Fine To Be Out of Trenches. You cannot imagine how fine it feels to be out of the trenches, and somehow you have the odd feeling of not playing today in the war. Can you understand that? You are away from it all; the booming and cracking of the guns does not interest you. You feel it is none of your business. The aeroplanes flying about and the trenches belong to another world and your own big guns not fifty yards distant have nothing to de with you. You do not look or wonder where the shells are falling o whom they are hitting. It is your day out of the trenches, and it is as if you are not playing and the war is something far in the background. You feel the strain of listening, waiting, and watch ing dropping away from you, and a sort of peace takes its place.


