SCOTLAND.

Distress in Scotland.—The Potato failure may be described in two words—total, universal, in Scotland. The visitation has fallen most severely upon the Highland and Island population of Scotland; and in many districts of that extensive territory scenes are already begun which are more than sufficient, were they but known, to awaken the sympathies of every feeling heart.

Horrible.—A correspondent of the St. Louis Republican, writing from Camp Patterson, near Barria, mentions the following incident:

"A murmur of indignation was running through our lines to-day, in consequence of a scene of unusual interest which transpired here this morning. An old squaw, from an encampment of Lapan Indians, about two miles below us on the river came to the camp of Texan volunteers, and offered for sale two Spanish Girls, from thirteen to fifteen years old. They were dreadfully emaciated, and almost destitute of a single garment of clothing.

It is said that the British Government intend to construct a ship canal around the falls of Saint Mary, thereby opening a communication for the largest class of vessels, with Lake Superior.—Cost estimated at \$2,000,000.

CANADA.—A report dated 15th April, 1846, addressed to His Excellency the Governor General, by Messrs. Joseph Dionne, P. H. Moore, John Simpson, and J. U. Baudry, commissioners to ascertain the rebellion losses, has been published. This is the second commission appointed for the purpose.

MEXICAN LOAN.—The Mexican government have sent agents to England to endeavor to negotiate a loan. As an inducement to effect the same the government offers to take off all prohibitions, and reduce the duty on imports for ten years.

DISTRESSING CASUALTY.—A distressing casualty occurred on the night of the 22d inst by the upsetting of a small boat in the river St. John near Buleys point in the Long Reach, by which four persons are reported to have met a watery grave.

FIRE.—Last Sunday afternoon the House on the corner of Sidney and Sheffield-streets, Lower Cove, occupied by Mr. Wm. Johnstone grocer, and others, was discovered to be on fire.

Inquest.—On Thursday the 22d instant, an inquest was held at Shediac, before Andrew Weldon, Esquire, Coroner for the County of Westmorland, on view of the body of Stephen

Atkinson, who, it appeared, came to his death in consequence of a blow given him with a stick by William Kimrod. The jury returned a verdict accordingly.

Kimrod, we understand, keeps a public house, in which Atkinson and another person had been drinking, and quarrelled, when he interfered, and the fatal blow was the result. He was committed to the County jail for trial, which, it is expected, will take place in January next.

ST. ANDREWS & QUEBEC RAIL ROAD.

We are informed that the St. Andrews and Quebec Railway is likely to receive very considerable support from the inhabitants of Woodstock, and the county of Carleton. They seem to have taken up the matter in a proper spirit, and with a determination to carry it into effect.

THE REGISTRATION LAW.

It is to be hoped that our new House of Assembly will not suffer another Election to take place without a registration law.

At the late election it was said by one of the candidates, that 300 bad votes had been polled. If this statement be correct, and the men thus voting were prosecuted and fined, the expense would certainly be more on these individuals alone, than what would be necessary to carry a registration law into operation.

The present system also gives rise, in case of protracted scrutinies, to much ill feeling and enmity among those who would otherwise have enjoyed peace and friendship.

But the most important object to be obtained by registration, is the prevention of false swearing. In comparison with this, costs and charges, and all other considerations, must vanish.

New York, Oct. 26.—There are letters from the South, speaking of frost on the 19th and 20th, but they have produced no impression on the market, either because they are not credited or because it is supposed a frost would do as much good as harm.

TRADE OF SYDNEY.—Upwards of fifty sail of vessels, are reported to have arrived at Sydney in two days.

Gales on the Lakes.—The last gale on Lake Erie has made havoc with the shipping. Some twenty vessels, including several steamboats, had to take refuge among the islands.

PHILADELPHIA, Thursday, 6th Oct.—The European mail of the 4th instant, the advices of which were received here last night by telegraph from New-York, and appeared in our leading city papers this morning, produced an unusual excitement in business circles.

HAVANA.—From this long distracted Island, there is some cheering intelligence. After a long period of civil war, in which the contending parties spared neither age or sex, a train of measures has been set in motion by the President, who, it appears, is a man of intelligence, for the union of the whole Island under one government.

THE WAR IN MEXICO.—Recent intelligence from Mexico represents the state of the American army as very critical. The details of the battle of Monterey, are being made known, and it appears from the Washington correspondent of the New-York Tribune, that "in one regiment alone more men were actually killed, wounded or missing, than the whole loss as hitherto reported.

Later intelligence states that the Mexicans have taken Monterey, and that the American army has lost 12 general officers together with a large number of men.

SHIP NEWS.

The brigantine Teazer, arrived at Quebec on the 24th ult. the bark Paragon, from Alton to St. John, N. B. with loss of topmast &c., she bore up for England in lat. 47 46, N., lon. 38 30.

Capt. Thomson, of the brig Hebe, at Quebec, reports that on the 23d ult. he spoke the Clyde, from St. John, she had lost her rudder and deck load in the gale of the 20th ult.; on the 25th, picked up the crew of the Elvira, of Prince Edward Island; bound to Liverpool, 14 days out, she was dismasted on the 19th and was in a sinking condition.

The brig Xenophon, Rochester, Master, 6th Aug. from London for Quebec, put into Picou on the 24th inst., with loss of bowsprit-head main-topmast, spars, &c., during the gale of the 19th Sept. She will not proceed to Quebec, but will load either at Picou or St. John, N. B.

Capt. Jamieson, of the brig Scotsman, arrived at Quebec on the 23d Sept., in lat. 45 2, N. long. 40, W. brought on board six of the crew of the Deptford, of Sunderland, which was dismasted on the 20th ultimo.—George Duncan, Carpenter; John Duncan, and Thomas Tucker, boys, being washed overboard during the gale.

On the 25th passed the Lord John Russell, dismasted; saw the crew taken off the wreck by a vessel bound to the eastward. On the 1st inst., put on board the Ruby, of Yarmouth, N. S., for Dublin, the master and mate of the Deptford.
