Everts learns that the Bellechasse Telephone Company of Quebec is endeavouring to make arrangements for the extension of its lines into the Province of New Brunswick. This company is already working eastward and is at present working east of Amqui. It is expected that Dalhousie will be reached this summer. The company will probably ask the Town Council for the right to enter and do business in the town and we think this undertaking should receive the support of our citizens. While Campbellton has a local system, yet it is very desirable for the promotion of business that all points in N. B. and Quebec be connected by telephone. No doubt the company would be willing to come to an amiable agreement with the local company and we trust such will be the case. We understand that according to an act relating to the town it has the power to grant this company a charter.

Coun McDonald moved that a committee of three be appointed to meet the Public Lands and Building Committee of the Municipal Council in reference to lock-up property. Carried.

Coun Taylor moved that the appropriation for current year passed at the last meeting be re-considered. Carried.

The Council then took recess. Upon resuming business Coun Taylor from the Assessment Committee reported that after re considering the assessment ordered at a previous meeting, the committee recommended that the following Assessment be levied in lieu thereof:—

And further that the Treasurer be instructed by this Council to place to the credit of the School Board of the revenue to be derived from the Police & License department the sum of \$600 and \$300 from Contingencies, making in all \$900 co. Reference was made to the position in which poles were placed on Cedar St. and after some discussion on the matter, Coun Bruce moved the matter of encroachment of Telephone Co on Cedar St be enquired into by Public Property & Streets Committee. Carried.

Coun McDonald said that recently he had been fourable bodied tramp in town, and made the suggestion that the Council look into the matter and endeavor to find a means to employ such characters. This was done at River du Loup, with good results.

Coun Murray submitted the new Water and Light Debenture, together with a resolution which was a motion of Coun Murray. Carried.

Coun Adams moved that the Council render Board of Health any assistance necessary in reference to moving pest house. Carried.

The Council then adjourned.

Lumber Co's Big Mill Begins Season's Work

MIGUASHA WHARF

Being Built Will Be of Great Benefit Personal Items

A treat in store for the Dalhousie people will be given by the pupils of the School for the Blind, Halifax on the 26th inst. in the Morris Hall. Principal Fraser, who will accompany his pupils, is already well known to a Dalhousie audience, and no doubt will meet with a cordial welcome. Mr. Geo. Haddow has been instrumental in making arrangements to assure the success of this concert and if we can judge by past experience his efforts will be appreciated by the public.

On Monday afternoon several of our leading citizens were present when the big mill of the Dalhousie Lumber Co started sawing for the first time this year. Since last fall the mill has been enlarged and is now one of the largest on the North Shore. The modern system for moving deals to the end of their wharf; their burning apparatus is very interesting. With their two mills they expect to employ over two men in Dalhousie this summer. The Messrs Hilyard are to be congratulated on their spirit of enterprise and all wish them success.

Your correspondent is not aware that any farmer from Restigouche Co. has applied to the Department of Agriculture to take charge of the illustration orchard as is proposed by the local government to establish in each county. Restigouche county should not miss this opportunity and an application should be sent in for 1905. Pages 19, 20 and 21 of the Agricultural report for 1903 will give any farmer an idea of the conditions.

Fruit can be grown in Restigouche with success, especially certain varieties of apples. Your correspondent has seen as good apples grown in Blair Athol, Dundee, Black Lands, Dalhousie and other parts of Restigouche as could be seen anywhere. Plums and cherries have been a success here also. Every farmer and every person having a garden should try a patch of cultivated strawberries. They are a sure crop here.

Mr. Peter MacNutt's schooner, from Malpeque, P. E. I. is discharging grain here. She has a cargo consisting of about 4000 bushels of oats, some wheat, barley and potatoes.

Mr. P. Charleson the popular contractor of Ottawa, was at Murphy's Hotel this week. He has the contract to build the wharf and ferry landing, at Miguasha P. Q. opposite Dalhousie. Already three piers have been placed and Mr. Charleson informed your correspondent that he expects to have the wharf ready for traffic about July 1st.

The Miguasha wharf will fill a long felt want. Passengers had to get off and on in small boats from the steamer. In many cases they

Exchequer Court.

A sitting of the Exchequer Court of Canada was held at the Court House Friday Mr. Justice Burbridge presiding. L. A. Audette, of Ottawa, Registrar of the Court, was in attendance.

The case of the King vs. Shives and Moore was referred to a referee.

The third case on the docket was that of the King vs. The Carquet Railway Company. The information in this case sets out that on May 16, 1888, the defendant company received goods to the value of \$349.63 from the Intercolonial

Railway at Gloucester Junction for the purpose of transmission, and that such goods while in the possession of the Carquet Railway Company, were through the negligence of that company destroyed by fire. The value of these was, with the approval of the defendant company, paid to the owners by the Department of Railways and Canals. Goods saved out of the fire were sold at auction by the Crown and realized \$35.50, leaving a balance alleged to be due by the company to the Crown of \$314.08.

The Crown also claims \$3,238.62 for car mileage and car repairs.

The defendant company contends that the goods referred to in the information were in its possession at the time of the fire, and allege that they were burned through the negligence of the officials of the I. C. R. It appears that the goods were stored in a building used in common by the I. C. R. and the Carquet Railway Company, and that there is a dispute whether the I. C. R. had delivered the goods to the defendant.

