YOUNG SCOTCHMAN DROWNED
Keays McNeil Lost His Life While Fishing Saturday Evening.
The sad news reached Dalhousie late Saturday evening that Keays McNeil had been drowned in the Nouvelle River while fishing.
Deceased lad was only eighteen years of age, and was unusually bright and likeable. For some years he had been a resident of Dalhousie living with Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Gallop and serving his time with Mr. Gallop in the auto garage and machine shop. Mr. and Mrs. Gallop were deeply attached to him.
For some time young McNeil has wished to visit his old home at Nouvelle West and enjoy a few days fishing.
Saturday afternoon with Mr. Gallop they left by auto and arrived early in the evening. They immediately took their fishing tackle and went down to the stream. Mr. Gallop being a stranger, was shown where to fish by McNeil.
For some unaccountable reason the unfortunate young man began to swim across the river, was caught in the swift current and carried into the whirlpool at the junction of Morris Brook with the main river, where recovery was impossible.
The body was recovered in a very short time, but life was extinct. The coroner was notified and an inquest was held on Monday when a verdict of accidental drowning was returned.
The remains were taken to the home of an uncle at Nouvelle, where services were held Tuesday morning. Later the body was taken to Escuminac and from there across the river to Dalhousie. At Dalhousie the body was met by a large number of sympathetic friends and conveyed to the Presbyterian church where the funeral services were conducted by Rev. H. McLean. The floral tributes were many and beautiful, among them being wreaths and cut flowers from Misses Jamieson, McNeil, Gallop, Mrs. D. Stewart, Mrs. Little, Mrs. T. G. Scott, Mrs. A. Gallop and Mrs. McNeil.
The remains were buried in the Presbyterian cemetery beside those of his father who died only a few weeks ago.
Deceased is survived by his mother two sisters and three brothers, who have the sympathy of a large circle of friends and relatives in their sad bereavement.

SAD DROWNING AT NOUVELLE
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FOUND BODY NEAR WHARF
Identified As That of Louis Soumasks, A Young Greek.
Monday evening Alex. Boudreau, who was gathering drift wood discovered the body of a man floating in the water. He immediately notified the crew of one of the boats tied up at the wharf when some men went out in a boat and brought the body to shore, and Coroner Martin notified.
The body was found to be very badly decomposed so much so that identification by means of the dead man's features was impossible.
However several articles found on the body, among them a gold watch with a \$20.00 gold piece as a watch charm as well as a silk handkerchief in which were wrapped several papers, including a bank book, all tend to establish the identity of the deceased as being Louis Soumasks, a young Greek who suddenly and mysteriously disappeared early last fall.
Soumasks was employed as a clerk in the ice cream and confectionery store in the Dimock Building on Water Street conducted at the time of his disappearance by George Gregory (famously known as George Spindakes) who later sold out and removed to Quebec.
Deceased young man was about thirty years of age.

BADLY INJURED BY AUTOMOBILE
Earnest Sherrard Struck By Automobile Near His Home.
Tuesday evening Ernest Sherrard was struck by an auto driven by Donald Stewart of Ferguson Manor, and severely injured. That he escaped being killed is considered miraculous.
Mr. Sherrard who lives on Roseberry Street west, was returning on a bicycle from his work at the Fraser mill. When opposite his home he turned in and was run over by the auto. He was thrown from the bicycle, hit and dragged a considerable distance by the auto, receiving several severe scalp wounds and had one ear nearly cut in two. He was also badly bruised about the back, arm and legs, and several arteries were cut, causing much loss of blood. He was removed to his verandah and Dr. Murray removed who attended to his injuries, many of which are very painful and from which he is at present suffering considerable pain.
Later in the evening Chief of Police Adams placed Donald Stewart under arrest.
After viewing the body and hearing the evidence brought in the following verdict—
"That Louis Soumasks met death through drowning himself on about the last of October, 1920."