The defendant also denies that there is any amount due the Crown for car mileage or car repairs.

An application was made today by the defendant for a postponement to allow time to take the evidence of W. J. Doucet, of Boston, and of Albert Melvin, of Stewart, Yukon.

Order granted, and Mr. O. Stockton, assistant Registrar of the Court, was appointed commissioner to take the evidence in Boston of W. J. Doucet.

The matter of taking the evidence of Albert Melvin stands until further information can be obtained.

DO NOT KICK.

TREE PLANTING.

THE suggestion thrown out by Mayor Murray at the last meeting of the Town Council that the Council take some measures to encourage the planting of trees along the streets is one worthy of consideration by our citizens. This is a subject which is receiving much study and attention by many of the city fathers throughout the Maritime Provinces and is a step in the right direction.

We are glad to learn that the School Board has taken up this matter and that Friday, May 27th has been set apart as a day for tree planting.

Many of our private citizens should take this matter up and as this is the proper time to plant trees should do so at once and add to the attractiveness, not only of their property, but of the town.

THE SIDEWALKS.

THE plank sidewalks in the Town of Campbellton are in a disgraceful condition. This is more particularly so on Water St., the principal thoroughfare of the town. Something ought to be done at once. The present mode of repairing the walks by means of a board or slab nailed over the hole, while it covers the hole, is not a commendable one as it makes it very unpleasant to go stumbling over these if you are not aware of their presence.

We understand that this street has been neglected from year to year in the hope that next year

would see permanent walks put down, but as time passes and other things seem more pressing these are held over for another year and with the large amount of work before it this year it is not possible for the town to undertake so great a work. A plank walk should be built at once so that the limbs and lives of our citizens may not longer be endangered.

THE CANADA EASTERN.

THE absorption of the Canada Eastern by the Intercolonial system will meet with the hearty approval of the people in all sections of this county. Newcastle may be made the eastern terminus of the main line from Fredericton and a dispatchers office established here or the one at Campbellton removed here. The absorption will probably result in a better development of the Miramichi country and it may also add to the revenue of the Intercolonial system. —Advocate.

It is hardly probable that the despatching office would be moved from here as already there is too much work for this division. What is more probable is that if the C. E. R. is taken over another division will be made with Newcastle as the headquarters.

A BATHURST APPEAL.

LE Courier des Provinces Maritimes of which Bathurst Journal Mr. Turgeon, M. P. is the editor, is rather imperative in the demand for the appointment of a French speaking senator to succeed Mr. Dever. The Courier says that the Acadians are very loyal, "but loyalty does not signify the denial of rights." Loyalty ought to be mutual. It does not permit injustice.

"Since 1896" says our Bathurst liberal friend, "the Acadians of New Brunswick have claimed from Sir Wilfred their right to a fair representation in the senate. At each vacancy the government has responded to the Acadians, 'Wait.' They have waited."

All the same among them, as among others, the time comes when patience ceases to be a virtue and they demand to-day of the government, the fulfilment of a sacred promise postponed often enough for purely political reasons. Temporizing has no longer reasons for being. It will now be an injustice. . . ."

The arrival to power of Mr. Emmerson was greeted by the Acadians as the beginning of an era of peace and justice, of loyalty and generosity. They were his friends, sincere and devoted. They expect from that large breast, from that generous soul, the recognition of an undeniable right which his predecessors with less appreciation have long refused. —Sun.

THE PRODUCTION OF SALMON.

Ottawa, May 12.—The United States Government, through the British Ambassador at Washington, again has expressed a wish to unite with the Canadian Government in a measure for the protection of salmon fisheries on the coast of British Columbia. It wants to assist in the creation and maintenance of a new hatchery in British Columbia. The feeling here against granting the request is very strong Montreal Star.

There are four salmon hatcheries already in operation in the Province of British Columbia. These are owned by the Dominion Gov't and one was built last year by the Provincial Gov't. Since the introduction however of the new trap net, which is also to be used on the Canadian side, it is clear that artificial propagation is the only means of saving the fishing from extinction.

The deadly trap nets are constructed of large piles, many hundred of fathoms of net being used. A single trap costing some \$5000.00 has been known to capture 1500 to 2000 salmon in the 24 hours. A Deputation of American Canermen interviewed the Provin-

cial Gov't a short time ago, declaring they were willing to expend \$100,000.00 in building and maintaining salmon hatcheries on the Fraser River, if the permission were granted them. The request was refused on the ground that such international work was liable to lead to friction and trouble.

DUTY ON BRINE

WHILE some people in the United States are talking about reciprocity with Canada the customs authorities of that country are trying to make their tariffs as onerous as possible to the people of Canada. The latest move for that purpose is the ruling of the general board of Appraisers of the United States that brine in which salt fish is packed is subject to duty; this ruling is on the same footing as the ruling of the same board, making the cans in which lobsters were packed subject to duty, although the lobsters themselves were free under the terms of the Treaty of Washington. This was justly looked upon as a swindling evasion of the terms of the treaty and it provoked much indignation in Canada. The fish dealers of the United States have all protested against this new duty upon brine, but whether their protest will be effective remains to be seen. The people of Canada have long ceased to expect any fair play from the United States with respect to trade and it should be the duty of the Government of Canada to meet the United States tariffs on our exports with a similar tariff, so that they may receive precisely the same treatment from us that we are receiving from them. —Gleaner.