Big Repair Scheme. Inasmuch as the buildings are out of repair and will need a considerable amount of work, it is said, that \$100,000 will be necessary to establish the new institution. Mr. Sanson said that he had found opposition to students being recruited for Mr. Kenyon's school upon the ground that it meant sending the young people out of Canada, and inasmuch as his evangelistic activities had been confined largely to the Maritime Provinces in recent years, it has been decided to establish his school here, and the opportunities offered at St. Martin's were found to be ideal. EVANGELIST WILL OPEN BIG SCHOOL

Old Baptist Seminary at St. Martins to be Made Headquarters for Bible Training. Fredericton, N. B., July 28.—The old Baptist seminary at St. Martins, St. John County, now owned by three St. John men, is about to be put into use again, this time as the headquarters of the Bethel Bible School, the educational institution now conducted at Spencerville, Mass., by Rev. F. W. Kenyon, an evangelist, who has conducted a number of campaigns in Fredericton and elsewhere in the Maritime Provinces. Frank D. Swim, ex-M. L. R. of Doaktown, and Havelock Sanson, of Campbellton, who has lately been actively identified with Mr. Kenyon's work, have gone to St. John where they expect to conclude arrangements for the purchase of the property.

Big Repair Scheme. Inasmuch as the buildings are out of repair and will need a considerable amount of work, it is said, that \$100,000 will be necessary to establish the new institution. Mr. Sanson said that he had found opposition to students being recruited for Mr. Kenyon's school upon the ground that it meant sending the young people out of Canada, and inasmuch as his evangelistic activities had been confined largely to the Maritime Provinces in recent years, it has been decided to establish his school here, and the opportunities offered at St. Martin's were found to be ideal. It will be an industrial school, as at Spencer, Mass., where students attending will have an opportunity to work at various kinds of employment to provide for their tuition and board.

USE APPROPRIATION ONLY.
The Graphic understands that the amount of money set aside this year

for the laying of permanent sidewalks has been exhausted. If this is so, then the walks now actually under way should be completed and the work called off for the season.
Citizens will regret that the appropriation did not go further, but are quite in demanding that no over-irritants be made to continue this work. To the average ratepayer it does not seem fair and equitable that the merchants doing business on the north side of Water Street, who enjoy no permanent sidewalk should be called upon to pay an equal proportion of the cost, through taxation, for such walks. In many towns and cities the property owners along whose frontage permanent walks are laid are required to pay one half of the cost of such improvements. This is perfectly fair as the laying of such permanent walks adds to the value of the property. The payment could be extended to a number of years so as to make the burden easier.
Again, many of the ratepayers feel that this work should be carried on by the issuing of bonds. Why should we who are already heavily burdened be obliged to pay by direct taxation

for improvements which will benefit our children and our children's children. They, by bonding the town for such improvements, should bear their share of the burden.
PRICE OF MILK.
This week's issue contains the gratifying announcement of a substantial reduction in the price of milk. On and after July 1st the price, per quart, will be ten cents. In taking this step the Gloucester Lumber and Trading Company are following in the footsteps of the leading dairymen of the province. There can be no doubt that the prevailing high price of milk has wrought a real hardship upon a great many people, especially during the current period of trade depression and reduced wages; and it is very certain that the proposed reduction in the price of this essential commodity will be heartily welcomed. People must have milk whether the price be high or low; when it is high they have as little as they can do without it, and when it is low they are never without it. Bathurst Northern Light.

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PROTECTION OF FORESTS NOW

Courts Now Giving Severe Sentences to Fire Law Breakers.

Jail sentences and heavy fines for causing forest fires are now being applied more frequently by Canadian courts. For the first time on record, an Ontario settler was sent to prison recently for defying the law regarding the taking of precautions before clearing land with fire.

Not many years ago, an Eastern Canada farmer set fire to his debris to clear a new patch for potato planting and as a direct result burned down enough white pine to have kept the largest Canadian lumber plant supplied for 66 years.

NEW BRUNSWICK MUNICIPALITIES

Annual Convention Will Be Held in Saint John Next Month.

A Convention of the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities will be held in St. John on the 24th and 25th days of August next. Important matters, such as the administration of the Health Act, highways, the expense and care of offenders under Dominion and provincial statutes at the expense of the municipalities, where fines are paid over to province or dominion, a new municipalities act, uniform accounting, the abolition of school districts and creation instead of one or more county school districts, and draft of general pension bill for municipal employees will be considered.

Origin of Heckling. The art of heckling, or badgering a political candidate with questions and interruptions, is well understood in England. The word, which is also spelled "heckle," was brought over into politics from the tax trade. Prior to the introduction of machinery, heckling was a process carried out by hand. The heckle was an instrument with a wooden base, into which a large number of steel pins were fixed at short distances one from another, these pins projected about four inches through the base, after the style of a hairbrush. The heckler, or heckler, held the flux material firmly in his hand, and drew it through the heckle pins, thereby straightening and splitting the fibre, and at the same time removing the loose fibre known as "tow." Nowadays this process is done by machinery, but the political application of it is still as much used as ever, and every soon finds out what a candidate is made of.

DISTINGUISHED VISITOR HERE

Hotel Dieu Hospital Visited by Dr. T. R. Ponton of Vancouver, B. C.

On Friday last, July 1st, Dr. T. R. Ponton of the Vancouver General Hospital, Vancouver, B. C., who has been chosen visitor of Canadian Hospitals, made his official visit to the Hotel Dieu Hospital here. For several years the American College of Surgeons has been working on a program of Hospital Standardization basing their work on surveys of the Hospitals of Canada and the United States and consultations with the administrative bodies governing these institutions. Previous to this year the program has been confined to hospitals of one hundred beds or over, but this year it is extended to those including fifty beds. As a result of these surveys and consultations there has been evolved a "Minimum Standard" for hospitals. This "Minimum Standard" has proved so acceptable in Canada that about half of the hospitals included in the program have complied with it.

Arriving on the Limited, Dr. Ponton was met at the station by members of the Medical Staff of the Hotel Dieu Hospital, who gave him a hearty welcome. At 1:30 p.m. he repaired to the hospital and after consultation with the Administrative Body began his visitation. He visited the patients' apartments, wards and private rooms, the Surgical Dept., Pathological and X-Ray Laboratories, the Dept. of Diets, Maternity Dept., Steam Laundry, the Room and Record Room. He examined the case records of patients under treatment in the hospital. Each department was investigated in detail, its methods of supervision and methods employed in each. The case-records and monthly reports of previous years were also examined.

At 3 p.m. a special meeting of the Medical and Nursing Staffs was held in the Staff-Room of the hospital. At the request of the President, Dr. L. G. Pinaut, Dr. Ponton addressed the meeting in part as follows:— President, Doctors, Reverend Sisters and Nurses:—

Since my arrival at Campbellton this visit has been full of pleasure and interest. At the request of the President, Dr. L. G. Pinaut, Dr. Ponton addressed the meeting in part as follows:— President, Doctors, Reverend Sisters and Nurses:—

Before I proceed to touch upon the subject of "Standardization," I wish to tell you that your hospital is standard—100 per cent—without deficiencies. While visiting your hospital I may say that I was not a little surprised—the wind was knocked out of me—unfortunately I had not provided ammunition to fire. So it will afford you great pleasure, no doubt, to know that your efforts have not been useless and that you have been working on the right lines. Now, for classification of hospitals, you must not stop there, but work to improve day by day.

I know you all know and have read about "Standardization," but we will go over the subject as it might prove helpful to you.

Recently we have done away with Class A, and B, re Classification of Hospitals. Hospitals are no longer compared, they are considered standard hospitals or are not approved at all.

Dr. Ponton then explained the three main points of "Minimum Standard": Case-Records, Staff Organization and Laboratory Facilities, showing how each was essential for the proper care of the patient, the end for which all hospitals exist.

At the end of his remarks the President, Dr. L. G. Pinaut, thanked Dr. Ponton for his visit and invited other members of the staff to speak. Dr. Murray replied in a few well chosen words.

A vote of thanks was then tendered to the distinguished visitor and the meeting adjourned.

Dr. Ponton, accompanied by Dr. Pinaut and other doctors, spent a few agreeable hours with Dr. H. Latham, one of the oldest members of the staff, at his summer home.

Dr. Ponton left on the Maritime to visit other hospitals of the province.

BUTTERMILK AS FOOD. The health value of buttermilk, which has been put on the list of light refreshments at the House of Commons at the request of two members was described by a London physician who is an authority on diet.

"Buttermilk is a beverage which decreases every encouragement, especially as a hot weather drink. Most of the fatty elements are removed in the process of making butter, but a number of other valuable nutritive qualities are left. These become even more valuable when buttermilk is taken with other food. Thus buttermilk contains a certain amount of casein which will enable one to make a most satisfying meal out of a glass of buttermilk plus a very small amount of potatoes."

"It also has an excess of lactic bacteria, the foes of nearly all the harmful germs in our digestive systems, which give it a slight laxative property. It has a decided acid flavor which makes it a thirst-quencher. As the fats have been extracted during the butter-making process, it has practically no body-heating properties. The casein is valuable because it supplies the repair elements needed to replace the wear and tear of muscular tissue."—(Ex.)
